Two Cleobury Mortimer dads are in training to compete in the 2014 Virgin London Marathon. Near neighbours, they came together when children Isobel and Joshua were diagnosed with diabetes on the same day January 8th this year.

The realisation that their children would both need daily insulin injections did more than draw the families together; it revealed the support available to families who face this problem. Mums Julia and Lisa are full of

praise for the service from Worcester and Kidderminster hospitals and the way special training has been taken up by the Peter Rabbit and Ever After nurseries, who saw that the vital injections were given on time, every day. Joshua has now moved on to Cleobury Primary School and mum Julia is again impressed by the cooperation she found there, where staff have specially trained. been Big thanks to nurses Tracey Kirkwood and Vicki Howard for their valuable work.

The dads can't be at home to help every day, Steve working as a Police officer in Stourbridge and Chris an engineer in the family business. But they want to see the work of the JDRF -**Iuvenile** Diabetes Research Foundation - supported as it strives to find a cure for Type 1 Diabetes. The Virgin Marathon was the answer and already the pair have pledges for over £2,000; they plan to have at least £4,000 when the big event hits our TV screens next April.

Type 1 diabetes affects 400,000 in the United Kingdom, and that includes 29,000 children, who all need daily insulin injections. A change of diet or lifestyle does not alter the problem. But you can help the JDRF research project to find a cure by pledging support for Steve and Chris, and through them their children.

Sue Henderson, one of the most modest people you could meet, but always ready with a smile.

The World's Biggest Coffee Morning has become institution, with volunteers running coffee and cake gatherings all over the country to MacMillan for raise funds Cancer Support. It started in 1991 and has been an enormous success, with the 2012 event raising a record total of £15 million.

The driving force behind Cleobury's effort is Sue Henderson. One of those quiet, self effacing people who never boast but get a lot done. And on September 27th she had another busy morning, cutting cakes and pouring coffees in the Market Hall, where seats were hard to find. Confirming just how good the local support for MacMillan

is was a poster thanking the Cleobury Mortimer branch for their efforts in 2012, which raised an impressive £5,109.

There were cakes and gifts on sale and the editor dug deep and took a cake home, his admiration for the strength of local generosity as strong as ever. And Sue Henderson has confirmed that the morning raised £352.55 for the MacMillan cause. There's another on the 23rd this month, as you'll see in the Calendar.



Sitting outside the hall, busy selling raffle tickets, was Elizabeth Bishop, whose son David is now head teacher of a large comprehensive school in Gloucestershire. She reckons he got the habit during his time at Lacon Childe.

Elizabeth was arguing over a cheque for £100 that her friend Shirley Spatchcock was trying to give her. What was it all about? "She did a wing walk and I said I'd give her £100 if she did it," Shirley explained. Now if you look at Mrs Bishop's picture you'll notice that she's over 21, so surely not given to such daredevil antics.

"I had a big birthday and I've wanted to do it for ages," she explained. So she booked the ride and climbed onto the top wing of a Boeing biplane, where she was strapped in place and stood up there as the plane took off and flew around for 15 minutes, through low cloud and up in the clear air to give her a wonderful view.

There was no charity fund raising, that's not allowed on these flights, just one very determined lady achieving an ambition. And did she enjoy it? "I loved every secønd, it was absolutely marvellous and Dave the pilot was really great. All the crew were and I've written to say if they want an ancient grey haired lady to encourage others, I'll do it."

And that £100? It was split between Macmillan and the Air Ambulance. Elizabeth didn't want it - she was still reliving her dream ride. And she's actually old enough to know better......





Star of the Small Ads - David Ward Firewood



You can't miss the place as you take the Leintwardine Road past the Salway Arms on the A49. The logs that are David Ward's living and passion are stacked high. This is firewood on a big scale, with 1,000 tons sold last year and this year a throughput of 1,200 tons expected.

