After we came out of the Clifton cinema in Ludlow off we would go to the village hall in either Oreton or Cleeton St Mary to the Saturday night dance which consisted of a record player on a chair. Perhaps there are some Clarion readers who remember those nights of over 50 years ago and if they remember a "Townie" with a funny accent who rode a red scooter with fair hair down to his shoulders (sob), that was me Happy days.

This is a brilliant idea and a real treat to eat. It's NHS Ice Cream, made here in Cleobury and available from Cleobury Cafe, Katerfresh, Heath Farm Meats or The Larch Barn.

I saw it at Heath Farm and had to give the Damson Gin flavour a try - I was not disappointed. It costs £2.50 a tub and all monies received go to the NHS funds. It was launched in late April and when we talked to the maker, Molly Perkins, on May 6th they had already made £365 for that best of causes.

It comes in five flavours and is a family affair, with Molly and mum Jan making it in the family kitchen, while dad Andy looks around for ideas for other flavours. Also involved are the Robinson family at Mawley Milk, where a surplus of cream needed using in a proper way, so it's donated to the NHS Ice Cream cause. How long will they carry on producing it? we asked. "As long as there's a need," was Molly's answer. Do try some before the rest of Cleobury catches on and it runs out. Delicious! JR

Plant outdoor Tomatoes in their final positions and provide support

Prune Philadelphus and Weigela after flowering

Ventilate and shade plants in the greenhouse on warm days

Plant main-crop Carrots and protect from root fly

Sow oriental vegetables under cloches

Keep young vegetable plants well-watered and catch weeds early by hoeing off.

A STRANGE PARALLEL

Cyril Breakwell, whose stories about rural life many years ago have been such a fascinating tale to follow, phoned recently. He had a distant parallel with the current coronavirus scare that he saw as a seven year old at Farlow School. It was in 1931, when he'd just started school later than most because the long walk to school and up that steep hill was regarded as too much for a child of six vears. My, haven't times changed in the past 90 or so years?

Cyril said he could remember an outbreak of diptheria at the school that claimed the lives of two sisters. What a tragedy for their parents, losing two little girls to a disease that's almost unheard of today. As Cyril was such a young boy at the time, he can't remember if there were other deaths in the area and as the school is currently closed, we asked other local sources for more information. Alf Jenkins said the school records should have a record, but that's locked away in the school right now.

Robert Hodge of the History Society has no access to local records on this matter, but advises that diptheria was a major cause of death in children in Britain in the 1930s. There was an average of 58,000 cases a year and 2,800 deaths across all ages, with Under 5s and Over 40s considered the highest risk. In those pre-NHS days, when medical care was a matter of payment or charity, an outbreak of a disease as serious as diptheria was a very serious matter. Fortunately the matter was addressed in the 1940s, when five million children were vaccinated and it became much less of a threat. The authorities learned how to deal with the problem of that time, just as we will today when a resistant injection has been developed.


JOB VACANCY ADVERTS IN THE CLARION

But it is a good time to use this space and remind you that any advert for a vacancy can appear on this page at no charge; it is a public service. Not one limited to businesses large and small, because if you just need a cleaner at your home this is a good place to find one.

We are printing fewer copies right now, because a lot of our outlets are closed as part of the national lockdown, but there are still 750 a month going out to the busiest places like doctors' reception areas to be read. When times are more normal we will begin to grow the output again until it reaches 1,000. That's a lot of Clarions circulating every month and numerous readers have told us that they read their copy and then pass it on. Goodness only knows how many actual readers we have, but it is certainly a lot more than the number we produce.

There's very little chance that you need to know this right now, but it's a reminder of what we can do to help you, whether you are looking for work or offering it. The Clarion is here to help - it always has been. JR





Some more random tales from days in the British carpet industry many years ago, the continuation of a story that started in the August 2019 issue. I was National Sales Manager at a factory in Bolton.

Bolton Carpets was part of the Bowater Furnishings Group, in what seemed to be an accident of acquisition. Bowater liked property and land - as a giant of the paper industry they owned 85% of Newfoundland and the timber that represented - and had bought the Beautility Furniture company that was based in a large site in North London. Beautility owned Goodacre Carpets of Kendal and in that group was Bolton Carpets. No prizes for guessing where they were based.

