#### THANK HEAVENS

Cleobury Parish Council held an Extraordinary Meeting on September 26th, with the destiny of the one acre of Muller Land the main item on a brief agenda. All nine councillors were present and about 60 members of the public.

When the discussion began, Cllr Gwilym Butler offered some additional information, an email from Blue Square Commercial. It they admitted had been regarding "misinformed the progress that had been made by Matrix, the Doctors, PCT etc and fully accept and understand the reasons the Muller Site was the best option for the community." They wished to pursue the developing matter of their Ludlow Road site, in part as a nursing home, recognising the need in the town with the closure of the Manor House. They would also like to discuss development of other the facilities to complement the Matrix Medical Centre to "enhance the community as a whole."

Cllr John Griffiths challenged chairman Thorogood's right to vote on the issuë. Mr Thorogood produced a copy of an e-mail from County Hall confirming the propriety of his vote. After some discussion it was proposed that the Council accept the Matrix offer and allow the work to go ahead on the new Centre.

Cllr Michael Reiner suggested an amendment, that the Muller land be swapped for the current medical site, to be developed by the Council for the community; no money to change hands for this exchange.

Cllr Butler pointed out that such an idea should have been put forward earlier, so that public opinion could be gauged. The amendment was defeated by 5 votes to 4.

The original proposal was then voted on. Seven councillors voted in favour, Councillors Ken

Reynolds and John Griffiths abstaining. There was prolonged applause from the public and Doctor Dawn Powick confirmed that the contractors are ready to make an early start.

So at last common sense and clear public opinion has prevailed. The community will be better off for it.

On to Oreton (what a pity the post office and shop there has long closed) and Goesland and down to Neen Savage and another rest by the ford. By this time the sun was low in the sky and I was feeling every one of my 62 years. One last challenge : Ron Hill. But taking a rest about every 10 metres or so I managed this and arrived home nine hours from the time when I set out.

I will never forget the beauty of the countryside and the help of the local people who set me on the right way after my mistakes in direction. I would urge anyone who can to walk parts of this footpath; I promise you will never forget it.

#### NO ROOM FOR DOUBT Not that there ever was...

The September 8th public meeting to hear the options available for the town's new Medical Centre saw over 300 people fill Lacon Childe's hall to overflowing. Chris Edwards, Area Director for the County Council, chaired the discussion an impartial observer as different groups gave their views.

The first two were the GPs and Cleobury Patients' Voice, both telling us why we need a new centre. Dr Dawn Powick explained what would happen to the old centre - it would be sold, but it was not clear if the sum realised would cover the outstanding mortgage. Dr Powick and Jenny McRorie were both given warm rounds of applause. As was Beth Lewis, who spoke on behalf of the young and the disabled.

Ashley Seymour, Development Manager for Matrix, explained the company are specialists in medical centre development, with 37 built to date, every one to clients' bespoke needs. The preferred site was the acre of land owned by the community, as the JAG Glazing site presented too many problems. The County Planning and Highways Department supports the Matrix plan and the company estimates

it can have the place built and be off-site by July 2013.

Liz Welch of Shropshire Primary Care Trust explained that Cleobury Mortimer is seen as a priority case and that with all development criteria met, finance is available for the project. But there is a need for urgency in getting the job started, before Primary Care Trusts are replaced by General Practice Clinical Commissioning Boards..

Mark Slater of Bovis Housing explained the various offers the company have made for the one acre site that the community owns: a £457,224 straight payment, £228,612 plus half an acre of the JAG site or £114,306 plus three quarters of an acre of the JAG land. These were minus abnormal costs to make the land good, such as filling the large underground firing range.

Jason Humphries of Blue Square gave a brief history of the company since its start in 2008. A representative of architects IDR explained there had been discussions with the Parish Council and that their plan for the Cleobury Engineering site was for a Medical Centre and pharmacy, along with provision of care for the elderly.

The meeting was then opened to the public and a non-executive

director of the Primary Care Trust thought the process had been going on too long; the best thought out plan should be adopted and started on.

Mike Lewis read a statement Warwickshire from North Borough Council about an order to a Blue Square company to repair properties that had not been met. resulting in prosecution and a fine. Mr Humphries replied that was a separate division of Blue Square, to protests from the floor.

