



Tony befriended us, as we learned his routine. He awoke at 3pm daily, just as our sons returned from school. We weighed him weekly, knowing the ideal winter hibernation weight is 450g. We were now in early summer and his favourite treat was a complete hardboiled egg, shell included!

Eventually, Tony weighed in at a whopping 800g! I'd already explained 'slow release' to our sons, who were

We sat beside his cage and opened his cage door. Tony came straight out and walked to Ollie for a stroke, then made his way to me. Finally, he walked to Josh to say his final farewell. We watched, as our Tony marched off down the garden to start his new life. We all cried, it was a bittersweet moment, so sad to see our friend go, but we'd released that beautiful strong animal, back where he belonged.

Every night, the boys filled up Tony's bowls and every morning, his bowls were empty, but he stopped visiting by late July. By August, it was light until 10.30pm. Ollie asked if we could sit outside to see Tony, iust one more time?

It was a lovely warm evening, but 'Like mother like sons'- the boys struggled to keep quiet! We waited & waited, then we could hear something coming towards us, it sounded like an elephant! The boys giggled with excitement, as we saw the bushes moving. Then, what a treat, our Tony appeared! He walked to each of us in turn and allowed us to stroke him. He looked amazing and the boys were delighted, but they'd accepted that he had to live his own life.

Tony taught us how to rescue & rehabilitate hedgehogs. We have successfully rescued and released dozens of these beautiful creatures, over the last 20yrs. Priceless memories for us!

CLEE HILL WILDLIFE GROUP

Have you heard your first Curlew of 2025 yet? If so, we'd like to know about it, please. We've already had several reports.

Our bird survey is now underway, but it's not too late to join in. We need more helpers, please.

It's very easy to do. You would make three visits to a survey square, each for about 3 hours, in early and late April, and mid-June. You mark where you see Curlew, Lapwing and other Target Species on a map, and send it in. The map will be sent to you, along with simple survey instructions. If you feel you would benefit from informal onthe-job training for the bird survey, please come on the Bird Walk.

The Bird Walk will be held on Clee Hill, starting at Cleeton St. Mary, and lasting about three hours. but it is open to anyone else who wants to come. We expect to see and hear two pairs of Curlew, Red Kite, Kestrel, and several of the other target species. Arrangements have not been finalised at the time of writing, but it is likely to be during the first weekend in April $(5^{\text{th}} - 6^{\text{th}})$. You will be able to find details, including time and date, on our website, www.ShropsCWGs.org. <u>uk</u>

In addition to Lapwing and Kestrel, Cuckoo and continuing a nest-box scheme for Kestrels, to help with a research project to try and find out why their numbers are going down. We can learn a lot in Clee Hill, which is a County hotspot with probably 8 – 9 breeding pairs. If you see any of these species, please let us know.



When it emerged that the water quality at the River Teme bathing site in Ludlow had been deemed 'poor', I called on Ministers to make urgent improvements. I then met with the Environment Agency and attended an event marking the launch of an innovative, new scheme to improve data available to the community and identify sources of pollution. It is welcome that Ludlow is the centre of this pioneering work. I hope to see a marked improvement as a result. I also raised the proposed 'River Onny Pipeline' project, which I am monitoring closely. I am also in conversation with residents and Severn Trent about this development.

Crime has a devastating impact on lives in South Shropshire. The Police must be equipped with the resources needed to keep our communities safe. This year, West Mercia Police is due to receive an extra £11.9 million compared to last year. However, a huge deficit is left due to inflation, demand, and increased costs from hikes in employer's National Insurance Contributions (NICs). The £4.2 million needed to cover increases to NICs represents the equivalent of over 80 police officers. Under the previous government, the number of police officers rose to 149,769 - the highest number on record. I am worried that September's headcount is already down 883 officers. I hope that these issues are quickly addressed.

I am delighted that Ludlow Train Station now has step-free access, after my predecessor Philip House of Commons, London, SW1A 0AA Dunne secured investment from the Department 01584

my for Transport for new lifts. It was excellent to attend the opening. Accessibility is a key part of daily life for many residents. If you don't consider it, you're basically saying to them 'you cannot travel this way'. I want to help secure more into infrastructure investment in South Shropshire. I helped secure £6,000 for road safety in Morville. This follows a meeting I convened in November with key partners including Police and Crime Commissioner John Campion. The funding is for new Vehicle Activated Speed signs in Morville. It is part of a wider strategy to improve road safety in the village, which includes an extension of the speed limit and gateway improvements.

I am thrilled that two local businesses have been shortlisted for the Countryside Alliance Awards, known as the 'Rural Oscars'. It is testament to the hard work and dedicated efforts of both Ludlow's 'All the Seasons' and Vine & Co from Church Stretton. I urge everyone to throw their support behind them before public voting closes on 6th April 2025. Pubs like The Queens in Ludlow also play a vital role in the rural economy, supporting hundreds of jobs. Yet, they are deeply concerned about their prospects under this new government following tax hikes which will cost them thousands of pounds. I was glad to nominate Tim and Jane Vaughan to attend a roundtable in Parliament with Shadow Business Secretary Andrew Griffith MP. Their valuable insights will help us to be a strong and effective opposition.

It is also concerning that a record number of councils have had to seek extra financial support from the government. It follows a massive shake up of local government funding, which has stripped rural councils of over £100 million direct funding. I have written to Ministers on four different occasions to request a fairer settlement for rural areas like ours. I will continue to campaign for more equitable funding that recognises the unique challenges of delivering public services in remote communities like South Shropshire.