My family moved there into The Dutch House, constructed by a local builder for his son in the 1920s. We had never been made more welcome anywhere we lived - the neighbours were just so big hearted. Our sons were happy in the nearby primary school and my wife was studying and later getting her Open University BA degree. She was handed it by David Attenborough, before he was knighted and became Sir David.. We were very happy.

I had recruited a good sales force and once the production side had been sorted out with a new managing director coming in, the business grew fast. The company was profitable; in our best year the sales force and myself cost the company 3.5 percent of the revenue we generated.

The sales office manager, who had tried to stab me in the back by lying about my conduct in the past, now found he was working for me. All I will say is that he retired early with a breakdown and that I believe revenge is a dish best eaten cold.

The company was outgrowing the Victorian spinning mill where it was based and plans were made at a very senior level to move the whole operation down to Kidderminster. Bowater had bought Georgian Carpets in Clensmore Street and the neighbouring old axminster works of Minster Carpets, plus the next site along, to accommodate the backing plant and warehousing. Overseeing the move was a senior man from Bowater in Knightsbridge, who presented our MD with a single sheet of paper with a rough line drawing that was supposed to be the moving plan and timetable.

The move was chaotic, with carpet produced in Bolton and shipped to a contract backing plant and then delivered to Kidderminster until our own plant could be installed. New workers were recruited to run the plant and when it started a huge Middle East order was put through to test how it ran. That cheap stuff had a simple latex seal on the back, not a sign of foam. And if there was a leak and latex got on the face of the carpet it had to be marked on the stock label, which the new crew duly did. Until someone asked why the latex was still coming through on the wrong side? About eight rolls had gone through damaged, 800 square yards and no-one had asked the crew to pass the message on to the operator at the other end. 800 square yards of carpet that we couldn't send out to our Arab customers. Oh dear.

I had been optimistic about the move to the Midlands, as it seemed logical that in Kidderminster we would find good people with experience of making carpets properly and sales office staff who knew what they were doing. I should have known that assumption is a very poor guide to forward planning, but I was about to find out. JR

CLEOBURY FOOTPATH ASSOCIATION

This time of the year, our footpath work concentrates on keeping paths clear of the rapid spring growth. It is amazing how quickly a path can go from being completely clear to being unpleasantly overgrown. Sometimes, just a week or so. We generally walk and clear individually near to our homes, but there are one or two paths that need a group effort.

This year all official footpath work on behalf of the County Council has been stopped. We will not be able to do the bigger jobs but some of us have still been out and about doing clearance.

It has been remarkable to see just how heavily walked our local footpaths have been this spring and pleasing to see how many people are discovering our extensive, well maintained and substantially stile free footpath network.

This heavy usage has helped to keep paths much clearer than usual. However on some paths, nettles will still grow up at the side of the paths and hedges and bramble will grow across them.

If you come across a path where the nettles have been bashed down, or a hedge nicely trimmed at a stile, it did not happen all on it's own. One of our volunteers did it. Without our continuing effort over the years, there would be very few walkable footpaths.

One of our bigger jobs is "Jacob's ladder" which goes from Ron Hill to Furlongs Close. Without us, that will definitely get overgrown this year.

Don't give up using paths that do get overgrown. Help yourselves and other walkers to keep enjoying our paths by doing a bit of clearance. Take a pair of secateurs or shears with you and take a few extra minutes to help. Even bash things down with your walking stick or trample on them.

Stewart likes his reasonable comforts and his equipment includes a small stove, a coffee making kit, some stout gloves and a pair of secateurs for clearing brambles on any local walks. Our present team are beavering away. They range from a seamstress who made dresses for Laura Ashley to pupils from Lacon Childe school and from several mothers and daughters to B&B hosts, all who live locally.

I shall be advertising in the Rock Magazine and the Clarion at the end of the May so hopefully more sewers will come forward and our hall will emerge into the light again.


PS if you have a machine but are unable to use it we have several sewers who either do not have a machine or their machine is not up to the job, who would be most grateful for the loan of it.

