It's a very compact counter, with room for only one and when we called the place was very busy. Too busy to establish whether they will carry the same range of services as the larger office just three doors up the road.

The Post Office signage gives a clear message, the poster on the door declaring 'If the shop's open, then we're open.' That's a much bigger range of hours than before.

Raj was his usual affable self, smiling at the customers as a tutor from the Post Office guided him through the various processes that he will master with practice. We wish the family well.

ANOTHER NEW SERVICE

On page 23 you can read about the official opening of Cleobury Opticians in Church Street. Another service available here in the town that means you don't have to travel a long way for professional attention.

But the news from this newcomer to the town gets even better. They have been

given official approval to provide domiciliary eye tests at the homes of people with limited mobility. The service is NHS funded and free of charge, but is only available for patients who meet certain requirements.


No room here to list those, but a call to 01299 270012 will establish eligibility and an appointment for a home test can be made.

LLOYDS BANK'S NEW **OPENING HOURS**

The letter from Lloyds Bank, advising a further restriction of their opening hours, caused some concern. So the Clarion talked to Sue Lloyd, Branch Manager. I should make it clear that no restrictions were imposed on our meeting, none of the corporate habit of asking to see the questions before the meeting was allowed.

The obvious question was, in a growing town where the main street has no empty shops

(Hems' old shop is actually a residence now), why reduce the opening hours of the principal bank by 40 percent? The answer was simply the amount of footfall on Tuesdav and Wednesday, the days the bank will be closing from June 1st. The bank itself is quiet on those days and the use of the cashpoint is lower as well. That source of cash will still operate and the staff will be on call in case of any problems with it.

Sue made it clear that opening three days a week is not a prelude to closure. The Presteigne branch has been opening two days a week for some years and is not listed for closure. The Cleobury staff have been given the choice of working two days at another branch or working a shorter week; no redundancies.

So it's a simple business decision: stay open on the days it pays to do so. The bank will still support selected local events and encourage staff to get involved. If we as a community want to get it back to five days opening, we have to support our local bank and it will respond in kind. In these days of cutbacks all around, that would be a big mountain to climb. Meanwhile, the bank is still there. IR

A REAL TEST OF FAITH

Rosemary Wormington was the guest, there to speak about Brain Tumour Support, a charity whose title is self-explanatory. They offer support to patients, their families and carers.

Her involvement started when her daughter was diagnosed with a tumour at four months and she told how the charity helped her and of the many inspirational people she's met in voluntary her work. Some 16,000 people а year are diagnosed with a serious brain tumour, which means extremely delicate surgery and long term care. There is no simple cure but there is care; nobody needs to face the problem alone.

Richard Williams introduced Rosemary and told of his own early diagnosis last June because what he thought was a severe migraine was found to be much more. He was given days to live, yet here he was telling his story, of survival through one determination, support and a strong Christian faith. The strain on his family and the need to travel 67 miles to Coventry for his daily therapy is just part of the story; his iron will and faith have seen his life expectation grow to ten years. He asked the surgical team what the shortest time was for a patient to get out of bed after the operation - it was 48 hours. He did it in 22.

Richard and Rosemary were a double act, joined briefly by Professor Sir George Castledine, who explained that global medical research cooperation is sparse and that there is a need for an international body to draw information together. This was a very impressive demonstration of people facing up to adversity and helping one another cope. The human race is richer for the presence of people willing work for others in this way. The problem of keeping sheep up on Clee Hill is more complex than a layman would think. The height means lower temperature, which means slower growth of the grass they live on, so the feed from one acre is less than down

in the valley. Angela MacKirdy has a modest flock of the Shropshire breed, with this year's 23 yearlings down in Ludlow where the feed is better. Shropshire breed, please notice; that trading title is not just a fancy name.


Wool from the shearing is sent down to Devon, where it's spun into yarn and dyed in a range of colours. The result is a double knitting wool that you can buy at the Farmers' Market, or pick up some of the pieces Angela knits herself: gloves, socks or handy bags to hold your mobile. You have to handle the wool to really appreciate how soft and warm it can be.

