



#### **EXPORTING EXPERTISE**

Anthony Eddies-Davies's Live the Adventure in Stottesdon has played a major role in developing the tourist industry of Bhutan, after his a kavaker and skills as leader expedition were recognised by the Bhutanese Royal Family. ### Star of the Small Ads - Tom Cartwright, Builder

35 years ago Tom Cartwright quit his dad's nursery business in Bewdley and moved to Cleobury Mortimer, where he set up business as a builder. "It was something I'd always enjoyed, where my skill lay," he explains. "Dad had an interest in engineering and a big workshop, where I learned to weld."

He and Mavis bought a cottage in Lower Street and set about restoration. "I owe a lot to Fred Burton, the undertaker, who encouraged me and taught me skills like using an adze." Tom was a quick learner and acquired a range of other skills that made him arguably the best local man in his trade, always in demand. You can see his expert touch in his cottage that has grown with the acquisition and restoration of the house next door, and the lovely cottage he built from scratch for John Cope when he retired from his butchery business.

Today he employs three men, Wayne, Andrew and Colin, all recruited from school and trained to be multi skilled. Their current project is a house dating in part back to the 17th century, that has been extended and made beautiful with great care. Tom proudly showed the old fittings uncovered and restored, the new staircase made in his workshop and the ancient bowed doorway with an oak door made to fit and complement its curving timbers.


All this done with modern methods and materials as the neglect of centuries was put right, to give a dry cellar, proper insulation and warmth without intruding on the beauty of the place. 'No visible wires' was the instruction to electrician Terry Henderson, and that's what he produced. "I've worked with Terry quite a long time," says Tom in tribute.

Talk to him about some of the damage he's put right and you realise why he's in demand. It seems that joists with no visible support at one end are quite a normal find when you're the builder call in to sort out the mess others may leave.

"I get told I ought to retire, but I enjoy what I'm doing and don't want to stop," he says. Is there anything he and his crew won't do? "Built up felt roofing - far too messy!" he laughs. The rest he can handle, in time, to the highest standard.

He's also very active behind the scenes with Cleobury Players and has ambitious plans to present R C Sherriff's classic First World War drama 'Journey's End' in 2014. He just needs 13 willing and able men to help. That sounds more demanding than building work.

#### Clerk to the Parish Council Matt Sheehan advises on road works coming shortly:

I need to inform you that I had a meeting with Western Power recently, about the work to instal a new cable down the High Street.

The original plan has changed and they are now putting the cable down the pavement on the South side, to just past the Post Office. They will start work on January 13th, with four-way lights at the crossroads and will work to keep disruption to a minimum. The project should take five weeks.

The North side of the High Street will have no parking, to allow traffic flow, and the conractors will also connect the new streetlight in the Tenbury Road, just before Tenbury Mead, and the new Childe Road toilets at the same time.

To work with the community, they said they will come to the Parish Council meeting on January 7th, 7.00pm in the Market Hall, to explain their efforts to limit disruption and answer any questions. A great gesture on their part.

#### WHOSE RESPONSIBILITY?

The Severn Trent River Trust held an open meeting at the Pioneer Centre at the end of November, to discuss the future care and development of local rivers, with the Rea and Arrow of particular interest.

The speakers were brief and described the largely voluntary work done to protect both wild life and countryside along the rivers, where water quality has improved in the last decade and work has done been to encourage some rare species to return to these local waters. There is cooperation between volunteers and the water

authority representatives, which was good to see.

Most of the landowners present seemed willing to accept their responsibilities riparian as owners with water frontages to maintain. Children have no real intentions of committing themselves to such responsibilities; however, it might be correct to say that they give themselves goals when trying to achieve a means to an end. I often joke with parents that children have a built in psychology degree when they are born. They always seem to know which buttons to press or how to play one parent off against another to ensure they can get what they want. Parenting skills are variable and will depend on parents' experiences from their own childhood, also from the culture in which they lived. Family values are passed down with individual's adaptations added or taken away which reflect their current environment and situations. Also in Talbot Square, which really has come up in the world and looks smart, Lowri at Edna Maes was celebrating the salon's first birthday.



#### FAITH IN THE MOSQUE?

Faith in the Pub is a well established group of men who profess the Christian faith and meet once a month to listen to a speaker and discuss their faith and its effects upon their everyday life. Early in December they took a big step beyond the normal amiable chat over a pint and visited a mosque at Tettenhall, i n Wolverhampton to see the Muslim faith in action and hear about its beliefs.

