The next will be the Environmental Champion, for the person or organisation who has done most to protect the local environment and the third will be the Business/ Organisation Champion for the body within the local area who promote has done most to business Cleobury in the Country area.

#### THE REMARKABLE GASKELLS

John and Angie Gaskell are towers of strength in raising money for cancer causes with their Rainbow Foundation. Last year they broke all records, with  $\pounds$ 20,160 raised at Golf Club events.

On February 16th there was a presentation of cheques to Cancer Research, MacMillan, Midlands Air Ambulance and 4Louis. Kidderminster Prostate Cancer Group had theirs earlier. In the 10 years Rainbow has been operating, they've raised almost £100,000 for a range of cancer charities.

The presentation was by their daughter Kelly, with family friends in support, as John was at home with Angie, who sadly is having her own battle with that dreadful disease. It was a tearful occasion, but the simple determination of the Gaskell family shone through with the announcement that the Rainbow Day will carry on, with this year's tournament booked for Friday July 5th.

Such devotion to a charitable cause is quite remarkable and deserves every support.

I will not mention any names in this statement, but hope the person responsible for it needing to be written will take note and act a little more responsibly in future.


Someone has been telling people that I had an affair with a woman in this town; if dates were part of the story, I do not not know.



#### **ORCHARD ADVICE**

A new venture to advise orchard owners on development and preservation is under way, thanks to Butterfly Conservation and the Wyre Community Land Trust. It's all part of a drive to help landowners manage their land to benefit wildlife and the environment.

Did you realise that since the 1950s, Worcestershire has lost 85 percent of its traditional orchards? That's a lot of local apple varieties no longer to be found in the area. So WCLT have started to map and record details of remaining orchards in the Wyre Forest area and they're looking for volunteers to help with further survey work. They would also like to hear from orchard owners who wish to be involved.

They have a programme of events coming up, covering pruning apple trees, planning and planting an orchard and orchard wildlife and pollinators. Wade Muggleton of Stottesdon, a recognised authority of the subject who has featured on BBC TV's 'Gardeners' World' recently, will be leading on this aspect.

With the current emphasis on pollinators, a look at the role of blossom, its pollination and how we might all do something to contribute. Includes a farm walk in the afternoon. Led by Wade Muggleton.

#### BLOOD BIKES HELP CARRY BREAST MILK

A unique partnership means that new mums who are apart from their premature babies being cared for in Shropshire's neonatal unit, can still provide them with their breast milk.

The neonatal team at The Shrewsbury and Telford Hospital NHS Trust has joined forces with The Shropshire, Staffordshire and Cheshire Blood Bikes to give mums the chance to feed their babies their own milk, even though they are apart.

Occasionally pre-term babies in the Neonatal Unit in the Shropshire Women and Children's Centre in the Princess Royal Hospital in Telford may be in a different hospital from their mothers, which means that they are unable to feed them.

However, the new partnership with the Blood Bikes, a charity which normally delivers blood products, means that a mother will be able to express her breast milk, which is then collected and transported by the bikers to the neonatal team.

Gina Powell, Neonatal Sister, said: "We look after babies that have come from hospitals in Stoke or Wolverhampton for example, and those mums may have had a Caesarean Section and may not be able to visit in the first instance because they are poorly.

"Breast milk, particularly the colostrum, is the best medicine for a pre-term baby as it will have the maternal immunity within it to protect the baby from infections and illnesses that could be life threatening.

"There are also benefits for the mother as she knows that she can meet her baby's needs, even though they are separated. She will be able to give her baby her milk even if she can't visit, which is wonderful for both mother and baby.

"We are absolutely delighted that Blood Bikes, which is a charity run by volunteers, can offer this help to our mums and babies; and we are incredibly grateful to them for their help and support. This will make a huge difference to them."

#### THE CREATIVE WRITING GROUP

Her material involved an introduction to a variety of colourful characters who were using a railway guard's van as a play venue. We look forward to updates as Gill's work progresses.

With seven brothers and sisters, all of whom are engaged in farming, the Evans family's agricultural interests are extensive and influential. Four of the family, John, Sue, Robert, and Clive are directors of Curdale Farms Limited based at the farm on the Ludlow Road just out of Cleobury Mortimer. They collectively farm 1400 acres in and around the town.

