THE MANOR HOUSE - NEWS AT LAST!

The Parish Council have been trying for some time to get some response from the owner of the Manor House. What was once a source of pride in the town has become something of an embarrassment as it became more shabby through neglect.



It's not exactly a place we can be proud of, is it?

Questions have been asked at public meetings and the County Council's officers have been on the case. The Manor House is a Grade Two Listed property and the owner does have a duty of care. Now we hear that the Parish Council have made contact with Mr Iqbal and have issued the following statement:

"The Parish Council and the owner of the Manor House been engaged exploratory consultations with the aim to reopen this landmark building in the village. These discussions have been positive and a number of options are currently being considered. It is appreciated that a commercially viable option will be sought with the assistance and support of all key stakeholders. Over the coming months it is anticipated that a firm proposal will be finalised at which time it would be possible to provide further details."

The Parish Council will continue to keep working with all parties to ensure that this Historic building is not left to become an eyesore in Cleobury Mortimer.

To a degree that is good news, but experience suggests we shouldn't be breaking out the champagne just yet. We should be glad the Parish Council is making a real effort, but in the light of experience of the owner, don't hold your breath.



We came to Neen Sollars 39 years ago and were immediately made welcome by the locals; very much so by Bernard and Elsie Owen, who have been good friends ever since. Bernard, was very involved in village life, especially with All Saints Church. We feel it should be made known, especially to newcomers to Neen Sollars, just how much Bernard did.

He set up an annual covenant scheme which raised money for the fabric of the building, and over the years raised funds by negotiating grants donations charitable from organisations, which enabled him to organise several projects. Notably, the replacement of the shingles on the Church spire; the preservation of The Coningsby Memorial, which dismantled, taken Northamptonshire where it was restored to its current condition for all to admire. It is on record as being one of the best alabaster monuments in the Country. Other projects include new lighting, work to the Reredos and new carpeting.

He wrote two books about the village: "Neen Sollars, A Village History from 1086", researched and compiled with Karen Bray, latterly of Fern Cottage. And "Life in Neen Sollars from Domesday to the Millenium." The proceeds from both going to the Church Repair Fund.

Kinlet Primary School Autumn Fayre

A GREAT DAY OUT

Saturday October 4th, and rain beating down. So sad for everyone who had worked to make the Autumn Fayre at Kinlet a good one. But they have no control over fickle English weather; a wet start to the day can put people off.

So it seemed at 11.00, but by midday the place was buzzing. Visitors could wander through the school and neighbouring nursery to see what both can offer their children.

The atmosphere is really happy, with brightly coloured walls, artwork everywhere and a friendly buzz about the place. It's a Victorian building, with only two classrooms originally, but with growing pupil

numbers what used to be the hall and gymnasium is now used for a third class. Head teacher Anita Raymond has done a super job in her three years here, with the pupil roll growing from 34 to 69, but getting extra accommodation is a constant battle.

There's a lot of input from parents and people outside the educational profession. Like local freelance artist Kev F, who inspired the pupils with sketches drawn as he talked and got them keen to produce their own magazine. The result is an A5 size four pager, mostly drawn by the children, with the final page sketches of staff and pupils by Kev. Great stuff.

Outside, a recent addition is the trim trail, courtesy of EZ-Solar owner Andy Perkins, who put one of his crews in to instal a range of climbing frames and challenges. "They'd never done anything like it before," Anita explained, "And it had to be approved by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents' inspectors before we could us it." It passed with flying colours.

A neat competition for the children was a series of photos with the question 'Which Member of Staff?' for them to answer. At a modest £1.00 a go it offered a prize and a little fund raising. This was on show in the third classroom, or was it the hall? There was a raffle for a big range of prizes and lots of goodies to tempt. Across the path was more substantial fare like hotdogs, cooked to order.

One area has sliding windows that open onto a garden, where Jodie Leigh had taken a break from the dance classes she runs in Bridgnorth and Highley and was encouraging children to just have fun. And healthy exercise, of course.

