I have been in the nursing profession for 35 years now, climbed the ladder gaining experience and responsibility. Like all my colleagues, I never planned for a year like this; it has been tough, oh so tough, exhausting and emotional. We have given our all to our patients, including saying comforting words and holding their hands as their lives slip away. As you know, lockdown has meant relations haven't been able to come into the hospital to tell their relatives how much they love them. That was left to us.

Lockdown has also meant that I couldn't go home to my family for fear of taking coronavirus to them. I have been tested regularly, but you still don't want to take risks. I have been able to stay in a room at a hotel, free of charge but had to do my own cooking and shopping.

You may have seen me on television a while ago. I had had a particularly bad day in the ward and had been to the supermarket to stock up on food. Due to the circumstances, everyone thought they must raid the shelves and buy, buy, buy. There was hardly an item of fresh vegetables left, nor milk or toilet rolls. A reporter caught me weeping in my car and I appeared on the television news, lashing out at all the selfish people, just looking after themselves. "It may be me nursing you one day," I said.

Thankfully things have improved now plenty of food but I am now feeling even more exhausted. On a brighter note, my colleagues and I so appreciated being clapped on a Thursday night. Of course, due to lockdown nobody could shake our hands or, better still give us a hug but it has been encouraging to be appreciated. It has also been good to hear of all the kindness that emerged from lockdown. I keep mentioning that word and it has been drummed into our minds over these past months: Keep Your Distance, wear a mask, wash your hands, stay at home. I couldn't stay at home or stay apart from patients. It has been hands on administering drugs, washing and turning patients in their beds - on and on it has gone.

I was horrified when in that hot weather we had we were all sweltering under our protective clothing in the hospital and scores of people poured to the seaside. I saw them on the news, all sunbathing cheek by jowl, and you wouldn't want to wear a mask sunbathing, would you? I suppose that in life some people are heroes and some couldn't care less - that is, until they are struck down with the virus.

Anyway, there is a bright, bright light at the end of the lockdown tunnel. This very day (*This was written on December 14th, Ed*) the general public start getting their vaccinations. Oh yes, that reminds me: haven't the scientists worked a miracle to produce the vaccine in months instead of years, to give us all hope. The pandemic will get conquered. They need recognition and a huge thanks.

So that's me, a hope sewn in my heart that lockdown will be over this year. I have so many people I want to hug. In my dreams tonight I may dream of life as it will be: lockdown free, fun and laughter, going to the cinema, opera, concert or ballet. If one good thing can come out of this, may it be that folk are locked up in a life of thoughtfulness and kindness to each other.





JOHN GREAVES - A NEW FACE ON THE TOWN COUNCIL

John Greaves has been working in the energy industry for 15 years and can explain how that vital sector has improved the cleanliness of its operation and is still looking forward in its search for efficiency. When he tells you that pollution from generating that vital power we all take for granted when we just switch on a light has been reduced by one third in the last 30 years, you realise there are some very bright brains on that job. It also means that these people have the ear of government when future planning is discussed.

He knew this area as a child, when his family had a holiday home up on Clee Hill and he could wander freely. So it was a natural move later in life to come back in 2014 to a place that had given such happy memories. He attended council meetings to capture a feeling of what was happening and was well impressed with the work he could see being achieved.

A chat with one of the council revealed vacancies and he was invited to apply for one of the co-opted posts. He and Guy James were selected and are settling into the job, John fitting the work in with his full-time energy research role.

He clearly likes the busy atmosphere of the town and the work of moving the community forward. He's one of three councillors on the Neighbourhood Development Plan and is happy to give his professional view wherever it can help in the council's work.



He sees catering for the young people who will be the next generation to work for the good of the town as important and wants to see development of employment that will make the place more secure as a community. Ask how many hours he puts in and it varies, but he reckons he gives 30 to 40 hours a month to the town's work.

Does he enjoy working as a councillor? "I'd recommend it to anyone who wants to contribute to the community," he says. "You'll find that some of the greatest rewards in life are not necessarily financial."

Could there be a better reason to become one of our town councillors?

THE LAPTOP PROJECT

To put it simply, this is a typical Cleobury Mortimer way of showing community spirit as you help people in need. Matt Yarranton was moved by news shots of children struggling to share space on the family computer as they tackled their home schooling. He could see this was talent wasted and access to information was badly needed.