John and his wife Catherine live at Broome Park Farm on the Catherton Road. Catherine runs a cosy and welcoming two bed room B&B business within the farm complex. She makes her own bacon and sausage products from a couple of homegrown pigs and provides much appreciated breakfast and evening meals based on local products. Catherine has been running the business for over t e a r s n V e catherine@broomeparkfarm.co.u k

Curdale Farms is a mixed farm of arable and livestock with 700 acres of wheat, barley, oats and fodder beet, which with grass and silage, feeds 1100 sheep and 500 beef cattle. This time of the year is the main lambing season when a further 1500 lambs have to be fed and watered. Some early lambs born just after Christmas provide a chance to be sold for the Easter lamb market. The 500 cattle are fattened up over 15-24 months, being sold as finished animals, to the supermarkets

The whole of the land of Curdale Farms is under Higher Level Stewardship Schemes designed to improve the environment and biodiversity of farms. The scheme lasts for 10 years and Curdale Farms have

been in the scheme for 7 years. They have carried out a wide range of environmental options which include hedge cutting every other year, outside bird nesting times, hedge planting and maintenance as well as some tree planting. Their arable land provides opportunities for additional biodiversity, with buffer zones around the edge of fields and non drilled corn strips for increasingly rare skylarks. They sow four acre plots of birdseed crops especially for finches which have dropped in numbers over recent years. Some fallow ground and stubble which is left to overwinter provides additional biodiversity and for а wider set of ecosystems to flourish. Access for the public is afforded with a wide range of footpaths.

John points out the continued need for footpath users to observe the Countryside Code and especially to safeguard the livestock by shutting gates and not allowing dogs off the lead where there is a chance of cattle and sheep worrying. In most years there are incidents of such worrying and deaths of ewes and lambs which is distressing for farmers. It puts a strain on relationships between farmers and the general public. There are over 500 dogs in Cleobury Mortimer which need walking and exercise every day. An understanding and a close partnership with farmers, their land, access the and environment of which they are stewards, is important.

We have a beautiful and richly bio diverse countryside of which farmers and landowners such as Curdale Farms are worthy stewards.

#### **OTTERS**

Dr Mark Baldwin responded to the news item on otters in the January 'Clarion' with a report from the Parish Magazine of June 1867:

'OTTER HUNT. On Monday the 13th, ten of the Hon. R.C.Hill's pack of Otter Hounds arrived at Shakenhurst and the next day had some excellent sport up the River Rea. The attendance was good, though the meet was at sunrise. We believe that before 4 a.m. there was no complaint on the score of cold, so good was the sport. A fine Otter with her four cubs was secured near Detton, at Titford Bridge.

The party made quite a sensation as they passed through our town on their way home. There are hopes of an early visit from this excellent pack, as it is supposed that other Otters are in the river.'

#### **BREAKFAST CLUB**

The Club met on February 12th to learn of the activities of Cleobury Mortimer's Fire Brigade from Andrew Davies, who currently heads up our local Fire Station.

The Service now has a wider remit, and was renamed 'Fire & Rescue Service' about ten years ago. There is a growing integration with the Ambulance Service, and fire crews now do First Responder and Paramedic courses.

Cleobury has never had any full-time firemen – ours are part-time or 'retained'. Don't think that this makes them in any way second-class – the training they get is first-class, and Shropshire is a model for the rest of the country in the way it has modernised its Fire Service and Rescue Services. They typically get 80 to 90 callouts annually, but last year's total was 130, many triggered by automatic fire alarms.

Prevention is always better than cure, so our firemen carry out risk assessments for business premises, publicise the benefit of smoke alarms, and will soon be doing the same for carbon monoxide detectors, The ideal number of too. firemen for Cleobury is 12, and Andrew is confident that this target will be met for the next few years. Women may be recruited in the near future, on special short-hour contracts, and this will help staff numbers.

#### Letter from Westminster

As Chair of the All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) for Rural Services, last month I hosted a Rural Vulnerability Day in Parliament.

Much discussion was focussed around a research report on the State of Rural Services 2018 compiled by Rural England. This took an in-depth look at eight key areas of rural service provision in contrast with more urban areas. These were: buses and community transport; broadband and mobile connectivity; public library services; hospitals; Public Health services; young people's services; shops and online shopping; and public advice services.

Having banged the drum for rural issues for almost two decades, I was shocked to hear remarks from one MP who called fairer funding settlements for rural areas "perverse reverse redistribution", when comparing rural Councils to places like Hackney, which has a core spending power per dwelling 27% higher than Shropshire.

But this reminded me of the importance of having good

data with which we can ensure rural areas like Shropshire continue to be pushed up the government's agenda.

