

SELECT AND SAVE FINED FOR UNDER AGE VAPE SALE

The owner of the Select and Save store in Cleobury Mortimer has been convicted of selling a nicotine vape product to a minor under the legal age of 18, following a prosecution by Shropshire Council R P Enterprises Ltd of Penn Road, Wolverhampton, was convicted at Telford Magistrates Court on 5th February 2024 and ordered to pay a total of £5,944 in fines and costs.

Shropshire Council's trading standards team conducted an underage sales exercise with two volunteers at the store in June 2023, after receiving intelligence that the premises was selling vapes to children under the age of 18. Of the six premises subjected to a test purchase on the day, only the Select and Save store sold a disposable vape to the volunteers.

The prosecution was brought as the business was unable to provide sufficient evidence of procedures it had taken to prevent the future sales of age restricted products to minors.

Chris Schofield, Shropshire Council's Cabinet member for planning and regulatory services, said: "This case is a reminder to any business selling age-

responsibilities to prevent sales to minors, such as 'Challenge 25', requesting photo ID, and ensuring all staff receive in touch to advise that she is now adequate training.

"We want to make sure Shropshire is a strong, safe and attractive place for people, and our trading standards team will continue to work to ensure laws on age related products are complied with.

"This kind of work by trading standards helps prevent under 18s from accessing age-restricted products from businesses who flout the law."

Any person or business who suspects a business may be selling vapes or other agerestricted products to minors, can report this to the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 0808 223 1133. Information can be provided anonymously and will be shared with trading standards in line with the council's information governance policies. Shropshire businesses who want advice on their legal obligations can do so by contacting 0345 678 9000. Further advice is also available from Business Companion.

CLEOBURY GARDENERS

Mycorrhizal Networks. Covid gave Kit Smith the opportunity to further his relationship with a magnificent Quercus Rubor his favourite oak tree on the Ridgeway beyond Hobsons Brewery. The fact that his garden was wilting during the hot summer whilst this Oak was surviving well, caused Kit to research the Why and How questions. He was guided to the existence and work of the Mycorrhizal Network, a worldwide web.

Kit Smith is Cleobury's own passionate environmentalist. At our meeting in February he spoke of a very long love affair, a 40 million year long love affair - between fungi, plants and trees which communicate with each other through their interconnected root systems, in a symbiotic relationship of mutual benefit: trees receive water and minerals from fungi in return for sugars from the photosynthesis of trees. Beneath the ground the root structures grow towards one another and have become a continuous underground existing over vast network areas of land, crossing countries, borders and boundaries. Increasingly, however, with development, some modern farming practices, population movement, civil and military unrest, the networks are suffering and the food exchanges are interrupted.

So how can we play our part? The importance of countryside to Cleobury residents, and the requirement to protect trees, tracks and wildlife corridors became apparent in the Neighbourhood Plan questionnaire, the ramifications of which remain relevant to 2038 – another 14 years for us to adjust, control and change for our benefit and those who follow. Be aware of disrupting the soil; apply a mycorrhizal powder to the roots of plants to encourage root development, and plant to reinstate networks rather than cause further disruption. There exists an outline map of wildlife corridors which have already been created around Cleobury which is available from Cleobury Country Centre.

Our next meeting, at the Parish Hall, is on Monday March 11th, 7.30 for 8pm. Our speaker is Benjamin Matthews, and his topic is "Hostas".

Remember, garden as though you will live forever.

FRIENDS OF SAINT MARY'S

Most people in Cleobury admire the beauty and presence of St Mary's Church, a focal point in the centre of the Town. But do you know how much it costs to maintain it for the benefit of all in the Community? The current annual running cost is approximately £47,000 which comes out at about £900 a week and this has to be found by the Parochial Church Council who are all volunteers. This sum just covers normal expenditure such as heating, lighting and routine maintenance, but any repairs or improvements are extra. In addition, the building is one of the 2.5% of listed buildings that are designated Grade 1 so that any work must be done to a high standard, usually by specialists and this does not come cheap.

