



AN INSPIRATION

A little more detail about George and Elsie Poyner, the remarkable couple who grace our front cover.

When George and Elsie took their marriage vows in Saint Michael's 70 years ago the world was at war. The newly weds separated when were soon George was called for military service and ended his travels in Burma, where preparations to recapture Singapore stopped as Japan surrendered. Back in Shropshire he found work with T H Pain's timber yard in Cleobury for eleven years before moving in 1957 to become the wages clerk at Entwistle and Bacon's timber products. A small place, employing just 27 people.

He wasn't at E&B long before they were bought out by Forest Fencing, a company where young Poyner's ability was recognised and he climbed the ladder of promotion. Quite a big ladder; in 1998 George retired from full time employment as company chairman and finance director. A measure of the firm's growth under his guidance was the number employed: 27 in 1957, 550 in 1998.

His record of quiet and effective service to the community explains why he's held in such high regard. 58 years as a Parish Councillor, 37 of them also as Parish Clerk. Secretary of the Village Hall Committee for 63 years, a Church Warden from 1953 to date, Treasurer of the Parochial Church Council for 25 years, a governor at the village Primary School for 46 years and Chairman for 25. It surprised noone that in 2002 he was awarded the MBE for work in the community, which he received from HRH The Prince of Wales.

The love between the two is very obvious; less so Elsie's illness, that affects her mobility. So George has taken on the job of cooking, with Elsie giving instructions. A situation tailor made for falling out? They smile as they explain this adaption to a new way of doing things. "I supervise," says Elsie and George smiles and laughs in agreement.

They've seen huge changes in 70 years together and instead of the village Post Office and Stores of old they use supermarkets and the shops in Cleobury. "What does vex me is the matter of them closing the school," says George. "Prince Charles said to me when I collected my award 'I can't believe the years you've done. Look after that little school.' They just don't realise the effect it can have on the local community."

And very few know more about community than these two. *JR*

APRIL IN THE FOREST

Now is the season of birdsong, replacing the sounds of the chainsaw and crunch of breaking branches which accompanied a busy winter of woodland management in the Wyre Forest.

Bare soil will soon be covered by new plant growth because it's boom time again. Coppiced trees and newly-laid hedges will produce new shoots and provide excellent cover for nesting birds in years to come. Hedges are wonderful minihabitats which, though manmade, mimic the conditions found in scrub and woodland edge and linking or extending areas of woodland to make "wildlife corridors". I've been some looking at lovely examples recently - masses of hazel catkins taking over from the autumn's show of hawthorn berries and promising a good crop of nuts for squirrels and mice next autumn.

This month we should see the first butterflies of spring. The brimstones spend the winter hibernating among ivy leaves, in which they are wonderfully camouflaged. They are strong fliers and when they wake will be heading along the rides and hedges to refuel with nectar, then they will search out and lay their eggs singly on the leaves of common or alder buckthorn.

On May 5th there are no local elections in Shropshire, but there will be a nationwide referendum on a change to the voting system for parliamentary elections. I believe our existing First-Past-the-Post system has served the country well. It relies on the basic principle of one person one vote, so whichever candidate gets the most votes wins. It usually delivers decisive results, is the system most likely to give the power to remove failed Governments and much fairer than the alternative on offer.

The Alternative Vote system would be a poor replacement, complex, confusing and costly. It is used in only three countries in the world - Papua New Guinea, Fiji and Australia. It allows voters to rank candidates in order of preference. If no candidate achieves 50% plus one of the votes cast for the first preference, the second preference votes of the candidate who comes last are distributed amongst the other candidates. If no candidate achieves the 50%+1 threshold, the second preference votes of the next lowest candidate are distributed, and so on until one candidate achieves over 50%. This system, as we saw in the Labour leadership election last year, can allow a candidate in second or even third place to end up being declared the winner.

AV would allow supporters of fringe parties to have their votes counted several times. For example, in 2005 I received 45% of the vote, so the MP here would have been decided by the Greens,

UKIP and perhaps Labour. If I had not won over 50% in 2010, both the BNP and the Monster Raving Loony Party could have had their votes counted more than Conservative or Liberal Democrat voters.