He's been here seven years, in which time the demand for logs and the price have grown. But if demand grows, won't we just run out of trees to fell? "The Forestry Commission say that only 10 percent of woodland in the West Midlands is commercially managed," he says. "We won't run out"

David has invested seriously in the operation, with improved future efficiency part of the plan. The automated sawing unit that takes in lengths of timber, cuts them to whatever lengths are needed to fit wood burning stoves, then splits them down to suitable thickness, is a good example; a £35,000 example.

The growth of the log market has brought a demand for higher standards with it. "We're in the same market as Tesco," he smiles. "People expect their logs to be the right size, clean and not come with a lot of offcut waste. They don't want them in a heap on the drive, so we bag them up and deliver where the customer wants them." That big sawing unit separates the logs from the natural waste material and feeds into sacks.

The waste of sawdust and small offcuts produces two skips

full every day. The next development on the Wooferton site is designed to make good use of that, as David explains:

"We're going to develop a unit in the yard with a biomass heater which burns that waste," he explains. As it will be burning a replaceable material, there will be a payback for its use from the government. Even better, the heat generated will mean that any logs, no matter how wet, can be dried to the 20 percent ideal burning level in three days. "So we won't have the situation of last summer, when everything was wet," he smiles. And he will be able to use 100 percent of the timber that comes in. No waste.

He draws his supplies from the local area, in some cases buying trees to clear from an area, in others taking the hardwoods that have been cleared with a softwood cropping. He's come a long way in seven years and plans to be in the same trade, in the same place, until he retires. **David is on 07866 441 154.**

LYMES DISEASE IN DOGS

As we move into autumn and the weather cools slightly, conditions become perfect for increased tick activity. While late spring is also a busy season for ticks, the lingering humidity and cooler temperatures of autumn months mean that you may see more of these blood-sucking parasites before winter settles in.

Ticks have a 3 year lifecycle. Eggs hatch to produce larvae and these feed on a host and drop off, maturing to nymphs over the next year. It is worth mentioning at this point that they are hardy little critters, capable of surviving being frozen, and even managing to get through a washing machine at 40 degrees. Having survived the year, the nymphs feed again, and then drop off the host that they have bitten, then pass another year to become adult ticks. Although you can see all of the stages, the first two are very small and easy to miss, it is only the adult ticks that grow to the size of a kidney bean. These are the ones that often come to us at the vets and removal is best performed with a 'tick hook', and we are always happy to offer advice, or remove ticks if you ask us.

This month we will focus on what the tick can carry... Lyme disease. This is a small, spiral shaped bacteria that can be passed to your dog when a nymph, or adult tick, feeds. Surveys of the ticks around the country has highlighted the Wyre Forest, alongside others, as a Lyme disease hotspot. It has been estimated that about 40% of ticks in the forest are carrying the bacteria. One bite from an infected tick will introduce the bacteria. Clinical signs in dogs are very variable. They can be symptom free, or the unlucky ones can show very vague signs such as lethargy, shifting lameness, and a high temperature.

Without treatment, damage can continue, and cause suffering for your poor dog.

Luckily, we have recently had a new vaccine launched. This covers the three main strains of the bacteria involved in this country, and works in a very clever way. Your dog carries immunity from the vaccine, which passes to the tick when they bite. This immunity vaccinates the tick, and prevents them from injecting the bacteria into your dog.

For more information on this vaccine, or if you want to get your dog vaccinated, please just ring. Throughout November, we are offering 20% off the cost of a Lyme disease vaccination course. It is certainly worth thinking about if you regularly walk your dogs in the long grass, or forest areas.

The other way of helping is to regularly use a spot-on flea treatment product. These treatments, used as directed, should kill the tick when it bites, but before it infects the animal with Lyme disease. For more information, pick up the phone and speak to us.

The first was for the Air Ambulance, whose fundraising manager Maria Jones took away £1238.01 towards the fund that keeps those vital whirlybirds in the sky when an emergency calls on their services.



Then Lesley Leach collected one for £2177.51 on behalf of the Hereford based service that has been such a boost to Pat during her treatment. Places like The Haven don't get a lot of publicity for the quiet understanding they bring to people who are facing the biggest challenge of their lives.