At the end of the day, all this effort had produced a handy £1,000 to help fund new equipment for the school. It's a lovely setting for a good place.





On The Market - The Pie Creator



Wendy Craige, aka Mrs Pie Creator. The friendly face you'll meet at the Farmers' Market.

To their many customers in Stourport, The Pie Creator is a bustling and friendly small shop at Number 52 High Street. It's been there 18 months and from a modest offering of pies and pates when they opened, there's a long, long list of just about any pie you could imagine. And a range of sausage rolls to die for; proper big rolls; handfuls, not little nibbles.

The joint power behind the name is two people, Nigel and Wendy Craige; the name is spelt that way because he's a proud Manxman. "We have three Manx children and a Manx cat," he smiles. He's been in the catering business for 35

years, since he left school, and everything you can see in the shop or on the market stall is baked on the Stourport premises. The bread is mixed by a Frenchman in Malvern, but baked in the Pie Creator ovens to be fresh every morning.

There's a lot more business done than just the shop and weekend Farmers' Markets. Nigel's baking skills and high standards that insist everything is fresh produces pies good enough for him to be a Diamond Finalist in the 2014 Heart of England food awards and for shops like Checketts of Ombersley, Gwillams Worcester and Charbury Farm Shop in Evesham to take supplies from him.


They cover markets as well and Wendy is a familiar face at Cleobury's Farmers' Market, a place she really enjoys coming to: "My top favourite, a really friendly place, with friendly people," she explains. The two of them cover two or three markets every weekend, as well as long hours in the bakery and shop. 'How many hours a week?' we asked Nigel; "About 100," he answered without hesitation. "Start baking at 2.00 in the morning and sometimes

work through until seven at night, or later." The man has clearly never heard of the European Working Time Directive, or whatever that idealistic piece of bureaucratic dreaming is called.

There's just the two of them working full time, plus two part timers, and the increase of their range and the 30 mile spread of their business round is a measure of growth in the past 18 months. So what do they see for their future? "A central kitchen and maybe two more shops," says Nigel. "The trouble is finding good staff willing to learn and put in the hours; we could do with an apprentice." You can sample the creations for yourself at the Farmers' Market and I promise you won't be disappointed. I've bought their pies and sausage rolls and can't remember eating better; it's a world of flavour away from supermarket stuff.

A Cleobury Character - John Carter



John Carter. The man in charge and firmly down-to-earth.

Five times a year, John Carter and his band of helpers leave town and head for Dodford village hall, near Bromsgrove. Another Carter's Antiques Auction is under way.

The signs are up, the wide range of bits and pieces for sale is laid out on trestle tables or sitting on the floor. The cafe is busy, outside the cars and vans are parked along the road and at 10.00 the man with the gavel in his hand gets things moving. John works his way through 430 items, keeping the pace brisk as he encourages bids, but never too hurried to miss a late wave from a buyer. He lightens the day with occasional jokes, sips at teas brought by the sale staff, and doesn't take a break until the hammer falls on the last item. Close on four and a half hours when we watched and the effort was etched in his face. But he was elated - the third sale in a row when every item on offer was sold. Very few sales achieve that once, never mind scoring a hat trick. The whole hall stood and applauded.

The Carter philosophy is quite simple: no traders sell at auctions, only private individuals, and he is cautious about reserve prices. serving the people who want to sell their antiques collectables, and I get that job done," he explained. "I do not have traders putting items in the sale with a reserve just to see if they can push the price up." Traders buy at John's sales, as do private collectors; one English trader drives over from France, because he knows he'll get a straight deal. The events are advertised in the main antique journals and there is a strong following on his website; look in www.cartersauction.co.uk see why. His crew work hard: Nick, Graham, Billy, George and Johnny all from Cleobury and three of them active skateboard people. They are busy all day, from labelling and setting out the sale goods, to lifting items up so buyers can see what's on offer as John works through the catalogue. Then they help the customers collect and wrap their purchases before taking them out to the cash desk to settle their bill and then on to load into the van or car.

