
Finally, from the Parish Council, we wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. Enjoy the festivities and stay safe.







INSURANCE RISK REDUCTION – A REAL RESULT

Kit Smith has some very good news:

Cleobury Mortimer has successfully reduced the risk of burglary and theft in the town due to the efforts of the Crime Reduction Group, with the full support of the Parish Council.

The Crime Reduction Group, organised and secured funding from the Crime Commissioner and our Parish Council, to install 12 new up-to-date CCTV cameras, which record images 24/7.

This will allow valuable and accurate images to be downloaded by the Police after any incident reported, which would be used to prosecute any criminals, using reliable camera evidence in court.

The very active and growing Group, earlier this year worked with the Police. Housing Association and the Parish Council and achieved Smartwater town status with in excess of 85% coverage of homes and their contents. Cleobury Mortimer is the first town to achieve that status.

The combined effect of the new CCTV and Smartwater has

helped to make the community feel safer and appears to have deterred theft and minor incidents.

Some local towns and villages have reported higher incidents of theft while our town has recorded less. Several neighbouring communities are now using Cleobury as a model and following suit.

As an active member of the group I have pursued my NFU Mutual Insurance agency and their underwriters to lower my Insurance premium. After constant correspondence they now believe that there is a significantly reduced risk to them as insurers in Cleobury Mortimer. They have confirmed reduction а 15% on mv household insurance - a very welcome and positive result of all the work by our community. My contact has been Tracey McCarvill, NFU 01304 825225



A PARISH WALK

We list these monthly social outings in the calendar, but maybe don't give them enough coverage. After all, they're free, friendly and an excellent chance to see some of the local countryside from an entirely different aspect. The editor put on his walking boots, grabbed camera and joined the а 10.00am November 6th gathering outside the Market Hall....

Timing is everything for a late autumn walk and on the morning of November 6th there was hardly a cloud in the bright blue sky. 21 people had looked at the weather and thought this was too good to miss. Leader Diane explained the procedure of walking along a narrow road in the best position to be seen and set off at a brisk pace, taking the back lane to join Tenbury Road before branching off across the fields to join the lane down towards Barnslands Farm. A short way down the lane we turned right and crossed more fields, progress delayed by the inevitable queue at each stile, where the agility of the younger members shone.

The early pace eased over the rougher surfaces and some of the long climbs out of the many small valleys we crossed saw those out of condition, like the editor, stopping to admire the view. Well, that's what they'd have you believe, but not that they were unable to keep up.

There were clouds gathering, but no hint of rain. The effect upon the views was interesting, with patches of brightly lit turf shining out from the areas shaded by cloud. It's part of the fascination of walking in fine countryside, to watch the scenes changing as the light varies.

We joined the lane to Neen Sollars at Southwood Farm and headed for the Tenbury Road before branching off again to stop at the Waddingtons' place at Bransley. Excellent bread pudding and mulled cider were served and the breathless given time to gather strength before we were off again. Up the lane to cross the Ludlow Road and head towards the ornate pumping station and wonder at the widespread store of large pipes in a nearby field. There's a lot of hardware hidden deep below the surface around the area of that reservoir.

Another diversion, this time leaving Green Lane and heading Cleobury Mortimer, for а welcome sight in the middle distance. Cross the Catherton Road and take another field path to join the footpath through the parkland that neighbours the Lacon Childe School sports field. The autumn colours that had brightened our way were still there as we walked through the park, people agreeing that we are

very fortunate to have such a facility in the town.



Nearing the end of the outing, with the distant spire of Saint Mary's beckoning us on.

It's a tradition that these early month walks end back in the town centre, with the warmth of the King's Arms' log fire to take away the chill. A very civilised way of rounding off the morning, but the editor had work to do and headed back to the office. Will he never learn?

Deana Kimber raised a good question as we walked: How many kissing gates has the Footpath Association installed since they moved on from old fashioned stiles to the easier to use metal gates? Nobody could provide an answer and it seems a check with the County Council will be necessary to get figure. an accurate They certainly do a lot of good work keeping local pathways clear and in use.

The next Parish Walk will be on December 5th and you'll find a warm welcome at 10.00 that morning, outside the Market Hall. It's a good day out.



