People welcomed their arrival, glad to have a proper butcher's shop on the main street again, and the place always looked busy. But we understand that the staff were told on Wednesday that the place would close on Saturday.

The reason for the closure given to several local people was the problem recruiting a fully trained butcher. You do have to wonder that such an established and reputable firm would have that problem, but a conversation with Clare and Clive Gittins at Heath Farm Meats confirms that is the case.

It seems that the craft of real butchering is hard to find, the move towards supermarkets making the different cutting to suit pre-pack presentation is now the norm.

Bowketts' products are still available on the main street at Carrot Tops. Of course the excellent Heath Farm Meats are still going strong, with the next generation of the family now on the payroll.

The big news for CMMS is that their application to be registered as a charity has been accepted. Cleobury Mortimer Men's Shed is the title of Registered Charity Number 1178085. As chairman Pete Blackburn put it: "A critical milestone achieved."

Latest news is the purchase and siting of a mobile home unit at the Tenbury Road site. This will be the base for the building of the real shed when all the official consents, plans, finance and materials are settled. Somewhere to work, take shelter when the weather's bad and just sit and make a cup of tea.



It was bought from Ditton Mill site and is in a very sound state, a credit to its occupants and the site management. There had been others offered in the past, inspected and rejected. One of the first matters to establish is the power supply for those cuppas.

The lease for the site at Newhouse Farm is under discussion and as the project steadily grows, the matter of funding the building becomes more urgent. Expect appeals for sponsorship and grants to be landing in postboxes very soon. It's impressive the progress that can be made when you have a group of enthusiastic people who can work together.

THE FOOTPATH ASSOCIATION

Good news for local walkers:

For a number of years, walkers have been confused as to their right to walk the driveway accessing The Glen Caravan Park. A public inquiry was held in April and the Planning Inspector has confirmed (subject to appeal) the legal order brought by Shropshire Council for the surfaced driveway from Catherton Road to become a public footpath to where it meets the footpath Workhouse Bank.

Please respect the residents' privacy when walking through the caravan park by staying on the public footpaths. Excessive dog fouling has been reported along the drive, so please keep your dogs on a lead and clear up after them

The Planning Inspector also confirmed the legal order to extend this path to the bridge before Cleanly Seat. However, the original path line was obstructed some years ago and is subject to negotiation between Shropshire Council and the Caravan Park

Summer clearance work is the priority for our work parties and in June, we cleared "Jacob's Ladder". Disappointingly, no

local users of the path turned out to help. It took six of us an hour to clear it, but it should now remain usable through the summer. We also did quite a lot of clearance in Neen Sollars, It's a pity that we have been unable to find a Neen Sollars resident who is prepared to help keep their footpaths clear. There is no guarantee we will always be able to do it and without our efforts each year, many of those paths would be very quickly lost.

The next Parish Walk is on Sunday July 1st when we will be walking a circuit that includes the Golf Course. Meet outside St Mary's Church at 10.00.

SILENT SOLDIERS

Councillor Paul French explains the purpose of these figures:

Cleobury Mortimer WW1 Group has purchased three Silent Soldiers to ensure there is a tangible reminder during the latter half of the anniversary of Armistice (1918) of the service given by so many.

The group is composed of Town Council and British Legion members and the soldiers are the latest step in marking this important year that the group has initiated. The Council funded two and the Legion one.

The term "Silent Soldiers" references those who did not return but also picks up accounts of those who saw soldiers returning, alone or in groups. Often it was noted that they were very quiet, perhaps only concerned with making it to those waiting for them.

Travel was provided but not door to door, so "returnees" were a common feature on roads and bridleways. Two of the Soldiers will take their places on the main route in and out of town. The third will move around during the year, so keep looking.