Thanks must go to Nick Davies of Hobson's Brewery, who backed the team with a campaign telling people they were "powered up the Peaks by Hobsons." Nice touch.

And let's not forget bus driver Peter Williams, who may have slightly exceeded his hours in the course of that day. And the family photographer Victoria, who comes to pub based events like this, takes good pictures and leaves as sober as she arrived. The Williams clan are quite a remarkable bunch of get up and go doers.

Letter from Westminster - Philip Dunne MP

As the 21st Century has progressed, the uptake and reliance on digital communication has been dramatic. Most of us use mobile phones, and almost all use the internet for communicating via email, online shopping or banking. Television has become digital and radio transmission is too. We need to ensure that rural areas are not left behind as we move into this digital age. The Government has committed to increasing broadband rollout, meaning that an estimated 90% of all households will have superfast broadband by 2016.

In Shropshire, I have campaigned for rural access to digital technology. Shropshire Council are working hard with the Government's delivery agency BDUK and BT, alongside other commercial suppliers, to provide broadband at a minimum level of 2mbps for homes and businesses. The vast majority of these properties, some 93%, will be served by fibre, 87% of which will receive superfast speeds of at least 24mbps. But I am also working with local campaigners to maintain focus on improving provision to all those in remote rural areas of South Shropshire who have missed out.

This development is increasingly important. We already have one of the highest proportions of home workers in the country, and I know through my regular advice surgeries and recent Jobs Fairs that there are many budding entrepreneurs across the constituency. These people could be growing their businesses through new online markets and suppliers, creating new investment and jobs for local people and growing prosperity in Shropshire. We

need to ensure that businesses have the platform to succeed here, and that means connectivity.

Mobile telephone network coverage faces similar challenges. I know only too well from the Ludlow constituency how many South Shropshire areas suffer from lack of mobile signal coverage. With the advent of 4G technology, to make Shropshire as business and consumer friendly as possible, mobile network coverage and broadband are issues we must tackle now.

At present there are still an estimated 1,300 properties in Shropshire with no network coverage from any provider. So this Government has recently launched a Mobile Infrastructure Project with funds to provide network coverage to rural areas. In the Ludlow constituency, Council wards identified for better coverage by 2015 are Brown Clee, Chirbury and Worthen, Clun, Corvedale and Highley.

Better provision of mobile and broadband networks will allow local residents more choice and make switching to a different provider or tariff easier. For many of us, the choice over what company we choose for our mobile phone is dictated by the best coverage we can receive in our home or place of work. More coverage will mean more choice, helping to offer better value for the consumer.

We need to keep Shropshire open to all kinds of business, promoting more choice and better services for residents at the same time. Improved mobile and network coverage will help bring growth, jobs and tourism as well as wider accessibility of modern public services to our area. Action is needed now to ensure that Shropshire does not fall behind in future.

Clarion Coppers - with CSO Nick Morris

The reported crimes this month are:

Overnight on September 20th/21st, a satnav was stolen from a van, possibly left unlocked, in Furlongs Road. On September 26th/27th a Kawasaki mule bike left locked and secure was stolen from an unlocked shed at a farm in Clee Hill. Also stolen was a dog cage, a flash light, wire cutters, electric fence tester, electric fence posts, branch cutters, a hammer and mole traps. There were two linked offences in the area between Neen Savage and Overwood on the same date. At one, a Hyundai generator was stolen, worth £1500, and a metal rack of shelves from the garage, and a western saddle, worth £1500, from the stable block. At the other, a barn was broken into by forcing a padlock, but no items were stolen. Not too far away at Button Oak, and during the same night, an outbuilding was broken into. Here, fishing gear worth £1500 and a chainsaw worth £400 were stolen.

