Cleobury Clarion

The Historic Core project next to the Parish Church gets under way on Monday the 3rd of this month. Contractors will be working on the south western corner of the churchyard and on the footpaths around the street side of the church. They will be paving the area and upgrading the footpaths, which means access will be closed at times.

The official order is to close the paths for 28 days, but there will be access for church other services and urgent events. Contractors Philips and Curry promise flexibility and understanding, but it does mean access will not be easy while they are working on the site. There will be times when you just won't get through; please be patient

This is all part of an imaginative development at the town's heart, that will give an attractive area in which events can take place; another asset for the community.

Architect Lesley Lloyd will oversee the job, which is the realisation of an idea formed by County Councillor Gwilym Butler, Tom Brettell and Cleobury Country. They had seen the effect of this area used as part of the Farmers' Markets and realised the future potential. The Parish Council got involved and the result is a project under way, with almost all the finance in place. There

will be up to £2,000 more to find, as delays have resulted in the contractors' quote rising by some four percent.

The paved area will match the War Memorial Gardens, the old stone coffin will be retained and the sundial relocated. The church noticeboard will remain in place.

Retractable bollards around the area will allow traffic access only for special occasions, and the contractors are aware that they will have to allow traders in for the March 15th Market. The architect is the sole site administrator, a very straight, no-nonsense lady.

Shaunah has asked us to list the groups who helped raise the funds: Diminishing Tea Parties, a social success as well as a financial one; a Post Card Evening organised by the Cricket Club; a dancing group who donated their Christmas card money; Tenbury U3A Reading Group; coffee mornings, wine & nibbles; a Pink Day at Stone Manor and personal donations by people giving because they had treatment at the Breast Surgery Clinic or knew someone who had. Lloyds Bank will be adding to the total, and the aim is to fully purchase that machine on behalf of Cleobury Country patients.

Final word from Shaunah: "I have been overwhelmed by the generosity of the people of Cleobury Mortimer and District. Well done and Thank You."



Cleobury cabinet maker Chris Newman has a book launch at the library on Saturday the 15th of this month. No mean achievement, one that deserves credit and some books sold.

It's one of those works you will dip into occasionally, one you could open at any page and fill time easily. It's on sale f r o m p u b l i s h e r s <u>AuthorHouse.co.uk</u> at £19.99 hardback or £11.95 soft back. If you prefer it in e-book format, it's £2.55.

Or the price at the launch, when you can get your own copy signed by the author, is £12.00 hardback or £7.99s in soft covers. Bargain.



FRANCIS FLETCHER



Francis as his friends will remember him, a Falklands veteran and family man.

Francis Fletcher died on February 2nd, just two days before his 61st birthday. He was a much travelled local man, born in Wolverley and moving to Hopton Wafers to educated Ludlow be at Grammar School before joining the Navy at 17. His school reports gave no hint of the responsible man to come; he served on the ice patrol ship HMS Endurance as a Leading Stores Accountant. He was also part of the British forces involved in the recapture of the Falkland Islands from the Argentine.

He left the service after the Falklands and took up a post in Saudi Arabia, advising on the operation and costings for British built Tornado jets during the Desert Storm campaign.

His life ended too soon, a victim of cancer of the sarcophagus. Ironically, his father Samuel died of the same disease 47 years before; he too was a war veteran, wounded at Dunkirk.

Francis leaves his wife Philip, Elvira and sons currently at Kidderminster College, and Peter, who is reading Physics at Rotterdam University, and mother Daisy, a Cleobury Mortimer resident. The funeral was at Wyre Forest Crematorium on February 27th and at Francis's request his ashes are to be scattered like his father's, along the stream side near Ditton Mill, where they both enjoyed the peace and tranquility.

A Cleobury Character - Shelley Roberts

It's still quite a surprise to see a lady at the wheel of a tipper truck. But Shelley Roberts passed her Heavy Good Vehicle test in 2003 and has been driving her 'little Volvo' ever since.