Heart disease in dogs

Heart disease (congestive heart failure) is a common cause of coughing in older dogs. It is the inability for the heart to provide adequate circulation of blood to meet the body's needs. Occasionally it is seen in younger dogs because of a congenital disease present at birth. There are two main causes in older dogs. In smaller dogs, it is usually caused by changes to the valves separating two of the heart chambers (mitral valve disease). The valves separating the chambers no longer work to form a tight seal, and blood can flow backwards into the heart. In bigger dogs it is usually caused by the heart muscle becoming weak and thinner. The heart fails to pump efficiently, circulation is reduced, and the heart becomes enlarged.

Other signs that can be seen with heart failure are intolerance to exercise, difficulty breathing or an increased rate of breathing, weight loss, loss of appetite, increase in abdominal size (due to fluid build-up), and occasionally fainting.

Examination by a vet can give clues as to heart disease being the cause of the signs, such as a heart murmur being heard, an abnormal heart rate, or crackles (fluid) heard on the lungs. It is important not to worry though, a dog with just a heart murmur detected is not necessarily in heart failure, it may remain unaffected for many years.

Further tests can be performed to confirm that heart disease is the cause of the signs. These may include taking an x-ray of the chest to assess heart size and shape, and to see if there is excess fluid build-up in the lungs. An ultrasound scan of the heart can also be done to assess the internal structures, including the valves and size of the chambers, as well as thickness of the heart muscle walls and strength of contractions. Occasionally an ECG is done to assess heart rate and rhythm abnormalities.

Large and giant breed dogs are predisposed to a disease called occult dilated cardiomyopathy. This is where the heart dilates slowly, but the clinical symptoms are negligible in the early stages. As the disease progresses the dog is at risk of having sudden heart failure. Ultrasound is increasingly being used to assess healthy large dogs annually to catch the disease in the early stages as it has been shown in this specific instance early treatment (before clinical signs sometimes) can greatly extend quality of life.

Medication can be very successful in controlling the clinical signs of heart disease, helping the heart to work, removing fluid from the lungs and slowing down progression of the disease. Diuretics are often used to remove excess fluid from the lungs or abdomen. Medicines are used to increase the strength of the contraction of heart muscle, increasing the amount of blood pumped. They are also used to widen the blood vessels, reducing the work the heart has to do and help to pump blood around the body. Studies have shown these medicines improve quality and longevity of life of dogs with heart disease.

MARY EVANS

The passing of Mary Evans of Curdale Farm on May 24th at the age of 91 saw the end of a life that had witnessed immense change in the area. She was the matriarch of one of the most prominent local farming families.

Born at Burcott Farm near Bridgnorth in 1926, she moved on to Baveney, where it was a three mile walk to school every day. In 1941 the family moved to Stottesdon, where Mary would help with milking the cows before catching the bus to Bridgnorth Grammar School. The farming habit of working hard was ingrained early.

She trained as a nurse, firstly at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham, moving on to Coventry and then Manchester as a midwife before settling at Wolverhampton. On a weekend visit home in 1951 she met Richard Evans at a whist drive and after a whirlwind courtship they were married in April 1951.

They had seven children: Jane, Susan, John, Michael, Robert, Stephen and Clive, who recall how precisely Mary could slice a cake to give seven equal shares. When she saw the first swallow of spring arrive, the door of the cellar was opened to allow the

birds to nest. And when the apple trees began to shed their crop, she insisted the children eat the windfalls to prevent waste.

She was a keen gardener, with a large plot to maintain. In her later years, her 79th birthday present was a new rotavator to make the job less demanding. In her kitchen you could find ducklings in boxes. or new born lambs warming by the Rayburn before Mary bottle fed them.

When Richard died in 1992 she naturally led the family, working late at harvest time and feeding those who'd come in from the fields. She was later persuaded to take holidays abroad and enjoyed discovering France, Spain and Canada. She was a regular church goer and an inveterate fan of Scrabble, playing her last game just two days before the end.

Her final weeks saw her gently cared for at home by a Diamond Life team, amongst whom Wendy in particular earned high praise from the family. She was then moved from Curdale to Kinlet and the nursing home, where life slipped away

A very special lady, quiet and modest in her manner, leaves a large gap in this community. The sympathies of all who knew her will go out to the family. My thanks to Stephen Evans for allowing use of his eulogy to provide the background for this obituary. JR.


