This is not going to be a quick process, but it is under way and we can expect to watch the Centre grow above the hedges lining the Ludlow Road.

And on the 25th, Blue Square invited us all to look at their proposed plans for a modern 60-bed retirement home to be built on the Cleobury Engineering site on Ludlow Road, subject to planning consent.

It's an impressive proposal and the developers would like your view of their plans. Pick up a questionaire from Matt Sheehan at the Market Hall and be sure it's completed and returned by March 14th.

A MESSAGE FROM ST MARY'S PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

We would like to thank everyone in the community who has supported St Mary's Church during the last 12 months. Many have supported financially, by regular giving or donations, and by supporting fund raising events. We are pleased to inform you that we have broken even in

2011. However, there is no room for complacency; we anticipate our outgoings will increase during 2012. To maintain the building, we have a number of restoration projects that will require funding.

As we write, the bells are being restored. Nothing has been done to them for 85 years and we need to ensure they will serve the church for many years to come. We are pleased to tell you that the cost of approximately £12000 has been met by donations and grants from groups supporting work on church bells. This includes a very generous grant from The Hereford Diocesan Guild of Bell Ringers Bell Restoration Fund.

During a recent inspection the church electrical wiring was found not to be up to current standards. We are applying for permission to rewire the building and replace the old light fittings. This will provide discrete and energy efficient light fittings with much better illumination. This work will start within the next few months and the cost is expected to be in excess of £20,000, funded in the main, by a large donation from The Friends of St Mary's and generous grants from, amongst others, The Shropshire Historic Churches Trust. There may be a

need to raise some additional money, so look out for requests such as 'sponsor a new light fitting'.

The recent quinquennial inspection drew attention to a number of restoration issues that are essential and mostly concerned with keeping water out of the building. Some are quite small; some have been dealt with, and paid for out of our funds. Others will need significantly more money to achieve.

Once again, thank you for all your support in the past and we look forward to it continuing as we work to maintain this important historical building. *Heather Kippin*

DO YOU REMEMBER JAMES MACKAY?



James MacKay, ex Scottish soldier and steward at Muller's Social Club in the 1940s.

The Clarion has been contacted by NRK, a leading Norwegian television station, whose Tore Stromoy is trying to trace any relatives of James MacKay.

James was stationed in the Faroe Islands in 1940 as a member of a Scottish regiment, and fell in love with a local girl. When he was moved on, he left pregnant lover behind and she duly produced a son in 1941. This was no runaway trick by the soldier, who supported his son financially, but was not allowed to visit his lover or to see his son. Now his son is trying to contact any of his

natural father's family or to trace his story.

In 1947 the court in the Faroes declared James was the boy's father, giving his address as 72 High Street, Cleobury Mortimer. There is no such address today; the highest number on the High Street electoral roll is 69. Has the house he lived at been demolished, or is there another explanation?

Jim Warren knew the name MacKay, but not the man, and says he ran the old Muller's Social Club, which then was in or near 43 High Street. If we can trace the man's life story and maybe contact any surviving family, NRK in Norway will bring his son over here.

Did you know James MacKay? Do you have any old records that show his name, or where he when he moved left Cleobury? We have searches going on in parish records and have asked the County Archive Office for help, but here in Cleobury could be the answer to a son's search for his father's traces. If you can help in any way, please contact the editor full details on Page 55.



Every household will receive a copy as it represents residents' views gained over the past 18 months. It covers topics Transport and Roads; from Housing and Planning; Environment: Services and Community. At the end of each topic is a list of ssues raised, actions required and by whom.

Philip Dunne MP - Letter from Westminster

I am in London from Monday to Thursday each week when the House of Commons is sitting. Awareness is rising in the capital that there will be an election in May to elect a Mayor for the next four years. The contest is unusual in that both the main candidates, Boris Johnson and Ken Livingston, have held the post before, so have a clear track record which voters can compare.