A change to AV is estimated to cost up to an additional £250 million. As the system is so confusing to understand, local councils would waste money on voter education campaigns. Local councils would also be likely to buy electronic vote counting machines. It seems wrong to spend up to a quarter of a billion pounds of taxpayers' money bringing in a new system when the existing one works. Those who support AV know it would be more likely to give the third party the balance of power after every General Election, so the Government would be determined by politicians doing backroom deals rather than through the ballot box. This seems a backwards step for democracy not a progressive reform, which explains why so many Labour politicians are also opposed to AV.

David Cameron recently said, "Yes, our politics need reform. Yes, we need to shift more power down across the country. But no to AV. It means an unfair voting system, processes that are unclear, and politics that is unaccountable. It is the precise opposite of what we need right now."

If you want your vote to count as much as your neighbour's, I urge you to vote No to AV on 5th May. *Philip Dunne*

Heather Kidd's Local View

A FASTER AMBULANCE SERVICE

The reorganisation ideas for the Royal Shrewsbury Hospital (a decision is due on March 24th) have triggered all sorts of feelings and reactions about the outcome. For much of South Shropshire the access to hospitals is the real problem, both in public transport terms and especially ambulance response times.

One of the more positive things to come out of the consultation process was that the Hospital's Chief Executive Adam Cairns, the Hospital Trust and the Ambulance Service for the West Midlands began to take this issue seriously.

Cllr Nigel Hartin and myself have continually raised this issue in letters, private meetings and in public meetings over the years. In response Adam Cairns recently convened a meeting with all the parties mentioned above and the Welsh Ambulance service. They will now be doing work to bring the information together in an effort to improve the response for us all. If this achieves response times better than the 35 - 40 minutes many of us now experience then we will have achieved something.

Living in a rural area should not mean we have an inferior service just because we do not hit the targets and can be lost in those for urban areas. Mothers in labour, children and Road Traffic accidents cannot be attended by First Responders. The Air Ambulance does not fly at night or in bad weather.

We have a follow up meeting in about two months. Rest assured Nigel and I will be fighting to improve this situation for us all. *Heather Kidd*

Lulu's Story



Elayne Jonas, our regular Vets Pets scribe, has a story with a happy ending. And you could make it even happier if you're looking for a dog.

Lulu, a three year old Staffie, came into Birch Hill Rescue after being on "death row" at another animal rescue. After a rare reaction to some medication she collapsed and began haemorrhaging. She was very poorly for several days and had to be hospitalised here at the surgery. As she was so anaemic it

was determined that she needed a blood transfusion.

This procedure is carried out regularly these days. Here at Hollybush we have several pets, both cat and dog, who are donors and we can also get blood from a national pet blood bank. On this occasion it was Billy, a Labrador owned by Debbie the head nurse, who stepped up; he'll do anything for a free meal.

After being given a light sedation to keep him relaxed, a little bit of hair was clipped from his neck and a large needle placed in a vein. The blood passes into a special collection bag containing Heparin to stop it clotting and the bag is weighed regularly until it is full at 500ml. The needle was then be removed from Billy, who got the doggie equivalent of a cup of tea and a biscuit and a nap. The blood was filtered and was then ready for the patient.

Lulu had an IV catheter placed in her leg and the donated blood began to pass into her. She had to be carefully monitored to check that it went in at the correct rate and she didn't have an adverse reaction to it.

When receiving donated blood the animal can have the first donation without any need of determining what type they are ("O" "A" etc) but must be typed before they can have a second transfusion.

To be a donor, dogs need to be over 25kg, healthy and with their vaccines up to date. Ideally, blood tests are undertaken to check for any other underlying problems.

Lulu was a superb patient, putting up with all the treatment without complaint. She is doing well and looking for a new home. If you are interested call 01299 270406.