There was a pilot scheme in Sheffield, but nothing nationally. So Matt contacted Darren Reynolds at Lacon Childe School and they agreed cooperation. A message on social media asked for laptops less than ten years old for Matt to clean of data and upgrade with a Cloud Ready scheme that runs on low level hardware.

We spoke to Matt four days after the scheme was launched and he'd already had five laptops donated and cash donations of £480. Lacon Childe have provided a room for him to store and work, giving his time for nothing.

There's a need for cash because updating and making the laptops ready for use does require parts. There is an audit of income and spending in operation already - the operation is transparent.

CANCER SUPPORT GROUP FITNESS

The Kidderminster Prostate Cancer Support Group is a very go-ahead operation that has been setting standards for a long time. In January they added another service that will help mature chaps who have had prostate treatment to keep fit and reasonably agile.

All done via the Zoom service and run by Di Fox, a Personal Trainer and Cancer Rehabilitation Specialist. No charge, free to all members of the Group, who can log in from home and not have to travel at all.

Di has a personal history with cancer, as she explained: "I was working as a personal trainer when I was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2015, but found that staying active helped me deal with both the physical and emotional side of my treatment; I've had chemo, surgery and radiotherapy. I'm now on hormone treatment and found that I felt better more quickly than I'd been expecting."

"I wanted to help others have the best experience they could, so in 2016 started working for Active Herefordshire a n d Worcestershire as the Macmillan Move More Physical Activity Co-ordinator. The role changed over the years, but working with others with a cancer diagnosis remains my passion. Funding for that role is no longer available and I'm aiming to provide a similar service independently, setting up sessions where I see a need. I approached Mary Symons, who I'd met through work at Active HW, to see if we could set up a Zoom fitness group for the Prostate Cancer Support Group and happily the committee liked the idea. "

"The aim of the sessions is to incorporate exercises to target upper body strength, lower body strength, cardiovascular fitness and core strength, each of which can be done at different levels, as appropriate."



The lady herself, with a charming smile and persuasive manner.

Hers is a very gentle and friendly approach to the job of getting a collection of mature chaps to work together, with encouraging comments and tips on making the best use of whatever's handy if you don't have a resistance band or dumbells around

There lay my first mistake, because I had dumbells from long ago in the wardrobe, but when I got them out there was only one size left, 5 kg weights that I used to use for bicep curls, but not for straight-arm lifting at my present age. Damn it! I could do it 25 years ago, but time has not helped. Di's helpful advice was use a can of soup or baked beans -I'll have those to hand next time. She led a warming up session, then took us through a set of exercises with specific body areas in mind. Upper and lower body and heart rate, followed by areas affected by prostate cancer treatment. It was challenging to test simple balance, with one foot in line behind the other, and a chair or wall nearby to aid balance.

It was interesting when the one-hour session was over to realise what muscles I'd been using that hadn't had to work for a long time. Discovering new areas to ache may not sound like a good idea, but with a regular Monday gentle workout, they'll soon be in proper working order.

THE BUSINESS OF INSTALLING KISSING GATES

Last month we repaired a footbridge on the Simon Evans Way that had been washed away - photos and more detail on our Facebook page. Looking back, we can say that access into the countryside around Cleobury has improved considerably by our replacement of stiles by gates. We installed our first at the bottom of Lion Lane into Clarvers Field in 2008. Since then we have installed a further 34 kissing gates and supplied four to landowners for them to instal. The two most memorable events were beyond the top of Clarvers and on Mawley Town Farm. In the first we hit a water main in the last place you would expect, in a field a long way from any houses. It turned out to be the supply to Sadlers Barn Farm coming from Eagle Lane. It was a long, tiring and wet day, especially as it was raining.

With the second we hit bedrock making it very hard work to make the holes necessary. David Robinson joined us and got stuck in putting us all to shame.

Shropshire Council also put in quite a few in Hopton Wafers and Neen Savage in 2009 when they overhauled the footpaths in those two parishes and some more in connection with diversions at Dinmore and Overwood Common. In more recent times, the Parish Council in Neen Sollars have been installing gates with our help; 11 so far and more to come. The Mawley Estate have removed all but three of the stiles on their land. Improvements in the neighbouring parishes of Bayton, Mamble and Rock can be added to that list. All this means that in the last 12 years a considerable amount of clambering over stiles have been replaced with an easy walk through a gate. We hope to continue to improve on that.





