On Thursday morning I was conveniently down to do the Cleobury to Bridgnorth service. At last I would see wife and baby. Entering the ward I was told by a nurse I could not go in, it was not visiting time. But I was allowed in to find my loving wife Win and a perfect baby. A few tears flowed - I was so happy!

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THE SHOEBOX APPEAL

New recruit Josh Coombes has been out chasing news stories. His first call was on Jenny Vanderhook.

Jenny is a compassionate local resident who has been volunteering for the Charity Teams4u for more than 30 years. Every Christmas, the charity runs a special appeal and anyone can get involved to help. It is done simply by packing shoeboxes full of acceptable items, they then get handed over by a team that t h e m ships o u t impoverished parts of the world, just the role that Jenny has. She also collects and decorates empty shoeboxes for anyone to collect, just inside the entrance at the Market Hall. This year though there have been fewer expectations on the number of shoeboxes that are going to be filled. The appeal is more pressed than usual, with the pandemic being the culprit.

She has previously been featured in the Clarion, giving a story on one of her expeditions to Romania where she gave out 3,000 shoeboxes over the course of just a week.

In one previous featured article mentioning the economic gap in the rural areas of the country compared to that of the more urban parts - she recalls seeing women in villages wearing colourful dressing gowns throughout the day which was all they had to wear, standing outside derelict orphanage buildings that children were being housed in, Jenny and her team reached out to a group of needy children. With each child that receives a shoebox, it tells them that someone out there cares about them.

This Christmas, Jenny is shipping out boxes to parts of Belarus, Moldova and Ukraine. Every year, in the Cleobury area Jenny expects around 1,000 boxes to be shipped out. However, we're seeing Covid-19 not just tarnishing businesses but charities too. With the closure of Severn Hospice shop in the High Street - a huge source of items that people donate from is keeping the numbers down. Jenny has reported that 500 boxes will be a wishful target this year. Jenny has since attempted to reach out to local institutions for help but has sadly been brushed aside.

There are many shoeboxes to be collected in the Market Hall - don't be afraid to grab as many as you want, as they get re-stocked regularly. The filled boxes are to be dropped off there too and the deadline is the end of October. Let's see if the generosity of the town can come through and make it beyond 500 this year! There are leaflets on display with the boxes, please give them a thorough read before taking them home to be filled. On the leaflets you will find an age group and gender to be the chosen recipient of that box, Jenny would like to mention that boys aged 12+ is currently dropping in inclusion. 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
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THE OWL NEST BOXES

Last month saw the end of the programme of installing eight owl nest boxes around Cleobury. There are many people to thank for this project including all those over the last two years who wrote down at what time and from what direction they heard hoots. Those records allowed us to draw up a hot spot map of owl territories and plan where we could best put up new boxes. Men In Sheds built the new boxes both for Tawny and Barn owls. Land and tree owners gave permission for us to put the boxes up and a small gang, despite weather and Covid, strategically placed in trees three barn owl and five tawny owl boxes to help extend our owls' potential territories and numbers.

Little more can be done to help our owls apart from making sure that their habitats both for feeding and breeding remain safe and protected.

Many people are reporting hearing owls as it is the time of year for pairing up, declaring territories and finding nesting holes. Let's hope some of those holes are square and made by Men in Sheds. There is no guarantee that owls will use our boxes but we can be sure that if they have no boxes, no owls will nest in them.

They've lived at Cherry Tree Cottage for four very busy years, starting out with a wilderness and bringing it back to a garden that lives in harmony with the rest of the hillside.

Nigel has done most of the work, with Clare mucking in on mowing and the floral side. They've felled enough trees to fill a big truck with logs, all neatly stacked. There are three ponds in the garden, serving ducks and geese and attracting visits from a huge range of wildlife. Nigel can recite a long list of lizards and newts, butterflies by the half dozen and field inhabitants from field mice to rabbits. 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As I write, the concerning news that cases of COVID19 in the UK are rising is still fresh. This is alarming and possibly disheartening, given how much change we have all had to endure to normal life from this pandemic. But it is not surprising as we cannot afford to be complacent against the threat this virus continues to pose.