Just before 9:00pm on October 3rd, two of a group of youths loitering around the bench in front of Robtec in High Street were captured on CCTV causing criminal damage to a brick wall; the offenders could not be recognised. A cannabis factory was discovered in a police operation at a property in Stottesdon on October 7th where a male was dealt with for this offence. Enquiries are ongoing for linked burglaries at Cleobury News in High Street, The Sports and Social Club in Love Lane and at locations further afield in Shropshire, which occurred on October 7th/8th. On October 13th/14th a Mitsubishi dropside lorry with a crane

fitted on the rear was stolen from Oreton Building Supplies. Enquiries are also ongoing to discover who is responsible for throwing fruit and vegetables at houses. A window was smashed at 8:00pm on October 17th at a property in Childe Road after a potato had been thrown. It is believed to be certain youngsters who are involved with this. If anyone could pass on any information about this to police, it would be gratefully received. As would information about the persistent damaging of the fence which borders the footpath between Lacon Childe School and High Street, (Bull Alley). Any information passed to police is in confidence.

Over the past few weeks youngsters have been gathering at Tenbury Road corner in the evenings. They are part of our community and entitled to be 'kids'. Mostly they do no harm, and we have to accept that they can be noisy at times, but some under 18s have had alcohol seized from them and some have been involved with other antisocial behaviour. One 14 year old girl was found obviously intoxicated at 10:45pm one night in Love Lane! Questions frequently asked are:

"Why don't their parents take responsibility for finding out what they are doing in the evenings?", "Do parents of certain under 18s approve of their children wandering the streets drinking alcohol?" and "Do some parents care that their children throw litter about, even when a bin is only three feet away as at the bench between Tuffins and Tenbury Road?". These are relevant questions which warrant answers.

The Farming Page

Jenny Everingham reports From The Farmhouse

Is it only in England we go from tee-shirts to winter waterproofs in 24 hours? Such a sudden end to a fantastic summer!

Of course, there have been consequences to the adverse conditions of last autumn, winter and spring, but thanks to the warm, dry spell we have had the best hay-making season for years. The cats come in from the hay barn bringing the essence of summer on their coats, and the overalls will smell so much sweeter this winter as they dry off over the Aga! The grain has done better than predicted too, with just the maize to finish off.

It's time for some of our store cattle to go to market, on their way to a new home where they will be matured for beef. They have been tested again for T.B. and all are clear, thank goodness. More will go in several groups through the autumn and winter, along with batches of lambs for the butchery trade. For us, this marks a turning point when we start to see a return on the input in costs and effort. However, it is also the point at which the next year's cycle begins.

First, there's muck spreading, so look out! Muck spreaders are huge these days, but they do a quick job. Once the sheds are clean and tidy, the suckler cows and calves,

and the beef cattle, can come in for the winter, to preserve the soil structure and herbage in the grazing fields, and feeding and bedding down with straw becomes the backbone of the daily routine. Spreading the muck returns to the soil as much of the nutrients as possible, thus helping to preserve the world's most valuable, though possibly least valued, resource. The sooner the next crop can be planted and start growing, the better, as this helps protect the soil from erosion.

Meanwhile, Bonfire Night is traditionally our "tupping" day, when the rams (or "tups") are put in with the ewes. Smiley faces all round!

I'd better mention the chickens! The original five hens have been laying well all summer, but we are now down to two eggs a day. Clucker is undoubtably the star of the show, still laying every couple of days. They have been joined by five assorted youngsters, one or two of which may be cockerels, and therefore will have to go! We're not expecting eggs from the babies till spring, With the darker evenings, the children can only help with chicken care at weekends.

Time to batten down the hatches and stoke up the log burner for winter! *Jenny*

Clarion Clippings - The Christmas Boxes

The Christmas Boxes that are filled with gifts for the less privileged children of places in distant Eastern Europe have become a part of the local festive season.

It sounds very simple. You get people to donate gifts for children and to decorate shoe boxes with wrapping paper to hold them. Then you send them off to whatever country this year's destination, where they will help to spread goodwill. A nice little gesture to those less fortunate than ourselves. But once the idea catches on and the numbers begin to grow, it becomes a big logistical task. Finding just one hundred shoe boxes is a challenge; when you get up to a thousand or more it's a real headache. Not to mention the matter of filling them with suitable gifts - you have to be careful that you don't offend the beliefs of the people who will receive the gifts, and that there's no chance of injury from something that seems quite innocent to us.