Philip Dunne's Letter from Westminster

This month marks one year since the Coronavirus reached our shores, and the remarkable transformation our society has undertaken due to its devastating impact over the past 12 months.

The whole country has come together to try to stop Covid in its tracks, and restore some sense of normality to our lives. But at the heart of this great national effort has been our NHS, who have endured 12 months of intense pressure, saving lives from Covid while also maintaining as much as possible the regular service on which we all rely.

So I wanted to take this column to offer my sincere thanks to all those who have played their part – doctors, nurses, and all NHS and care staff, as well as those who have come out of retirement to volunteer. Volunteers have played a key role in supporting the NHS this year, whether in delivering healthcare or the vaccination programme, or helping people who have been shielding to secure supplies. I am pleased the government has swept away some of the bureaucratic issues that were preventing people from taking part.

Like many, I spent much of 2020 having meetings through Zoom, including with our local NHS leaders and public health directors. I suspect for most public health directors around the country, the idea of having to deal with a pandemic was hoped to be a remote possibility. So I am grateful that we have been so well served in Shropshire, with an effective test and trace system that has acted swiftly to curtail outbreaks, including last year in few local care homes, some businesses, and rather publicly at a site in Craven Arms. There is no question that swift coordinated action stopped greater spread of the virus into Shropshire's wider population.

Local GPs and primary care staff have also been crucial in the roll out of the vaccine in South Shropshire, and the inspiring vigilance of care home staff has ensured that two thirds of care homes in Shropshire remained covid-free last year.

I also pay tribute to the work of the Armed Forces, who have stepped up to offer logistical and medical support, such as providing ambulance drivers, as well as personnel to man testing centres around the country.

As a former Hospitals Minister, I am well aware of the pressure that exceptional events can put on local healthcare systems, let alone a global pandemic that has morphed into an increasingly contagious variant. So I can only commend and thank the resilience of all those involved in keeping our health services going, but particularly all those working in our NHS.

We are not through this pandemic, but each vaccine into an arm is another light to brighten the end of the tunnel. I know everyone involved in care and health will continue to do their utmost to keep us safe this year, as they did last year. So it is up to all of us to step up to and stick to the rules, follow the guidance, and take whatever steps we can to break the chain of infection. That way we hasten the return to normality in the months ahead.







NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN UPDATE

Why have a neighbourhood plan? Once a NDP achieves a simple majority vote at a public referendum it becomes a legal requirement. Any development <u>must</u> then comply with the policies of the plan. IF there is NO plan the community have little or NO influence over any future housing development in Cleobury Mortimer.

Housing Density? Sometimes it is difficult to picture what housing density looks and feels like so local examples are: Cleobury Meadows development: housing density is 46 homes per hectare (10,000 sq. metres or 100 metres x 100 metres). Bovis Homes estate development has a housing density of 43 homes per hectare

The Draft NDP has housing density at 20 homes per hectare meaning a more spacious look and feel

Benefits to Town? The plan includes: 20% affordable homes being a mix of 1,2 and 3 bedroom properties, 80% will be market housing composed of 20% bungalows, 60% other housing or self build homes, Housing density of 20 homes per hectare, on plot parking, more open space to enjoy and improved walking/cycling routes

What happens if there is no plan? Developers maximise the profit of the site, meaning a lot more houses squeezed in, not enough parking, and the community will have no say in how /what is built with little or no obligation to provide other community gains.

When will I get to vote on the plan? A referendum is likely September to November 2021

2021 Timeline: May: Plan to Shropshire Council for review;

June: Shropshire Council give opinion on the Plan; August: Town Council vote on the Plan; September: Legal review by a government examiner;

September - Nov: Public Referendum; Late December: Plan made law and becomes part of the Shropshire Local Plan (if a majority vote) These dates could be subject to change. Can I still give my views? Yes - we welcome feedback - please get in touch on the following e mail:

CORONAVIRUS JABS

Another reason to be glad we live in Shropshire.

Along with a lovely lady of whom I'm very fond, I got my coronavirus vaccine jabs, both of them, by January 7th. We were given appointments for December 17th and travelled separately, to comply with government recommendations, to Bridgnorth Medical Centre. A brief wait, a friendly reception and clear instructions before a jab in the upper arm and out to a waiting area, to sit for 15 minutes before heading home. Each of us given a card stating that we'd had the treatment and giving our next visit on January 7th.