They each have quite a history. Shelley passed her driving test at 17 and has been enthusiastic about the art ever since. Let's not call her mad about driving, this is a lady who rises far above that level. The truck has been in the Roberts family from new in 1996, and covered 1,080,000 kilometres. A million kilometre truck. "Most go to Africa at about half that," she smiles .

No cosseted little toy, it's a working vehicle that carries up to 11.2 tonnes of whatever is needed, most of it delivering stone from Clee Hill or one of the area quarries. Most of their big trucks are eight wheelers with a 20 tonne payload, but Shelley's four-wheeler can get into tighter areas where the big boys cannot squeeze. That pleases the customer, with the load dropped wherever it's needed on site; saves labour and time.


The Volvo's long life is a tribute to its drivers, more particularly Shelley in recent years. In those 675,000 miles the equivalent of 27 times around the earth - it's had one new clutch. Contrast that with the customer at West End Garage when Shelley worked there, whose poor little Ford Fiesta had a new clutch every 1,500 miles.

The cylinder head came off last year, at around the million kilometre mark, when a head stud broke and Mike had to fit a new head gasket and bolt. It's actually quite quick by truck standards, with a 6,000cc six cylinder engine deep breathing via both a turbocharger and a supercharger; the result is a healthy 260bhp, or Jaguar territory if you prefer; that all gets to the rear wheels through an eight-speed gearbox. And some people think a six-speed is cool! "It does go well, it drives like a go kart ," says Shelley. "And I've seen boy racers off at the lights!" Could that have been the reason for a gear breaking up and two bearings needing replacement? Probably not. And it's had the fuel tank replaced after a leak developed around seam and the. It's not a lot

Mike looks after servicing, his standing as an experienced mechanic subject to spot checks by a VOSA inspector. His own 20 tonner stands in the yard; it's another Volvo, of course.

It's not an easy job, and she has taken a pickaxe to a frozen load of gravel to get it shifted. So does she enjoy it? "I keep going back to it," she admits. "But it's hard physical work, not really a woman's job." She is building her own stone supply business, her customers including Severn Valley Railway, who know and trust her and like the flexibility of a small load service. Looks like she can't give up yet.



Letter from Westminster -Philip Dunne MP

We have had the wettest January since 1766, and in February the highest tidal surge for sixty years. Strong winds led to widespread power cuts. We cannot control the forces of nature at work around us, but the Government has been completely committed to provide help to those who need it now and funding for the future to help protect households in coastal and rural areas against winter storms.

When Duty Minister for the Ministry of Defence, I joined discussions last month to provide help to the worst affected areas. We offered military personnel who were deployed to provide support in flood affected areas as part of multi-agency efforts. Royal Marines from 40 Commando helped in Somerset; specialist vehicles and boats were provided by fire services and the military, including along the River Severn in Worcestershire. Military planners supported the Environment Agency, local councils and emergency services in county command centres set up in flood affected counties across Southern England. The RAF flew surveillance flights to monitor the extent of flood damage.

The Prime Minister announced new measures to help people put their lives back together as the waters subside, including changing the rules so local authorities could claim back 100 per cent of their flood costs from central government. Home owners affected will be eligible for grants to build better flood protection, and businesses will be eligible to defer local taxes to ease the pressure of resuming trading. A new fund has been established to help farmers recover from flooding. All of this will be complemented by investing more than ever before to build up defences against future winter floods.

Local residents know the devastation flooding can cause a local community. River levels in Shropshire remain high, ground is waterlogged, the Severn has burst its banks in Bridgnorth and flooding in Shrewsbury has affected some residents and businesses. Thankfully Shropshire has not seen flooding to the extent seen Somerset and the South-west, or along the Thames. But only a few years ago severe flooding in parts of Ludlow, Much Wenlock and elsewhere forced people to leave their homes and many lost possessions through water damage. The images of Dawlish, where erosion left train tracks swinging in the wind, reminded me of the holes blown under the Severn Valley Railway by flash floods in 2007. But the consequences of cutting rail links to Devon and Cornwall are clearly even more serious. Damage to other infrastructure links has made it difficult to provide assistance to some of the worst affected areas. I urge anyone who is in a flood risk area to use the Environment Agency's early flood warning service as well as advice what to do before, during and after a flood, available at www.environment-agency.gov.uk/ homeandleisure/floods . Shropshire Council has an excellent flood advice section on its website at http://www.shropshire.gov.uk/flooding-advice for updates on school and road closures.