Joe Simons

Rather than being sent to Coventry I arrived in Coventry in 1962. Life began in my grandmother's front room in late March, my mother being particularly stoic, either that or no one had mentioned pain relief. I had a happy and rather uneventful childhood save for two moments of note. The first was the consumption of a small quantity of petrol, I liked the smell, suffice to say I don't anymore. The second involved me taking on the role of 007. I thought that I could kick through a small pane of glass in a rubbish skip. Actually, you do need sugar glass and a stunt person in order for the illusion to work. I was taken to the local GP where I was stitched up under candlelight. I am still trying to work out if these events were truly formative.

My schooling was equally uneventful save for always being just short of the expectations of my teachers. That maybe a teacher thing to stretch one to achieve, or simply that I was always just short of their expectations. I come from a family of teachers especially scientists. My father was a Professor of Chemistry and my younger brother Professor of Theoretical Physics so clearly a life in the ministry was on the cards for me.

Truth be told it probably was. I felt drawn to serve and recognised through my parents and siblings that service was an area that sat very comfortably with my natural disposition. However, as I have come to realise you can't always expect to get from A to B in the most direct route, in fact it is often best if you don't. I went to university and studied for a degree in Urban Estates Surveying and 2 years after that I qualified as a Chartered Surveyor. My specialism was retail and after spending some time managing the property estate for a now defunct Dry Cleaners, I spent the majority of my career working for Boots the Chemists looking after their stores and acquiring new ones. My work took me all around the UK and also overseas for a short period of time.

My life has had its fair share of ups and downs and my faith has been right at the heart of it, especially when my mother and my daughter died in very quick succession. The darkness that comes with loss drew me even deeper into the reassurance that I was loved by God and valued not abandoned. There was a tap on the shoulder which turned into a push, then a tug and finally I succumbed and was approved by the Bishops Advisory Panel in June 2017.

I am looking forward to my curacy and getting to know you all. This next stage in my journey, will I pray, be built by us together as I seek to serve you and our God in this new place.



BRASS BANDING IN CLEOBURY MORTIMER

Katie Griffiths tells the story of an outstanding local institution - Cleobury Mortimer Concert Brass.

The origins of Cleobury Mortimer Concert Brass go back to the early 1900's when a group of self-taught men formed a band in the village and became known as The Cleobury Mortimer Silver Band. They practiced in a room above The Old Lion.

In the late 40's the band consisted of about eight experienced players, with new players swelling the ranks to around 18. By the early 1950's they had reached a high enough standard to take second prize in a competition. The conductor of the band at this time was Sandy Millichamp.

Band records show that in 1955, there were 17 male members of the band; the addition of females did not happen until 1960. Members were issued with a book of marches and a selection book. At this time, the band moved to their new practice room above the Old Fire Station (at the rear of the Market Hall) which served as the home of the band until sold in late 1981.

In 1984 the band started to receive sponsorship from local engineering company Mullers and were also able to use the canteen for practice and storage. The conductor was now Raymond Millichamp (son of Sandy) who held this role for several years, his brothers also playing in the band. Jim Clifford (of Mullers) became President of the band and held the role for 15 years, he was followed by Adrian Coles for eight years and Paul Wakeley from 2014 to the present day.

In the early 1980's and as a branch off from the Lacon Childe school band, the Cleobury Junior Band was formed and were then sponsored by Bray Construction. This band then morphed into The Bell Band a few years later and were conducted for many years by Jon Jackson, Penny Jaeger took up the baton in the 1990's

With the Bell Band having a lower average age, it was inevitable that over time the

numbers would diminish with youngsters moving on. It was around 2014 that the Bell Band wound up and Cleobury Mortimer Concert Brass made the remaining players welcome to join them. There are not many small towns that will have housed two brass bands!

A large number of the band have been playing in Cleobury for over 30 years, most of us started learning whilst at school. Over the years there has been much romance in the band, several weddings and offspring still playing to this date.

In 1995 Stella Disney became musical director, bringing musical knowledge as well as beginner players to the fold. It was at this time, the Prelude Band was formed

In 1996 the band were awarded a lottery grant of £28,432 which was used to buy a complete set of instruments and these are still in full use. Stella Wilcox was our honourable secretary and ambassador of the band from 1977 to 2004, she is greatly missed for her organisation skills, although we are trying to keep the scrapbooks up to date for future generations.

