#### TAI CHI CLASSES

#### **Alison Wall explains:**

If you've ever seen people practicing Tai Chi in the park, you'll know it's a calm and graceful form of exercise. If you've ever tried it, you'll know how enjoyable and relaxing it is to move slowly, allowing your body to become gradually more flexible and your mind calmer.



The lady herself. Alison will be leading the classes at the Parish Hall from June 30th Tai chi originated in China centuries ago and is now practised around the world. There are many different types, but all involve slow flowing movements, deep

breathing and calming the mind. Its roots are in Chi Gung, a much older – and easier to learn - Chinese exercise practice designed to promote health and wellbeing. Fast forward to present times, and according to the NHS: 'While there's scope for more rigorous research on Tai Chi's health benefits, studies have shown that it can help people aged 65 and over to reduce stress, improve posture, balance and general mobility and increase muscle strength in the legs."

The simplifed Tai Chi I teach is called Tai Chi Movements for Wellbeing, which was devised by an NHS clinician and a Tai Chi specialist based in Herefordshire. The simple moves are designed to promote relaxation, flexibility, better balance and coordination. Many people comment that they sleep better after a session of tai chi, and feel more relaxed and less stressed.

My classes are for people of all ages who are new to exercise and those looking for a gentle form of exercise. The moves can be practised standing up or sitting down. I am launching a new weekly one-hour class at Cleobury Mortimer Parish Hall, starting Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> June, from 10am to 11am. There is no need to book, so feel free to come along to try the class out.

#### A TRULY LOCAL BUS SERVICE?

A new charity based in Tenbury Wells is looking into the possibility of a weekly run through the area with a 16 seater minibus. John Driver (good name for a bus driver, you must admit) is the chairman at Teme Wheels and would like to hear from anyone who would use such a facility.

The initial idea is a bus starting out from Great Witley and driving through Bayton to Cleobury, then on to Tenbury Wells before progressing through Little Hereford and Brimfield to Ludlow. The return journey would be timed to allow for shopping and the bus would have wheelchair carrying capacity.

All this would be on a nonprofit basis, with fares kept as low as possible. What John wants to establish at this early stage is how many people will possibly use the service. Not every week, but on a reasonably regular basis that will cover the cost of running the bus. #### COAST 2 COAST CYCLE RIDE

After having their London to Paris Charity Ride cancelled for the second year running, the Cleobury Cranks; Dom Allen, Adam Tillsley, Mark Harbourn & Guy Turpin (ably supported by Paul 'Finch' Southall) are tackling the 'Coast-to-Coast' cycle route, but with a twist.

They have chosen a route which will include two of the country's toughest climbs. If the Hardknott Pass is the King of Climbs, then the Wrynose Pass is every bit the Queen, with some sections comfortably exceeding some lung busting and leg fatiguing 33% inclines.

Starting on July 15<sup>th</sup>, the 170 mile route takes in three of our National Parks, kicking off on the west coast at Ravenglass in Cumbria, climbing over the southern section of the Lake District, through the Yorkshire Dales and finally crossing the North York Moors culminating on the east coast at Whitby, for some well-deserved fish and chips. #### **Second Public Consultation**

A public consultation on this plan was done in the Summer of 2020. The community steering group have made some changes to the plan based on public feedback e.g. removal of the picnic shelter at Larks Rise, and putting public safety as the highest priority of the plan, due to public concerns about highway safety and in particular Tenbury Road junction.

All Neighbourhood Plans must have had an independent Environmental Assessment done to comply with planning legislation. We are pleased to report that this is almost complete and the steering group are eager to share this, and the full plan, with the community. This second public consultation is now being planned and will take take place during the months of July/August 2021.

The public consultation will include: Public Drop in Sessions at the Parish Hall: 6pm - 9pm Friday 16th July 2021 1pm - 5pm Saturday 14th August 2021 During the consultation period the Plan and environmental assessment will be uploaded and accessible on the Town Council website: <u>https://www.cleobury.org.uk</u>

A link to the survey to collect public feedback will be communicated via Facebook, the Town Council website and the drop-in sessions. Paper copies will be available at the drop-in sessions, from Cleobury Country or by calling the Town Clerk on 07483 112290 during the consultation period.

All of the above will be subject to the COVID Public Health England advice.

Reminder: With no Neighbourhood Plan development will happen anyway but without guaranteed community gains.

#### **Clee Hill Community Wildlife Group**

#### Group area

Our area is centred on the open hill land of Titterstone Clee and Clee Hill Common, extending approximately as far as Knowlegate and Knowbury to the south, Bitterley to the west, Cleedownton and Bromdon to the north, and Catherton Common and Doddington to the east. A map can be found on our website.