THE MEDICAL CENTRE SAGA

The Parish Church was packed on March 2nd for the meeting about a new Medical Centre for Cleobury Mortimer. In fact for Cleobury Country, as our current centre serves a wide area.

Doctor Chris Dimond chaired the gathering, and representatives of Cleobury Patients' Shropshire Council, the Primary Care Trust, Matrix Realty Group and the Medical Practice all had their say as the history of the acre of land gifted to the town was covered from each point of view. All the speakers were brief.

Discussion was opened to questions and comments from the public, with a strong feeling of indignation that the Parish Council had no representative. They had another meeting, but their presence 50 yards away in the Market Hall did seem ironic. After points of view from focused pretty frantic had been expressed - talk of a revolution did hint at a Raving Loony presence - the meeting agreed on a motion calling on the Parish Council to act before the funding runs out. There was no dissent Professor Waddington and offered to act for the meeting and advise the Parish Council of the vote. He was back in two minutes, having found the Market

Hall locked, with both the lights public, most of whom then left at and the Parish Council out.

County Councillor Madge Shineton did explain to the meeting that the Parish Council were bound to get the best value for money for the community out of the gifted land, but she also expressed concern that process had taken so long.

It was a prize example of failing to keep people informed, which only served to arouse suspicion of the Parish Council's motives. There is little evidence they were anything but honourable, but they were also coy about telling the people they serve the simple facts. We can only hope they have learned from that lesson.

The Council met on March 7th. with 42 of the public crowding the room. In the Open Comments period, Dr Dawn **Powick** explained the urgency of the need for a new Medical Centre and Jenny McCrorie the feeling and motion from the earlier meeting. When the meeting proper opened, Cllr Gwilym Butler suggested that the Medical Centre brought forward in the agenda.

After discussion, it was proposed Cllr Geoff Hainsworth that land on the Muller/Bovis site available for the Medical Centre; passed unanimously. There was a round of applause from the this point.

The Clarion has learned there was subsequently a meeting between Cleobury Patients' Voice number a of Parish and agreed Councillors, who the Council would write to Primary Care Trust making clear the decision above had been made. We have been told that the letter refers to 'land south of the Ludlow Road' and does not precisely identify the site.

We have also had sight of a letter from County Councillors Butler and Shineton to the Primary Care Trust. It states that the Parish Council has agreed to confirm a site by April 28th, that senior members of the County Council support the plan for a new Medical Centre, that the Head of Strategy and Policy has no objection to the development and acknowledges that no planning consent has been given yet, but are confident that 'can be achieved.' The Primary Care Trust have acknowledged the Parish Council's advice of their decision, but state that the development site must be properly identified.

Dr Dawn Powick has agreed there is no room for complacency and that pressure should be kept up.

That is the position on March 21st. We will try to keep you informed of progress.



Clarion Craftsman - Saw Doctor Dave Clark - Page 23



Dave Clark is well known in the area as a restorer of classic motorbikes with a sharp eye for detail and a smooth way of riding. But he's here this month because he spent his working life in this area as a saw doctor at the Forest Fencing works run by Alan Timmis, with George Poyner as a fellow director, in Newnham Bridge.

Born in Nottingham, Dave did a five year apprenticeship to learn his craft, interrupted by two years of National Service in the Army. He showed early signs of quiet determination when he set out to ride to work one very icy day on his shiny new 700cc Royal Enfield. Only when he'd fallen off five times, picked it up and tried again did he decide to park the bike and walk. No question of not getting in to work. He married Mary and with the arrival of Tracey and

Lisa on the way in the late 1960s, Dave was looking for a better job. He and Mary talked about emigrating to South Africa, but an advert for a job in Worcestershire caught his eye and he got an interview.

"It was Entwhistle and Bacon Timber Products back then and when they showed me round I walked into this big shed full of women making boxes for the apple farmers. They were all singing, and I thought if that was the happy atmosphere of the place I could fancy working there."