Planting a new orchard has produced apples that make some very fine juices, including a mulled version. Other fruits add to the menu and a packet of Fruit Leather from apple and

THE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Our March meeting welcomed Diana Perry of David Austin Roses, who has been involved for 30 years; her knowledge and enthusiasm for her job shone through in her talk. She explained there is only one true English rose, the one we find in the hedgerow! All roses have been developed from those brought to our country bv collectors from China and Europe. The flower has been cherished since the 1600's and constantly cross bred to develop perfume, disease resistance, shape of blooms and colour.

As Diana moved through her slides she gave information on pruning, hints on how to get the best out of our roses and advice on the best type to suit our gardens. Potted roses need their compost replacing about twice a year (John Innes No 3) and they need plenty of water during summertime. It takes about eight years for David Austin to develop a rose to show at Chelsea. They have about 30 green houses full of seedlings which are checked and selected to take further. After the green houses where the cross pollination is done by hand the selected plants are transferred to the fields where they again go

through a selection process. All done by David Austin who has a very keen smell and eye for beauty. Names are very important and can be the making of a new rose, especially if the person it is named after is there when it is presented at Chelsea. But it is the old favourites that sell well.

Our Spring flower competition was won by Jenny Vanderhook. Our next meeting is about making best use of space for fruit and vegetables and will be led by Wade Muggleton on April 13th in the Methodist Hall. *Liz Smurthwaite*



Keeping Your Horse's Legs Healthy

Lameness is one of the most common causes of a vet visit for a horse. The equine lower limb is comprised of bone, joint and tendon which don't have a lot of protective muscle, making them vulnerable to damage. By following a few simple steps, you can go a long way in keeping your horse's legs healthy.

Warm Up involves gradually raising your horse's heart rate to increase the amount of oxygen in the blood. Adequate warm up is essential to avoid injury to muscles, ligaments and tendon as it increases the mobility and elasticity of muscles, which in turn minimise the amount of strain placed on tendons and ligaments. Choosing the best way to warm your horse depends on the discipline and the ground conditions, but the basic approach should always be the same and a regime that is regular and repeatable is best enforced.

A similar **Cooling Down** session after exercise is fundamental to give time for lactic acid to be released from tired muscles which will reduce the risk of injury post exercise.

Leg Protection is always worth the investment. Generally boots are a more favourable choice for horse owners as they are easy to fit, keep clean and are quick to remove. However, there are a few problems with boots that owners need to be aware of; specifically heat build-up, weight, restriction of movement and poor fit. Remember that badly fitting boots are worse than no boots at all.

There is a lot less choice when it comes to bandages, but when fitted correctly, they can help protect and support the ligaments and tendons in the horse's lower legs. The main disadvantage to bandaging is that they are frequently fitted incorrectly and if they are uneven or too tight then the pressure can cause tendon injuries. No matter which form of leg protection you have chosen for your horse we would always recommend it is removed immediately after work to prevent any injuries caused through excessive heat buildup in the tendons and ligaments. If your horse has undertaken hard work (galloping or jumping on hard ground or exercising on an excessively hot day), cold hose its legs for a good 5 minutes and then give it a gentle walk around before returning it to its box.

Any evidence of your horse being lame after exercise is an immediate indicator that they may have sustained an injury during exercise. The most common injuries sustained at exercise include over reach or brushing injuries, bruising and inflammation as a result of knocking fences and tendon or ligament injuries due to excessive extension of the lower limb.

As well as assessing your horse for lameness after exercise it is also important to assess your horse's legs carefully to try and establish if there are any early signs that something may be wrong.

Prevention is always better than the cure, so if you have any questions or concerns about your horse's legs, speak to your vet! *Kate Maxwell*



Letter from Westminster -Philip Dunne MP

By the time you read this, we will be roughly a month away from the General Election.

All General Elections are important. They determine the direction our country will take for the next five years. This election could be the most important for a generation. As we approach Thursday May 7th, the media frenzy surrounding the election may seem endless to some. But I want to encourage everyone to vote, whatever your political persuasion might be.