There is more than enough hysteria about Muslims in the general press and if you just take a quick peek at some of the Facebook output you'd think we were being attacked by the Devil himself. Time for a more considered look and to examine some facts.

There were about twelve in the party, met by our host Zahid Parvez and made to feel at home when he explained that it is customary to remove shoes before entering the mosque, not for any religious reason, but simply to keep the carpets clean. The building was once a GP's practice that has been adapted, with some of space used the as classrooms: it is а community building rather than just a place of worship.

We were allowed to enter the area where the men worshipped and to stand

and listen while а community leader led prayers. The atmosphere was more informal than you would see in our church, with some men arriving late to join in and then continue their prayers after the main assembly had finished. It is normal for practising Muslims to pray to Allah five times in a day, the first at daybreak and the last at around nightfall.

There were only men of all ages - at prayer in this room, no women. We asked Zahid about this later and he explained that a woman kneeling in prayer is seen as a distraction for a man, who should be concentrating only on prayer. At some mosques the sexes are in the same room for prayer, with the men on the ground floor and the women above them in a gallery. We were assured that there separation is no because women are treated as lesser beings.

We talked at length with Zahid, and whilst there are parallels in the basic beliefs of Christians, Jews and Muslims, they acknowledge the Virgin Birth but see Jesus Christ as a learned teacher to be revered, not as the Son of God.

Dinner was served by the community leaders, after we had all formally washed our hands. It was simple fare of vegetables, rice, chicken and a vegetarion alternative, with water the only drink until the after-dinner tea.

More questions came out, and the obvious area of difference was over Shariah Law, which we in the West often see as inhuman. Zahid explained the basic punishment for theft, where a hand will be amputated as punishment, but only if the guilty party is an adult, not impoverished or starving. We have moved on from the days when a man could be hung for stealing food to feed his family or himself, but the Muslim faith is very conservative and still observes the ancient law.

Not once was a question dismissed or ignored, Zahid and his fellows listening courteously and answering carefully. Muslims have lived in Great Britain for hundreds of years and the first purpose built mosque was erected in Woking, in Surrey, back in 1889. It is still there after 123 years.

The feeling in the mini-bus home was that a lot had been learned, our hosts had been very open, but there are some areas where we are never likely agree. to Nothing wrong with that, as great religions have learned over the centuries that we can live peacefully with other ideals. If only everyone who uses a faith as a weapon could see that. *JR*



## Meet Bill Longmore, the new Police and Crime Commissioner for the West Mercia area. He explains his plans and how you can see what he's doing and comment on what is being done to improve policing in our area.

I have recently been elected as West Mercia's first Crime Police and Commissioner, covering Herefordshire, Shropshire, Telford & Wrekin and I would like to take this Worcestershire. opportunity to introduce myself and explain how you can let me know your views on my proposals for policing and community safety.

The role of Police and Crime Commissioner is set out in the Police and Social Responsibility Act 2011. It is a new role but broadly I am responsible for securing the maintenance of the police force within West Mercia and ensuring that it is effective and responsibilities efficient. My include: holding the Chief Constable to account; developing and issuing a police and crime plan and publishing an annual report; setting the budget for policing and making community safety grants; obtaining the views of people and victims of crime within West Mercia about matters concerning policing; co-operating with criminal justice bodies, to ensure an efficient and effective criminal justice service, and with community safety partners, having regard to their priorities.

I do not intend to be a faceless man sitting in an office but out listening to the community.

I aim to provide a strong and powerful voice for the people of West Mercia and represent their views about how crime and disorder is prevented and its consequences are tackled. I want to develop a closer working relationship between the Commissioner's Office with the Police and with the general public. I am under no illusions as to the challenges I face in this new role. We are currently living in times of austerity where finance and resources are limited, and police budgets have been slashed by millions of pounds. I aim to ensure that what funding is available is used wisely to provide an effective and efficient police force within West Mercia and to prevent crime and disorder.

The Olympic Games in London was an example of what can be achieved by organisations dedication and the and motivation of individuals to inspire others to achieve greater things. I want to use my position to inspire others to be leaders in the community to prevent crime and disorder, and build a better and safer society for the people of West Mercia. I would particularly within leadership like to encourage communities to promote and provide activities for young people, which engage as many people as possible.