It was traditional in the timber industry that a saw doctor got accommodation with the job, like other men working on the land did. Dave's a quietly canny negotiator and the company bought him and Mary the house they now own in Cleobury. It was handy for the local branch of E&B; today we call it the Box Factory.

His job was to run the saw making and servicing department, with seven men under his charge as the company grew. Saw production meant taking in rolls of high tensile steel and sending out the endless bands of cutting teeth that are the business part of band saws. In the early days the joint in the band was overlapped and silver

soldered. A job that had to be done with great care and precision, with the blade cutting at 8,000 feet a minute and the joint made with silver solder only 3mm thick. As technology advanced, he learned to TIG weld a butt join with no overlap; another task that had to be right. A saw that can slice a tree trunk down its length works hard.

One thing Dave insisted on from the start was proper dust extraction on every saw in the company. "Looking back I don't know how I did it," he grins from the less frantic world of retirement. But the workshop where he transforms wrecks to winners he built concours himself. And if he needs a little piece turning up, he does it on an ancient lathe he also brought back to full working life. Those skills will never leave him.

We have had another burglary on 16th March in Ronhill Cresent. In the early hours of March 6th there was an assault near the lights at Catherton Road on the A4117; four males in a vehicle stopped and assaulted anther male in what appears to be a unprovoked attack. There was a disorder at the Stable Tavern on Saturday March 19th, when a male was arrested at the scene and has been charged to court for threatening behaviour.

There have been a couple of attacks on garages and out houses; please secure them as best you can. If you have any information about these offences, or wish to speak to me about any issues you can contact me. Details at the bottom of this page.

The first meeting of the new Neighbourhood Watch will be in the Methodist Hall at 7.00pm on April 13th. Talks on crime prevention, how crime is dealt with, what's been happening and how we can all help to make our community safer. If you would like to come, let me know as we need to know numbers. There will be posters around the town with the full programme.

The NHW facebook page has been a great success, so much so that the West Mercia force are looking at the media and how it can be used successfully in local policing. Response has been fanastic, I am able to see what the local problems are and can be contacted through the site too. Information that has been received has led to a number of known criminals being stopped and checked in and around our area, work you may not see that is going on in the back ground.

There were concerns raised at the Local Joint Committee and on Facebook about speed through the town. We have conducted speed enforcement in March and this will continue throughout the spring and summer. There have also been issues surrounding dogs off the lead and not controlled correctly; these have also had positive outcomes and enforcement.

New issues are people parking their vehicles on pavements restricting movements of mothers with prams and the motor scooters of the less mobile. It is an offence to cause an unessesary obstruction of the highway, where a fixed penalty notice can be issued for £30, so keep the pavement clear. With regard to noisy vehicles around the Love Lane area, a number of young drivers have been spoken to. If their poor standard of driving mixed with anti social behaviour continues, the police have the power to seize the vehicles and impound them. charges are in excess of £120, plus Removal storage and court costs; if the vehicle is not collected it can be crushed. The majority of young drivers do drive sensibly, so let's not tar them all with the same brush.

If you need any help, the station is open most Saturday mornings from 10.00 to 12.00 noon. Volunteers for all kinds of community work are also required, if you can spare some time then let me know.

The Police Community Fund is a registered charity that not only helps victims of crime but also gives small grants to local ventures within the West Mercia area. Towards the end of 2010, PC Sarah Smithson applied for a grant to benefit young people in the Cleobury area and was successful in securing a grant of £300. This has been passed to Mark Greaves who manages St Mary's Youth Project; he will supplement the Project's rock climbing equipment by purchasing a further ten harnesses, ropes and helmets so that more of the 80 young people who are members can take part in this popular and challenging activity.

Lets make our community the safest by working together.

A Secret Success - Willowdene Care Farm - Page 31



Matt Home. How many hours a week does he put in?
"Too many - You're on call 24/7." **EFFECTIVE DEVOTION**

You have to look very carefully to find Willowdene Care Farm in Chorley. It looks just like a farm; in fact it is a centre of excellence in bringing drug addicts back to sanity and a worthwhile place in society. Their success measured by the number of men - it's only men, a mix of the sexes simply would add complication - who complete training to get a qualification, go out and get a job in the open market and stay drug free and employed for twelve months. The national average for that success rate is 38 percent; Willowdene's is 85 percent.