A bottle tombola tempted a little investment, with no more success than the last attempt. Is someone telling me something?

Following an announcement by the Department for Health before Easter of a huge commitment to improve acute healthcare in Shropshire – at £312m the largest capital investment in healthcare in the county ever – the formal consultation into Future Fit is well underway. The public are able to have their say on how acute healthcare should be delivered in the county for years to come.

Shropshire and Telford CCGs and Shrewsbury and Telford Hospital NHS Trust have organised a number of drop in events where the public can learn more about the two options on the table, so they can input their views.

There are two such events in South Shropshire this month, on 4th July at the Bishop Mascall Centre in Ludlow, 3.30pm-7.30pm, and Bridgnorth Leisure Centre on 25th July, 3.30pm-7.30pm – as well as smaller pop-up sessions. So it is worth checking the Future Fit website https://nhsfuturefit.org to find out when your nearest event may be. The website also contains a great deal of information about the Future Fit process as a whole, so I encourage readers to take a look.

I was extremely concerned to hear last month reports of activists, purporting to be NHS campaigners, seeking to undermine the consultation process by disrupting public events and intimidating people who turn up to learn more. I condemn unequivocally attempts to intimidate those who seek to engage in the public consultation process, whether online or at public events. SaTH reviewed their security procedures, so I hope future events will not be interrupted. It appears some are also overtly

using the consultation process for political purposes. It has been disheartening but not surprising to see some whose politics mean they cannot bring themselves to welcome this huge sum of funding. But some have even gone further, criticising NHS staff.

This cannot stand unchallenged, as NHS staff and clinicians have put years of work into the Future Fit process - it has been clinician led from the start. Clinicians' motives are clearly what is best for patients – they would not recommend a course of action that would jeopardise patient safety. SaTH also had to take the remarkable step of making a public announcement to counter misleading reports of staff comments.

So I am keen to encourage readers from across South Shropshire to have a rational look at what is proposed, to read the informative consultation documents for themselves.

My own view is that Option 1, with major trauma treated at Shrewsbury, and planned care focussed at Telford, is the best way to cover the whole population of Shropshire for the future, as well as those from mid-Wales who rely on these services. It is the option supported by clinicians.

But there are local residents who will have genuine grounds to support the other option, which would see trauma at Telford and planned care at Shrewsbury. So it is important to contribute to the consultation. This will help to ensure the final decision considers the views of South Shropshire residents.

THE BENEFITS OF MASSAGE

The long awaited Public Enquiry into the Diamond operation was finally held on 21st June. Madge Shineton and I attended, as well as two representatives from Shropshire Council, the room being packed, with standing room only. The Chairman opened by saying that it was not proper for the public to speak while the meeting was in session but he would speak to individuals during breaks (which we both took advantage of). Two Diamond Directors were in attendance but most of the talking was done by their legal representative who was very sharp and had obviously studied the case in depth. The DVSA produced details of a survey which indicated that Diamond's average failure to run on time was 21% compared with a legal target of 5%. After detailed explanations were given prior to the meeting, this was reduced to 11% overall. Interestingly, the rate for services from the Kiddy depot was 15%. Much time (over an hour!) was then taken up with the reasons for individual services being late or not running which will be considered by the Commissioner when he makes his decision.

Discussion then moved to maintenance. DVSA do spot checks on vehicles and of 166 Diamond buses examined, 37 or 22% were issued with prohibitions and removed from service until repaired. These mostly involved fuel and oil leaks and loose wheels The Commissioner noted that Diamond servicing records indicated that more problems showed up during their annual pre MoT check than at other times. Was this because other checks were not thorough enough? No, replied Diamond. This was because the pre MoT check included cosmetic items not otherwise covered. Explanations were also given for the other cases although the Commissioner did not appear totally convinced. He expressed concern about the level of fuel and oil leaks but was told these tended to be worse on older vehicles.