The government last month introduced the new 'rule of six', to help stem the rising number of cases. I know the Prime Minister deeply regrets having to implement this restrictive measure, and I have heard from constituents how this will impact their lives, from social activities and family gatherings to business disruption. I can assure readers that this imposition is not lost on me. Having had to shield at home for several months earlier in the year, I am well aware of the difficulty of not seeing people in your community or extended family whom you like to meet to keep in touch. But unfortunately, it has proven necessary to take action to control the virus once more.

I hope that this broad measure, alongside localised lockdowns where there is a clear spike in cases, will avoid the need for any kind of national lockdown once again. I was impressed by the speed of response from Shropshire Council and local health bodies to spring into action when a spike in cases was reported at Craven Arms and Dorrington in recent weeks. So we know that quick and decisive action, combined with an increase in localised testing, can really help shutdown the spread of COVID19 in our communities.

On the issue of testing, I am well aware that increasing numbers of people have had problems in securing a test either at home or at one of the drive in centres. Demand for tests has increased very significantly during September, as those going back to school or work settings, or returning from holidays, have developed symptoms of COVID, or been exposed to someone showing symptoms, or the normal flu/cold/cough which starts to circulate each autumn. This is increasing demand for tests exponentially.

The situation is very fluid. I am aware of people in South Shropshire securing tests last month with only a few hours notice. There is a regional test site in Telford and 2 mobile units, which for some weeks have been based in Oswestry and Craven Arms, all operating at capacity each day last month, before the latter moved to Shrewsbury.


More testing capacity is being added each week, with more sites opening each week in September to take the total to over 400, with 500 testing sites due by the end of October across England. As I write in September laboratory testing capacity has reached 370,000 a day, higher per capita than in Germany, France or Spain. But it is clearly not enough to cope with the demand, so more testing laboratories are needed and the current plan is to get to 500,000 tests a day by the end of this month. I have called for the Government to plan for even more, so that testing does not have to be prioritised as it was during lockdown and is being again now.

Pilot projects for saliva based tests with rapid results were launched last month in Salford, Southampton and Hampshire. If these prove effective then there is the prospect for a vastly increased testing system which should remove the current capacity constraints of the present system which require analysis in laboratories.


I shall continue to engage with Shropshire public health leads and Health Ministers to secure sufficient accessible testing locally to meet the needs of local residents.

My advice to those seeking tests is to keep applying and consider seeking a home test which is despatched in the post. It is clearly important to maintain social distancing and control measures like regular handwashing, if we are to keep on top of the virus once again this autumn.

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Marian, bless the lady, has been writing away into the small hours to produce three instalments of memories of days working in Wales. This is Part One - others in November and, to round off 2020, in December.

Read, wonder and enjoy.

Sometimes I have difficulty remembering names or even the day of the week it is, but I remember so many things about Talybont Farm I could write a book about it. It was in Merionethshire (now called Gwynedd) and was the farm where my father and his six siblings were brought up. My brother and I were taken there every summer since we were toddlers, and were left there for two or three weeks with my two aunts and uncle, who ran the farm.

There was a strict routine to the day regarding meal times, as it probably was for all the farms in the area. Breakfast was at 8.00am, a hot drink about 10.00, dinner at noon, tea, sandwiches and cakes about 4.00, then believe it or not, another meal - supper after that. The workmen shared these meals and marched into the kitchen, their hobnail boots clattering on the flagstone floor. They sat at a separate long narrow table, on benches and at hay making time or harvest, extra men would be there helping, and all joined in the meals. My aunts were excellent cooks and there was no expense spared to be hospitable. If a man had come to inseminate a cow, if the vet or a passing neighbour called in, they all ended up around the kitchen table if they had time.


Some of the farm workers lived in, so they were around to do the early morning milking, etc. There were two rooms in the farmhouse called the Barracks, both could be approached by stone steps from the outside. This is where the workmen slept, even my uncle with them. Apparently during and after the war the farm had to look after

prisoners of war, German and Italian, and they slept in the Barracks too. One German returned at a later date and said how happy he had been there. Probably all the good food helped!