We are fortunate in this country to hold a real stake in how we are governed. Democratic elections are something often taken for granted, but universal suffrage is a fairly modern development even in the UK. Women only received the vote in 1918, and even then only for women over 30. It took another ten years to bring the right in line with men's at age 21.

Too many in the world still have no say over who governs them. While many decry a lack of faith in our political system, it is worth recalling what Winston Churchill said: "Democracy is the worst form of government, except for all the others."

So please ensure you can vote on May 7th by registering at <u>www.gov.uk/register-to-vote</u>. Our democracy thrives when more of us are engaged. If you are not sure whether you will be able to make it to the polling station on Election Day, you can apply for a postal vote or have someone vote for you as a proxy. The last day to apply for a postal vote is Tuesday 21st April, with ballot papers being sent later that week. So if you expect to be away between then and the election, it may be worth getting a proxy.

Encouraging younger voters can be difficult, but studies show those who use their vote once are likely to continue voting in the future. I am speaking to young people in sixth forms in our schools to urge them to vote, helping our system and society become more inclusive and democratic.

Some argue that the voting system needs overhauling. But the public overwhelmingly rejected a move to proportional representation in the referendum just a few years ago. Nor am I not convinced that we need compulsory voting. Personally, I have always felt that politics should become more compelling to inspire people to vote. The right to use one's vote, or not use it, should be left to the free choice of the individual. It is worth reminding ourselves just how powerful an individual's vote can be. General Elections offer an opportunity to have a direct say in who governs you for the next five years. For those who doubt how much difference one vote can make, consider Exeter in 1910: the incumbent Conservative MP Henry Duke won with a majority of just one. In the Ashton-under-Lyne constituency in 1886, Conservative John Addison and Liberal A. B. Rowley tied the election, and under the law at that time, the Returning Officer was given a casting vote. He returned Addison, essentially with a majority of zero!

For me, Election Day cannot come soon enough. It has been an immense privilege to represent the Ludlow Constituency for the past ten years, and I very much hope to be able to do so in the next Parliament. *Philip Dunne*





One service coming back through Bewdley stopped when a passenger pointed out to the driver that the bus appeared to be on fire. Sure enough, smoke was issuing from the back of the bus and the driver got out to investigate. Having peered at the engine for a bit, it was suggested to him that it would be a good idea if he switched it off... Cue another late arrival. Still no sign that the 2L departs from the usual stop in Corve Street so if you are a stranger wanting the service, good luck. On the other hand, the bus stop at Ludlow Leisure Centre still shows the 2L stopping there. I had a call from one friend saying that he had been waiting three weeks for the bus there and was getting fed up. Some drivers have been talking of further timetable changes but nothing official. I don't expect that anyone will bother to tell us if and when they happen so nothing new there.

A strange sight the other day was a 'First' bus proceeding up the High Street with a 'Driver under instruction' sign on the front. Perhaps they are training Diamond staff now or he may just have been lost. Talking of First, they recently sacked one of their drivers in Bristol for testing positive for cocaine despite his denials. It was later proven that he had

absorbed this from contaminated banknotes that he had been given as payment for fares as apparently many notes carry detectable traces of cocaine. This is despite Shropshire Council's assurance on the 3rd December, 21st January and 27th February that this had been sorted and had stopped happening. I'll chase them about this (again!). The Traffic Commissioners i n Birmingham have apparently received number а of complaints about Diamond including copies of these 'Clarion' articles. SPREADING THE WORD

A strong community like Cleobury Mortimer has old traditions at its heart. Like the neighbours give care one another. the generous donations made to charities, the hundreds who stand in silence reverent on Remembrance Sunday. We all know there is a down side, but on balance this is a friendly place to live.

The most obvious traditional feature is the Parish Church, with its twisted spire that you can see from miles away, and its dominant position overlooking our main street. But not all of us know what that ancient building is for, or what goes on inside those huge, almost forbidding doors.

The church is aware that it is no longer recognised as the most obvious centre of all that happens, but it is working hard to make more people aware that it is a welcoming place. If a stone building could have a smile, this one would.