Same system, equally speedy and we were issued with a card confirming that we'd had the jabs using the Pfizer BioNTech vaccine. The news about new strains of the virus emerging and the decision to impose another lockdown did rather dampen any temptation to break out the champagne, so we agreed to keep low and take care. But it is a great relief to know that this treatment was available so early and was delivered in a very efficient way.

Philip Dunne advises that the South East Shropshire Primary Care Network had been chosen to deliver this pilot scheme, with all nine GP practices taking part. The next local development was the opening of a vaccination unit at Ludlow racecourse to serve the South West Shropshire area with invitations issued by local practices.

ZERO CARBON PLAN

The Shropshire Climate Action Partnership is a team of volunteers from across the county motivated by the climate emergency. It took them just three months to come up with a plan which does suggest that this is no mere talking shop.

Their aim is zero carbon Shropshire by 2030 and state that they know the scale of that challenge and that we have the ability to meet it. The key issues include:

- 1. We have carbon dioxide emissions about double the global average.
- 2. The Paris Agreement demonstrated the need to stop using fossil fuels by 2030.
- 3. The technologies needed to achieve zero carbon are available and affordable.
- 4. A pathway to zero carbon has been put forward and about 70% of changes needed have been identified. More work needed this year to develop a comprehensive plan.
- 5. Actions are needed from now.<u>www.ZeroCarbonShr</u><u>opshire.org</u> will tell you more.
- 6. Time is pressing. We all need to work together on an emergency footing.
- Zero carbon represents a major commercial opportunity for employment and sustainable growth.

Samples of readers' views, for and against 'Himself' by Jess Kidd:



Some people (well one) have asked how I came to be called Ariadne. This is a slightly puzzling story so if you are sensitive or easily bored, turn the page now...

Those of you familiar with Greek mythology will remember that Ariadne was a Cretan Princess, the daughter of King Minos. She then travelled to Naxos with Theseus whereupon he abandoned her although there are two main versions of what happened next. In more recent times, names from Greek Mythology were adopted by the Royal Navy for their ships and a series of 8 vessels carried the name 'Ariadne' between 1776 and 1992. THE MEDICAL CENTRE - AN UPDATE

As we head into the winter months we thought we would update you from The Medical Centre.

Obviously this has been a year like no other and we are very grateful for all the support and understanding we have received from our patients throughout this difficult time.

Due to Covid-19, we have had to change the way we work and we are now screening all patients by telephone prior to arranging the most appropriate appointment or treatment for them. This measure is to ensure the ongoing safety of our patients and staff and to minimise the likelihood of disruption to services that may occur should large numbers of staff To help us with these have to isolate. processes we do ask that you do not come into the Surgery without an appointment, or prior approval from us, and whenever possible attend appointments on your own.

Despite these changes, we are seeing many patients face to face and a clinician is always available to talk to and discuss any medical concerns with patients on the phone.

We are performing our usual full range of services in the Medical Centre and are catching up on services that were cancelled earlier this year such as cervical screening, and blood tests. If we offer you an appointment or review at the surgery for screening or for chronic disease management than please be assured that it is safe to attend the surgery and we urge you to come to these appointments as planned.

We have across the October to January period run a number of flu clinics and are pleased to be able to report that in excess of 2,760 patients have received their vaccination from us this year, this compares with 1,800 across the whole of last winter. We do still have a small number of vaccines available so if you have not yet been vaccinated and believe you fit the vaccination criteria this year, please give Reception a call and they will be pleased to help you.

Please always remember to follow government advice and if you develop symptoms of Covid-19 such as a high temperature, a new continuous cough or a loss of sense of taste or smell, to selfisolate and obtain a covid test. These can be accessed through the government website <u>www.gov.uk</u> or by calling 119.

Please do not attend the medical centre if you or any of your family have symptoms as this puts other patients and staff at risk.

In December 2020 we began working alongside our neighbouring practices to deliver the Covid-19 vaccination programme which covers the whole of the South East Shropshire population from Bridgnorth Medical Practice. So far we have given 5,190 vaccinations, with a total of 9,170 to have been given by the 31st January 2021.

As new vaccines become available we will be continuing to review our processes. You will be contacted if and when you are eligible for your vaccination; please do not contact the surgery about this as we are working diligently through the cohorts provided by NHS England, and our phone lines are already extremely busy. Rest assured, all normal services will continue at the surgery whilst we are involved in the vaccination programme.