Debby, owner of the Ceobury Pharmacy, asked why she hadn't been approached by Blue Square about moving to their site; Mr Humpries replied that no decision on that had been made. Councillor Madge Shineton emphasised the need to grasp this opportunity now, while it is available and shortly afterwards the chairman asked for a show of hands for the preferred choice. It was unanimously in favour of the Matrix.proposal.

Parish Council chairman Sean Thorogood thanked everyone for coming and said the feeling of the meeting would be made known at the Council's decisive meeting on September 26th. Subject to printing deadlines, we hope to bring you details of that meeting on the front cover.. *Jim Reynolds*



### **Philip Dunne MP's Letter from Westminster**

The House of Commons resumed for two weeks last month before the Party Conference season. While challenges to the Eurozone and global swirled economy around, the focus in Westminster was on the initial proposals published by the Boundary Commission on new parliamentary boundaries for the next General Election, fixed for 7th May 2015. The Conservative and Liberal Democrat parties had proposed cutting the number of MPs ahead of the General Election in 2010. I was the government whip who steered the Parliamentary Voting System and Constituencies Bill through Parliament last year, which led to the referendum on the voting system this Spring and set the guidelines for the Commission's work which led to these proposals.

The number of MPs is being reduced from 650 to 600 with constituency sizes around an average of 76,600. This means Shropshire will justify 4.6 MPs based on the electorate at December 2010. So we knew that at least one constituency would need to cross the local authority boundary; it was not a surprise that the initial proposal suggested combining Ludlow Constituency with part of North Herefordshire. What did come as a shock was the changes proposed for Ludlow. To the east, the Commission proposes creating Bridgnorth and Telford South, combining the five wards covering Bridgnorth, Broseley, Much Wenlock and Worfield with the three covering Albrighton and Shifnal from The Wrekin constituency, with all the Telford wards south of the M54. To the south, the Commission proposes combining the remaining wards from Ludlow for a combined Ludlow and Leominster seat extending as far as Herefordshire's southern boundary. This would make one of the largest geographic seats in the country.

These are early days in the process of changing constituency boundaries; the Commission is consulting and will publish revisions based on representations. It is not expected to publish any revisions with until Autumn 2012 final determination by 30th September 2013. Ι encourage residents to take part in the 12 week public consultation which ends on 12th December. This will include a Public Hearing in the Ludlow Conference Centre on Monday 7th and Tuesday 8th November.

### Heather Kidd's Local View

I have written before about cut backs and difficult times people face. Food, fuel and travel costs hit our pockets and wages are stagnant or going backwards. My family have tightened belts and reorganised finances to make ends meet.

I know that when people talk things through and understand problems, they often come up with ideas and mostly try to accept pay restraint and cuts. They have to feel part of a team where everyone is sharing the pain and pulling together. They have to be valued to go the extra mile. People who have given the best part of their working life to a company will do this if treated right. In the company my husband works in they made collective decisions and are living with the difficulties - because they feel valued.

Watching what is happening with Shropshire Council has saddened me. The staff all know that things must change and that the cuts are real. The main problem is that many do not feel appreciated, are rarely thanked for the extra mile and they frequently find decisions about their future or that of their department difficult to understand. Sometimes they feel bullied. This is a receipe for danger to our essential services. Good services need good and committed people. People who feel valued even if they are being paid £13,400. The coalition recommended a pay rise of up to £250 for all those earning less that £21,000. The Council wishes to cut 5.4% in 2 chunks for this very low paid area. I raised all of this in Council this week.

If Shropshire Council is to move on and serve its vulnerable people, they now need to work on communication, understanding and valuing their work force. They need to heal this rift and understand issues facing the low paid. *Heather Kidd*

#### MUCH MORE THAN A CATS HOME

Ann Himsley's Country Cats Hotel is very good at what it does in looking after your fine feline if you're away. She was nominated for the Cattery of the Year title for the level of care she offers at Kinlet, but never did hear quite where she finished. OK, so she didn't win, but the operation is clearly well thought of. And there's another side to the successful Cats Hotel.