The farmhouse was a substantial building, stone painted white and hundreds of years old. Amongst the farm buildings was one called 'The Old House' but in Welsh - Hen Dy. The mind boggles at the thought of how old that building was and what history was attached to it. There were also some stables, used in the times when horses were used to work the land. The was a rickyard where hay and straw were stored, other barns, pig sties, a granary which was the corn store and the cowshed attached to the farmhouse. The cows were kept in there all the time during the winter, just unchained to go out for a drink of water. I remember the lovely smell of cows, the hay and the noise of the chains. Keeping them in caused a lot of work mucking them out every day - no modern machinery in those days. Uncle checked them every night before he went to bed.

I stayed at Talybont for several years when there was still no electricity, which was very late getting to that district. The aunts lit the Aladdin Lamp which was fuelled with oil or paraffin; a glass dome fitted over it and a mantle on the top gave a bright light. We would read or play cards except on a Sunday - no balls games or cards on the Sabbath! We were given a candle to go to bed with, the candles throwing eerie shadows on the walls as we went upstairs. At the bottom of the stairs was the hallway, where there was a stuffed fox with a bird in its mouth in a glass case. The grandfather clock was there too, ticking loudly and chiming on the hour. I inherited the clock and have it beside me as I write this.

WHITHER SHIREHALL?

Shropshire Council is considering the future of Shirehall, its long established Shrewsbury base, as part of a rethink about the whole operation of running the county. It has applied to Historic England for a Certificate of Immunity to delay any move to have the place registered as a listed building, with all the restrictions on alteration and even demolition that would entail. It seems that the application for immunity was not widely publicised.

The response has been the formation of a group under the title SOS - Save Our Shirehall. Their stated focus is to attract support locally and from national organisations to oppose the perceived threat to the building.

Our information on the council's thinking comes from County Councillor Gwilym Butler. He explained that at the last full council meeting "it was agreed that due to the change in work practices and the dire state that Shirehall is in, that it would be more prudent to create a new, smaller civic hub in part of the shopping centre in Shrewsbury and new hubs across the county to make the council more accessible where needed." Mr Butler is working to have the Cleobury Country building on Love Lane as part of a local hub, possibly on a part time basis.He understands that at its capacity Shirehall accommodated around 3,000 people, but thinks that the need now is for a hub of around 250 people.

Opinions about the viability and state of the building vary widely. SOS say "The Shirehall, besides being Shropshire's civic centre, is a very fine example of post war modern architecture," adding that many staff enjoy working there as teams in "Well designed spacious and light offices."

SOS also quote Royal Institute of British Architects editor Hugh Pearman as saying: "We are at a moment when to demolish a perfectly good and refurbish able large building is highly irresponsible." Mr Pearman has also stated: "Reusing and adapting what exists is acknowledged best practice to reduce carbon emissions and is by any standard less wasteful."

The counter to that positive presentation of the current building naturally sees the problem very differently. "Shirehallneeds tens of millions of pounds spent on it in the long term in repairs and renewals including all windows, rewiring, flooring, decorating, heating, air conditioning and a new roof. It is big and drafty and no longer fit for purpose.....Before Covid a third of the building lay vacant and was not in use. On the last fire inspection we were told that new regulations mean that upgrades costing in excess of £2million were needed if we intended to stay there."

Read those quotes and you can see how far apart the two groups are, from SOS stating that "...in future years the Shirehall could be seen as a much-treasured example of late twentieth century architecture" while Gwilym Butler writes of "..the building and its brutalist concrete construction."

But the future of the Council's working practice and the best location for that deserves a serious debate and a chance for the public to express their views. The world is changing and the way of working changes with it. What the information we have seen so far does not include is any estimate of costs and long term benefits; this is bound to come before any binding decision is taken.



ART FOR ALL

The Artists' Gallery, one of the growing number of attractions that surround the Ludlow Farm Shop at Bromfield on the A49, hosts a very special event over a three week period beginning at the end of this month. 21 local artists and creative practitioners (that's a new term to me and it does cover a lot of diverse skills and interests) will be showing off their works from 10.00 in the morning until 5.00 in the afternoon, seven days a week. It sounds like a great opportunity to find Christmas gifts out of the ordinary, or something special to brighten vour home.

The Gallery is an intriguing place to visit, compact but laid out to show off the work of the eight artists who launched the idea last October Happy Birthday, Gallery. The resident artists are aware that many local people working in the arts business have had very few if any local fairs to meet the public and sell their products. For the Open Art Exhibition they will take on the neighbouring hall, almost trebling the show space available.