Rector's Letter

This year Ash Wednesday, opening the season of Lent, falls on the 17th of February. What are we to say about Lent this year? This figure is of course the saddest of statistics, but it only stands as the tip of the iceberg as far as the full total of human misery generated by this wretched virus is concerned. A Garden is for Life, Not Just the Summer

I recently discovered a cunning 'hack' that provides an instant disguise for missed weeds, incomplete pruning and the general 'fraying around the edges' state of my garden. Like all useful hacks, it's easy, available to all and, best of all, free - simply leave your garden until the depths of winter and let Mother Nature do her thing. As you lie tucked up in bed, she'll pop along and transform your slightly shambolic patch into a marvel that could grace the pages of any glossy gardening magazine.

How does she do this? The payoff for chilling us all to the bone is that she sprinkles frozen jewels far and wide.

Why is this a noteworthy 'hack'? Because frozen gardens *always* look wonderful (yes, even mine).

There's something truly magical about the icy cleanliness of a garden under a blanket of frost. The deeper the frost, the fresher and more enchanting it becomes. Everything sparkles under the low sun of a Winter's morning. Pesky weeds that previously drove you to distraction transform into horticultural specimens encased in diamonds. A hoar frost reveals the bone structure of your garden with your plot laid out in front of you in relief, a skeleton upon which you can plan next season's blooms, crops and impromptu picnics.

And it gets better. Crunching your way around your garden on such a morning is another delight. The childlike pleasure of seeing your breath, cracking through frozen puddles and navigating super-slippery paving slabs is an invigorating way to wake up. This naturally raises the question, why do we obsess over getting our gardens in tip-top condition for the handful of months where stuff flowers and it's briefly warm enough to sit outside and enjoy it? A cruel irony is that this brief moment of horticultural wonder coincides with the need to keep on top of the lawn, weeds and watering. Running around like a headless chicken, titivating your garden and not actually taking time to enjoy it is an easy trap to fall into.

Now, I'm not suggesting for one moment that you don't think and plan ahead for the summer, but let's not forget we have 12 remarkable months with which to enjoy our gardens. Granted, the soggy ones can test the patience, but the cold ones can be just as arresting as the height of summer. After hours of research (primarily looking out of the window with a cuppa), I can reveal that the secret is leaving some stuff in the ground. For example, the spent Allium heads I left in the border by the house looked cracking encased in frost. Same goes for the Teasels (lethal to anyone unfortunate enough to brush past them, but irresistible to birds and beautiful in the arctic morning air). I even risked leaving my new favourite plant, Verbena Bonariensis, exposed to the elements. The books told me that taking them back to the ground would be the best way to save them, but seeing their stems and seedheads encased in a frosty coat made the gamble worthwhile. Keep your fingers crossed that they make another appearance...

Whatever the weather, I hope you get the opportunity to enjoy your garden, inside or out, over the coming weeks.

February in the Wyre Forest

We know that the winter months are not 'dead' and that even January can see gorse flowering, but February is the month when I wake up to the fact that spring is approaching. The Christian feast of Candlemas (2nd February) has customs linked to the lengthening of the days, some of which it inherited from the Celtic Imbolc festival: the celebration of the start of lambing. Also this month we have St. Valentine's Day: the time when birds pair up for the year and humans turn their thoughts the same way! Those of us not inclined to follow in that direction can still make use of National Nestbox Week to help our garden birds.

This month the hardy and cheerful Snowdrop greets us in gardens and hedge banks: my 'Wild Flower Key' by Francis Rose doesn't seem to be sure whether it's a native but allows that it may be so in the Welsh Borders, and that's good enough for me. I'll be watching for buds bursting on the trees (especially the 1250 little saplings we've underplanted over the winter in the oak woodland near Uncllys Farm with the help of enthusiastic, socially-distant volunteers), but I may have to wait another month. Meanwhile I can enjoy the display of catkins in the hazel coppice: male flowers of the tree opening in fine weather to shed their yellow pollen. Look carefully and you will see the tiny red female flowers clinging close to the bare twigs, ready to produce hazelnuts when fertilised by pollen carried on the wind.

Our opportunities to exercise have been very limited recently and the temptation is to stride out on woodland walks and cover a bit of ground. However, I would advocate going a little more slowly and pausing so that the wildlife around us can recover and resume normal activity. How about taking something to sit on and taking a break on a log or under a tree? The calls and songs of birds will return and you may be surprised to see insects on the move or hear the rustling progress of a mouse or vole. The reservoir near Uncllys is a popular spot but I can still find myself as its only observer and be rewarded with a sighting of its most colourful resident, the Kingfisher.