London's free papers, the Evening Standard and Metro, are running almost daily coverage of the contest. One of the issues discussed is the respective track record and current priorities of candidates for fighting crime in the capital, as the Metropolitan Police are accountable to the Mayor of London, who is directly elected by residents of London.

We do not have elections in Shropshire this May. But we will have an election on 15th November for a new post, the Police and Crime Commissioner to whom the West Mercia Police will become accountable. This will become one of the most important elected offices in our area. So raising awareness of the role and the rationale for its introduction is also important.

West Mercia is a large area, comprising Shropshire, Telford & Wrekin, Herefordshire and Worcestershire. We do not have a single paper which covers this region entirely, let alone a free one. So local parish magazines like this provide a helpful outlet to inform local residents. The Police and Crime Commissioner's role will be to become the main voice through which local people can hold the police to account. He or she will set strategic priorities for the force, providing

stronger and more transparent accountability of the police, holding the chief constable and the force to account; effectively making the police answerable to our communities.

A major part of the task will be to ensure local community needs are identified and met as effectively as possible, so developing local relationships through building confidence and restoring trust. This will lead the Commissioner to work in partnership with local MPs, councils and a range of agencies, within the force area and at a national level, to ensure an integrated approach to preventing and reducing crime.

But the Commissioner will not be expected to run the police. Operational responsibility will remain with the Chief Constable and his senior team. The Commissioner will take over the responsibilities of the existing West Mercia Police Authority, the members of which have been mostly appointed by local authorities. Shropshire Council will still have a role, appointing members of the Police and Crime Panel, which will scrutinise the Police and Crime Commissioner.

West Mercia is an effective police force. I want to ensure it remains so, and therefore make sure we have a strong field of high quality candidates for Police and Crime Commissioner to choose from this autumn. Candidates will need to live in the West Mercia force area and to be nominated by 100 people. It is expected to be a full-time role. More information can be found on the Home Office website.

Where are you off to on Holiday this year? Did you realise that pets can travel with you to most places in Europe? The rules about Pet Passports have recently changed, meaning that it is now a lot cheaper, and easier to take your best friends with you. 






On a day when the weather did little to encourage support, Neen Sollars' Victory Hall was busy as plans for the Community Hydro Cooperative were outlined.

Director Bill Duley and Secretary Jon Halle led the outlining presentation, the installation of a 12.5kw generator at Tetstill Weir, its projected life of 40 to 50 years that takes it well beyond the 20 year span of the financial project and the return investors can expect. At the end of 20 years, the investments will all be repaid; the money from Shropshire Council via Cleobury Country will be used for other community projects.

There were questions, a few doubters and an impressive statement from the owner of Tetstill Mill of his confidence and commitment to invest. As Bill Duley explained, the River Rea had provided power via the mill for centuries; in the 21st century it will produce vital electricity with no damage to the river or its environs.



WESTWOOD FARM 22 February

Links can be quite surprising sometimes. Who would think that West Midland farmers, tea and cakes and agri-political leaders had any connections? One of the most recent occurrences on the last count has been the election of Adam Quinney to the top table of the NFU. Adam and his wife Sarah farm on the Worcestershire/ Warwickshire border near Alcester. They are guite dynamic in their methods and are no strangers to trying out innovation. Their main enterprises are beef and sheep farming and have just embarked on a very direct supply link with a major retailer. Adam's excellent input into a recent national radio programme was the starting point for his election nomination by Worcestershire County and following a campaign trail around England and Wales, together with a good many canvassing phone calls, the local man easily led a field of seven candidates for the NFU's Vice President position. That's the easy bit done. There are so many matters already ongoing and such alot of issues imminent. The usual raft of speakers were in evidence. The top politicians, the Government's Caroline Spelman and Jim Paice and



The many problems must be tackled and solved allowing for best planning and execution of farming's most important function, the provision of a wholesome food supply. This brings us close to tea and cakes! Well, when a number of farmers from Herefordshire, Shropshire and Worcestershire shared a brain storming session with Adam Quinney, a few days before his election, beverage and cakes were much in evidence at the chosen venue of the Colliers Cafe at Rock. So, as the chosen one's agri political career progresses, we, in these parts can feel a little responsible. We do have some links!