We were first approached by Shelly Perkins of Neen Sollars, a firmly local lady whose art talent was nurtured at Lacon Childe School before going on to build a career as a wildlife artist and photographer. She also has a passion for travel, which was realised when in 2017 she was appointed Artist in Residence to the Scott Polar Research Institute and spent six weeks in the Antarctic. Her paintings inspired by that wild place are on display,

along with the book she wrote about the visit, copiously illustrated with both drawings and photos.

The residents produce a wide range of fine art. Kim Davis works under the title of wood turner, but look at the care that goes into converting a wooden stump into an eye catching vase and you can see he's a lot more than just a man with a lathe. Jan Jay's work on textiles produces wonderful blends of colour and texture far beyond the ordinary.

Pip Jones is a watercolourist, surely one of the most refined of painting styles that can take your breath away with what seems to be simple beauty, but is the product of devoted years. Sarah Billingham's Redland Pottery shows what remarkable effects can be produced with modern ceramics, a place for your imagination to roam free.

Megan Evans offers fascinating collagraph .prints with a clear environmental message, using rubbish collected from the local landscapeMore traditional is Priscilla Hann's work as a bronze sculptor and the samples on show confirm her years of experience and the growth skill that means. She clearly loves animals and these works almost look live.

And the eighth member of the group is Danielle Flowers, who combines a love of wood and making jewellery, with a range of fascinating small pieces that show off the texture and figure of the wood, some pieces with inserted silver and gold details. I've not seen such a creation before and its appeal to younger buyers is obvious.

These are the people who set up the Artists' Gallery and have proved that such a venture can work, even in these strange times.

The Open Art Exhibition runs from October 31st to November 22nd, from 10.00 to 5.00 seven days a week. And admission is free.

A SUMMER LIKE NO OTHER

Our relationship with the garden has undergone a dramatic transformation over the last few months.

Data shows that lockdown prompted people to spend more time (and money) gardening than ever before. As the sun provided some respite to the daily dose of bad news, DIY stores and garden centres did a roaring trade in plug plants, fancy patio furniture, and barbecue setups that would put Gordon Ramsay to shame. Inevitably, prime time TV shows were hastily cut and pasted together to keep the country's new green-fingered converts engaged and entertained. Whether it be tending a window box or mowing an expanse of lawn, Britain proudly returned to its roots as a nation of gardeners.

For me, this brought a sense of vindication. For years, friends have ribbed me about my premature middle age obsession with gardening (tending my own, visiting others, reading about 'the classics' like Hidcote and Great Dixter). However, over the last few months, these same friends have not only succumbed to the allure of the trowel but also become equally enraptured by germination, soil testing, and planting schemes. Marvellous news – now we can grow old together.

Such has been the transformation that that when social commentators search for the thinnest of silver linings from COVID-19, the nation's new respect for horticulture will surely make the list. It's a small but significant shift in the right direction.

In my own patch, this Summer has been a bit of a weird one. Despite the bonus time in the garden, my carefully curated plans have failed miserably. Ask any seasoned gardener and they will confidently predict certain things at the start of the growing season - a glut of courgettes, sweetcorn that will grow strongly (and then be eaten in situ by the local wildlife) and, no matter how hard you try, sweet peppers will always be a bitter disappointment (in both senses of the word). I can report that none of the above came to pass. In reality, those crops that have always been a surefire hit (*I mean, who has ever struggled to grow courgettes?*) failed to deliver while we're now awash with exotic fruits that we previously only dared dream of (cucumbers, sweet peppers, and figs to be exact). It's all rather confusing...

If nothing else, it goes to prove that you're always learning when it comes to this gardening lark. Just when you think you've cracked it, Mother Nature decides to throw in a few anomalies to keep you on your toes.

It's probably this game of horticultural roulette that keeps me coming back - you never really get a chance to get bored. There are new adversaries around every corner - unpredictable weather, rampant weeds, and equally rampant rodents - each trying their best to put the kibosh on carefully drawn out plans.

Despite the inevitable onslaught and, acknowledging that any lofty aspirations I have for the garden are guaranteed to be taken down a peg or two by Mother Nature, I can't wait to get cracking with the next phase. Currently up for consideration are spring tulips (size, colour, positioning), winter veg (is it worth the hassle? how excited can/should a man get over an onion set?) and preparing myself, both spiritually and physically, for the inevitable leaf drop.