The local effort is both led and driven by Jenny Vanderhook, and this year we had the chance to watch as she spread a huge collection of toys across the Pump House floor and explained to the Rainbows children how to pick out gifts and pack them. The regular helpers were there to help as the big Toy Pack got under way, children helping other children.

This was a very orderly event, with little noise and the children waiting to hear an answer to their question, or to be shown by one of the Rainbow or Guides helpers just what to do. No shows of temperament or shouting, just getting on with the job in an atmosphere of cooperation and wanting to help others less fortunate. Jenny's explanation of the purpose of the exercise had clearly gone down well. And the pile of soft toys in the centre of the hall said it all about the amount of work that had gone into this year's campaign.

This is only a part of the local effort, with shoe boxes



As the winter approaches I reassure myself by taking a look at the wood pile, reduced to nothing last winter/spring but now full again and, I hope, pretty dry after a good summer. It was a busy summer too of trenchdigging to bring a kilometre of cable from the end of St John's Lane to Uncllys Farm, and I look forward to the 18th of this month when Western Power are due to throw the switch which brings electricity. mains (loudly celebrating and we must restrain brightly!) ourselves so that the good habits brought by living nine years 'off grid' are not lost: our dishwasher can look forward to being used for its designed purpose rather than as a glorified plate rack, but I'll continue to dry the laundry on the washing line and airer!

Bare trees and short days have their own charm. I can enjoy looking through the woods and having more chance of spotting deer. Over the years I've got better at identifying trees by their winter silhouettes and twigs. The birch are fairly easy and even when viewed from above the canopy, distinguish themselves by the reddishbrown of their twigs. Oak twigs have fat clusters of brown buds and beech have slender, pointed buds on equally slender stems. The sycamore has green twigs with rounded green buds, the ash has dull twigs with black buds set opposite each other in pairs, and everyone knows the sticky buds and horseshoeshaped leaf scars of the horse chestnut! Have a look when you next walk in the woods and take a good identification book such as Alan Mitchell's 'Field Guide to the Trees of Britain and Northern Europe'.

Families walking the Forestry Commission's Yellow Route at Callow Hill can enjoy the Stick Man trail, based on the children's by book **Julia** Donaldson and Axel Scheffler. The 12 panels along the trail have fascinating facts and fun activities for children and the leaflet, which is being sold in the Forest Café for £1, contains additional activities and a pack of pipe cleaners to help you make your own Stick Man.

Willow twigs will be put to a more traditional use on the Basket Making day at Uncllys on November 9th. Ring 01299 403691 as soon as possible if you would like to join us making your own decorative and useful tray with willow and bark – the course lasts from 10.00 to 4.00 and costs £45.



Clarion Clippings - A Rather Important Meeting

The public's first chance to have their say about the closure of Cleobury's Police station and the effects of big cuts in the policing budget will be on the 6th this month. That's when the next Neighbourhood Watch meeting is scheduled, 7.00 pm at the Methodist Hall in Church Street.

This is a vital meeting on several fronts. Not least the future of the NHW itself, where secretary Betsy Pratt finds pressure of work (that's the sort that pays wages, you understand) means she can't carry on. Betsy and Flo Hadley have done a very fine job for the community in establishing the Watch, and with policing levels being reduced, it is the obvious body to cooperate with WPC Ann O'Leary and her team. But there is no police station base to report to, no obvious point at which to speak to the volunteers who used to man the station and we need to know what future plans are. Commissioner Bill Longmore has apparently indicated that there will be a greater role for bodies like the NHW to play, but no plans for its future have been made public.

In this low crime area there is still a need for vigilance, because professional criminals may find low policing levels a tempting prospect.

Inspector Robert Thomas has agreed to speak on the new policing model and how it will affect the community. We will be there to report; this is your chance to ask questions of the people responsible for our security.