Tis the season to be jolly! Winter and Christmas time brings joy to man and pet alike, but there are some festive risks that every pet owner needs to be aware of:

- Chocolate we all love it! Chocolate has a toxic component for dogs and cats called theobromine. Cacao and dark chocolate has the most. It can cause vomiting, diarrhoea, hyperactivity and even heart problems. At high doses it can trigger seizures and even death. Fortunately making your pet vomit and giving them activated charcoal helps reduce the risk of problems and if enough has been consumed then hospitalisation is sometimes required.
- Grapes, raisins, sultanas and currants makes you think of Christmas pudding doesn't it? But these are all associated with kidney injury in dogs and cats and can lead to kidney failure! The association between the amount eaten and the severity is not known, so any amount can be very dangerous. Again making the pet vomit as soon as possible is important. The first signs of toxicity are lethargy and sometimes vomiting, followed by depression and irreversible kidney damage. The signs usually appear in the first 24 hours but by then it is often too late.
- Xylitol the sweetest of treats! This a commonly used sweetener in candy and in some baking goods. It is also found in chewing gum and dental products. But this popular sweetener is very toxic for dogs and even a very small amount can cause low blood sugar, lethargy, tremors and seizures. A high dose will cause liver failure and can be fatal for most dogs. Making your dog vomit straight after eating anything that has xylitol and putting them on a drip is crucial.
- Human pain reliefs for all those after-party headaches! Ibuprofen and paracetamol are readily available over-the-counter and are also found in almost every home. Paracetamol, even at the smallest dose will cause your cat's red blood cells to die and can lead to liver failure in dogs. Some cats might even need a blood transfusions to survive. Ibuprofen causes vomiting, diarrhoea and lethargy, and can lead to kidney insufficiency and seizures. Making dogs and cats vomit as quick as possible and

fluid therapy reduces the risk of complications.

- Onions and garlic ah, pies and roasts! They go into many human foods that cats and dogs find delicious and you might find your cat or dog is lethargic and has pale gums if eaten. These vegetables can cause severe anaemia. If caught early making them vomit can prevent serious blood loss otherwise intensive care and even a blood transfusion might be required.
- Antifreeze the one that helps you drive to Nan's Christmas dinner! Ethylene glycol is the chemical in antifreeze that tastes sweet for our four-legged friends. It is toxic for dogs, cats, humans and rabbits alike and as little as a teaspoon can be deadly for a full grown cat. Signs like depression and lethargy, or even vomiting are the first one. But this chemical is renowned for causing kidney failure. Prompt vomit induction and fluid therapy are needed. The first sign to be suspicious off is the dog or cat licking the ground or their lips around a car that had antifreeze replaced recently or in the garage that has antifreeze.

So with all of the festive merriment please try to remember your four legged friends and should you be concerned please phone your vet for some advice whatever the time of day.

We hope that this will help keeping your pets safe over the holidays and wish you a Purrfect Christmas!

Cleobury Patients' Voice: Update As we went to press, the Board of the local Community Health Trust (which operates Ludlow and Bridgnorth Hospitals as well as community nursing and child health services) was meeting to approve a recommendation to terminate its own existence. It has decided that it isn't large enough, nor does it have the ability or capacity to handle the changes expected of it by Shropshire's new Sustainability and Transformation Plan for the future of local healthcare (a plan that has still not been published for public Regional NHS consumption). mandarins have agreed that the Trust will not be financially or clinically sustainable in the future. Given its seeming determination to close as many beds in Ludlow Hospital as possible, for example, this comes as no great surprise to some of us, although it must be acknowledged that it has been starved of funds by 'austerity' so has been placed in an unenviable position.

The Trust anticipates replacement by a larger organisation and is particularly keen on the concept of the MCP, or multi-speciality community

provider. This is a new model defined as a partnership between GPs, community services, mental health services, social care and low-level acute services. You might well ask how all of these parties are going to bind themselves together into an efficient organisation capable of managing a multi-million-pound budget to deliver effective (and, no doubt, cheaper) health services. You wouldn't be the first, and already one such arrangement in the East Midlands has crashed and burnt in less than a year as a result of inadequate financial and legal arrangements (and despite the involvement of some prominent advisors). The Trust describes GPs as being the 'cornerstone' of the new MCP: I wonder how enthusiastic some of our already overstretched GPs will be about taking this on too.