Who said gardening wasn't high octane stuff..? I hope my friends are ready for the ride...

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When you are walking out in the forest do you ever get the feeling that you are being watched? The Fallow Deer are such experts at blending in to their background that it is almost impossible to see them before they see you. We often give ourselves away by the noise we make too – I'm usually saying something like, "We haven't seen any deer around here for a while" just before I spot them. The photo shows a young male, a pricket, caught on camera by Mick Farmer among some birch trees, for which his dark winter coat provided poor camouflage. I'm not certain but he may be one of Wyre's black deer which make up about 40% of the herd.



This month is the beginning of the rutting season, when mature males are far from quiet and elusive. The two sexes spend most of the year in separate herds but from late August rising levels of testosterone in the bucks cause a change of behaviour, and they return to their

traditional rutting grounds in the heart of the forest. They trample and urinate on the soil then lie down in it, presumably to enhance their

appeal to the does, which are attracted by their loud, groaning calls. Rival males are seen off and challengers may be taken on in combat to win the right to mate with the assembled harem. Deer are very sensitive to disturbance at this important time and will often wait for nightfall to mate. In November the rutting season will have passed and the two sexes will separate again. The bucks will take some time to recover and need to build themselves up with high energy food such as acorns and beech mast: indeed some of the older bucks will die at this stage of the year.

Deer are frequent visitors to our farm – each morning shows their droppings scattered in the farmyard and the fields unprotected by deer fencing. One of the advantages of my erratic sleeping pattern is that I sometimes indulge in night-time or dawn forays into the garden, and on more than one occasion have heard munching coming from the other side of the fence. Fortunately the days when they could get inside the garden have gone. If you ask me for a list of garden plants that are 'deer proof' the answer is easy - I haven't found one that they Linda Iles aren't willing to try.

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

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In Business - Richard Haines, The Worcestershire Chimney Sweep

Five years ago Richard Haines was a busy wood merchant, with a stock of timber, machinery to handle it and a rented yard to operate from. When he found he had to find another place to accommodate the business, he did not fancy moving everything one little bit, so sold the lot and and took on something rather different. "I had an established customer base, so I decided I'd sweep the chimneys I'd been helping to soot up," he explains.

He looked at various professional bodies for training and advice, opting for the Guild of Master Sweeps and taking their very thorough training course. Days on the technical and legal side of the business, then more days training with experienced men and finally the big exam. Not an easy matter, he had to get it 100% right to be accepted into the Guild.

"You have to have a two million pound public liability insurance cover and go for a refresher course every five years," he told us. Standards are high for the Guild, and he has qualified as a HETAS approved sweep and installer. Getting properly trained and setting up with good equipment was not a cheap matter, about £8,000 before he bought the van and the range of spares and parts he carries to every call. Blocks to cut new fire bricks if the old ones are no longer effective and a range of door sealing ropes to keep them properly sealed. "It's not to try to sell more stuff, it's just an insurance to keep a stove working and warming properly," is his simple logic.

There is a burden of responsibility with the job today and if a chimney system is not properly maintained or installed it has to be reported to HETAS and they report in turn to the housing authorities. It's not bureaucracy for the sake of it, simply a matter of keeping people safe. He has seen some chimneys where the pipe was close to structural timbers and could start a house fire; they've been put right.

He also checks carbon monoxide alarms and carries replacement units of good quality - not the cheapest, but the reliable brands he knows can be trusted. At about £30 for a seven year life is not a lot to keep you safe.

He's a man very happy with his work, who averages four sweeps a day. "Because you don't know what you're going to find and I won't rush the job," he explains. He doesn't just sweep, he checks the stove and chimney. He'll take phone calls any day of the week and reckons to cover an area up to 50 miles from his Tenbury hase

Would he change the job if another chance came along. "No. I love it, meeting people and doing the job properly."



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




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
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
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

Articles in many previous issues of the Clarion mention dog mess on footpaths, pavements, in the roads and on fields. There are plenty of dog waste bins around town and if you feel that we need more then please ask us.

Litter has been a more noticeable problem this year, especially on the Playing Field and through the QEII Park. We are grateful to those who do use the bins and also to those who have been litter picking for no reason other than their care of our community. We will be purchasing more litter bins to try and encourage everyone to be more socially responsible and use the bins provided if they cannot take their litter home.