In 2005 we moved from Mullers to the Parish Hall, not easy to find a venue in Cleobury that can house both a 30 piece brass band, music and equipment! It was during this year that Roger Andrews joined us as Musical Director, and when he left Mike Amphlett took up the baton and started the band competing again. We have enjoyed much success on the competition front for the past 9 years. We have performed at many varied events, with happy audiences enjoying our wide repertoire of music.

We are so lucky that we have this wonderful town band that has played a major part in our local community for many years and hopefully many more years to come. And for those who have gone before us, what a fantastic testament that the band is still thriving all these years later, a huge part of town history.



Letter from Westminster

Summer in the New Normal

As I write, we have had several weeks of glorious weather before entering June, with warm sunny days providing the main relief from the dark shadow of the coronavirus pandemic, which continues to disrupt many of our usual freedoms.

I have considerable sympathy with those who have been coping with the lockdown in cities, where outside space and access to nature is limited. One of the many reasons people choose to make their lives in South Shropshire, or to move here, is for the beautiful countryside we enjoy. At a time where we have had to limit our exposure to others, I know for many people our countryside has been invaluable.

But equally, I feel for those who would usually be putting much dedicated time and effort, often for free, into the many community events we enjoy in South Shropshire over the summer months. As we do not know how long this wretched virus will be with us, planning events even months in advance has been impossible. Great stalwarts of the South Salopian summer calendar have had to be cancelled – like Burwarton Show this August – or postponed.

So it will fall to many of us to have our own DIY summers, if we want to retain some of the fun and sense of community such events bring. Having seen how our communities came together to mark VE Day with social distancing, or the weekly clap for carers that sees neighbours united in celebration of NHS, care and essential workers, I feel confident that we will see similar community spirit during this summer.



HELPING IN THE HIGHLANDS

More stories from Marian Rees of her days working as a shepherdess in Scotland.

My travels as a shepherdess many years ago took me to the Killilan Estate in the Scottish Highlands, a little inland from the Kyle of Lockaish. To get there involved a scenic drive alongside Loch Long, passing a few houses dotted about until reaching a cluster of dwellings in Killilan.

The biggest house was where the Estate Manager lived, he was English and knowledgeable about deer stalking and butchering the meat, but had little interest in the sheep side. One road passed the houses and led out onto the beautiful wilds and seven miles later ended at Iron Lodge. Here the old shepherd Alastair MacRae lived with his sister Flora, who has learning difficulties, and their dog Nell and the cow.

Alastair was devoted to his flock of sheep, spread out on the hills around. It was a huge job to gather them, involving several shepherds, helpers like me and many dogs. Some dogs were brilliant at running out long distances to gather the sheep off the far peaks, others at barking and getting the sheep to run. The gatherers were standing strategically at certain points, we had to wait for perhaps an hour before the fittest men climbed up to the heights and then the gather commenced. A sheep gather could last seven to eight hours.

We would come across a herd of deer sometimes and if we disturbed a young deer calf lying in the bracken we had to make sure it didn't follow us and get separated from its mother. The very young had been left in a certain spot by the mother, who came back to that spot to feed it later on.

The sheep handling pens and dipper in Scotland were called the Farik. The sheep, and especially the lambs were likely to have ticks on them and dipping was essential. The person actually doing the dipping stood down in a pit alongside the dipping bath. They had to grab hold of the ewe's horn and dunk her head while the rest of the sheep was obviously submerged. It was quite a dangerous job, as the dip could splash your face and eyes. In those days it was a very strong dip that was used; very effective on the ticks and maggots, but now banned.

One time the Farm Manager ordered Alastair to move his entire flock to a nearer hill to "save travelling and petrol." Alastair humbly agreed, but a smile came onto his face. When the sheep were released on to 'foreign parts' they just made a bee (sheep?) line back to their familiar ground, using knowledge passed down from generation to generation. I stood beside Alastair as he watched them through his spyglass. "My sheep have all gone home," he said with a very satisfied expression on his weather-worn face.

There was a track that led from Killilan up to Corrie-Doyne, another remote area, absolutely beautiful and wild. There was a sheep farm there and large tin barn. The first time I went into this barn there were hundreds of sheep fleeces all piled up from the shearing of the previous year. I had to help wrap them all up individually, pack them in wool sacks and sew them up - a good job for a wet day! There were plenty of them that summer.