Part of the grand plan for Shropshire healthcare involves the creation of 'Neighbourhoods', defined as building 'resilient communities', creating population-level behavioural change (!) and delivering care closer to home. The role of Community and Care Coordinator is identified as fundamental to this and it is not as well-known as it should be that Katja Jones, familiar to many from her work with CoCo, already performs this role at the Medical Centre, albeit with precious little funding. Also not well-known as yet is the suggestion, on the part of the local health authority (Shropshire CCG), that this funding should be withdrawn. Does the right hand have any idea of what the left is up to?

An LJC meeting in Cleobury is being planned for January on the subject of these healthcare plans. Many of the significant players are expected to attend so watch out for further details. In the meantime, CPV meets at the Medical Centre every third Monday of the month at 6:30pm. EASTERN TRAVELS

I'd seen her in pictures and but Skype images, never actually held my fifth grandchild. Holly was born in Singapore on Christmas Day 2015 and moved to Hong Kong within two months. The chance to see and hold her came with an invitation from Iain, my older son, to fly out there.

It took eleven quiet and comfortable hours on a BA Airbus 380 to land there, the clothes needed in chilly England suddenly far too hot. The taxi to Iain ride and Elena's apartment on Prince Edward Road West in Kowloon (there's a reminder that this was once part of the British Empire) revealing a land of sky scraping office and apartment blocks. Not all of them on the American scale, but reflecting the philosophy that if land is expensive you build vertically. How expensive? A new world record for a parking space was set here recently -600,000 US dollars!

You can't realistically expect a child to immediately accept the presence of a stranger walking into a household and wanting to pick her up. Her older sister Sophie, a shade under two years older, was much more relaxed about Grandad, having recently seen me on Skype, but I suspect not remembering my visit last year. It would take a little time to get to know then both.

Shorts and sandals were standard wear, the temperature in the mid 20s Centigrade every day. One of the benefits of city living Kowloon style is the range of shops within a short walk, the food and supermarket outlets open seven days a week. Beer, one of life's essentials in a warm climate, came at a price that was a pleasant surprise after Singapore last year. Would you believe £13 for a pint of Guinness at the renowned Raffles Hotel? In Hong Kong one buys decent craft beers for between £2 and 3 a bottle.

Daughter in law Elena showed me some of the highlights, notably The Peak. It's the highest hill in the area, reached by a cable car from a city centre station, where we queued for more than an hour before getting aboard using the elbows technique learned in London in my youth. I may be a country boy (fogey?) these days, but I found it easy to think city style again.

The view from the Peak was limited by slight mist and the gathering dusk, but the stretches of high buildings were very impressive. Back to the apartment, where the children had been fed and watered.

Eating was a mixture of home cooking, Mexican takeaway and just visiting a known restaurant, where the children were made very welcome and high chairs offered as a matter of course. I found this aspect of service much stronger than we have here in the UK.

A brief visit to the island of Macau for the 63rd annual Grand Prix showed how flexible people can be in keeping business going while racing roars through the city centre. This is regarded as the Las Vegas of China, with casinos galore and more pawn shops than food shops.

Hong Kong is a very mixed race community, its shopping malls mostly dominated by the predictable big brand names. But how many Prada, Rolex, Dior or Gucci shops do you need? I found the local Moko Mall more interesting and the street markets a place for a little bargaining. I was offered a fan for 120 HK Dollars and Elena just walked away; 200 metres down the road a similar one was bought for 25 HK. Local advice is a great help.

I flew home knowing what a great experience the place and my family can offer. Can't wait to go back. Landed at Heathrow at 4.45am and got back to work on the Clarion until jetlag hit

YOU NEVER STOP LEARNING





It hardly seems possible that only a year has passed since I wrote my last Christmas letter from Westminster. David Cameron was still our Prime Minister, leading a recently elected Conservative majority Government in Parliament; I was still a Defence Minister; Barack Obama was still US President; Britain a member of the European Union, looking likely to vote to Remain so.