We talked to leading members of the parish clergy, Rector Ashley Buck and Curate Richard Mutter, about the position of the church in the community today and how it is reaching out to people. There is a lot of involvement with both schools, including a special service for Year 10 Lacon Childe pupils, who then move on to visit Bayton Parish Church. In the summer break, there is a Holiday Club in the church, with themed activities to occupy young minds. And of course the work that Mark Greaves and his team at St Mary's Youth Project do is a

really effective way of reaching and helping young people.

"We have a generation who have not rejected the church, they are just not aware of it," Ashley Buck explained. "If we introduce them to the Gospel it's a new experience, and not automatically rejected."

The reach goes beyond our younger people, with the church building welcoming a variety of events far removed from services of worship. The Farmers Markets are the prime example, plus concerts, drama and one-off productions like Josh Carter's sell-out dance event. All proof that the place welcomes people who have little or no religious conviction; it is a communal place open to all. Ashley again: "We need to use these opportunities to prove our worth by visible action."

Very obviously not the words of a man who wants to keep the place as the exclusive preserve of a privileged few. It is there for the people of Cleobury Mortimer, all of them, whatever their beliefs. Part of our town.

I once found an old copy of "Farmer's Weekly" in which an article explored a 'new-fangled' machine reportedly popular in New Zealand called a "Combined Harvester", which they confidently predicted would never catch on here! But it did, and power-assisted farming began to resemble what we have today.

This means that a nice big tractor with some nice heavy tack can make short work of the Spring planting over the next week behind the farmhouse door!

I'm writing this a few days earlier than usual as I have some annual leave to use up. Hurrah!

A car parked in The Hurst suffered criminal damage, a smashed wing mirror, and during the same time period the victim's porch window was smashed. 

It never attracts a capacity crowd, but this is an important day in the town's year. Local associations say what they've done and the Parish Council do likewise. A big issue this year will be the moves to reduce crime the in area and SmartWater will be there to show what their ingenious system can do to help keep the criminals at bay.

With the dreaded cutbacks a part of daily life, we have to accept that police patrols will be rare. The Parish Council's answer is the Crime Reduction Group, which is supported by the local Police and Crime Commissioner with a grant for extra CCTV coverage in the town. And they're working on ideas to make the practice of about £10. If enough of us buy crime more difficult. it, Cleobury will become a

SmartWater is one way. You put a dab of the fluid on your property and the coded number is registered with the company. If you have a break-in, the police can scan goods and sometimes the suspect's hands and clothing to see if there's a trace of SmartWater. If it's your number coming up, there's no argument that the goods are yours.

There was a six months trial in the NW10 area of London ; I used to work there and can tell it's not a low crime area. When SmartWater was used there and the local criminals got to know about it, burglaries dropped by 80 percent. That is a remarkable result and thanks to cooperation between the makers and police, you'll be able to buy a bottle for about £10. If enough of us buy it, Cleobury will become a SmartWater town and signs will warn the criminal element off.

There's also a 'Don't Buy Crime' campaign about to start. It's common sense: if thieves find they can't sell their loot off in pubs and clubs because of the risk of the buyer being nicked, they'll stay away.

So come and hear more at the meeting in the Market Hall, at 7.00 on April 20th. And if you want to get involved with the Crime Reduction Group, they'll make you very welcome. There's an absence of farmers on there at the moment, and they need some feedback from that industry.

If the police cutbacks mean fewer patrols, it's up to us to help ourselves. Come and find out how on the 20th. JR



Linda Iles April In The Wyre Forest



April is, by my reckoning, the middle of spring. The earlier signs of life and growth are replaced by a general busyness and acceleration which brings us new leaves, flowers, butterflies, the appearance of fox and badger cubs and the arrival of many of the summer's bird visitors.



Swallow chicks in a typical mud cup nest, up amidst the rafters where few predators can reach them.