Over the next few months I will be writing my first Police and Crime Plan and would welcome feedback on my proposals before the plan is finalised. I will publish details on my website <u>www.westmercia-pcc.gov.uk</u> by January 7th and you will have until January 18th to submit responses. To keep costs down I intend where possible to consult electronically via my website or email but will of course post details to those not online.



## **The Farming Page - from Rachel Robinson**

Hello from Mawley Town Farm. This is our first article and we hope you find the information of interest. If there is anything you would like to know more about for future editions, please do get in touch.

Mawley Town is a mixed farm, with dairy, beef, arable and milk processing. Situated just a mile out on the Kidderminster side of town, we can be easily identified bv our new landmark - a 75kw wind turbine that provides 3/4 of our electricity. We take welfare animal and the environment very seriously, and try to balance the two in modern day farming. We feel very priviliged to be the generation second of Robinsons to be custodians of this historic farm, and hope it continues for generations to come to meet the demands of food and farming.

We are currently milking 220 predominantly cows. Holstein Friesians, because have a tremendous thev


natural capacity to produce milk. The Holstein derives from the Friesian cow but has been bred for its larger frame, better udders and docile temperament. Their laid back nature makes them nice cattle to work with and the majority of our herd are home-bred. We calve all year round; about 250 calves are born each year, and the calf shed is home to 40 calves at any one time. We keep all our bull calves, even the Holsteins and rear them maturity. About two to thirds of all the calves born will go for beef. All the Holstein heifer calves go out grass until they to are mature at the age of two when they themselves are due to calf. We use artificial insemination for the majority of breeding, but we also have a home bred bull Mawley Conquest, who is out at grass with 80 heifers. For beef we have 'Shortie' a Beef Shorthorn bull, as we only need a small proportion of dairy heifers born each year.

As we enter the new year, we can start to plant crops we didn't manage to get in in the autumn, now that the davs are stretching out. Hopefully they won't be in the ground very long before they start to shoot. We grow crops for the cattle, mostly wheat, barley, oats, peas, maize and grass. As I write this in December we have another day of rain falling on saturated ground. We only managed to plant a third of the crops in the autumn due to the wet, so we join all our colleagues across the country in the hope of a kind spring.

We have been processing milk in our small dairy for many years and provide a service to the community with a doorstep delivery. We also supply Carrot Tops, Spar, Talbot Store, the Post Office and Harry Tuffins in the town, along with a network independent of farm shops, tearooms, pubs and schools in south Shropshire north and Worcestershire





## **Clarion Coppers - With CSO Nick Morris**

Since last month's issue there have been very few relevant incidents to report, but we have our share of things like domestic incidents, assaults, fights, private disagreements, road traffic collisions, missing persons, concerns for safety, etc. On November 22nd just before 8:00pm we had a report of a laser beam being shone on a bungalow in Mortimer Gardens. I did an area search immediately but I didn't see any likely culprits. Between November 18th and 22nd the ground floor door of a barn conversion in Billingsley was forced and jewellery stolen. This is thought to be have been linked to a burglary in Cleobury North on November 23rd where jewellery was stolen after burglars entered through a ground floor toilet window. On November 25th tools were stolen from an unlocked garage in Milson. If you would like to obtain a 'Smartwater' property marking pack at a reduced rate, pop into the police station to leave your contact details. We are usually open every mid morning Monday to Saturday and at other odd times - do try the door even if it says 'closed' because you never know!! If I'm there I normally only lock it when I'm having my break.

In the West Mecia area as a whole, we deal with a considerable number of domestic abuse incidents. We encourage all victims of this crime to report it. We have leaflets in the police station with sound advice and useful contact numbers.

Now a word of warning on scams and other fraudulent activity. Criminals continue to develop clever ways of trying to get hold of your money and we must try to stop this. Official advice is if you have been a victim of

fraud, now or in the past, it is important that you report the matter. You can do this by visiting the U.K. National Fraud and Internet reporting centre- Action Fraud:-<u>www.actionfraud.police.uk</u> or telephone:- 0300 123 2040.

Drivers are continuing to receive fines and penalty points on their licences for parking on the zigzags in High Street without a valid reason. Many verbal warnings have been given to offenders. A frequent excuse given is, " I only went to the shop to get ..". Would those drivers accept the excuse a burglar they caught in their house might give, "I only stole a bit of jewellery - I needed the money because I'm short as I don't work"? All laws are for everybody.