Clarion Coppers - with PCSO Nick Morris

Here are the reported crimes in our area since those mentioned in the last issue.

There was an attempted burglary at a house in Rock between 10:00pm Pound Bank, on January23rd and 11:00am on January 27th. Nothing had been stolen and it is thought that the criminals may have been deterred by the alarms. On January 23rd between 3:00pm and 4:30pm the rear passenger windows of a 4X4 vehicle parked near The Blount Arms Caravan Park were smashed while the owner walked her dog. Nothing was stolen. There was a burglary at a property in End between January 22nd Orchard and January24th whilst the occupant was in hospital. Entry was gained by the forcing of a back door and the smashing of the lounge window before it was ransacked. Cash and jewellery was stolen from a safe. Catalytic converters were stolen from a parked vehicle in The Crescent, Clee Hill on January 25th/ 26th, and from a parked vehicle in Three Crosses, Clee Hill on January 29th/30th. Power tools were stolen during a burglary at an outbuilding of a farm on the outskirts of Cleobury between January 26th and January 28th. A theft of an I-phone occurred at Ben's Barbers in Church Street, Cleobury, after the victim had been distracted by a foreign-looking couple. This happened during the afternoon on January 29th.On February 1st at just after midnight in Cleobury Meadows, two males were seen stealing a Landrover by the owner who looked out of the window having heard a suspicious sound. The owner quickly dressed and followed the thieves in another car. After a short chase, the thieves abandoned the Landrover and got into a waiting Ford Transit type flat bed recovery vehicle where a third male was waiting. That vehicle drove off in the direction of Kidderminster. One of the males was later arrested on suspicion of the crime and is now on bail. A high value camera with associated equipment, and a coat, were stolen from a vehicle parked at The Crown, Hopton Wafers, overnight on February 1st/2nd after a rear window had been smashed. Power tools and keys were stolen, and locks damaged, at a break-in to a

workshop at Clee Hill Quarry overnight on February 3rd/4th. A burglary took place at a house in Millpool Place, Cleobury Mortimer, whilst the occupants were on holiday, between February 7th and February 15th. A large amount of mostly silver and gold jewellery and antiques were stolen. Between the afternoon of February 17th and 7:30am the following morning, £150 worth of damage was sustained to a baby changing unit and door handles in the new gents' toilet in Childe Road. During the evening of January 25th, two males were arrested in the Leisure Centre car park for possession of illegal drugs, and one of them for also possessing an offensive weapon.

There have been several successful drugs warrants executed over the West Mercia area recently. A man was jailed for two and a half years for running a cannabis factory in a garage at the rear of The Steps pub in Stourport. £40,000 worth of plants were discovered. The landlord of the pub was given a suspended sentence and 250 hours of unpaid community work after admitting to producing cannabis. Both offenders were ordered to pay £600 costs as well. A little bit further afield in Worcester, several people were arrested on suspicion of supplying heroin. These arrests follow an investigation after information has been received by police from members of the public. If any reader has any information, however little, about the drug activity in and around Cleobury, please let Police know. All information is collated and will make a big picture from little ones, and sooner or later the offenders will face justice. By passing on information you help to put a stop to this activity and the possible ruination of young people's lives. Question your children about what they may have found out at school and pass it on discreetly. Information about drugs activity or any other criminal activity can be reported to Police directly on 101, or by contacting Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111. The Farming Page - Catherine and John Evans Explain the Effects of the Wet, Wet Winter

There has only been one topic of this conversation winter the _ weather. Rain, rain and more rain! I think everyone sympathises with the plight of those living in the Somerset Levels who have been flooded for weeks on end, with no sign of improvement. The argument still rages over the cause and solution but one thing is sure, the impact on peoples livelihood will be huge. For farmers, livestock have perished or been moved off the farms, watching the anguish and stress on the TV has been heartbreaking and the longer the water remains the greater the personal, financial a n d environmental damage. The submerged plants will rot, trees will die and it will take months for the land to recover. Grassland will need ploughing up and reseeding and arable plants will not have survived the wet conditions so the impact will continue far into the year.