He then turned to the incidence of vehicle fires. Why so many? Diamond's reply was that this was not unusual as even National Express buses had suffered two instances recently. (This may be the

case but how many buses have they got?). I spoke to one of the Shropshire Council staff and he said they deal with 26 bus companies and can't recall a single fire on any of their vehicles so draw your own conclusions... Diamond's explanation was that the first two fires were caused by the same fault (an overheating alternator) so they had changed these on all vehicles of that type. The Far Forest fire was the same type of vehicle but the cause could not be established as there was nothing left to examine!. The Bloxwich episode was a different type of vehicle and caused by an electrical problem. They claimed that these incidents could happen to anyone but the Commissioner looked a little skeptical although he said nothing.

The Diamond representative then gave a long and detailed closing speech in which he accepted that things were not perfect but that the company was working hard to improve. Since taking over the Kiddy depot in 2013, they had reduced the average age of the buses from 14 to 8.2 years and were planning to introduce even newer vehicles. In addition, all the newer vehicles from the companies they had taken over had been allocated to the Kiddy depot. He also said that the 95% 'on time' target was unfair in the light of increasing congestion and should be reviewed (clearly believing that attack is the best form of defence...) He finished by saying that although the Commissioner had the power to revoke the company's licence, this would mean no buses as no-one else would take on the routes.

The Commissioner then summed up, saying that similar things had been said at the last Public Enquiry in 2016. He had heard the arguments put forward but never in his 8 years as a Commissioner had he received so many complaints about a single company or had such a high attendance at an Enquiry. He stated that he would consider all the points made to him and would publish his decision within 28 days. All in all, this had taken over 4 hours with just a 10 minute comfort break but it must have been fairly interesting as I stayed awake throughout. *ST*

July in the Wyre Forest

Charming photograph by Rosemary Winnall. This will be the first year since we moved to Uncllys 14 years ago that there will be no House Martins or Swallows nesting here. I've done my best: there's a dustbin lid full of damp mud for their nest-building and the old nesting sites are still there. A few individuals have visited on sunny days, raising my hopes and lifting my spirits as they swoop around the barn and house. The Martins like the gable ends of the house, and have even inspected the remains of old nests there, but nothing has come of it. In the past Swallows have nested in the barn roof and the eaves of the Studio, preferring a more open aspect (as the estate agents might put it).

I wonder what's going on? 'Springwatch' and various websites have mentioned that these migrants have had a peculiar and sporadic arrival this year most probably caused by the long winter and storms. I hope

they are making up for lost time somewhere. I miss their busy comings and goings and the little faces of the nestlings looking out for their parents' returns with beaks full of flies. Did I say, 'Beaks full of flies'? That may be the answer to the mysterious absence of the swallow family, as insects just don't seem to be around in large numbers any more. When you come back from a car journey is the front of the car covered in squashed flies?

That would have been normal 30 years ago. I suspect this has something to do with the widespread use of insecticides in our gardens and, even more so, in the wider countryside. I see that Chris Packham has been talking to the media about an 'ecological apocalypse' creeping up on us in Britain. One of the trends he mentions is the decrease in insects such as moths and crane flies which come in at night through open windows in his home in the New Forest. I've noticed the same thing - something must surely be wrong if there are hardly any crane flies in the middle of a National Nature Reserve (and our children don't know what a 'Daddy long legs' is!).

However, I have heard a cuckoo several times this year (perhaps the same one each time), so the 'Silent Spring' isn't quite upon us yet. And there is always hope that something can be done to reverse the evident declines in nearly all of our wildlife: look at the Pearl Bordered Fritillary butterfly which is increasing in numbers thanks to positive efforts to increase its habitat along forest rides. The Red Kite too is being seen more and more in this locality, continuing its spread through England thanks to reintroductions from the small population in Wales which survived the persecution of less enlightened times.