Ann is one of the local RSPCA registered cat rescue centres, where innocent moggies are given a temporary home and shelter from neglect and worse. Like the time the Police broke into a flat to find dead snakes and tarantulas, plus cats that were expected to look after themselves because they are very independent.

Of course they are. Cats are like any other animal in a hostile environment; they turn away from neglect or abuse and look for a way to simply survive. Which makes them ideal rescue pets, because they don't make too many demands on their new owners.

Their accommodation here in Kinlet is very impressive. Clean, with proper bedding and room to move, one cat to a unit. We met Tasha, who came to Ann for a tummy tickle and a cuddle. "He came in with four bolts and a rod in his foreleg,"she told us. "I think he'd been hit by a car." He's healed and he's handsome - as the picture shows - and never turns nasty. "Ideal for someone on their own who wants a soulmate," as Ann put it.

There'a always a range of cats wanting good homes, from young adults to fully grown. It's not a gamble taking on such a needy animal, as they have all been neutered or come with a voucher to have that done. And they've all been vaccinated. The RSPCA pays for that and does ask for a donation towards the cost before a cat leaves for a new home.

Are they expensive to keep? "Two pouches of food a day, plus water," Ann explained. That works out at about 80p a day. If you want to know more, or to visit the cattery and see how many fine animals are in need of a good home, talk to Ann on 01299 841270 or Julia Hale on 07985 728318



#### **KENNEL COUGH**

Something we get asked a lot about is Kennel Cough. Its real name is Infectious Tracheobronchitis and it is a highly infectious respiratory which disease circulates in the dog population all year round - rather like our own flu. Although around eight bugs are involved, the two main culprits are a bacterium called Bordetella Bronchiseptica and Canine Parainfluenza Virus. You are probably realising why it is known as the more easily pronounceable Kennel Cough! Despite the more commonly used name, less than half of outbreaks begin in kennels. Dogs are just as likely to encounter the disease in everyday places such as the street or the park, at dog shows or at training classes or from next door's pet. In other words, wherever dogs meet. A vaccine is available and can be carried out at any time and this lasts for twelve months. Unlike the usual method of vaccine by injection into the skin,

Kennel Cough vaccine is administered up the dog's nose. Lots of boarding kennels insist on dogs being vaccinated against this nasty disease and in this case the vaccine must be given at least 10 days before they go. If you want more information about Kennel Cough please speak to one of our vets or qualified nurses.

This national competition is run by pet food company Royal Canin, with 18 making it to the final this time. 

#### OCTOBER IN THE FOREST Linda Iles, with more knowledge and forest news:

Wood ants are a familiar sight in the Wyre Forest. Their 1 cm size never fails to impress ("Cor, look at those giant ants!") and a very active nest on a sunny day can be quite intimidating! They only live in ancient woodland where they feed on an assortment of invertebrates and climb trees in search of aphids which they 'milk' for sugary honeydew. They build nests by gathering fragments of vegetation such as larch needles to make a heap up to one metre high. In the nest are tunnels which extend underground and provide space for several queens to lay Their natural their eggs. history is fascinating and well-researched, but how well are they doing now? How many nests are there and where? If you would like to help to find the answers please pick up an information leaflet and survey form from the Visitor Centre and complete it with your observations by 30<sup>th</sup> October.

On Wednesday October 5th there is a course on Nature Photography for Beginners from 10.00 to 4.00 at the Community Discovery Centre. This is what it says and warm waterproof clothes will be needed for outdoor work. £20 per person (adults and interested children over 11) subsidised by Grow With Wyre. Please book.

This is the best time of year to look for mushrooms and toadstools, when networks of fungal threads in soil and rotten wood send up fruiting bodies to release their spores into the environment. Fungus Forays are always very popular, and this year there are 4 two-hour sessions which cost £6.50 per person:

Saturday 1st October: 10.30am – 12.30pm at Earnwood car park, 2pm – 4pm at Hawkbatch car park; Sunday 30<sup>th</sup>: 10.30am – 12.30pm at Hawkbatch car

park, 2pm – 4pm at Earnwood car park. Booking is required.

The half-term holiday has two events for children aged 5 to 11.