Steve is the third generation of the Hems clan to work in their small High Street shop. Grandad Arthur started it in 1953 as a change from his work in the Birmingham meat trade, and Steve's father Gordon followed after he left National Service. Steve will assure you that Gordon was a tank driver in his National Service because the two-handed control of the fighting machine was close in style to driving a horse and cart around Brum. And he keeps a straight face when he explains it.

When Gordon was taken ill, Steve's plans for a career in the Royal Navy were forgotten and he joined the family business.

sausages and hams, plus a range of burgers, barbecue meats and faggots. The steak and ale pies are made by his mum, in a true family business tradition.

Award winning black puddings come from Poxon's of Birmingham, while lovely chutneys are made down the road at Rosie's Cleobury Kitchen. If you've tried any of this wide range, you'll know why there's often a queue out door and along pavement. They're open six days a week, with apprentice Rob covering when Steve's delivering to customers who can't travel in to see him.

The smile and laughter are all part of the appeal. He won't tell you, but he's often working until 8.00 or 9.00 o'clock the night before to keep up the supply of produce.

It might be a small shop, but it has a big appeal and an even bigger reputation.

WOULD YOU LIKE HELP AT HOME?

The Age UK Help at Home scheme helps older people maintain their independence and remain in their own homes. The scheme is supported by Shropshire Council and accredited to the ISO 9001:2008 quality standard. There are four separate elements to the scheme:-

MARCH IN THE FOREST That means Linda Iles, with some more Wyre Wanderings....

Signs of spring abound in the forest. You should be able to hear goldcrests and siskins singing, while blackbirds, mistle thrushes and song thrushes start to build nests. The eggs of tawny owls, dippers and ravens will already be hatching. On warm days of the cold-blooded some inhabitants of the woods - wood ants, adders, grass snakes and slow worms - should emerge from hibernation and frogs will spawn.

Silky "pussy willow" buds will silver the sallow trees and new leaves appear: usually first on the hawthorn, followed by hazel, rowan, elder and bright green larch needles.

Early flowers should be out: primroses, wood anemones, celandines, violets and wood sorrel. Thinning and felling of conifers near the Community Discovery Centre has created the right conditions for a variety of other woodland such bluebells, plants, as heathers, ramsons, enchanters nightshade, woodsage, and wood spurge to spread. We will be encouraging enrichment of the habitat by planting more native flowers and shrubs where appropriate. We hope to see more bilberry bushes as well, not only because

the fruit is good in pies, they are excellent in jams and jellies, cooked in batter or raw with cream. In the Hebrides the leaves are traditionally dried to make a while the berries were collected from the Long Mynd to be sold as a dye (no surprise for anyone who has collected them and suffered the stains resulting from the odd squashed berry). deer love to bilberries but the bushes are sometimes protected by tangles of brambles so that humans have a chance too. Grazing by deer reduces diversity in our forest, so the best flowers are generally tucked away in inaccessible places by rills and streams.

The Forestry Commission will be hosting events open to the public. Forest Friends are a group of pre-school children and carers, meeting every term-time Thursday from 10 to 11am for forest-based play and activities. And Health Walks every Tuesday and Sunday starting from the Forest Cafe at 11.00am to build fitness at a gentle pace.

During school holidays there be weekly Treetastic Tuesdays and Forest Fridays with the Discovery Centre open people to the see interpretative artworks and exhibits. Plus trails and activities for children on these days. There will be an Easter Egg Hunt on Good Friday from 10.30am to 2.00pm, starting at the Community Discovery Centre. No need to book but please bring £3.50 per child.

It's a pity Roy Leigh's not fond of shouting, because the man has a sense of humour that isn't heard in a crowd. When he introduced himself at the recent Chamber of Trade, he told them he'd just bought the old library building in Church Street and was thinking of trading in second hand books. That's what we heard.