At this time of the year the males and females live separately, watching out for fish from their bankside perches. 'The Nature of Wyre' by the Wyre Forest Study Group, tells me that four pairs have nested along the Dowles Brook in recent years, excavating tunnels up to three feet into the bank to do so. Their choice of nest site may put them at risk of being washed out by flash floods but in good years they may rear up to three broods of young. We are very lucky to see Kingfishers in this area, not only in the forest but often along the banks of the Severn, which is where Mick Farmer took this splendid photo. *Linda Iles*

SAMARITANS

Mental health is a subject of much concern at the moment, with the extra worry of Coronavirus adding to the stress many people find it hard to cope with. One of the better known support charities for people in crisis is Samaritans and we talked to one of their volunteers and found out more about this remarkable free service.

The charity was founded in 1953 by Chad Varah, a Church of England priest who was also a cartoonist and script writer. Quite a character. Not that the church origins dictate who can seek help - it is open to all who need someone to simply listen.

Today there are 20,000 volunteers working for the cause, with 200 branches in the UK and ROI. The service is free and operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. They are busy all the time; in the six months from March to August 2020, there were 1.2 million calls and email contacts made.

We talked to Paul, who volunteered in 2016 and took a training course as a listening volunteer. That took almost six months, from briefings to sitting and listening to an experienced volunteer before taking calls and then sharing a debrief before being welcomed as one of the team at Telford. There are two listeners on each shift, working as a team and supporting one another. The calls may come from anywhere in the country, from Europe and sometimes further, the automatic switchboard puts the incoming call through to the first available volunteer. "So I could be dealing with a call from Morpeth or Southampton," as Paul puts it.

What the team do not do is disclose personal details their job is to sit and simply be a sympathetic listener. Anyone who has been through stress will almost certainly have found it hard to just sit and talk; Samaritans listen without the need to comment until they feel the caller may need the support of their voice..

If a caller has to end the talk, there's no way he or she can get back to the same person. It's part of the volunteer training that they explain there will be another sympathetic ear on the line next time they call, but not the same person. Do callers accept that? "We're all human beings," is Paul's answer. "Listening is the most important thing to do." And that is the essence of the Samaritan service - willing to listen.

Volunteers normally work three hour shifts, with the 10.00pm to 2.00am four hour shift being the exception, as these hours are often a critical time for those who need support. Listening may not seem to be a very tiring business, but taking in what a person under great stress is trying to tell you can be. What volunteers are trained not to do is give advice or to be in any way judgemental; that simple service of quietly listening is what works best.


So how does the service measure its success? Suicide statistics give a clue, and the fact that a GP with a stressed patient might suggest a call to the Samaritans could help is a clue to the service's standing with medical professionals.

What the volunteers do not have is a target, the only pressure they face is that of listening, talking when it's necessary and being a kind presence, even though the caller will never know what they look like.

We were bound to ask how the training covered a caller with suicide in mind. Not an easy matter to deal with and a suicide happening during a call is not unknown. There can't be many more tests of a volunteer's mettle than that and we ended the interview full of admiration for people whose motivation is to help others.

So why did Paul volunteer? "In 2014 I was going through the worst experience of my life and a stranger asked how I was. It was such a kind gesture. I realised that life has been good to me and I wanted to put something back."

Beating the Scammers

A belated Happy New year to all. At the end of last year, we looked at electronic scam activity. We looked at the "Rule of 5" relating to the use of passwords. I cannot stress enough the fact that password management is one of the most important ways of staying safe online. Let's assume you have good password control on anything you do online, but that's not the only way the bad boys will come after you. There are so many scams being perpetrated online that are designed to relieve you of your money. While the approach varies greatly, the objective remains the same. You are tricked into revealing enough of your bank details whether it is credit/debit card or bank account details, to enable the scammer to access your money. Once the scammer has access to your cards or accounts, they will go on a spending spree and order goods in your name but have them sent to a different address. Once the goods are received, they are usually sold off or 'fenced' and the criminal gets the cash. If they don't use your credit or debit card to order goods there are other ways that they can use your card either by cloning the card or cloning your personal details to remove money directly through cash machines. I will go into more detail on these aspects in a future article. Going back to the 'front end', I said that there are many ways the scam can suck you in, so let's focus on those that come through your email. A good email account or reputable host provider will pass genuine emails to your inbox and direct emails where the sender is not in your contact list, to the spam or junk folder. For example, on one of my email accounts, I had two genuine emails in the inbox and 31 spam emails in the junk box. Many of these spam emails are genuine businesses trying to sell you something, but there are also some that are far less than genuine but either catch your eye with a subject heading that looks genuine or comes from a sender that looks like it might be genuine. EG. Sender: Post Office, Subject: [your name] followed by We were unable to deliver your parcel. Looks very plausible especially in today's environment when the amount of goods we are ordering online has risen significantly. You open the email and see that there is a link you are asked to click on to provide your full details, or payment information for the small redelivery fee. If tempted to offer your details or card details to pay this small fee (usually £1 or £2), you have