For instance, the recent overhaul of the clock, maintenance of the bell frame and new staircase to the bell chamber is likely to cost around £50,000. Grant funding is often available but this usually requires match funding so that the balance must be raised locally. This problem has been recognised and in 2003 The Friends of St Mary's was formed to 'Maintain, repair, restore and preserve the Church building and its fabric for the benefit of the community and future generations'. Since its formation, the Friends have raised and donated at least £100,000 for a number of projects including the rewiring and installation of an improved lighting system and underfloor heating which have made the building much more practical as an events venue.

However, time takes its toll and this year, three of our long serving Committee members are retiring. Elizabeth Burton, Angela Drennan and Diane Waddington have together given many years of service to Cleobury and deserve our thanks for all the work they have done. As a result, new Committee members are urgently required. As the population of Cleobury now numbers over 3000, there must be some public spirited souls out there willing to help.

To sum up, you are cordially invited to attend the Annual General Meeting of the Friends on March 14th at 7 pm in St Mary's Church. Volunteers especially welcome.




THE LATEST FROM CORAL & TOM...



Clee Hill Community Wildlife Group Curlew and Lapwing survey Curlews usually start returning in late February, and continue to arrive throughout March. Have you heard your first of the year yet? If so, please tell us

Our survey aims to find out how many breeding pairs there are, and where. We need to know that before we can try and help them. If you can recognise Lapwing and Curlew (and preferably their calls), you can make an important contribution. If possible, we would also like you to record Kestrel, Cuckoo, and other target species, but that's an optional extra.

The area is centred on the open hill land of Titterstone Clee and Clee Hill and Catherton Commons, extending approximately as far as Knowlegate and Knowbury to the south, Bitterley to the west, Cleedownton and Bromdon to the north, and Doddington to the east. The bird survey has been carried out every year since 2012, and we are doing it again this year.

If you regret the disappearance of Curlew and Lapwing from the local countryside, and want to do something to help stop it, we would like your help, please. New helpers will be very welcome.

In 2023, we had the best result for some years – two pairs of Curlew each fledged a young bird. We located about eight breeding pairs of Curlews in the area altogether, similar to the last three years, but a lot less than the 13 pairs when we started in 2012. Are there more? Where are they?

The survey is easy to do, and only involves three 3-hour visits between the beginning of April and mid-June. Simple instructions and a map to record your observations are provided, and there will be a training session if you want to come. Whether you join in or not, please let us know if you see Curlew, Lapwing or Kestrel anywhere in the area.

You can read about the Shropshire Ornithological Society (SOS) *Save our Curlews campaign* on the SOS website www.shropshirebirds.com/save-our-curlews/.

We still need to monitor the local Curlew population, and check all the pairs we do find, to see if they produce young, and if any fledge, so if you can do so, please help.

A Bird Group meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Monday 18 March, at the Recreation Rooms, 22A, Clee Hill High Street, to present the results of our work in previous years, and plans for 2024.

The Cleobury Mortimer Manor House

It has stood the test of time. For three centuries the Manor House on Cleobury Mortimer High Street has presented itself as a testament to the style, imagination and quality of build that the Georgian era legacy has left for us.

Properties from previous centuries are protected through a listing system by Historic England. A Grade II with * is considered to have a special element of particular interest and in the case of the Manor House this is the curved and swept oak staircase with toad-back handrail. This is what makes our Manor House with a separately listed adjoining Stable Block, so special amongst the 77 listed buildings and structures in our town alone.

It is believed the House was built in the late 17th Century, by Hugh de Mortimer and was typical of Manorial Houses of that age. Formerly known as Cooks House, it was sold on 30th November 1760 for the sum of £60. Over the years, many exchanges of ownership ended with the property ending its life as a Nursing Home in 1988. The home was closed up around 2010 and has remained so since then.