"No, I didn;t get a chance to finish what I was saying," he told the Clarion. "I was going to say I was thinking of dealing in used books, but all the stock had been removed. But I was interrupted and couldn't finish the joke."

So no books. What he's looking to do is develop the fine old building as a gallery to show off his own antique stock, possibly with areas rented to local crafts people to show off their own skills. It all depends upon what he's allowed to do to make the place more attractive. The old

police cell is still there, Victorian grimness showing through the cream paintwork, but at some stage the original door has been removed. He'd like it back, please.

"It depends how the money goes, but I'd like to put a gallery in," he says. What he has done is change the name and it's officially listed as The Old Court. "It was listed as The Municipal Library and I didn't think it was a good idea to have two of those here," he grins.

THE HAPPY JAM MAKERS

Ditton Priors' Oak Farm is one of the unknown hero places that seem to flourish in Shropshire. This is the working farm owned by the county, managed by Stuart Toulson and working with young adults with special needs. On average there are 30 workers on site every day, their work led by just four front-line staff.

And the results are astonishing. The blackcurrant jam they make here was the overall winner at the W.I.'s 2010 Real Jam Festival. The certificate shows a score of 20 out of 20 with the judge's one word comment: 'Perfect!' (It's in stock at Talbot Stores) And last November they were the National Community Recycle Champions for their work on

site and collecting compost materials locally.

The workers all come from the local Shropshire area, arriving by the farm's own minibus or taxi. "We lead by example and working with them," Stuart Toulson explained. "It's very different from formal teaching, and when we're outside we all work side by side.

There's a lot going on here. 30 hens produce free range eggs sold locally and lambs are bred, reared and prepared for market. There are four acres of land given to growing domestic vegetables and fruit crops - that's what their jams come from.

Future growth? "My 2012 project is to convert a building into an industrial unit and produce jams and chutneys on a bigger scale," Stuart explained. "In the long term we might launch our own company."

They enjoy a very friendly relationship with the Ditton Priors community, and the Country Fair and Dog Show is held on the Oak Farm site, with more than a thousand people visiting. The Fun Dog Show alone attracts 200 entries.

Long term security of the operation in these straitened times? Possibly Community Land Trust status and management handed over to the community of which they are a part. It's a place run with love

and imagination, deserving all the support we can give

Cleobury Patients' Voice and the Medical Centre

Medical Centre Patient Satisfaction Survey, Findings, Results and Actions:

The survey was anonymous, carried out by members of Cleobury Patients Voice. The results were presented to CPV'S Annual General Meeting in January and to the practice on January 26th. The results have been published on the practice's website www.cleoburymortimermc.co.uk along with this action plan.

SUMMARY OF KEY FINDINGS

- 1. Ease of getting care scored high at 85% but getting to see a preferred doctor scored 80%.
- 2. Patients were happy with how doctors and nurses dealt with them although a couple of comments were made about GPs communication style.
- 3. There was a low uptake of comments about Registrars (Trainee GPs) and Medical Students
- 4. Patients were happy with Reception staff but we did not score as high for getting through on the phone with only 67% rating this average or above. Staff were found to be welcoming, helpful and answered questions.
- 5. Issues of confidentiality were raised, mainly around being able to hear conversations when patients are in the waiting room as the consultation rooms are next door. Patients asking for test results at the front desk and other patients being able to overhear the conversation
- 6. The building itself did not score high. Patients commented on access for disabled, privacy in reception, toilets and moving round the building.