Linda Iles considers our springtime visitors

I'm writing this in March, and was surprised to open the curtains to a dusting of snow this morning. Of course, cold weather isn't unusual in spring and I have often been anxious about the pollination and setting of fruit on the apples and cherries in the orchards.

We can have hot days too, and this month should see the arrival of the birds that visit to breed in the summer. We hope to see our newly cleaned and renovated bird boxes being occupied, and not all by Blue Tits! Over the years been we've delighted to have а number of pairs of Redstarts nesting in our and neighbours' own

farms.We look out for their investigation of nest boxes near the orchards and their appearance on top of fence posts, waiting to dart off to catch insects on the wing. Often our first clue to their presence is hearing a contact call: a short ascending whistle. Next month they will be very busy feeding their nestlings and we hope for the successful appearance of the fledglings. Last year a favourite nest box, which doesn't look as if it would attract the parents, sitting as it does high on a solitary post facing south at the bottom of the vegetable garden, was taken instead by a pair of Pied Flycatchers (the Redstarts were gazumped!). An entry in my diary for May notes, 'Pied Wagtail babies in the garden, being attended by parents. Redstarts shouting at me when I went to net the redcurrants'. (Thanks to Mick Farmer for the photos of the male Redstart with the caterpillar and the male Pied Flycatcher on the nest box.)

We can't assume that we'll see the same this year. Birds which migrate are subject to the difficulties of feeding and coping with bad weather on the way, and when they get here will they find enough insects in our over-tidy and oversprayed landscape? I'll be listening for the call of the Cuckoo to let me know whether or not there is hope that we'll still be able to enjoy the traditional sights and sounds of spring in the years to come.

Simon Morton In The Garden

The Compost Conspiracy

Every gardener worth their salt will wax lyrical about the joys of making their own compost. They'll tell you—usually at length and with smug superiority—that there's nothing quite like rich, dark, life-giving compost, magically created from a few kitchen scraps and the odd pile of lawn clippings. They make it sound so easy. uspiciously easy. I, for one, had my doubts.

After decades of well-intentioned (but ultimately doomed) gardening and compost preparation, I've never managed to produce anything remotely resembling the gorgeous, crumbly organic matter I'd seen on gardening programmes or in glossy magazine spreads. No, my efforts had consistently resulted in either:

A) A festering, stinking swamp of disappointment or

B) A dry, lifeless heap that bore an uncanny resemblance to brown lawn clippings.

And before you start—yes, I followed the rules. I knew about the golden ratio of green to brown materials. I diligently turned the pile. I even invested in a compost-turning tool (a purchase that felt oddly specific and, frankly, a bit of a scam). And yet, despite all this fiddling about, my compost area steadfastly refused to transform into the rich, fertile matter I'd been promised.

Now, I'm not a cynical man, but there were times when I started to suspect that Monty Don and his kind were either buying their compost in bulk, lying outright, or part of an elaborate nationwide joke at the expense of unsuspecting, ever-hopeful gardeners like me.

But then, this year, something remarkable happened. I mean, genuinely gobsmacking. It was a horticultural miracle.

After years of composting failure, I had accumulated a mountain of garden detritus—a towering heap of lawn clippings, twigs, and assorted plant odds and sods. It was less of a compost pile and more of a sprawling, organic

mound, similar to the mashed potato pile in Close Encounters of the Third Kind. It was starting to cast a shadow over most of the garden and scaring small children.

It was time to deal with it. Enter my mate with a digger.

With all the efficiency and giddiness of a man always looking for an excuse to use heavy machinery, he made short work of shifting the entire lot into a neat corner. And in doing so, he inadvertently revealed something extraordinary: the motherlode of compost.

Beneath the outer layers of failed attempts lay tonnes—yes, tonnes—of the rich, dark, nutrientpacked compost I had been dreaming of. It was a discovery of near-archaeological significance -Indiana Jones would have been chuffed.

Yes, I had unwittingly created gold dust for my garden. COMPOST! Actual useable and rather fine-looking compost!

How had this happened? I have absolutely no idea. Perhaps it was the sheer weight of the pile compressing itself into composting submission. Maybe the deep layers had secretly been doing their thing for years, untouched and unnoticed. Or perhaps the gardening gods had finally taken pity on me.

Whatever the cause, I was not about to waste this miraculous bounty. I embarked on an enthusiastic (some might say frenzied) orgy of mulching. Every bed, every border, every available patch of soil was lovingly blanketed in my newfound treasure. As a result, the garden has never looked so pristine, the soil rejuvenated, and if you listen closely, I swear you can hear the bulbs cheering as they receive their well-earned nutrients.

So, to all those who, like me, are compost sceptics—don't give up. If there's one thing gardening teaches you, it's that perseverance is key.



The bird nesting season is upon very dangerous for a dog us once again and it seems to start earlier each time! Many birds decided in the last couple of weeks that the weather was good enough. I have also been seeing frogspawn here and there! Signs of spring on the way.

Of course my biggest concern, as always at this time of year, is the struggles of our rare and important ground nesting birds. Curlew, Wheatear and Meadow Pipits, amongst others, must struggle against the ravages of weather, increasing numbers of predators and less, and less wild open spaces. The last thing they need is constant disturbance from people and their dogs!

So please can I ask everyone to help them by keeping dogs on a lead to protect our ground nesting birds and avoid any disturbance. Please responsibly and do not let dogs off the lead roaming across the common between 1st March and 31st July. This legal is а requirement

Reduce to a minimum driving vehicles off-road onto the common, do not take vehicles where you do not have a right of access

Keep to rights of way and wellworn paths as much as possible when you access the common