The building was listed by Historic England over 20 years ago. But it became obvious that the current owner has not fully maintained the building, resulting in a local campaign to save it from further decline.

Known as the **Save The Manor House** campaign, the group has built a web site with a lot of detail about the history of the house, photographs and regular updates on the massive challenges faced.

Just recently a small group of supporters met outside the Manor House to show that its decline was not forgotten and looking at the front elevation it is very clear that urgent maintenance is required to the decaying woodwork and paintwork.



The Save the Manor House Team, while still in discussions with the Local Conservation Office, have also met with the owner, who has confirmed that any appropriate offer to purchase would be met with interest. At this stage there has been one approach which we will follow closely

The group has simple objectives.

1st is to have at least the visible frontage of the property cleaned up to remove the 'eyesore' element. This would entail addressing the decaying paintwork, the front garden and shrub area and the main gates.

 2^{nd} objective is to see the property sold to a party who would restore life to the whole building and site.

3rd and final objective would be to see the house be part of our thriving community either purely as a residential property or some form of single or multiple business enterprise further benefitting the economy of the town.

We would welcome that our campaign with saving the Manor House gets the widest possible coverage. We believe there must be someone out there who would be prepared to take it on for all our benefit.

March in the Wyre Forest

March is something of a changeover month. Winter visitors such as Redwings and Fieldfares will be on their way back north but the summer visitors should be arriving and we may see Sand Martins by the river or hear Chiffchaffs making their onomatopoeic calls. Many of our year-round residents are already laying eggs in their nests and others may already be feeding nestlings.



Tawny Owls and Ravens are examples of these early breeders. The Raven (pictured) is a frequent visitor to the farm but I have yet to see one at close quarters or even at ground level. They most commonly announce their presence high above the tree canopy as they fly over, repeating a throaty, rasping 'Cronk', and often tumbling in acrobatic displays to each other. They pair for life, which can be up to fifteen years. They are completely black like their relatives the crows and rooks, but are much bigger, bigger even than buzzards. Their Linda Iles

size, long wings (giving a wingspan of 1.3 metres) and diamond-shaped tail help to identify them at a distance but if you could see them close up they would also be distinguished by a heavy beak and bristling throat feathers.

Literature and older text books associate Ravens with the cliffs and mountains of the north and west, and although they have extended their range eastwards over most of Britain, their presence, and especially their calls, evoke a sense of wildness and loneliness. These are not the only emotions they inspire: over many hundreds of years they have often been feared or hated. They feed on carrion (as well as small living prey) and can be relied upon to turn up when an animal dies, starting their feast by pecking out the creature's eyes. There is evidence that they sometimes kill lambs and even adult sheep, so it's not surprising that many farmers hate them and gamekeepers persecute them. They are also associated with battlefields and feature in superstitions and folk tales as harbingers of death. The other side of the coin is that they are highly intelligent: good at mimicry, feats of memory and problem-solving. They can make fascinating and amusing pets and the famous Ravens that guard the Tower of London are tame, cared for by a Yeoman warder known as the Ravenmaster. In case you didn't know, the Tower and England itself will fall if they ever leave. But was King Arthur turned into a Raven, and will he return to save his kingdom when disaster threatens?

Philip Dunne's Letter from Westminster

The Spring Budget

The Chancellor will deliver his Spring Budget Statement on 6th March. This is likely to be the last major fiscal event of this Parliament. It also provides a formal update of latest estimates of the economic outlook which will provide much of the context for the upcoming General Election.

The economic backdrop is really important to grasp. The Government had to spend £400bn to keep millions of businesses and tens of millions of their employees afloat during the pandemic. The interest burden in servicing that debt has risen, as interest rates were increased, to bring down inflation, which had soared due to the escalation in energy costs after Putin invaded Ukraine. These issues all have a bearing on each other.