The place is run by Matthew Home, who took over what his parents John and Jenny started in 1988, with a unit behind their bungalow and a willingness to care for people nobody else would look at. The men they took in worked on the farm and in the neighbouring woodlands; the Home family were motivated by Christian principles, certainly not by profit . Some of the local press reaction was less than

charitable in its tone, but the work continued and the Chorley community recognised what a good job they were doing. There was a measure of that at a council planning meeting to discuss the latest development. "Suppose we'd said No in 1988?" asked one enlightened councillor. "There's not been a single incident of trouble at Willowdene."

That success has not come Every applicant for a place is interviewed face to face, and has to show a willingness to come off drugs and work to get back into society. "They must be someone you can work with," as Matthew puts. One 39 year old summed up his wish: "I believe I have the right to live," he said at one of the regular reviews every student faces. "This is the first I've time been accepted anywhere."

That's a strong clue to what made many of these men addicts in the first place: "People take drugs to kill pain," explains Matthew. Some of the background stories leave you wondering how children - and most of the students were first abused at a very young age - can survive such treatment. "The average starting age on heroin is 14," says Matt. "Many were dabbling with drugs at primary school."

Every new student has been through a detox programme before coming to Willowdene. They come from all over the UK, from Scotland down to the West Country, and often find the countryside hard to handle: "One guy from Liverpool had never seen the stars at night, he'd only seen street lights and was afraid of the dark."

There's no formal timetable for a student to follow, each one has an individual programme that addresses his needs. They sign up for a nine months course and have a weekly review of progress. It's a strictly drug free site and alcohol is not allowed either; few break that rule and those that do risk expulsion. Matt again: "It has to be tough love in this situation. They all work on the farm and estate or at forestry. The biggest thing we do is break the cycle of shame children who've been abused and taking drugs since they were as young as six think it's their own fault."

Willowdene remains in touch with many students from years ago and three of the current full time staff arrived as addicts and have been through the course. They're not allowed to take up a post here until they've proved themselves working by elsewhere for two years and staying clean. The intensity of the work means a lot of staff involved, currently ten full time, four part timers and two volunteers. There is still a need for volunteer drivers of the farm's own vehicles to carry students about; talk to Matt on 01746 718658.

It's financed by the government and local charities, because drug addicts cost the country a lot and curing them makes good money sense. When Crispin Blunt, Under Secretary of State from the Ministry of Justice, visited West Mercia recently, Willowdene was on his tour as an outstanding example of what can be done to cure society of some of its ills. It's a beacon of hope for people with no home or hope.

Clive Davies' Westwood Farm Diary - Page 33

WESTWOOD FARM 18th March

Spring hasn't quite sprung yet but it seems well on the way. With the cattle in particular requiring plentiful supplies of feed over the cold winter months, it's noticeable that their appetites are much more easily satisfied now that temperatures are higher. We have been busy preparing the spring calvers, following on from their worming programme, and this year we have administered a flukicide: we have also dosed each of the expectant mums with a vaccine. The benefit of this is that the calves don't succumb to a range of viral and bacterial conditions. The fluke is a worm like pest that affects the livers of animals; it is mostly associated with wet periods. Whilst recent months have been somewhat dryer than average, we felt that with the cattle having experienced the stressful winter period it was best to offer the most comprehensive broadspectrum treatment available. All in all, we are now set-up for the arrival of the new crop of calves. The cows will calve down to a bull we had calves from throughout last year, but the first calving heifers are due to a bull that we bought in especially for them. In the past we have used his half brother, so there will be interest in the comparisons that we can soon make. We are just about a full week into lambing the couple of dozen Shropshire ewes. Already we are over half way. Most of the lambs are strong and to date creating few problems. That will no doubt change!