12 months on, and so much in the world of politics has changed. Theresa May has become Prime Minister, leading a Government in which I am serving as Minister of State for Health. This was not a move I anticipated, but I have relished getting to know more about the healthcare system on which we all rely, and working to improve it for all.

Despite a campaign where both camps were mired in controversy, Donald Trump has beaten Hillary Clinton to become the 45th President of the United States in January. It must be said that this year even the political things that haven't changed were unpredictable – Jeremy Corbyn has won a second election as leader of the Labour Party despite a no confidence vote from 80% of voting Labour MPs and mass shadow cabinet resignations. Now he looks set to stay for the long-haul. UKIP elected a new leader, who promptly resigned, so Nigel Farage is back as leader once again, apparently only a caretaker.

Politics never stands still, and I anticipate further challenges in the year ahead. But this follows what I hope will be a relaxing Christmas and/or New Year break for readers. Before spending time with my family, I shall be visiting those who make Christmas special for all of us and keep us safe when we need them – posties, police, paramedics and other health workers, who are preparing to cope with the pressure the Christmas season brings.

THIS MONTH AT THE MARKET




THE GOLF CLUB ADOPTS TECHNO

To a non-golfer this was a step into a mysterious world. I don't mean talking to keen club players or being impressed that 80 or so people turned up on a weekday evening to hear about a new step in tuition. It was the extent to which technology can take one strike of the ball in a studio setting and analyse every aspect. No matter what excuses you normally make in the bar after a bad game, this little box comes up with the merciless truth.

It was the launch of Cleobury Golf Club's Swing Studio, with coach David Pain welcoming the curious and supervising a series of demonstrations in what some of us know better as the dance area for social occasions. The whole point of this ingenious Sky Trak system is that it can be carried to almost any venue and set up to let golfers drive off and then read the detailed analysis off.

The basis is a curtained area with a mat as the driving green surface and a range of famous courses available on the screen that the golfer faces. From Saint Andrews to Augusta, you can choose your venue and then the hole you want to tackle. All of this indoors, where the weather can't spoil the occasion. We watched as a series of volunteers stepped up to the tee and drove down the green. Well, down the screen actually, but with just a touch of imagination you could dream you were out on some exotic course. They were using real clubs and balls, and when one man wanted a left handed club he was handed David's own.

The little black box that sits by the ball on the tee then projected its detailed analysis onto the screen, giving a wide range of measurements and directional accuracy.

This new development is David's baby, an extra facility to add to the coaching that he has built up since training for the job. He was rather overwhelmed by the response: "I was hoping we might get 30 or so people, but the number was nearer 80, and we got really good feedback." reported the he following morning. The reception on the evening was certainly very positive, with lots of enquiries and the range of special spots sold out.

He's certainly a very busy young man, putting in 40 hours a week in his work as a director of the club and another 30 hours in a normal week's coaching.

It was interesting to talk to members who have a high regard for the way the Pain family runs the club, feet firmly on the ground and a friendly atmosphere that draws members of several other clubs to play the range of 27 holes on what must be one of the most attractive grounds. Ann from Spire Hairdressers and husband Mel have been members from the beginning and can tell how they used to walk through mud in days before the tarmac got up to the clubhouse. Looks like a winning formula.

On The Buses

Unfortunately, the meeting with Shropshire Council to discuss the bus situation and possible solutions was postponed from the beginning of the month and is now scheduled for 29 November so any report will be too late to feature in this month's column. However, the LJC meeting in Cleobury in the evening of Wednesday 7th December is still on and the agenda will include an update on the bus situation. It will be in the Market Hall starting at 7pm so get there if you can.

On the operating front, there have been several incidents during the month including а breakdown at Hollywaste and a much delayed 9.17 on the 8th caused by the bus being 'delayed by a lorry' apparently. Must have been a very slow lorry as the bus didn't appear in Cleobury until 9.55. The Transport Minister recently announced in the House of Lords that, in future, bus operators will be required to give better on board information to help deaf and blind passengers. This would include information on routes, stopping points and diversions but in the case of Diamond even the drivers don't know this. let alone the passengers.