DEFRA Minister Lord Gardiner. who has responsibility for Rural Affairs, was able to address our meeting. He made clear the government is taking rurality more seriously. For example, 14 government departments now have a dedicated senior civil servant responsible for rural implications of policies. We have also more equitable distribution of funding for important areas such as schools and local government. But this report shows why there is still much more to do.

When it comes to connectivity, rural areas are improving but lag behind urban areas. Given transport difficulties compared to urban areas, it is all the more important for rural connectivity to improve, so business and employment opportunities can open up. The research indicated basic phone calls cannot be made inside 33% of rural buildings on all four mobile networks (EE, Three, O2 and Vodafone), compared to 3% in urban areas. This needs to improve.

The report also highlighted that while young people in rural areas fare better than their urban peers in education and mental health, they tend to score worse on key public health indicators: alcohol consumption, smoking, being bullied, and risky behaviour.

One of the outcomes from the Day is that the APPG will be taking an in-depth look into why rural children are more likely to have worse public health indicators, and what we can do to help tackle this growing health issue.

The report highlighted growing evidence of services sharing premises at 'hubs', enabling rural communities to retain access to services while helping achieve some cost savings and generate footfall. So this is something we should continue to encourage.

There is more work to do. This State of Rural Services report will help add weight to our campaign for greater funding for rural areas, particularly in the context of the next Spending Review from HM Treasury.





#### March in the Wyre Forest

This month we anticipate the birth of the first lambs on Uncllys Farm since we moved here. Our grazier has a flock of 16 Kerry, Welsh Mountain and Herdwick ewes who have been consorting with a Kerry ram, so we hope for a good crop of lambs with a mixture of markings but all equally bouncy! On a serious note, we'll have to try and protect them from dog worrying. The forest is very popular with dog walkers and most assume that they can let their pets off the lead here. They also assume that their pet would never chase sheep, but sad experience shows that you can't be sure of this.



There's a connection here with our efforts to conserve woodland birds, which are increasingly disturbed by dogs. Fortunately a number of woodland plots are now surrounded by deer fencing so that trees can regenerate naturally, safe from hungry Fallow and Muntjac. Volunteers have recently planted little Rowan, Hazel, Wild Cherry, Wild Service and Hawthorn trees in these plots to create a diverse habitat which can better support a wide range of insects, birds and other wildlife. Research shows that many woodland birds including Dunnock, Nightingale, Garden Warbler and Long-Tailed Tit are adversely affected by deer browsing. We intend to do more survey work so that we can see if our efforts produce the beneficial results intended.

This month also sees the opening of a new exhibition at Bewdley Museum. 'Beautiful, Peaceful and Fruitful: Ruskin in Wyre' marks the 200th birthday of the eminent Victorian whose legacy could be said to include public libraries, museums and art galleries, the sympathetic preservation of old buildings and beautiful landscapes, the recognition of Turner, the improvement of factory working conditions... etc.! His acquaintance with our forest inspired a movement (the Guild of St. George) to set up communities where ordinary people could work the land, develop craftsmanship and pursue their own education, in short 'make some piece of England beautiful, peaceful and fruitful'. Ruskin Land is certainly beautiful and peaceful. Its fruitfulness may be measured in many ways: the produce from its orchards and fields, the diversity of its nature, its role in spreading a love of nature, art and craftsmanship, and the health and wellbeing of those who live, visit or work there.



#### THE HUB GOES ON GROWING

If you want proof that young people can work together to make a place better, here it is. It's known as The Hub today and for years was the Methodist Hall in Church Street. In 2012 the Saint Mary's Youth Project arranged to take on the lease and convert the building to a youth centre. The project attracted lots of support, from both youngsters and bto their families and volunteers who could see what a great idea it was.

B & Q provided paint, Shropshire Housing Group chipped in with both staff and a £5,000 grant and work began. A nice touch was Tom Cowell from Lacon Childe School volunteering, as his grandad built the original hall.

In November 2013 The Hub was opened and today it's a smart place to meet up and to gather before outings to places like climbing walls in Worcester and Kidderminster, with the venture visit latest а to Blackstone Park and on into Bewdley to take in the Museum and other attractions. Young people being shown what is good in this area.

When the Methodist Chapel ceased regular services last September it was a natural place for the Hub to expand its operation and plans were drawn up to establish a cafe, a dance studio and a soft play area, in a new Community Hub All in a form so that the building can be easily converted back to be used for any church ceremony if the Methodist congregation need it. This flexibility means that the building is still active and not closed up, with the inevitable deterioration that would mean.