Nearby were the ruins of a house where a shepherd and family once lived. One of the locals told me when babies were born in this house the doctor had to come by horseback to tend the lady. No mobile phones in those days. One of the shepherds, Donnie Findlayson and his wife Ina, were very friendly and hospitable and they sometimes invited me for a hot meal after a hard day's work. Once I fell asleep at the meal table, I was so tired.

The whole estate was owned by Arabs and probably still is. Donnie told me when they were deer stalking they would be transported to the hills by helicopter. The game keeper, Innes Smith, lived on the estate and was quite a character, with interesting stories to tell of life in the Highlands.

I would love to revisit this area one day, but it is a long way away. I still have some good Christian friends who live in the area and invite me up typical Highland Hospitality they say "No need to give us warning of your coming - just arrive!" We'll see....





THE CLEOBURY SWIFTS WATCH

Our Swifts have returned from overwintering in Africa. They were a week late but as of the middle of last month we had at least five nesting pairs. At the end of last year, we counted 27 swifts, so we have some way to go, but it is still very good to see them racing around the church and high in the sky. House martins are back again in good numbers especially around the Medical Centre. Swallows however are very few and far between, a trend for the past two years.

Our Tawny owl population of at least three nesting pairs are feeding their owlets with much hooting and calling. Installing five new nesting boxes will resume in the autumn. The real performers are our buzzards with a nesting pair in the town and an astonishing 30 counted at one time at Mawley. Their soaring flight and mewing calls are now part of the countryside sights and sounds. *Kit Smith*

The Spice Box in London eatspicebox.co.uk and The Crafty Indian restaurant in Shipley thecraftyindian.com are examples of takeaways inviting customers to use Tiffin Tins to avoid plastic containers. Your voice is the most powerful tool we have when it comes to making change. Together we can help Cleobury become a leader in this change.

As a family we have switched to soap that comes free of plastic wrap. My wife was inspired by the TV Chef James Martin who appeared to have a lemon on a bracket above his sink. A little research showed this to be Le Provendi Lemon Wall Rotating S o a p fr o m <u>www.frenchsoaps.co.uk</u> in Harrogate. Having been in use for the past four months we are not half way through the bar and estimate it is more cost effective than the bottled hand soaps and it smells amazing.

In recent weeks I've been taking regular walks in the forest, although not beyond a pretty small radius. One of the benefits is that I really notice the little details and the changes in the forest from one week to the next. The luminous leaves of the spring have darkened to a deeper green, the foliage giving cover to the Fallow Deer and reducing the sunlight to the ground-hugging plants.

I'm watching the little Bilberry bushes which, like almost everything else, flowered generously this spring, developing their purple fruits and noting the most promising clumps for picking in August. Could this be the year for a bilberry pie? Still on the fruit theme, we're keeping an eye on the cherry orchard and have high hopes that next month may yield a crop for us to enjoy and even share. The blossom in April was a sight to behold and even the surviving centenarian trees set fruit to some extent. It all depends whether the Wood Pigeons and Mistle Thrushes leave any for us.


The tadpoles in the reservoir are growing their legs and form black shoals near the surface. Any day now the edges will be teeming with baby toads leaving the waters of their birth to take their chance in the wider world of the woods. Toads are much more tolerant of dry conditions than frogs and can make a good living eating slugs, worms, spiders, ants and other insects. They sometimes take up residence in gardens: what with fat adult toads lurking unexpectedly under stones or logs in the garden and tiny baby toads finding their way into piles of weeds waiting for the bonfire, my interactions with them have not always been happy.



The Greater Spotted Woodpecker, whose alias is Yaffle, is a regular sight and sound in the forest.

The sounds of the forest develop too as the season progresses. We've lost the Cuckoo and the Garden Warbler is silent now, but the squeals of the Swallows ring out around the barns. Nesting sites are sometimes revealed by the squeaks of the nestlings when we pass close by and there is no doubt where the Greater Spotted Woodpeckers have built their nest in a dead cherry tree. The Green Woodpeckers may be nesting somewhere nearby too: we often see the adults picking up ants from the track or fields, and their loud laughing cry is the origin of their other name of Yaffle.