As an example, there was a problem with yet another driver not knowing the route around Bewdley and having to ask for directions. Apparently, he looked about 14 (mind you, everyone looks young to me these days) and had to be pointed in the right direction. Fortunately, Liz Bishop was on hand and took him under her wing ensuring that everyone arrived safely. She must be getting used to these duties by now and should perhaps be awarded her Navigators wings. There was also a report in the 'Shuttle' about a Swedish tourist who wanted to catch a bus from Kiddy to Stourport. After two buses failed to appear, she gave up and got a taxi...

A study by the University of Leeds recently concluded that a 10% improvement in local bus

the services in 10% deprived most neighbourhoods in England would create thousands of new jobs and increase people's income. They said that bus investment was not just a matter of transport policy but also had positive effects on health, education skills, wellbeing and social cohesion - Shropshire Council please note. As I mentioned last month, I have invited Philip Dunne to accompany me from Kidderminster to Ludlow on the 2L and have said I will take food parcel to sustain us in case of disaster. I'll let you know what the response is.

You may recall that last time there was a mention of the concept of 'Shared Spaces' in which all signs, pavements etc are removed from a certain area which is then to be shared between vehicles and pedestrians. I tried the Kiddy version out and can't say I was impressed. It is helped slightly by the fact that most traffic (apart from delivery vehicles coming from the Rowland Hill Centre) is approaching from only one direction but, even so, I saw several people wander across without realising that the traffic shared the same space. Several local Councillors have expressed concerns about the layout but Wyre Forest Council have expressed confidence in the scheme so that's all right then...

Still no sign of the the Shropshire Council Bus Strategy consultation which was said to be starting in October but as I write this in late November, there has been nothing. Given that the consultation was due to be finished about now this needs to be monitored just in case something is slipped through on the quiet (perish the thought...)

STOP PRESS!. A burnt out Diamond bus has just been seen being recovered from the A449 at Ombersley. Probably the 303 Kiddy to Worcester so if you are thinking of using this service, be afraid, be very afraid...



It's pretty quiet on the farm at the moment. There's a flock of Wiltshire Horn ewes on an extended visit, minding their own business in the cider orchard hay field. The chickens squawk and mutter occasionally, but one cockerel is definitely quieter than two, and I've got used to him leading the hens on cheeky forays over the gate into the flower garden. The boy lambs (wethers) and the two pigs have gone to provide some very tasty dinners, such being their raison d'etre. The cattle herd are cared for by the Wyre Community Land Trust and only occasionally come to Uncllys to munch our grass and have their annual TB test.

This makes life easier for the farmers in the winter months. We have our work cut out for us keeping the house warm by barrowing logs from the woodstores to the stoves, and if there's a freeze we'll be getting water to the livestock. Winter is the time for traditional tasks such as pruning, mending fences and machinery and hedgelaying.

In the forest itself the last of the leaves are dropping from the oaks. Big drifts of leaves have been on the ground for a month now but are gradually being nibbled away by worms, millipedes, woodlice and suchlike helped by fungi and bacteria, so that their nutrients and organic fibres are added to the woodland soil. Recently I helped to dig out a heap of beech leaf mould (compost) and it was noticeable that, despite having stood for two years, the leaves are still not completely broken down. The leaves of the each tree species will have a slightly different chemical composition and not only show a range of resistance to decomposition but attract a different assemblage of organisms to feed on them. Carbon dioxide is released into the soil as they are broken down, so that there is more in a forest soil than in the column of air above it from ground level to the top of the atmosphere (see Michael Allaby's Woodland Trust Book of British Woodlands.) This 'carbon sink' effect is a very precious attribute of woodlands and one which is reversed when forests are cleared.

Now that the trees are bare we are able to see through them again, and the holly is once more king of the forest with its shiny evergreen leaves and bright red berries. No wonder we use it to brighten our Christmas season! *Linda lles*





With the harvest and autumn planting well under our belt, this time of year our focus turns to housing the cattle over winter and the many maintenance and servicing jobs that have to be done to the machinery that has been busy all summer. The Mawley herd continues to work hard to produce our Mawley Milk. There are currently 250 cows in milk, with an additional 45 'dry cows' who are in the rest period before milking. Last month we had 26 calves born. We keep all our calves - the bulls for beef and the heifers join the milking herd at around 2-3 years of age.