The plans were submitted to the Aviva Fund with the hope of getting a £25,000 grant, but that did not come their way. Instead, a consolation £500 will help and they are back writing to any source of funds to seek support.

What has emerged is a groundswell of voluntary help from friends, parents and local trades, asking how they can help. That's already happening, with Shropshire Housing Group funding a wood burning stove.

The young people are designing and driving this Community Hub project and have so impressed with their ideas that the Neighbourhood Plan Team have included provision of a purpose designed Community within future housing Hub development. What the Hub is working so well at is bringing people together.

"What we're building is a healthy, thriving community," explained project trustee Roger Brown. At a time when mental health is a growing concern, that is a clear thinking, long term aim. So much progress shows that it can be done and there are already developments in the pipeline that we will keep you informed. After the reform of the post office, а Uniform Penny Post was introduced from 10 January 1840 and by May 1840 post could be pre paid using the famous Penny Black stamp.

Picture postcards did not arrive until 1894. A postcard costing a halfpenny arrived the next day and gives an insight into social history and the lives of ordinary people. Bv 1902 postcards developed into having a division for the address and messages. Codes and encryptions were used to keep prying eyes from secret messages. In their heydays 600,000,000 postcards were sent annually and the period between 1902 and 1914 was the Golden Age. Today, postcards with famous names can reach £40,000 at auction."

Even in the unlikely event of finding a salesperson who actually wants to sell you a car, what to buy?. Chunky pretend off roaders seem to be flavour of the month but I don't know whether this is down to easier access or just the higher ground clearance and softer suspension needed before venturing out on the potholed wasteland laughingly referred to as the Shropshire road network. It's not that it's bad, but it feels like some of these roads haven't been touched since the Romans left... Have you driven up the Bridgnorth road lately? - it's a good place to play 'spot the tarmac'. Perhaps the potholes could be renamed 'Plunge Pools' which is a bit more upmarket. Apparently, Shropshire Council was given just over £6 Million extra by the Government for road repairs and then took £5 Million out for Adult Social Care. Personally, I wouldn't want to sacrifice good handling qualities for more comfort so I'll stick to a conventional hatchback or estate.

There are any number of makes to choose from and it is said that there are no longer any truly bad cars, it's just that some are better than others. A number can be discounted straight away on the grounds of cost so we are looking at the lower end of the price range. There has been a shift in the target population for makers recently which makes things difficult for people watchers as all the old rules regarding driver image have to be revised. Some such as Skoda have gone a bit more up market and have lost their bargain basement image (and price) although many still consider them to be the thinking persons Audi. Their place seems to have been taken by newcomers such as Dacia whilst others such as Kia and Hyundai seem to be targeting a younger audience with sportier models. Japanese models have a reputation for being worthy but dull (although there are exceptions such as the Mazda MX5).

Italian cars are largely bought with the heart rather than the head with Alfa Romeo constantly on the cusp of producing great cars and then not quite getting there. Fiat seem to have lost their way recently, being kept afloat by the success of the 500 as no one seems to want any of their other models. Ferrari are doing well if you have over £100,000 to spare but have you ever tried getting a bale of hay into one?.

Makes such as Audi, seem to be moving upmarket which is a shame because they look nice but are expensive and mostly driven by psychopaths... It's true! Whenever you notice another vehicle following at a distance of about six inches or attempting a near suicidal overtake, it will almost certainly be an Audi. Their drivers are fast taking on the mantle previously worn by BMW drivers for their 'attitude' but in addition are bitter because they can't afford the Beemer. Back in the day, motor cyclists were always wary of Volvo drivers who were notorious for their poor eyesight, although I am assured that there is no truth in the rumour that prescription windscreens were an option. These days, they seem to be driven by a younger crowd although I always found SAAB drivers more interesting. Sadly the latter are no longer built. Mercedes drivers don't seem to have changed much, mostly being asleep in the middle lane of motorways and Honda Jazz drivers have to be over 80. More next time (possibly). Steve Todd

### Lettings

Property landlords are facing a lot of change at the moment, with the latest update being the introduction of mandatory five-year electrical installation checks on private rented housing. The new rules will be phased in with agents and landlords being given at least six months to familiarise themselves with the legislation. Those properties already covered by a valid Electrical Installation Condition Report (EICR)

won't need to replace it until five years after it was granted. All inspectors hired to issue an EICR must have the relevant qualifications and be competent to conduct inspections. Failure to comply with this will result in tough financial penalties.