A WORLD WAR TWO HERO

It was quite a surprise when Geoff Barratt opened a mysterious padded envelope to discover a letter from the French Ambassador to England and a very special medal.

The letter explained that he was one of the men chosen to be made a Chevalier of France's most prestigious military honour in gratitude for their bravery in freeing France from the grip of German invaders. The Legion was established by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1802.

He's modestly proud of the award, but doesn't talk of the dangers he faced, even though his memory and a notebook can up his service. when volunteered Ι was seventeen and a half, and hoped I'd get a posting near home like one of the local lads," he recalls. "But they sent me to Aberdeen instead!"

Eight weeks basic training completed, he was transferred to Catterick Camp, where he trained as a tank driver on a Churchill model, before moving on to Pickering as one of a squad of 30 men. That was enough to form a strike force with five man crews to their fleet of six, part of the Royal Armoured Corps.

They were moved on to Yeadon Airport, where they were issued with new Valentine tanks. It was an irony that Geoff's squad had a Valentine built in Croydon, while the next one along came from Smethwick - where he was born.

The squad were part of the invasion force on D-Day, landing on either Sword or King's Beach, but in the confusion Geoff could not be certain. He did know their target, the port of Caen.

"Caerne was a military hub," explains Geoff. "I only learned recently that my son's father-in-law was out in the English Channel with the Royal Navy, firing shells into Caen!"

The Allied forces advanced and Geoff saw Rouen and Rheims on his drive eastwards. Then their tank either went over a mine or was hit by an explosive shell lost a track. and replacements were available in the urgent push and he found himself transferred to the Royal Army Service Corps. He was finally discharged at Dortmund in Germany in 1947. "Never got a scratch, never fired a bullet in anger," he says with a grin.

Years later he was asked what was the worst part of his service? "In 1982, when I went back to the cemeteries over there and thought of all those lads we lost." He was a tough survivor, but never lost decent human feelings.

His award of the Legion d'Honneur was celebrated by his fellow residents of Doddington Heights on June 22nd, when a lunch in his honour was held in the Village Hall. How right that such service should be recognised.





The Battle of Hamel 1918

The Germans launched the Spring Offensive in late March and pushed the Allies back until they were checked early in April. The Allies then started a series of small scale advances which proved successful. It was decided that a vital objective was Le Hamel on the Somme. There were two main reasons: the Germans had forced a bulge in the front line exposing the Allies to fire from both sides and observation of their rear areas, secondly high ground in the village allowed the Germans this observation. If the village was taken the Allies would be clear to advance and take Amiens, which was key to further advance.

This battle saw many innovative aspects of war on the Western Front which were largely due to the commander Lieutenant General John Monash, Australian Army. Le Hamel was the first battle fought by the Australian Corps in which an Australian general was in command. Monash had been an engineer in civilian life which is probably why he was able to take on board technical innovation and use it to have a real effect on battlefield mobility which had been lost for nearly four years.

Every aspect was planned down to the last detail to ensure that all sections were used as a cohesive whole. Tanks and infantry, artillery, aircraft and signals all worked together. Aspects of Monash's plan had been used before but never all of them at the same time. Le Hamel was a small operation but came to be recognised as a pivotal point in the application of resource during the Great War.

A casual observer would have been surprised at the high number of tanks involved in the action; they supported the infantry and overcame machine gun nests and strong points. At one point it was reported that when the advance was slowed by machine gun fire from both sides an Australian sergeant noticed a tank apparently with time on its hands. Here the account gets very surreal... there were no field phones in a tank so there was no one to one contact and the tank crew had restricted vision. The sergeant went over to it and pulled the bell handle at the back", once the

door was opened the crew were alerted and the machine gun post was dealt with.

For the first time on a battlefield tanks were also used to bring up supplies behind advancing infantry. As we have noted before this was usually done by support battalions and some units used this method during the battle.