On Tuesday the 25<sup>th</sup> they can learn how to make their own "Lanterns and Besoms". We will show you how to make a traditional birch besom and you will need to bring a jam jar to decorate with dried leaves, both of which you can take home. This will be quite a demanding craft activity so they will need a parent/ helper who is keen to get stuck in (not too literally, I hope!)

"Bats" on Friday the 28<sup>th</sup> is a morning of bat-inspired games, masks and other crafts. Did you know that the Wyre Forest is home to eight species of bats? Surprisingly we don't know very much about them and information is now being collected in a systematic survey.

Each event takes place at the Community Discovery Centre from 10.30am to 12noon, costs  $\pounds$ 3.50 per child and must be booked on 01299 266929.

### **Clive Davies' Westwood Farm Diary**

#### WESTWOOD FARM DIARY 21 September

Co-operation is the thing. Well, some would suppose it is and from an agricultural point of view this is guite the norm in Continental Europe. But here in UK it has been slow to develop; more to the point it's virtually a non-starter. This is probably a shame. There would be much to gain from working together. A better element of sharing resource and workload could result in more cost effective production. But, and there is no doubt about it, the British way is one of independence, soldiering on single handily, or thereabouts. Alternately, with co-operation could come partnership? In a business situation, the amalgamation of all the talents whether it is someone providing the land, the finance, the machinery, the livestock or of course the labour force, may bring benefits. This situation may be observed outside these shores but here such examples are thin on the ground. However, there is one great shining light and recently a group of farmers from the south Shropshire area made a trip to the impressive Leckford Estate. This is one of the jewels in the crown of the John Lewis Partnership, the well known outfit behind the Waitrose food stores. Their farm near Longstock in Hampshire provides produce for these leading shops. Clearly not all fresh items or otherwise are grown on their own farm, but as much as possible is and all with the great ethos of the workers being partners in the company and fairly benefitting from their efforts. It is strange why this concept has not been more widely adopted. It is even another notch or two up from what the great Victorian chocolate makers, Cadbury and Rowntree, developed with their 'worker village' arrangements. The Leckford Estate is some 4000 acres and was originally established in 1928 by John Spedan Lewis, one of the sons of the company founder. His initial interests were connected with his

love of the natural world and his wish to produce wholesome food through sustainable systems. The estate also provided a recreation facility for the family's expanding workforce. It still does to this day with extensive gardens, a couple of golf courses, tennis courts, a cricket ground, fishing and holiday accommodation. But, as impressive as all this is the farming at Leckford is spot-on. One of the most recently introduced enterprises is the vineyard. This ten acre site will produce sparkling wine but not before 2014 by when a guarter of a million pounds will have been invested. The top fruit orchards of principally apples and pears are consistently yielding well. The mushroom growing enterprise started life from when surplus straw became available following the introduction of the straw-burning ban. The straw was composted to provide the growing medium and this continues now but on a massive scale to the point that almost all of the 30 tonnes of Chestnut Mushrooms sold in Waitrose stores each week are grown at Leckford. The poultry production of eggs and broilers are both free range and well run. They use up some of the tonnes of grain produced from the arable acres. But without doubt the flagship of the farm is the dairy herd. There are some 600 Holstein cows maintained in the up to date dairy set-up that cost £3 million to develop about five years ago. You would have difficulty in finding a more contented herd anywhere. The massive buildings provide light, airy housing for the herd when not grazing. There is the 48 point rotary parlour with its own viewing gallery for the benefit of visitors. These cows are milked twice a day by two staff while another colleague deals with all the other milking time duties of washing out, feeding and so on. In all, a joy to see and a great advert for this Partnership and the co-operation thing. **Clive Davies**

#### YOUTH SHOWS THE WAY

If there's one obvious development we need on the town's main street, it's young people opening new businesses. Just look at the success of Ashley and Estelle's Cleobury Cafe or Rachel's Carrot Tops to remind yourself that ambition combined with the energy of youth is what can drive trade forward.

The Exchange Brasserie has been some weeks in coming, but on Friday September 16th it opened its doors to the public. It's run by partners Rob Smith, just 19, and Leigh Everett, 27. The two met working at The Crown in Hopton Wafers and shared a dream of running their own place. They'd both moved on to other jobs when the vacant High Street place was up for the taking. With help from Rob's parents they took it on and set about refitting. It's now a very impressive place to walk into.