The results were discussed at practice on January 26th. The following action points have been agreed: -

- 1. Getting to see one doctor is known to be a problem but this is not easily addressed, as they already work full-time. The Practice will look at how many extra doctor sessions it may need once we move into the new building but at the Pinkham Lane site we do not have rooms available to increase sessions.
- 2. We will explore with CPV tailoring the survey to allow us to drill the results down into individual clinicians rather than one heading for GPs.
- 3. Medical Students are relatively new in the Practice but we will ensure Reception Staff make patients aware they are seeing the medical student and explain their role.
- 4. Reception staff will inform patients that they cannot give results out at reception because of confidentiality and patients will be asked to phone. We will have an interview room in the new building but we don't have a separate room to take patients to at the moment.
- 5. We would like to have extra staff answering the phone between key times 8.30-10.00 and 1.30 to 2.30 but within the current building we do not have space to take any more on and we try to answer calls as quickly as we can. It is a staff priority during these times
- 6. We play music to minimize patients hearing conversations from nearby rooms and have advised staff not to talk too loudly. This problem will be addressed in the new building, as no consultation rooms will lead off the waiting room.
- 7. All staff have regular updates on confidentiality and any breaches should be reported to the Practice Manager.
- 8. All comments about the building will be resolved in our new centre.

IN BUSINESS

Stottesdon's Old Vicarage Adventure Centre



Anthony Eddies-Davies. The power behind a family business much bigger than it seems.

You could tell this was no ordinary place from the first phone call "Anthony's not here today," explained a very polite lady. "He's doing a Swift Water and Flood Rescue course with Glasgow Airport Fire Crew." So the Old Vicarage Adventure Centre has a reputation good enough to draw trainees from that far away; they obviously don't do boring and ordinary around here.

Then I met Anthony. "Oh yes, we're one of five centres approved to train for that. We're the recognised training centre for the Shetland Airport Rescue and South Wales Police, too." Just a small part of the work they do here in the heart of Stottesdon. Another Shropshire surprise.

It started back in 1984, when Brian Eddies-Davies converted a room in the Old Vicarage to board under privileged kids. In 1989 Anthony left Ludlow College and opted out of university. He knew he wanted to work in outdoor training and what his father had started was the stepping off point. He learned to graft on the farm and he learned to guide and train others in outdoor pursuits.

Today he runs The Old Vicarage Centre and his wife Steph the Country Treks horse and pony riding facility that takes riders out into the South Shropshire Hills with about 200 miles of trekking to choose from. Walk into the Old Vicarage grounds and you're struck by the way the place has been extended with living and office accommodation, plus classrooms and other facilities, most of it built by local Tim Preece Timber Buildings. Outside is a climbing wall, eager students waiting to be roped up and given a chance to tackle the challenge. If you include the cottage nearby in the village, they can accommodate 50 people here.

Nearby is Ginny Hole, 27 acres with one of their stables and a huge range of activities. There was a Riding for the Disabled session there when we called, with the students on obedient ponies and an instructor close at hand all the time. They were also taking a gentle trek through the adjoining woods, with smiles all round.

Canoes and kayaks occupy the nearby lake, everyone in a lifejacket and under careful watch. Towering above this was a network of rope walks, where everyone is secured to a safety line before being allowed to walk out along a variety of challenges. "We operate safety checks at all times, whatever the activity," I was told. In the nearby woods you can try paintball or laser

combat, and on the right weekend you'll see youngsters crawling through mud like commandoes.

The list of activities is almost endless, catering for the disabled, school groups, BTEC students, and adults who want an adventure weekend, or professionals seeking to improve their own skills and qualifications.

What you don't expect to find is an overseas adventure holiday programme, but they have it. And again it's done thoroughly, with all trips led by their own trained staff, to such exotic places as Bhutan, Nepal, North and South America, India and New Zealand. White water rafting in the Himalayas must be quite a change from the River Severn. And let's emphasise the thorough approach again - they do not contract holiday parties out to a local operator. They do the job themselves. It's that safety thing again.

It remains a strongly family business, a close knit loyal team whose smiles are almost part of the uniform. They employ 20 people full time, they're recognised by the official bodies of every area of their training activities and they even run eight week courses to train up outdoor instructors.

They can sleep 50 in the dorms, another 50 on the tented village campsite and have a self catering cottage in the village for family holidays.

How many hours does Anthony work a week? "Don't ask," he grins, ready for the next job to enjoy.