We continue to supply the independent shops in our town six mornings a week. With our on-site pasteurising and bottling of the milk, the pint you pick up in Cleobury has only travelled the mile and a half from the farm to the High Street! We also travel a little further afield to Ludlow/Church Stretton to the west, Bridgnorth to the north, Worcester

and Kidderminster/Bromsgrove to the south and east. Our aim has always been to keep it local and we are very grateful to our loyal customers, some of whom have been purchasing our milk for many years! Although we do not provide a direct doorstep delivery any longer, Sean Boden & Son are doing a super service for the community, delivering our milk and cream and other goods to the doorstep.

If you don't receive a Christmas card from us, please don't be offended - you aren't off the list. Instead of sending cards we make a donation to a charity very close to our own hearts - Little Hearts Matter. Also for every 4 pint of Semi Skimmed milk we sell this December, we will donate 5p per carton to the Birmingham Children's Hospital - look out for our special labels. We wish you all a happy Christmas and peaceful 2017. *Rachel*







IN BUSINESS

Hoskins' Family Funeral Services is a long established company that can trace its foundation back to 1878. By 1996 Ray Hoskins, the third generation in charge, decided to retire and Stephen Peregrine bought the company.

Stephen had been in the funeral business for 20 years and knew that the Hoskins name along with the long established J Waite funeral service they had recently acquired was a prize worth winning. The last 20 years have seen steady growth, to the point where today the Hoskins name has offices in Ludlow's Tower Street, plus Kidderminster, Stourport and Worcester, with an unmanned office in Cleobury's Market Hall. Next year Stephen and son Adam plan to open a fully functioning Funeral Home in Cleobury.

His son Adam is a stonemason and works closely with Hoskins to supply memorials, while older son Sean is a qualified grave digger who currently works outside the service to better support a growing family.

The company has a fleet of three Jaguars, plus contacts to provide almost anything a family may desire for the final farewell to a loved one.

The spread of the service means that Stephen watches trends in what families ask for. "There are fewer religious ceremonies and more humanist," he explains. "If we could replicate the Cleobury Mortimer parish here in Ludlow there would be far

fewer humanist ceremonies. The demand in the Ludlow area is about 50/50, but the nearer you get towards Birmingham it changes; probably 70 percent cremations."



Stephen Peregrine, a man with 40 years experience of funerals.

He clearly has a high regard for the clergy in Cleobury and their ability to find out about the life of the deceased before delivering a eulogy. His own approach fits in with that ethos, taking notes of whatever religious beliefs a bereaved family may have and guiding them in their choice of hymns if they are not familiar with the range. "Modern technology is a blessing there, I can play a range of hymns on my iPad to help them choose," he explains.

He chooses his staff carefully, his drivers and bearers all retired policemen: "They're smart, men of the world who can work together as a team." Experienced staff handle the administrative work; he describes himself as "a people person who concentrates on presenting the funeral properly

and gently guiding and advising the family at a time of great stress. "

"There is a tendency to overspend," he emphasises. "It's too easy to think you must have the best for your mum or dad. We only stock the basic coffins here, but if a family wants more we order it in especially."

The new crematorium at Kidderminster earns praise: "Service time is an hour, while others give 30 or 35 minutes. An hour allows a family to create a send off they truly want for their loved one."

Stephen lives next to the Chapel of Remembrance at Ludlow, so that the grieving will not see their loved one as lying in isolation, but close to someone who will care for them.

He's on call 24 hours a day, so that someone facing a loss can talk to a person who will listen and help.

He talks to his staff and offers encouragement if they are upset by the grief they witness. "This is a sensitive job to be in, particularly after a sudden death or the passing of a child" he says. "You get caught up in the emotions."

What shines through when you talk to him is his belief in what he does for a living: "I know that buying this business was the best decision of my life. The feeling of gratitude you can get from a family when you've done a good job is worth a million dollars. We've got to get it right."