The youthful theme continues with the waiting staff, from 16 to 22 years old and all with a lot of training time put in. "They're not just there to collect and carry plates, they'll talk the customer through the menu and give proper service," says Rob, who's the front of house man.

Leigh and James are the chefs, concentrating on seasonal and local produce "We've served 300 covers since we opened on the 16th," explained Rob when we talked six days later. "One dish was returned, and that was a mistake by an overkeen waitress taking it before it was finished." That's 99.7 percent satisfaction, a mighty high rate for a brand new team.

"There are a lot of very bright kids around here, and we're happy to recruit them," Leigh told us. "One of them, David Woodhouse, came in just as a washer-up and we'll take him on as an apprentice, because he's shown an interest." It's worth noting that at 27, Leigh is the veteran around the place. It naturally is fully licensed, and with cooler capacity limited to one beer, there's a wide range of the bottled variety to choose from. The shots sound impressive with a 12 year old whisky for those with deeper pockets.

They're open 12.00 noon to 2.30 for lunches Tuesday to Saturday, and 12.00 to 4.00 on Sunday, when traditional roast will be a regular feature. Evening opening is 6.00 to 9.00 Tuesday to Thursday and 6.00 to 9.30 on Friday and Saturday. But that is the early offering and it's not set in stone: "If we've got demand, we'll stay open," Rob made clear.

They've had customers from their previous places call in and a number of first night diners have been back. They spent time working out an impressive menu and cooked it for the staff to get their reaction and guidance. "Leigh converted Jess. She didn't eat fish, but she liked it the way he did it," laughed Rob. That sounds promising.

Why call the place the Exchange Brasserie? "It used to be the town's Labour Exchange," explained Rob. You live and learn.





### GOOD SERVICE

When Nick Wilkinson left Lacon Childe School in 2000 he knew he wanted to work with his hands. He'd gone through Yellow Pages and made lists of suitable businesses to write to when a man called to service the boiler at home in Neen Sollars.

That was too good a chance to miss, and when Nick asked if he wanted an apprentice he was signed up for a two year stretch of learning. He emerged with his NVQ to look for the next stage of development and opted for his own business.

Dad Graham, who has a background in engineering, looked after the books and purchasing as Nick set about the business of getting known. "Adverts in the Clarion and the Parish magazine, plus cards in shop windows. But the best by far was word of mouth." He did contract work for builders, which mainly took him to Birmingham and the delights of the morning commute, but the best breakthrough was being used by Farlow Estates on the rental properties they manage. That takes him as far west as Knighton and south to Malvern to sort out problems.

Nine years in business has seen a range of specialist equipment acquired, the most expensive a boiler analyser at £700. "From the beginning, whenever we needed parts to carry on the van, more buy we'd than we wanted," explains Graham. "That way we built up a good stock over time."

"We should have all the parts we need for a job on the van," Nick emphasises. "If we don't, we won't charge the customer for the time spent going to get it." It's a thorough approach that needs a stocktake every month, to keep such time wasting to a minimum.

Work is roughly a 50/50 split between repairs and new installations, covering a range from a simple tap washer to fitting a complete new bathroom. For that sort of work he brings in specialist skills such as tiling and plastering, using people he knows and trusts.

Every plumber gets emergency calls and the NJ response is normally immediate. "If you're in the middle of a big job like installing a bathroom, people generally don't object to you going to deal with something that's really urgent." He's learned the importance of customer relations and always lets a customer know early if there's a snag or holdup

Nick is OFTEC registered and licensed to instal and service boilers and their fuel tanks, plus the installation of underfloor heating. Oil fired heating, the most common in this area, is his speciality.

He's a one man band, though dad still looks after the books. Is the old chap well paid? They both laugh at the very idea!

There are no employees, though Nick can see the possibility of taking on an apprentice as the business grows. At this stage, he hires specialists when he needs them.

Putting in 50 hours a week, he lives in Bewdley with the van overnighted in a secure location. Heading for marriage next year and a tenth birthday for the business, he's a young man steadily making his way.