Carter's charges are modest by auctioneer standards. 17.5 percent commission from the seller and 16 percent as the buyer's premium; big auction houses charge a lot more than that. On the day we watched, the highest price paid was £650 for a fine silver tea set.

John won't have internet bidding ("It would cost me £1,000 a time and I would have to put up my charges") but does welcome phone business, which is the province of Graham, with four phones to keep contact if needed, and a constant gentle flow of words to keep the caller informed. It's an impressive operation and good value. And the cafe does a full English breakfast for just £3.50. A good day out.



The Severn Edge Vets Pets Page Jeremy Hall on the complex matter of false pregnancy.

Every month I keep my eyes open for new topics for this column. Inevitably my inspiration comes from the animals and people I have encountered in that time. November is no different, and this month I want to talk about False Pregnancy in dogs.

Phantom or False pregnancy happens exclusively to female animals and dogs seem to be more prone than other animals to suffering them. This is because a dog's pregnancy is entirely controlled by the ovary. The hormones travelling around a dog's body are virtually identical whether she is pregnant or not, right up to when the 63 day (average) gestation period ends. At this point the pregnant animal develops nesting behaviour, has puppies and starts milking to feed them.

Sometimes female dogs that are not pregnant confuse themselves (hormonally) into the same behaviour – displaying some or all of the signs that they are ready to give birth. Affected pooches may start dragging their bed around, tidying their toys into one place (nesting), and will nearly always develop milk.

In mild cases, she may bring herself through the phantom pregnancy without ever showing you there is a problem, but more severely affected dogs can get quite depressed and poorly with the whole situation. One of the most common problems we see them for is pain on their tummy, due to mastitis. This is an extremely painful condition that happens because she is producing milk, but nothing is taking it off her, allowing bacteria to multiply and infection to take hold.

Vets can help to stop the hormone cycle – normally with a little syrup onto her food for a few days, and treated dogs will perk up very quickly as they start to feel better. Once they have had one phantom pregnancy, they are prone to having them at each season thereafter, so the best option, as always, is to have them neutered at the earliest opportunity. Females that are neutered young will never have a phantom pregnancy, will never get a potentially deadly uterus infection,

and have a much lower risk of breast cancer in later life. Please, for dogs' sake get them Spayed! There has never been a better time to get your pet to us for neutering, as through November and December Severn Edge Vets are offering a helpful 20% off all neutering for Dogs, Cats and Rabbits. Timing for males is not critical – we can castrate male animals at any stage from 6 months old and sometimes even a little earlier. Females need a little more consideration; we must make sure they are not in season when we spay them, and for bitches in particular, we must leave them three months from their last season to ensure they are not going into a phantom pregnancy. Advice for bitches has changed recently, so now we can also offer to spay them at six months old – before they have a season.

We are always here for advice, and all of our Vets are more than happy to chat to you about your pets' preventative healthcare. Please don't hesitate to call or pop in for a chat.





Job Centres now allocate job seekers a coach and they are asked to see looking for work as their job.

So there is support for job seekers but not always local to where people live. It assumes the seeker has internet access and is comfortable with accessing the recommended websites.



Letter from Westminster -Philip Dunne MP

The NHS in Shropshire is currently undergoing a consultation, 'Future Fit', led by clinicians, which aims to deliver a sustainable model for emergency and urgent healthcare in the county for the foreseeable future. It is important that residents know what this could mean. Future Fit began a year ago with a consultation amongst clinicians and GPs, which this summer led to some options being discussed with public and patients groups. I attended part of the discussion in Ludlow last month to find out more and what people think. I also have met with Shropshire NHS chiefs to discuss health concerns for the Ludlow constituency.

Eight options are currently being considered, looking at different models for providing emergency care, diagnosis and treatment and Urgent Care Centres. The intention is to reduce these to three or four, with costings, before Christmas. The NHS will then work up detailed recommendations to be put to public consultation next summer.

The aim is to identify how best to secure state of the art A&E provision with complementary urgent care services in Shropshire. I want it to be clear that Future Fit has nothing whatsoever to do with privatisation. This is about securing quality care for Shropshire.