While the UK entered a technical recession at the end of 2023 it is likely to have left it at the beginning of this year, making it one of the shallowest downturns in the past century, and the UK economy is forecast to outgrow both France and Germany in 2024. Inflation has more than halved. Unemployment is at close to record lows. Energy costs are declining. Mortgage interest rates have started to fall. Incomes have risen above inflation for the past nine months. Taxes (national insurance) have been cut for 27 million people this year. There are plenty of challenges but the economic backdrop is improving

I am not standing again, so this is also the last chance I have had to suggest ideas for any tax or spending decisions which the Chancellor may make to help deliver positive changes for residents of South Shropshire.

I write significantly ahead of the Budget, and have no knowledge of what it might contain. There will be policies of national significance, and I hope that the prudence with which this government has stewarded the economy through the period of high inflation, will now leave some room for manoeuvre, including the possibility of further tax cuts to help stimulate economic growth.

I have joined other colleagues from the Conservative Environment Network in calling for a number of changes, which mostly remove perverse disincentives towards green schemes. For example, given how important farming is to South Shropshire, I have asked the Chancellor to support the River Severn Partnership proposals and to look again at equalling out tax anomalies on agricultural land being used for environmental schemes. I have also called for stamp duty changes to be made to encourage householders to invest in energy efficiency measures when moving house.

I also want to support our hospitality sector, which is crucial to South Shropshire's economy but has been hit hard in recent years. Readers may have seen that ABTA recently named Shropshire as one of its top ten global destinations – the only place in the UK to feature. So harnessing our hospitality sector will help drive future growth, and I have supported calls to extend rate relief for hospitality businesses, to help ease the burden of rising cost pressures.

My earliest interventions this year were to work with Shropshire Council to put into perspective the financial challenges they face. The Adult Social Care budget continues to absorb a growing percentage of the Council's finances, not least because South Shropshire is a popular place to retire, and so our demographics are older. Over 30% of our population in South Shropshire is aged over 65, compared to 18% nationally. Last month we secured some increase in the funding allocation to Shropshire Council, but the Council still faces significant budget challenges.

Given my previous role as a Defence Minister,, I would be encouraged to see further uplift in the Defence budget. I have called for the plan to reduce the size of the Army to be reversed.

Whatever measures we see this month, it will be important to avoid fuelling any further inflation, while using tax changes as a lever to stimulate growth in the economy, which pays for the public services on which we all rely.

THE BREAKFAST CLUB

In February, the Club met to hear Pete Blackburn talk about 'Crisis & Conflict'. A retired police officer, Pete has experienced crisis and conflict during the course of his duties, and he summarised some of the learning relevant to any conflict situation. He did, however, stress right at the start that this is a field in which 'there is no such thing as an expert' as we all have more to learn.

In any crisis situation the prime aim of the police will be to save life and defuse confrontation without harm coming to anyone involved. Key factors in such a situation include situational awareness, emotional intelligence, and effective communication using active listening skills. It is always important to remain as calm as possible, and use active listening skills to establish a rapport and gain an understanding of the situation to build genuine trust and a safe way forward. Simple common sense principles, e.g. being truthful, will help increase the likelihood of a peaceful resolution.

Having outlined some of these principles, Pete then shared the learning from one domestic siege situation where an elderly lady was held at knifepoint by a family member threatening to kill her. Pete outlined how he initially spoke directly to the subject then coordinated the negotiations, working closely with other specialist mental health professionals. This approach

helped influence the subject to release the lady held without harm, and after 28 hours of negotiation a peaceful surrender was achieved, to the relief of all involved. Whilst numerous options were continually reviewed by the police, good communication and teamwork led to a peaceful outcome. A good example of how negotiation can help bring a complex conflict situation to peaceful conclusion. Pete's final words were 'The most dangerous time in any negotiation is when you think you're winning.'