We fully endorse all initiatives for caring for our environment. It isn't just for other people in other parts of the country/world, it starts at home by using bins, recycling etc. We would ask you all to consider if you can do more as an individual but also challenge family and friends and for parents to speak to children about the environment around them and how they would like it to look when they are adults.

As we move towards winter, please have a look at our website www.cleobury.org.uk to guide you as to reporting issues, as we always encourage people to report directly to Shropshire Council by telephone 0345 678 9000 or on-line at www.shropshire.gov.uk. It is not only quicker if done directly but it also adds some weight to our reports of potholes, pavement issues, parking, littering etc. The streetlights around town belong to either Shropshire Council, the Town Council, various Housing Associations or private landlords. You can check the map on Shropshire Council's website when reporting a fault to see if they belong to Shropshire Council. If not theirs please ring the Town Council office on 01299 271154 and we will notify the relevant contractors/organisation.

Also, with any issues at the Play Area, Playing Fields, QEII Park, Toilets, Cemetery, or the Wells please ring the Town Council office.



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In the third of this series of articles we are going to focus on DOOR STEP scams. In the grand scale of things these are lower down the scale in terms of severity but are still never the less in the swindling group of crimes. Most door to door scams involve the selling of goods or services that are either not delivered or are of very poor quality. You don't get value for money and you may get billed for work you didn't want, need or However, doorstep scammers are agree to. not always pushy or overtly persuasive. Indeed, they often seem polite and friendly (a ploy to gain your confidence). So, if you are not expecting someone, its important to be on your guard when you answer the door, especially if you live on your own, or are elderly and potentially vulnerable. It can be very easy to fall victim to Doorstep scams so let's look at some of them and how you can protect yourself. One of the first things that should be on your list is a door chain which you should use every time you open the door. This will prevent an undesirable person opening your door by more than a few inches.

ROGUE TRADERS - A cold caller may offer you a service that you don't really need. The person may claim to have noticed something about your property that needs work or improvement, such as the roof or guttering or chimney, and offer to fix it for cash or at an inflated price. It's not uncommon for the rogue to identify something that you cannot easily see for yourself. Often the person will claim they are already working in the area and can 'do a good deal' for you.

ACTION: Thank the person for their interest but politely decline the offer, asking them to leave. If you are suspicious but not in immediate danger call the Police 101 service. If you feel you are in danger, call 999.

BOGUS OFFICIALS - These scammers claim to be from a utility company or the Local Authority looking to gain access to your home. It's not uncommon for them to work in pairs. One remains out of sight while you open the door while the other persuades you to show them the utility meter for example, and while you are distracted, the second one

enters your property and looks for valuables that can be removed easily.

ACTION: Anyone who claims to represent an official organisation will carry an ID badge for that organisation. Ask to see their ID and if they are genuine they won't have any problem showing you, or waiting while you call that organisation to verify their identity. If they get agitated or refuse, it's time to close the door and in this case call the Police 101 number to report it.

NOTTINGHAM KNOCKERS - A version of Rogue Traders who are often ex-convicts claiming to be part of a rehabilitation scheme. Callers offer householders the goods, at inflated prices, but often use the sale as a ruse for checking out a person's home and gullibility. They may engage the person in more conversation, to find out details about them. If they believe there may be an opportunity they note your address and sell to interested parties in prisons, pubs and among certain trades. Unfortunately the elderly are often targeted for these scams, and any suspicious activity should be reported to the police.

ACTION: As with any doorstep caller, never feel obligated to buy something. Close the door and if you feel threatened in any way call the Police.

OTHER DOORSTEP SCAMS -

Fake charity collections - A fraudster may pretend they're from a charity and ask you to donate money, clothes or goods. Always ask for the charity number of anyone knocking on your door.

Made-up consumer surveys - Some scammers ask you to complete a survey so they can get hold of your personal details or use it as a cover for you to buy something you don't need.

Hard luck stories - People may come to your door and ask you to help them out with cash, or ask to use your telephone and claim they're feeling unwell. The story is made up and intended to con you out of your money or gain access to your home. As with all these forms of scam, the intention is to defraud or steal.

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