It offers the opportunity to upgrade Minor Injuries Units in our community hospitals to Urgent Care Centres in Ludlow and Bridgnorth. There is also a case to be made for Bishop's Castle to secure a Centre, if it could attract enough patients from mid-Wales, where there is limited cover.

I shall be arguing for Urgent Care Centres in our community hospitals, with an improved range of services, not only for a higher level of personal injury treatment, but also the prospect of more diagnostic tests done locally, to avoid much the travel required to Shrewsbury or Telford. My commitment over emergency care is to seek the best results for South Shropshire patients. There is a balance to be struck between locations, since across the whole constituency some find it more convenient to attend Royal Shrewsbury Hospital and some the Princess Royal Hospital in Telford.

As I travel around more than most, I am aware of the challenges posed by rurality and lack of public transport. I am also determined to ensure ambulance cover to get patients to emergency treatment as quickly as possible.

But wherever clinicians propose A&E is best delivered, it has to be clinically viable and to provide quality cover for the whole county. The views of the public need to be well informed and taken into proper account. Public engagement is an important start to this process, but only a start, and much greater awareness building and consultation must take place before decisions are set in stone.

I want to better understand the options being presented before rushing to judgement on what is best for local residents, as they more or less evenly divide between those who attend Shrewsbury or Telford in the event of an emergency. The key is to ensure we secure state of the art clinically safe A&E cover and keep this in the county.

Reported local crimes since September 18th: A factory unit in Burford was broken into between 5:00pm on September 19th and 6:45pm on September 22nd. Nail guns, saws and protective clothing worth £2500 was stolen. In Oreton, outbuildings, a stable block and tack room were broken into during the night of September 25th/ 26th, but nothing is thought stolen. About 300 litres of oil was stolen from a storage tank in Stottesdon on September 28th/29th. Please note that oil tank alarms which send a signal your house to show the oil level, and which emit a loud siren if there is a rapid loss can be obtained Shropshire Council Community Enablement Officers. Sometime on October 1st/ 2nd a black Volkswagen minibus was stolen from a residential area in Burford. The owner had inadvertently left his jacket containing the keys inside the unlocked vehicle! How lucky was that for the thief? On October 1st/2nd the canvas roof of a car in Cleobury Meadows was ripped open. Entry gained but nothing stolen. During the same night, another parked and unlocked car was entered; only a door key was stolen. Overnight on October 8th/9th a JCB Bobcat loader worth £8500 was stolen from a farm at Boraston; CCTV footage at the scene is being studied. Wire cable was stolen from a skip on the driveway of a house in Steeple Close between 10:30am and 11:30am on October 9th. On October 11th/12th a van parked at Bellevue Garage, Bridgnorth Road, was broken into. Power tools, cash and audio equipment were stolen and with damage incurred the loss

amounted to around £3500. On October 13th a burglary at an empty farmhouse near Neen Sollars was discovered, which would have occurred since September 15th. A stainless steel sink, copper pipe and two immersion heaters were stolen. On October 14th two bicycles worth £4000 were stolen from a detached garage in Burford. Criminal damage occurred at a house in Kinlet; a front window was smashed, also the rear window of the occupant's car, parked on the driveway. This was on October 15th/16th. Between October 10th and 19th a tractor, Bobcat loader and trailer were stolen from farm buildings at Kinlet. In the afternoon of October 19th a window was smashed at a house in Betjemen Way. This could have been accidental but no one has come forward to admit it or apologise. Overnight on October 19th/20th a shed in the back garden of a house in Clee Hill was broken into and a trail motorbike worth £1500 was stolen.

As can be seen we do not have many house burglaries in our area, but this should not be a signal for complacency. Never skimp on security. Sheds, garages and outbuildings remain targets for thieves, so I suggest you consider, in addition to strong locks, a shed alarm which can be obtained from your local Shropshire Council Enablement Officer.

To end on a positive note, most readers will be pleased to learn that a local (ish) male has been charged in connection with burglaries and is currently enjoying free board and lodging at one of Her Majesty's establishments!