The Club's next meeting will be held on March 12th at the Golf Club, with Chris Kippin speaking on 'So Near And Yet So Far'. This will be followed by the AGM. April's meeting will be held on 2 April, with visiting speaker Tim Blackburn (Consultant in Facial Plastic Surgery, Manchester) who will speak on 'Facial Reconstruction Surgery'. There have been a number of rumours as to why our Post Office shut last year and a case that was heard at Telford Magistrates Court on 5th February might provide a clue. The Court heard that RP Enterprises, the operators of the 'Select and Save' shop in Cleobury Mortimer, were guilty of selling vapes to an apparently under age 'mystery shopper' working for Shropshire Trading Standards last June. It appears that, acting on 'information received', six shops were subjected to test purchases. The other five passed the tests but.... RP Enterprises were fined a total of £5944. Given the general atmosphere that surrounded the shop, I suspect that this news will not come as a surprise to many....

On the same subject, as a change from 'Would you like a ride in my Cousin's taxi?, it has emerged that predators are using vapes to groom under age youngsters into sexual or criminal activity. They often use social media to engage with victims, commonly posing as those of a similar age. This can also involve the use of illegal high strength products of which some 750,000 were seized by Trading Standards officers nationally in the year ending March 2023. I suspect the total will be even higher in the current year. Still, the probem is being solved by what a government spokesman has claimed is 'bold and decisive action on smoking and vaping'. Excuse me for being cynical but where is it?

A Labour Councillor on Shropshire Council has been accused of starting a class war and advocating a Marxist agenda by a Conservative opponent for suggesting that residential care for children be taken back into Council control. It was claimed that this would save £11 million and also enable care workers to be paid a decent wage for the difficult work they do instead of the bare minimum paid by private operators. If this is the case, perhaps most of us would be manning the barricades. This coincides with a report in 'The House Magazine' highlighting the costs and profits made by the sector. This found that the average cost of keeping a child in residential

care is £5,400 a week with some cases exceeding £10,000. Some councils are paying 25 per cent more than two years ago and income at the 20 largest operators totalled some £1.63 billion with profits of 19 per cent, up six points since the previous year. The average annual cost of a placement being £281,000 with the highest being £373,000.

Apparently the Mullers site is under offer again although the potential buyer seems to want to use it for storage rather than manufacturing purposes which would limit employment opportunities.



MAN OF THE WORLD. THE MUSIC OF PETER GREEN

I do love music. As a kid I would hear my Godfather, an enthusiastic amateur, in full tenor flow and enjoy the sound. I did try to learn to play the piano, because my big sister did, but didn't have the patience to learn scales and that interest faded very quickly; I never have liked boredom.

I discovered rock n' roll and Bill Haley in the 50s, then Little Richard, and boredom was forgotten. I still love great music, of whatever genre, from Bach's 'Saint Matthew Passion' to Led Zeppelin's 'Stairway to Heaven'.

When the Regal Theatre announced the existence of 'Man of the World' I booked tickets as soon as I could, not knowing who would be performing; Peter Green's music was enough to know. February 24th would reveal all.

My lady and I dined at Mister Thom's family eatery, a few doors from the theatre; friendly, tasty and affordable. We were greeted in the usual friendly style of the theatre's volunteers and Marilyn showed us to our seats. There was a growing air of anticipation as 8.00 o'clock grew close and we still didn't know who would be performing.

The curtain rose with the audience applauding as four men walked on stage to their instruments. Lead and bass guitars, drums and and pair of bongos centre stage by a microphone. And the sound of 'Black Magic Woman' at a healthy decibel rating. This was good; time to settle back and enjoy the evening.

Vocalist Dave Harris was a show in himself, with lyrics and body motions, then taking on the bongos and blending with the guitarist as they exchanged solo spots. It was later in the evening that I learned the guitarist was the great Remi Harris, who I did not recognise in his lead guitar casual dress. But his command of the instrument should have told me who it was - who else brings such versatile playing to the Regal?