It's a bit early to tell yet, but like the Hereford's situation, we have offspring by three different rams and so to watch the progress of the various lines of breeding should make this small sheep enterprise interesting viewing. But, for both the sheep and cattle, one major bonus would be that the grass soon shoots-

on. Whilst it's dry and some days sunny, the temperatures aren't just yet high enough to encourage rapid growth. We have held off with applying any fertilizer so far. We have a delivery on its way but what with the less than helpful growing conditions and the fact that the tractor is ill, we are just delaying the spreading for a few more days.


The tractor saga is sad and probably expensive. Some accidental damage to about three teeth on a gearbox cog is bad news. The John Deere dealers in Leominster are carrying out some surgery. It's a specialist job and will blow the repairs budget whatever the outcome. It's only recently that the same offending bit of kit had to have a new water pump fitted. As soon as we can get the Green Machine back working, there will be a long list of jobs to undertake especially in connection with growing some grass and shifting muck so that the cows have comfortable quarters for calving-time. The winter caused some damage to pipes on our crop sprayer. The obvious candidates we have spotted, let's hope there are not more major concerns elsewhere.

The hard early frost caught us out. As soon as possible we must investigate the detailed workings of this equipment to enable it to be ready for any required field work. Most of our spraying is now to do with controlling weeds in grassland. The triaxle stock trailer is also undergoing some repairs. It's about seven years old now and has hauled a good many tonnes of animals about, as well as many other bits and pieces. The welded floor seams are showing some wear. The main problem is a fairly clear-cut design fault, but they're not always so obvious when you buy these things. Let's hope that everything else that should do stays in one piece. It's looking an expensive spring already!





THE NOVERS

Glyn Barratt has news about a secret place that's becoming open to those who know about it. That includes you now.

The Novers is one of the hidden secret places of the Clee Hills. A 28 acre re-generated ancient woodland containing archaeological evidence of the limestone industry which once flourished upon hill. the Ancient opencast quarries, a mine, lime kilns and the remains of tramways and inclines survive buried deep within the trees. When the quarrying ceased the site was abandoned and slowly the mixed native forest took back the site, regenerating from the ancient forest seed bank. It is a magical place with ivy and moss draped trees that inspire the imagination of visitors of all ages. A wealth of wild flowers in the Spring and home many of our native woodland creatures.

The site has recently been purchased by Titterstone Clee Heritage Trust with grant support from Shropshire County, English Nature, ALSF and community contributions.

It will be managed as a sustainable woodland, to increase its biodiversity and provide an educational facility for local schools and colleges.

Over the winter the main track has access been resurfaced and a small car park has been created. A volunteer programme has been launched and initial works have been commenced to improve the walkways within woodland. A programme of events and short taster type courses are planned for the summer and Autumn of 2011 on a range of woodland and landscape related topics. The course programme will be available in the Clarion for the next six months and available on the TCHT web site at www.thecleehilltrust.co.uk. In the longer term plans are being made for a programme of archaeological experimental projects, which will include the building of an Iron Age Round House planned for the summer and autumn of this year. The ancient hazel coppice will be restored to a productive cycle and a permaculture forest garden will be created within the woodland to provide a sustainable foraging resource.

Not such a big anyone problem experience of the business, but daunting to a willing volunteer without much experience. One organising admitted they were learning, a good sign that they prepared to listen.

The big message was that local people are concerned and care very much about the best possible health provision in the future. But we only saw one Parish Concullor there - full credit to Debbie Brown. We'll be trying to bring you details of some of the less well known services available through the NHS or local volunteer bodies.

So Cleobury Patients' Voice is up and running. And making an effective noise. Please back them in any way you can - it's your future that concerns them.

OH DEAR, ANOTHER SCAM TO BEWARE OF

This is a letter received by Shropshire Council, printed without the author's name to protect their identity:

Last week we had a Mr Frederick Butcher call at our farm offering to sell half a tank of bitumen tar. He said he worked for County Highways contracted was from Shropshire Council undertake work on our roads and his tanker lorry had been damaged a few days earlier. He was selling the bitumen at £1/ foot instead of the usual £7.20/ foot. He was driving a white 'transit' style van together with another man and a small boy. There was no sign of the tanker. The police confirm the van as his, registered in Oxfordshire, Reg NA56 PDY.