LACON CHILDE DEBATE ASSISTED DYING

A brave venture, taking one very emotional current topic, asking Year 11 pupils to hear the cases for and against Assisted Dying and express their views.

Guests on October 3rd were Ann Leedham of Dying With Dignity and Father Chris Walsh, Catholic priest for Cleobury and Ludlow. In supporti were students Naomi Shore and Sorcha McCullagh.

Mrs Leedham explained that the bill before Parliament would allow the terminally ill who retained their mental capacity and whose condition was agreed by two doctors to be incurable, should allowed to choose when to die. No third party could influence the choice, which would allow patient to sidestep prolonged suffering. Naomi Shore, with some impressive quotations from both the Bible and Aquinas, spoke well in support.

Father Walsh spoke of the better care available today and quoted a British Medical Journal article stating that 98 percent of deaths were recorded as "acceptable in terms of suffering". He also expressed misgivings that with an increasing number of older

people and a shrinking budget for their care, there might be pressure to end life. Sorcha McCullagh pointed out a feeling within the medical profession that a decision to end a patient's life can lead to a loss of faith in the profession itself.

When the meeting did finish, head teacher Darren Reynolds thanked guests and students for their willingness to listen to arguments, consider what they'd heard and ask pertinent questions. The students were then asked to vote, with 50 against the bill and 92 in favour.

It was an impressive show of the value of education, with teenagers listening, thinking and speaking their minds clearly. Camilla Harrison confirmed that there will be further such debates; it's another feather in the school's cap.


The Farming Page - Jenny Everingham writes From The Farmhouse



Linda Iles **November In The Wyre Forest**





This year has been a good one for hornets, honeybees and bumble bees. We had hornets build a nest in one of the farmhouse chimneys. I became aware of it in August but saw no need to take any action since we could easily avoid using the room and I'm rather an admirer of these impressive insects. My guests did start to wear out their welcome when one got in through another window and our house-sitter sat on it (an unpleasant incident for both of them). Then, when the cooling autumn temperatures persuaded us to light the wood burner in the room next door we may have started a chain of events that resulted in a large chunk of the nest dropping into the fireplace, attended by frantic worker hornets. They tried to rescue the larvae by carrying them across to the windows and the subsequent mess was quite revolting.

My problems were solved when my friendly pest control man suggested blocking the flue with a bin bag full of newspaper. The queens can exit out of the chimney to search out places to hibernate and I've washed the floor.

Talking of hibernation, the hedgehog is a small animal I'd like to see a bit more of around here. I occasionally see dead ones on the road but it's many years since I saw a live one and I'd consider myself favoured if one came to visit. It would do me a favour by eating some of the slugs which proliferate around my garden but in return I must avoid slug pellets and other pesticides (even if they claim not to harm wildlife). All kinds of man-made hazards await garden hedgehogs: steep-sided ponds, plastic netting which they can become entangled in, jars and bottles that can trap them and pipes or drains they can fall down. Your bonfire pile for firework night may look like the ideal place to hibernate, so it's best to only make your bonfire on the day you're going to light it. They need to put on fat ready for the big sleep, and if you're aware of having them in your garden you can help by leaving out some cat or dog food. The very informative website of Willows Hedgehog Rescue states that they tend not to be found where badgers are numerous, but even though badgers can kill and eat them it is not at all clear that they are responsible for their absence. Francis Engleheart's work as a piano tutor grew from his own love of music. He played purely for enjoyment, and slipped into tuition at Moffats School in response to a demand from parents and pupils.

He's very mobile and can tutor in Kinlet Hall as school duties permit, or visit a pupil's home, where they may be more relaxed and receptive to suggestions of trying a slightly more difficult piece than any tried before. It must be said that the drive out to the Hall and waiting in the reception hall is a very different experience from any other waiting room of my experience. The atmosphere is relaxing, the Shropshire countryside wonderfully scenic and the matter of learning to play one of shared enjoyment. No better way to encourage a pupil of any age or ability.