The Colonel of the 13th Battalion on reaching the position where the forward dump was to be established was surprised to find a large quantity of stores already there. He asked a soldier to explain and was rewarded with the information that "Our tank bought it up, sir.". One tank in a number of trips had delivered a wide range of supplies ranging from barbed wire to ammunition and grenades.

It was recorded that "Never had supplies reached the front with the swiftness with which they were delivered that day." One Battalion Commander remarked "In this achievement lay the outstanding lesson of the battle."

Planes were also used as never before, twelve carrying ammunition dropped loads by parachute, in total some 111000 rounds of ammunition. During this operation support was provided by British planes engaging German ground forces. The battle also saw spotter planes marking the rate of enemy advance, sending messages by rocket (not a major success) increased use of radio and utilisation of carrier pigeons. Under three hours after the attack started signallers had phone lines through to the front.

Hamel is often referred to as "The text book victory." Within two hours all objectives were met and 1400 German prisoners taken. This was in most part due to Monash, his very precise planning and confidence to use combinations of different resources in ways never previously considered. We can only conjecture upon this and wonder if things would have been different earlier had similar application been applied to battles.

Monash was not typical material for a battlefield commander but he seems to have worked some sort of magic at Hamel.

CLEOBURY'S SWIFTS

Kit Smith reports on our high flying summer residents:

It had not been a good start to this year's swifts in Cleobury. We might have expected over twenty birds to arrive from Africa on the first of May. Due to storms, wind, rain and hail over Africa and France, only seven swifts had arrived with us by May 8th. However, these resilient and adaptive birds have redeemed themselves and although late, twenty two were counted in the sky by mid June.

It will continue to be a difficult year for them, because by arriving late they may well have to remain with us until mid August to rear their fledglings and feed up before returning to Africa. Let us hope the weather is good with sufficient food of high flying insects.

They are using some of their old nesting sites but also using new ones in the Market Hall eaves. So far newly matured swifts have not used the eight swift boxes the Youth Group put up on the church, although they have shown some interest in them.

There will be a Swift Watch meeting in the Market Hall on Friday 27th July. All welcome. We will attempt to count them in the air and to assess how good or bad a season they will have had. We can also look at how our Swallows and House Martins numbers are holding up. They also were late in arrival, and probably will only manage one or perhaps two broods instead of the more usual two or three.

THE BREAKFAST CLUB

The Breakfast Club met at the Cleobury Café on June 12th to hear Jill Sharp talk about work as a physiotherapist, something which quite a few club members have experienced in person.

At Kidderminster Hospital, she became aware of some of the medical problems people face, which her gave the determination to help them. A Levels at night school opened to the way a degree in Physiotherapy from Wolverhampton University. She then worked for the NHS for 35 years. Now she provides a physiotherapy service Cleobury's High Street.

She provides an in-depth assessment patients' of problems, which enables her to identify appropriate treatment. addition to standard manipulative and massage treatments, Jill's extra qualifications allow her to offer acupuncture and the Emmett technique. We often assume that physio is only useful for musculo and skeletal problems; actually has a wider application, encompassing things like respiratory problems, and post-operative recovery. The most common problems she has to tackle are associated with the lower back, and tendinitis in various parts of the body.

In the UK, generally people are not mindful enough of the needs of their bodies, whereas in countries like Sweden, people take greater care. Jill outlined a few things we should keep in mind, particularly as we age, for age both reduces our abilities and also slows down our recovery. We should try to

maintain good posture. We need good core muscles – lower abdomen, front and back – to create a sturdy foundation for the rest of the body. Good sound sleep is a help, and we should avoid unbalanced loads (don't always carry a heavy bag on the same shoulder), and repetitive activity for too long. Tight clothing can create problems for the muscles and tendons.

Jill gave us a good overview of her work, while encouraging us to look after our bodies in such a way that we will be less likely to end up as her patients. Her underlying philosophy of wanting to help people lead better lives came through clearly.

STOTTESDON W.I.