We told him no thanks as we had a similar incident last autumn where we also called the police who 'saw them off'.

This is very concerning when people come to the door selling something that is too good to be true - I currently live with my aged parents who would have probably have paid him as they believed his story and felt that everyone who says they work for the Council must indeed do so.

Could you please, therefore, confirm to me whether Shropshire Council does contract out to such people and whether they are acting legally by apparently selling off a commodity which we have paid for through our precept. How can they sell the tar off privately instead of getting on

with improving the condition of our roads?

And this is the explanation from Phil James of the County Highways Department, when he circulated the original enquiry, asking that people be warned of the cheats:

We have also been contacted by a farmer giving the same story as detailed above. He was trying to confirm whether the "working for the Council" story was true. I put him right and asked that he spread the word locally that these individuals are not connected with Shropshire Council operations in any way.

I'm told the individual concerned was very persuasive and even said that they could make payment to "South Shropshire District Council" (which we all know is no longer in existence) in order to try to validate his offer!

Do please take careful note of this. Cuts in public spending will be used by cheats like this to try to swindle people. If you are offered a special deal on anything that is supposed to come from the council, check it out with the police.



A check-up at the Medical Centre showed blood pressure at its lowest level


for six years and a doctor visibly impressed. Add the weight loss and he was happy to try reducing daily intake of an asthma controlling drug by half.

IT BEGAN WITH A BOOK

Terry Keegan has been passionate about Heavy Horses most of his life, with deep admiration for their quiet strength. Years ago he visited Walsall's museum and found the history of their harnesses and decoration. Realising tradition would be lost unless recorded, he wrote 'The Heavy Horse, its Harness and Harness Decoration'. It has become a standard reference. "People were asking where they could get traditional brassware and harness, and I realised it was a business opportunity," he recalls.

With a friend in the casting industry, original patterns were found and bought. These are made of lead and used to make a sand mould into which molten brass is poured. From the

beginning KB Brass decided to make the best quality, and tried several foundries before finding one that could produce the standard they wanted. "Brass is brass, but quality of design and the finishing makes all the difference," he explains. It is also a labour intensive process.

A raw casting has its figuring cleaned by hand and the piece is dished slightly in a press. Polishing to a mirror finish gives the final touch and each one has the KB stamp . Terry has been asked to value rare brasses before auction; he turned them over to find his KB branding.

It's well known and respected; the man who does programme artwork for the Dorset Steam Fair knows Terry and Alison. "A landmark figure in the Heavy Horse shows," he said. When organisers want a souvenir brass for entrants, they turn to KB for the ability to make to a high standard. They still use a Walsall foundry for the casting; detailed filing is by a local contractor.

Not every special is a success. They made one for the owner of the original caravan pulled by horses in a Royal Show display. A caravan on a horse brass had no appeal and almost all production was scrapped.

Their work is good; they have twice been commissioned to

produce small batches of exclusive designs for HRH The Prince of Wales' own Heavy Horses. They submitted a design with the normal Fleur de Lys design and learned that it's not quite so when you're dealing at Royal level. The correct three feather Prince of Wales Fleur de Lys in deep relief was the acceptable answer.

The business has grown, peaking with 130 designs in 2000, when Alison took over the day-to-day running and Terry took a back seat. You can't say he retired, such an active enthusiast doesn't. Alison heads up the team when she and her son spend a weekend at shows, arriving in a converted Mercedes van with living accommodation and enough space to carry their stock. At most shows they'll have about 30 different designs on display.

The latest are two special Limited Editions to mark the wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton, priced at £9.95 and £10.95 and highlighted with hand painting. Even that is special, using very durable Hammerite enamel. The next special will celebrate the Queen's 85th birthday; this may be a business with strong traditions, but it doesn't stand still.