Swallows seem to be fewer in number each year, but I hope that the reasonable weather last year may have helped them. They have to survive many dangers to reach our country, and once here they need food, catching insects on the wing, and breeding sites where they can nest under cover. The classic site would be on a ledge or rafter in a barn and the nest is a mud cup, lined with feathers. In the past their efforts to build at Uncllys have unfortunately been disturbed by our cats, but they may fare better now that one has died and the other has become more middle-aged! The building used for nesting must have an open door or window to allow the birds constant access, but even a bricksized hole will be enough. An artificial ledge

about 15cm wide and with a rim of beading to keep the nest from sliding off could be fixed high in an outhouse. (I may have a go at making some papier mache nests to make up for the criminal records of the cats).You can also help swallows and house martins by making sure there is a nice, muddy puddle available for building material (perhaps in an upside down dustbin lid), and you may be rewarded by seeing up to three broods of nestlings during the summer.

Mid-way through March a new family trail was launched by the Forestry Commission. 'Superworm' follows on from the success of the Gruffalo trails, both based on children's books of the same names by author Julia Donaldson and illustrator Axel Scheffler. A short trail leads from the car park past boards bearing pictures of Superworm and friends, information and suggestions for forest activities. Super or not, the forest soils couldn't do without the worms. They drag down leaves into their burrows, enriching the soil with humus and allowing materials to mix and be aerated. They are also the main food of shrews and moles, badgers and many birds. Moles can eat 50 grams of worms a day, and an area of grass the size of a football pitch can hold up to two million of them! (Thank you, Springwatch, for those figures) Actually a football pitch or golf green probably doesn't have any worms in it because green keepers poison them to prevent wormcasts, and consequently have to do the fertilising and aerating themselves.



REMEMBERING GRANDPA PARKER

He was a prisoner of the Germans in the 1939-45 World War and in the winter of early '45 was one of those who were force marched from Poland ahead of the approaching Russian army. Three of the Parker children will be honouring Herbert Parker's memory, with a cycle ride from the camp where he was interred to the point of his release. Chris, Rose and David will be doing the hard bit, following Herbert's route as closely as they can and raising money for both UNICEF and The Lily Foundation. Their target is $\pounds 10,000$.





IN BUSINESS: Wild Meadow Boarding Kennels

If dogs appreciated country views, they'd ask to be boarded at Kate and Rich's place at Wild Meadow up on Hopton Bank. The outlook is superb.

Rather like the kennels. This place is as far from tatty as you can get; it's spotless. You walk through an office to the kennel area, built by Rich, with the bigger units offering 72 square feet of space, the smaller ones 46. There are just 15 units, with space to accommodate two or even three dogs if they are from the same home.

The business exists because of Kate's love of dogs - she used to

work in a kennels - and is located next to the farmhouse they are working on. The extension Rich is building in place of the old conservatory confirms his skills, and he runs the family holiday home business down the road in Worcestershire. You'll notice the priority here - the kennels is completed and operating, while the house is coming along

The dogs' accommodation is heated and air conditioned, kept at 15 degrees centigrade throughout the year. The dogs have a regular routine every day, starting with a walk at 7.30 and followed by breakfast. From 11.00am to 4.00pm is the quiet time, when they relax and visitors not are normally allowed in the kennels, because the animals don't settle if they're disturbed and can become stressed. From 4.00 to 6.00 is the time for a second walk before second feeding; it's also the time they welcome visitors to see how the place runs.

Feeding is dictated by a dog's established habit and diet, and there is a wide selection of foods in stock to cater for this. If the owner prefers to supply the food, that is what the dog gets, all part of making someone's loved pet feel welcome. If a dog is taken ill, Pete Howman of Severn Edge Vets is the established contact. But if the owner has stated a particular choice of help, that is who they would call in. They have Pet Plan insurance cover for all this work.

Naturally the place is licensed, through the Bridgnorth office of Shropshire Council, whose inspector calls once a year to see that the standards are kept up. He doesn't call between the end of November and February, as the place is closed.

Visitors are welcome between 4.00 and 6.00pm, with no appointment necessary. They take day boarders for people who are off to work, but the majority are from families on holiday.

Do they have plans to expand this very impressive jewel of a place? "No, we've not got to employ anyone with this size," Kate explains. "We want to control it ourselves and we're comfortable with what we've got. We know the name of every dog and we know the owners and what they want." That's not through a lack of ambition, it's because they've achieved a high standard; what they would want for their own animals, and won't compromise.