On midsummer day I sat in a wild flower meadow bordering Cramer Gutter amongst Common Spotted Orchids. It is a delight to enjoy these flowers, now far from 'common', in their natural surroundings, and it is to this end that our speaker, Dr Wison Wall, devotes his energies. A director of Bewdley Orchids he is a leading light in the propagation of almost every species of our native varieties, collecting seed and germinating each plant in ideal conditions with symbiotic fungi, over a period of several years. Many of the resulting specimens are returned to a natural environment, Dr Wall's ultimate goal being the recreation of our disappearing wild flower habitats.

He campaigns against picking the flowers (thus preventing their seed pollination by night flying moths) and uprooting orchids. which kills damaging deep root systems: these illegal practices are in large part responsible for the current decline of the species. an erudite was fascinating talk; a visit to the Bewdley Orchids website will provide more information and a catalogue of his plants for sale, to help us all create our own small patch of wild flower meadow.

ON CATHERTON

A lot of people just see Catherton Common Nature Reserve as a wasteland grazed by sheep. In fact the most valuable parts for wildlife are its wetland areas here and there across the site. Wherever there is a spring, a stream or an old bell pit you can find water. Where that water flows onto a flatter area or soils with impeded drainage wet flushes, marshy grassland and bogs develop.

I was exploring the wet flush between Upper Marshes and Cramer Gutter, following work we have done over the last few years to remove trees and scrub that were starting to strangle the wet flush. Now is a special time to see some of the amazing insects that populate this habitat.

In particular Small Pearl Bordered Fritillary butterfly (a bright orange one) and Keeled skimmer dragonfly (powder blue abdomen). Both insects are very rare with Catherton being the only site in the West Midlands for Keeled Skimmer. Clive Dean



Welcome to the Town Council's first monthly report of what is happening in and around our parish. We are lucky to have our volunteer councillors that give up their time and efforts to do their best for our community, making sure it is looked after. In these days of cuts and issues with Shropshire Council, more developments and new challenges, we have to work ever harder to keep services.

We recently gained Quality status for our work with the community, only the second council in Shropshire to get this, engaging with and supporting all community groups to keep us moving forward in very challenging times.

We have many community led groups and projects to ensure it is what you want and one such group is the Crime Reduction Group, supported by the Town Council and Police.

One current project is the CCTV installation, which is now in place and gradually coming on line, to add retrospective assistance to Police and Insurance companies, which was prompted due to the closing of the Police station and lack of Police presence and issues we were having to put up with. The system was funded through Grant application with the bulk coming from the Police and Crime Commissioner's Office, so we can now look to deter Crime as much as solve it, as the Smartwater initiative was also taken on to do.

This month we have helped with one serious assault, three reports of anti-social behaviour, one insurance incident, theft from vehicles and we will be giving regular updates how it is helping our community and any outcomes I am made aware of. We have also received a thank you from the Police recently for the information obtained, praising our system to help solve crimes, as well as thanks from the public.

Another initiative from the Crime Group are the traffic calming gates as you enter Cleobury, to try and reduce the speed of vehicles entering the town, which has had success in other towns. Parking and disabled parking is another current item being looked at.

We have many voluntary community groups that we work with: for re vamping the play area, adult gym equipment, BMX track, dog training area, WW1 group (notice the new WW1 benches), festival group and the combined sports group with football, rugby and cricket clubs coming together to help improve our facilities. Please contact the Town Clerk if you would like to help any of these.

The groups come up with ideas, ways to fund and then ask for the Town Council's support, so it is what the community want. With Shropshire Council and the cutbacks putting more on local councils and especially Cleobury being at the bottom of the County, we continue to fight for services that we already pay for.

We are very interactive within the community either through our Website, which is full of information, or our very popular Facebook page, where we keep everyone up to date.

Our Council meetings are usually on the first Monday of the month, 7.00pm at Cleobury Country Centre, to look at issues and challenges which are listed on our Agenda, after which the agreed minutes are posted on our website, which helps keep you up to date. *Matt Sheehan*