Regarding antisocial behaviour, do not hesitate to phone 101 to report it. And if you see vehicles being driven dangerously, report what you see with vehicle details and if possible a description of the driver; we will speak to, and monitor the offender with a view to issuing a formal warning if the behaviour continues. Thanks to everyone who has reported anything to us -it is much appreciated. If the information keeps coming, we can get a bigger picture of what is happening and eventually bring offenders to justice.

Finally, we would like to wish you a very Happy New Year. Except criminals, who have no remorse for their crimes or compassion for their victims and who intend to be selfish and bring misery and unhappiness to people who have done them no wrong!



## January in the Wyre Forest - Linda Iles writes

Today is cold – one of those icy, sparkly, days which are ideal for walking. Stepping out into the forest, I am soon on a narrow track where my boots occasionally crunch through a crust of ice into water and I have to skip around the deeper puddles. I keep my eyes open for fallow deer through the bare oaks but see only pigeons, squirrels and boisterous jays in search of acorns.

The fallen leaves have lost bright their colours and intriguing shapes, having broken down to a dark brown mulch on its way to becoming soil. It seals in moisture and a little residual warmth so that roots and shoots can grow even under today's frost. Looking more closely at a rotting log I

can see that it is home to two kinds of delicate, vivid green mosses and resolve to learn more about these hardy little plants.

Warmed by the exercise, I complete the circle of my walk, crossing the fields and then stopping by the pond to watch for movement under the surface, which still has a thin layer of ice on the unlit side. Was that a water beetle that swam away at the extreme edge of my vision? Or maybe a water boatman? The water has cleared in the cold weather so that I can see right down to the dead leaves on the bottom, where I have no doubt there is plenty going on.

I am resolved to complete this project this year. Although some wildlife has enjoyed my pond since it was dug five years ago, I have never finished the edge or populated the shelves underwater with aquatic plants. As a result this little world is out of balance, and warmer weather brings algal blooms that obscure my views of its inhabitants and shade out other submerged vegetation that Ι try to establish. Now is the time to plan, and when the spring comes I can bring in my stone, gravel and plants with the hope

of making a thriving and beautiful haven for some of our freshwater-loving wild creatures.

The Discovery Centre ponds have had two years to settle down since the building work was completed. You may have seen the main pond with its dragonfly sculpture for yourself on a visit to the wildlife area sensory trail. and Unfortunately the pond water quality is suffering due to problems with the water treatment system, resulting in sensory experiences of a rather unpleasant and unforeseen kind! I hope the Forestry Commission's expertise get everything working properly and make the pong a thing of the past!

If you would like an opportunity to help our wildlife in the forest this month, Butterfly Conservation have a volunteer work party on Wednesday 16th January, meeting at Dry Mill Lane car park, Bewdley (grid reference SO773764) for 10 am before driving to an area where butterfly habitat is being improved. ## **Game Night at Cleobury Golf Club**

It was the first time I'd been to the Game Night, something that's becoming a tradition and a real favøurite with the carnivores. It's chef Phil Waring's chance to let his imagination run loose with traditional game meats.

A bonus was sharing a table with Iain Juckes of Juckes Wines in Ombersley, who is a member of the club and their wine supplier. We joined two lovely local ladies, Eve and Hilda, who had been to the last event and knew what was coming.

Iain spoke briefly about the wines he'd chosen to serve with the five courses and was handing it out by the glass as guests headed for their tables. Sorry, but as I was driving I kept off the alcohol and have nothing to say about that aspect. But we do buy mixed cases of wine from Juckes and it's the best value by far we've found amongst some of the big names.

The first dish was Phil's Cleobury Fried Pheasant, legs and breasts of that bird in a Southern Fried coating with a winter coleslaw, chilli dip and a small jenga tower of chunky chips. Not a happy combination for me, the coating detracting from a meat flavour that needs no boost in the manner of commercial chicken.

Venison was next, a long established English favourite

that was cleverly combined with chocolate to season it. It came with parsnips, a puree and a crunchy touch of chips, all topped off by a redcurrant Yorkshire pud. A glass or two of one of Mr Juckes' fine reds would have made this one even better, but it was quite a treat on its own. My equal favourite of the four meats.

Iain chatted amiably about life as a wine merchant who specialises in the catering trade and has customers as far away as Northampton. "If you'd asked me what I dreamed of doing when I started in this trade at the age of 16, I could never have dreamed I'd go white water rafting and riding with the gouchos in Argentina," he told us. He's seen most of the wine world, including Australia, and obviously enjoyed it. Lucky man? Yes, but much of his travelling has been at his own company's expense; it's not all been jollies at someone else's expense.