On a more personal level, all the fields are waterlogged and we were unable to put the early spring lambs out into the fields until the last few days, as they were too wet. The ewes due to start lambing in March have been brought inside as it has been too wet to get around the fields to feed and check them. Arable land remains uncultivated as the soggy ground means we can't get into the fields with heavy machinery. Muck is building up in the sheds as it can't be taken out and spread on the fields, winter maintenance such as fencing and hedge cutting has been delayed and we still have maize, spring barley and spring oats to plant once the conditions improve and the ground warms up. On a positive note the B&B guests are enjoying bottle feeding the early lambs and collecting eggs now the hens have started laying again! Iohn and Catherine Evans



The New Medical Centre - Further Progress



Work on the new Centre has been delayed by the rains, but is only a few weeks behind schedule. The building right will be the new pharmacy, the farther section will house consulting and treatment rooms and between will be reception. There are areas not yet allocated to a particular service; they are for future expansion. This is going to be a very impressive Centre for our local medical services, with good parking space on site and outside. Site manager John Hutchinson and his crew have made great progress despite the handicap of so much rain that slowed work. With one section of the roof to be completed when we called in mid February, the essential fitting out inside the building was already under way and Mr Hutchinson estimated the work was just three weeks behind the original schedule.

Local services will be accommodated in the Centre, making life easier for patients who have had to travel elsewhere in recent times. And it would be reasonable to expect extra services to be offered as professionals realise that patients can reach them with little inconvenience. This whole project really has grown quickly once work started. JR

THE WORK OF THE SURGERY

Primary Care is the first port of call for most people with health problems, 90% of all NHS contacts across all the services offered. Cleobury's Medical Practice has a large team, from Health Visitors to Midwives a n d Counsellors who work from our base or а community hospital. These services change people regularly; some may recall having physiotherapy in the Market Hall, which was Ludlow: moved to а similar story exists for other such staff. It's hoped that some of these will be able to use both a clinic

site and the medical centre, as a base.

The reception staff deal with incoming calls, prescriptions and a multitude of tasks like organising future clinics and appointments, liaising with hospitals and community Much of their providers. time is spent scanning, filing and coding blood, x-ray, MRI results and hospital letters into the patient records. Sue Arrowsmith is the Practice Manager, who oversees finance and is dealing with all aspects of the New Build.

Most of you will know practice nurses Adele and Donna, who provide nursing care for patients who come to the surgery. They also administer immunisations for children and for travel and run our chronic disease clinics. Health care support worker Mandy is responsible for taking blood samples, ECG's and asthma and bronchitis breathing tests.

The practice doctors are partners Allsop, Thompson and Powick. Dr Powick is due to retire to a part-time role in April and we are recruiting a new partner. We have always been involved in training and Doctors Powick and Thompson trained here.

More recently we have been involved in training final year medical students, with whom patients are offered a 30 minute appointment; 20 minutes with the student and ten with the GP too. This has been well received and we thank patients who have been willing to see the students.







Linda Iles March In The Forest



Round about this time of year a small number of people take part in the Wyre Forest frogspawn survey. For me this involves setting off through the forest to find my allocation of 10 ponds, some easy to find, one mysteriously evasive despite my having done this for the past nine years. When there, I gaze intently into the water at various points, counting clumps of frogspawn. A few clumps are easy to count but in favoured sites I resort to desperate estimates: 200? 500? On a warm day there may be obvious frog activity ("croak", "plop") and I will know that I'll have to repeat the exercise when they've finished. They may even stop due to cold weather and start again when it gets warmer. I may look too early (nothing there) or too late (clumps of spawn sinking and starting to merge into each other).