Claire Whiteman-Haywood is one of his adult pupils, who turned to music as a form of relaxation. "I'm not really advanced," she modestly told me. "But I do enjoy playing." She then demonstrated that her practising of the Blue Danube was paying dividends and we left with her smiling. It seems to be the habit amongst pianists of all abilities.



As this year is the centenary for the start of World War 1, this term our children in years 2 through to six have been learning about the Great War.

To understand the lives of our ancestors from 100 years ago children have been learning about the lifestyles of children and families from that era as well as life in the trenches, the geography of Europe at that time and the lead up to, and the start of, the war. When walking through our year 2 classroom last week I heard children asking their teacher to tell them all about trench foot, again, please

Before writing this article I asked some children which aspect of this topic they have particularly enjoyed and was told that going back in time to learn in a post-Victorian class was great fun. One child told me that she was disappointed that she had only been lashed the once!

Children in years 3 and 4 have wrapped their topic books in brown paper, with their names shown in parcel tags. Inside their books they have written about life in the trenches, labelled the map of how Europe looked at that time, written about the lead up to the Great War, produced propaganda posters to encourage men to enlist and have written letters home from the trenches to their loved ones. As well as a wonderful record of their learning, I am sure that these books will be a treasured keepsake.

THE WYRE FOREST WOOD FAIR - PART ONE

The Wyre Forest and its future will affect us all, from the people who work there to those who simply drive through and feel grateful we have so much woodland that is accessible for all. Where it goes in the future was the subject of a weekend in October and there was so much to see and report that it will take two pages to do it.

The weekend was centred in the area known as Ruskinland given that was to Iohn Guild Saint Ruskin's of George. In the Uncllys farmyard is the award winning Ruskin Studio, where visitors could take tea and cake and admire a very fine structure that demands little of its surroundings to provide them with shelter and warmth. A building for t h e environmentally conscious 21st century, in fact.



In the farmyard, Steve Hardy was working away on a pole lathe to produce legs and cross spokes for traditional Windsor chairs. The pole method dates back centuries and Steve told us it can still be found working in Morocco. It is the simplest power available; a stout sapling is bent over and a rope attached, the other end being tied to a simple treadle. Press treadle down and the piece of wood around which the rope is wound will spin, as it's mounted between two centres on a wooden frame. Take your foot off the treadle and the sapling springs back. Repeat the operation, using a chisel to carve the chosen shape into the wood, the operator bracing his hand against a stop to hold the chisel steady.

Crude? Of course it is, but it demands no power beyond what nature provides. It is the simple, thinking man's answer to the need to work wood with no conventional 21st century power source on tap. To put it another way, two fingers up to whichever power company is sending bills to make you wince.



21st century power hero? Steve Hardy would probably blush at the suggestion, but this wood turning lathe uses not one ounce of conventional power.

The most telling point in this chat to Steve was that he was making legs for chairs, but all the waste from the turning went for firewood. He was also turning small pieces with a traditional profile, then

splitting them down to make a traditional Christmas decorations. Again, nothing wasted.

A lady watching this process did try the lathe and found it much harder than Steve's experienced hands made it look. No surprise there, then.

We gathered in the Ruskin Studio for a talk about the development of the future Forest. This is an area often under threat from lack of management; 70 percent of birdlife has been lost due to that lack. It richly deserves sympathetic treatment and it is not easily replaced. Ruskin gave it to the community "To make xx this piece of England beautiful, peaceful and fruitful." It is just that, but it has to earn its place in today's world and there are some good addressing brains this problem. That's the vital factor - balance between commercial needs to pay the way ahead and traditional wood growth and processing to make the area attractive to tourists. No easy job and we should all recognise the great difficulty the Forestry Commission and Natural England face achieving that while pleasing their political masters.

There was obvious support for the preservation of the more traditional lifestyle, but Uncllys Farm is a business and must pay its way. A tour of the neighbouring forest and the work being done there would make some of the alternative uses more clear and John Iles would be our guide through this next stage of learning.