The third dish was rabbit, that most basic of traditional country meats that has kept many families well fed. Phil served this as a pie,with the meat stripped off the bone to make it more accessible, and served up with a subtle mustard mash and succulent baby carrots. My other joint favourite of the evening, it stopped conversation as we all savoured its flavour.

Duck was the final meat, served with cherry sauce, roasted beetroot, leeks and fondant potato. An imaginative mixture again, but I found the meat too tough make the to combination work really well. You have to get duck absolutely right to do it justice and for me that didn't happen.

Have I been spoiled by an exquisite Peking Duck in a noted restaurant in Beijing? Am I unreasonable to expect the same here in rural Shropshire? Maybe so, and I do not want to take anything away from an evening I went to out of curiosity and came away thinking what a great idea it was. Maybe I'll avoid duck in future.

The evening rounded off with a dessert of baked figs in caramel and balsamic vnegar with Italian ricotta cheese on the side and a dash of toasted almonds, another warming dish to send us off into the night chill feeling very well fed.

Congratulations to Phil for the big amount of work he put into this and to the club for being brave and showing those who listen that they have a good talent in their kitchen that any visitor - not just club members - can taste and enjoy. It's too easy to overlook how good the club can be as a place to eat out on that special occasion.



## **IN BUSINESS: The Pioneer Centre**

It's probably Cleobury Mortimer's best kept secret. A conference and recreational facility with room for 310 guests and not visible from any main route. The Pioneer Centre draws about 18,000 visitors a year and hardly makes a ripple in the life of the town.

It's tucked away on the lane from Six Ashes that passes in front of Mawley Town Farm, a 25 acre site that was established as a National Camp in the 1930s. It passed through many hands before the Northamptonshire Association of Youth Clubs took over in 1991 and employed Ryland Robertshaw to revive its fortunes.

Today it's headed by Tim Stone and employs up to 60 people according to the season and demand, 30 of them full time and salaried. He says that almost all of the 25 acres is in use now, with a range of facilities that keeps on growing.

Most of the accommodation from the 30s is still there. Some of the huts are used to house staff and volunteers, while others have been converted to provide all-weather fun, like the indoor caving centre and the two archery ranges. They complement the outdoor climbing and abseiling towers, the challenging high ropes courses; there are more than we have room to list here.

The raft building ponds, dug last year, gave birth to a rare facility. The earth from those excavations has been used to build a new tower, with a long, sloping climb to the top. Up there is a shelter and the steel structure that allows wheel chair users to rope up and abseil down a steep ramp. "They couldn't join in before, but just had to sit and watch," explains Tim. "Now they can join in and experience the thrill."

The place has grown from its humble beginnings to offer a flexible range of accommodation and teaching and conference facilities that draws users from all over the country and caters for a wide range of dietary needs and different faiths. When you read this, the Jewish Lads and Girls Brigade will have stayed for a holiday, the in-house catering able to cater for their kosher food requirements. And they have also welcomed parties of Sikhs and Muslims, again able to provide for the specific needs of separate beliefs.

Guests stay in modern wooden buildings, four people to a room, with ensuite facilities. Those units blend with slightly larger rooms that have wider doors special provision and for wheelchair users. 310 young people staying on one site, with en suite provision including wet rooms and decent drying facilities, is a service very hard to find. The quality of the

buildings is clear when Tim explains that they are up to ten years old, but have had regular cleaning as their maintenance, not refurbishment. All guest accommodation is less than ten years old.

Backing up the sleeping accommodation is a range of recreation and meeting rooms from the 300-seater conference hall via 200 and 100 seater small halls down to rooms for a few dozen. Tim emphasises that the charges include all this extra provision, with no hidden extras to add to the bill; in times of tightened budgets, that honest approach wins friends. In his words: "We do try to avoid hidden costs - the price is the price."

They welcome a lot of school parties, who find the security of everything provided on one site fits in with the need to know where the children are at all times. The play and sports facilities can be used to keep the children occupied throughout the day, and the trained staff much prefer to be busy using their skills - and improving their own standards - than looking for other ways of filling their day.

An essential part of the Centre's operation is its ability to train young people become to qualified and able to progress in their profession. "We have an Activities Team who want to do what they're trained for," says Tim. "Most of the staff are under 25 and enjoy working with people and being flexible. They're pressured, but it's never an unpleasant pressure."