just given the scammer enough info to potentially clean you out! DO NOT BE TEMPTED, the folder is not called spam on your email account for nothing. Personally, I delete 100% of the messages in my spam box. I work on the principal that if there is a genuine message in there the sender will contact me again, possibly by a different route. I have mentioned in the past that clicking on the sender's name on the email reveals more detail about who they are. In the example I gave above where the sender was 'Post Office', the real sender was 'contact@consenttop.com'.

Just to remind you, genuine business owners sending emails will always use a sender address that comes from their genuine domain. E.g., One with sender as National Railway Museum did actually come from them, the senders address was 'norepy@railwaymuseum.org.uk' I did read it, they were not asking for personal details, but I deleted it anyway once I had read it. The message I am trying to get over is this. An email may look like it is from a genuine source, always check the source by clicking on the sender name. There are so many apparently genuine senders, like Royal Mail, HMRC, TV Licencing, Energy suppliers, Banks etc etc, it always makes sense to check if the sender is really who they say they are. If you decide to open the email, be very wary of any links you are asked to click on. They usually are highlighted and start with http:// or https://. However, as the scammers send out hundreds of thousands of these emails every day, just opening the email confirms to the sender that your address is active and you could be flagged by them as a possible future target. You can find out more online on Facebook Group 'SCAMS and How To Stop Them' or online at '<u>www.beat-the-scams.info/</u>' or '<u>https://</u> www.thisismoney.co.uk/money/ beatthescammers/index.html' If you are reading this online, you can just click on these links to be redirected. If you don't have access to a computer, ask a friend or go to the library and ask to use one of theirs. As always, BE ALERT, BE AWARE AND STAY SAFE. Next month we will look in more detail at the methods scammers use to try to trick us.

SAVING ICONIC BIRDS

Clee Hill Community Wildlife Group has been monitoring local Curlews, Lapwings and other birds since 2012. In 2020, about 25 local people sent in records from home, or obtained while out exercising, or after the coronavirus restrictions were lifted in mid-May. A full report of what we found has been sent out to our members and can be found on our website <u>www.shropscwgs.org.uk</u>

The good news is that the Kestrel population is doing well (we found six nests, including two in nest boxes we've put up), we heard more Cuckoos than usual, and Red Kites have spread right across the area.

Save our Curlews

In spite of the restrictions, our Curlew coverage was not much worse than in previous years. We found 8 pairs, so sadly many of the 13 pairs we found when we started have already disappeared.

There is a real danger that we will lose these iconic birds forever unless we can find out why they are disappearing, and take action to halt and reverse the decline. Remind yourself of what we might lose by listening to the Curlew's evocative and mournful song on <u>https://</u><u>www.british-birdsongs.uk/</u> <u>curlew/?type1585</u>

The Community Wildlife Group has been working with Shropshire Ornithological Society, carrying out research to find nests, put an electric fence around them to protect the eggs from predators, and then fix radio-tags to the chicks and track them to see how they use the landscape, and what happens to them. Not enough young birds fledge to replace the older birds dying off. We need to know why so we can do something about it.

This innovative research will continue in the Clee Hill area in 2021, with landowners' help. It is expensive, and we need to raise more funds to carry it out. An appeal has been sent to our members and supporters, and we would be very grateful for support from other Clarion readers too.

Curlews should be returning to the area at the end of the month, or early March. We will be asking Clarion readers to help with the survey, or send in Curlew records to help us to find all the pairs that come back.

CYRIL BREAKWELL


Cyril was a month short of his 96th birthday when he died on Boxing Day. A local lad, he was one of nine children and is survived only by younger brother Ron.