A friend keeps a log of the first day of spawning each year. The dates range from February 24th in 2011 (after the coldest winter in 25 years) to March 12th in 2005. She doesn't have a date for last year – probably gave up, though it wasn't too bad a year for frogs or us in the end. The data are collected by the Wyre Forest Study Group, who were recently featured on BBC 1's "Countryfile". The survey doesn't tell us how many of the eggs survive to adult frogs but should indicate trends in population numbers.

Forestry Commission events this month:

3rd to 9th March - Climate Week. A family-friendly trail takes you see how trees and forests can be part of the solution to climate change. The Wyre Forest Discovery Centre is offering a discount for schools to who come on their 'Trees and Climate Change' programme that week. Also see www.climateweek.com to see how this nationwide occasion will be encouraging all of us to do our bit, small or large, to help create a secure future.

Sunday 30th March - Forest Discovery Day. This will include a forestry and timber trail accompanied by forest-themed activities for families in and around the Community Discovery Centre at Callow Hill.

The regular **Health Walks** continue to meet at the Forest Cafe at 10.30am on Tuesdays or Sundays to register before the 11am walk. These walks are led by volunteers and there is no charge.

Forest Friends meet at 10am each Thursday for an hour of forest activities for pre-school children and their carers. On the first Thursday of the month this is led by the Discovery Centre team and 6th March will see the creation of works of Forest Art (see www.forestry.gov.uk/forestry/ infd-6frek4 for the themes for other months), while Forest School practitioners from "Step-Up" will run play-based sessions on the other Thursdays. There is a charge of £3 per child (plus £1 for other participating siblings).

IN BUSINESS: Mark Williams, Professional Willwriter



Mark Williams at home. Or he'll call at your place, whichever suits you best.

Born into an Army family in Tanzania, it was natural that Mark Williams would work in the services. His choice was the police, starting in Hampshire in 1979 and moving up country to West Mercia in 1986. He retired in 2009 as a Detective Superintendent, having covered the local area and worked mainly from Kidderminster. and Telford stations. He knows the territory and its people well.

"When I left the Police, I wanted to get back to some sort of face to face work, it was the best part of policing," he says. He chose to become a willwriter, which meant extra training and passing a two-stage exam before being accepted as a member of the Institute of Professional Willwriters. Much r e spected in the legal profession, as he makes clear: "The only legal body with a Code of Practice approved by Trading Standards."

The standards he offers are impressive: "I set a deadline for a job, with a guaranteed fixed price." And when he's not in his busy period from January to May ("At this time of year, I'm probably working a 60 hour week") he's taking time to catch up on his training and developments in the law. Part of the requirement to belong to his professional body is updating his knowledge every year.

35 years spent dealing with the law and people reflect in his interview technique: "I don't rush someone, it's the same fee regardless of the time it takes, and as people get older they're still sharp but it just takes them a little longer to follow things. You need to speak clearly and slowly." Anyone who's taken a phone message from a call centre, where a 250 miles an hour jabber means they can hit their target, will appreciate how much easier Mark's mature and experienced approach is.

There are frustrations and occasional challenges in the job, but he never gets tired of it. "Not at all. Every will is different, every person is, too, and you're meeting so many people."

"I don't think that enough young people starting a family think about making a will. It's an important part of ensuring their child's future if a tragedy should occur. And some families don't arrange a lasting power of attorney until it's too late, then find that member of the family has lost the capacity to do it. Not just through dementia, though that is the most common reason for seeking it, it can be a stroke, an accident, whatever...." It's not a very happy subject to discuss, but the simple logic of what he says cannot be denied.

He's in a delicate but vital business, as anyone who has experienced the loss of a parent or close relative who never quite got around to making out a will can tell you. And the matter of probate, or recording in detail the inheritance a departed relative is leaving behind, is an area where he is happy to leave it to the family: "I always encourage people to do their own probate, so far as they can."

His knowledge is recognised in the work he does organising willwriting sessions for the West Mercia Police and sometimes their neighbouring forces. And with a good reputation across a wide area, will he look to expand the business in the years to come? "No. I enjoy seeing people face to face and if you get too big you lose contact with that side." It's a lean operation: Mark, wife Lyn with specialist personnel knowledge and a part time secretary. Still personal.