The bass guitar man often seems lost in such company and Tom Moore made no attempt to play the star. He did what a good bass man always does and provided rhythm when it as needed and swapped chords and phrases with Remi on special sets. Mutual respect was e v i d e n c e d b y R e m i acclaiming Tom's solo spots at the end of whatever song featured the two of them.

The first half of the show featured this group's 'The Green Manalishi' before the band took a well earned break and the audience headed for the bars to deal with thirst or other facilities to make room for whatever their fancy was. It was a good sign that people talked to people they hadn't met before this respect for music brought them together.

The second half started with pure instrumental numbers before Dave Small was back on the bongos and a neat blending of vocals and mouth organ. I hadn't seen this man in action before and he was a great blend of vocal and instrumental talent, once again swapping solos spots with Remi. It was a reminder of just whose music we had come to hear when the first few bars of 'Man Of The World' struck up on Remi's guitar and the audience were applauding. These people, nearly all of them, knew their music.

After more than two hours of great music it had to come to an end. And I've got this far in the story without mentioning Shane Dixon, who did a great job on drums and probably worked harder than anyone. Another great guy richly deserving applause as the band shared a final bow to a cheering standing acclaim. It was the best rock show I've seen, and I've seen quite a few. LET'S BEAT THE SCAMMERS

Welcome back to all my readers.

I have a question to pose before I continue to try and raise awareness of the evil in the world.

The question is "what is truth?". I ask this as it is fundamental to the actions we take on a daily basis to protect ourselves and our families. One definition is that "truth" is what you see in reality, or experience yourself seeing with your own eyes. It's not what someone else tells you which may or may not have been seen by themselves, although in the majority of cases, it will be true.

You trust those closest to you, don't you?

Scams tend to be labelled in certain ways, like email scams, delivery scams, doorstep scams and the emerging term "romance scams". This new type of scam relates to the scammer building a relationship with someone online and at some point taking the relationship in a different direction by introducing **blackmail** into the mix. Simply put, "give me money or I will expose you". That threat creates a level of fear that overtakes any form of rational thinking.

The victim is, at the least, embarrassed that a piece of information about them might end up in the public domain, or at worst, puts them in a situation where the information could destroy their life.

I use the word destroy, not in a physical sense but in every other way, socially, financially and internally in family relationships. **BLACKMAIL** is the operative word here and the scammer will go to extensive lengths to convince a victim that handing over money will make the whole thing go away.

It does not! Blackmailers have no upper limit and can only be stopped when, like the school playground bully, the victim stands up to them.

In the case I am writing about, it can only be stopped when the victim had the courage to stand up, admit their actions to their immediate family and call the Police despite being warned that in doing so would bring the world crashing down on them.

What are the messages I am trying to convey here?

First of all, the power of social media is such that it sometimes is hard to tell the truth from the untrue.

This example relates to an unsolicited approach over the social media, 'Instagram' where the victim made the assumption that the person was very genuine. There was nothing genuine about this, it was an attempt to set a snare and it worked.

The old term "softly softly catchy monkey" springs to mind and these scammers are working hundreds of potential victims simultaneously. It only takes one or two to fall and the scammer has succeeded.

So how do you avoid it?

As I have written many times before, be very suspicious of any unsolicited message, post, email or approach from someone you don't immediately recognise. Cut it off at the outset, the scammer may not be put off immediately but for them it's a business and the millions out there represent rich pickings for them so they will just move on. In discussions with the authorities, I have discovered that since Covid, the examples of this type of scam have exploded worldwide. Scammers sitting at computers anywhere in the world are trying to target the innocent and the vulnerable. Please don't be one of them.

At this time of year, many people may feel some form of loneliness that can lead to vulnerability, resulting in common sense being put aside. The outcome for the victim is beyond our sense of fairness and justice.

We all need to do our bit in our community to reach out to those around us, particularly those living alone. Together we stand a chance of minimising the impact of these terrible crimes. Sadly they are not going away, but let's keep them out of our community.