#### **Save our Curlews**

Working with Shropshire Ornithological Society, we have tried to find every Curlew nest in the area, so we can put an electric fence around it to protect the eggs from predation. When the chicks hatch we will attach a radio tag, so we can see what happens to them, and how they use the landscape.

We think there are eight pairs left in the area, and half the nests have been found, plus another one just outside the area. Three of these five have been fenced, an excellent result. We will report on the progress of these nests in future issues.

Unfortunately, the owners of the land containing one nest refused permission to put a fence up, and the sitting adult at the fifth nest had already been predated when it was visited to put the fence up, the day after it was found.

#### **Bird Survey 2021**

We have been monitoring local Curlews and other birds since 2012, and the 2021 survey is now underway. The Curlew and Kestrel populations are important at the County level.

#### If you see or hear Curlew, Lapwing, Kestrel or Cuckoo any time between now and mid-July, anywhere in the area, we'd like to know, please.

We particularly want Curlew records, as it's possible that there are more to find.

Ours is one of 10 Community Wildlife Groups monitoring Curlews in Shropshire. You can see where they operate, and what they found in 2019 and 2020, on the same website

#### THE LEGION IS 100 YEARS OLD

No offence is intended to the Royal British Legion in its centenary year. But when the body was formed in May 1921, with the intention of helping anyone who had served in the forces, it was just The British Legion. It was 50 years later that Her Majesty bestowed the Royal title. And on May 15th Cleobury Mortimer's branch gathered at the town cenotaph with Rector Ashley and bugler David Taylor to lay a wreath commemorating that historic anniversary.

It was a simple and very dignified service. A prayer led by the Rector, the Last Post delivered by David Taylor, followed by a silence and then the the bugler played Reveille before Mike Hermolle recited The Exhortation, that very moving verse from Laurence Binyon's poem 'For The Fallen,' those present responding with "We will remember them." Mike then reminded the modest gathering that on July 17th the Cleobury Mortimer branch of the Legion celebrates its 100th birthday, one of the earliest rural branches to be formed. With such a long history, no wonder it enjoys such strong support in the community. More details of the event in our July issue.

School governors do an important job in the process of educating our children, but get little recognition; they are the backroom boys and girls. We talked to the chairs of governors at Cleobury Primary and Lacon Childe to get a better idea of what this voluntary role means.

Stuart Auger has stayed on as chair of the governors at the primary school, even though his son has now moved on to Lacon Childe. He's been a governor for six years, and enjoys the challenge of helping the school improve whilst seeing the children flourish. As a self employed project manager he has skills support that help school the without intruding in the day to day operation. The consists of three parent governing body governors, three community governors and two staff plus the head and leadership team, although this year he is keen to build up the numbers to full strength. This work is not too demanding with six formal meetings in the year, plus time spent in school supporting projects like the plan this year to build an extra classroom - a sign of how popular the school is. Taking over the nursery that once operated independently within the school naturally involved the governors, too, and it is so great to see it go from strength to strength. The school is part of the Shropshire Gateway Educational Trust, which allows particular talents to move around the group, such as specialist teachers, advising other schools on methods and facilities, or sports professionals sharing their skills. "The teachers are really passionate about their job," he explains "which makes the role really rewarding". "And as a governor you're that critical friend, someone who can see the potential and discuss how it can be achieved." Does he still enjoy his voluntary role? "Oh yes, it's so different to the day job. The school and staff are great and there's so much to learn and understand." Governors can bring in businesslike thinking and often use an annual Skills Audit to ensure their combined strengths and skills are best suited for the school. "But it's the passion for the role that's more important than anything," he emphasises.

Lisa Cigsar chairs the governors at Lacon Childe and has a daughter at Bayton Primary and a son at Lacon Childe. Self-employed in the financial services area, she's quite a sucker for punishment as a long-term governor at Bayton as well as her Lacon Childe post. How much time does just the chair of governors post take up?

"The year is divided into three terms and there are two governor meetings a term, we also visit the school and staff regularly as part of our monitoring role, and try to match these to areas that we ourselves may be interested in. We work alongside the teaching staff and senior leaders, looking at the impact that decisions and policies made at governor and board level have on the outcomes for the pupils and staff within the school, of course this takes some of your time, but it is fabulous to see what a positive impact your input and support can have." She's another to talk about the passion of the staff for the job : "The lockdown has been very difficult for all schools, but the dedication of all of the staff at Lacon has shone through, playing our part in supporting them as governors has been priceless."

You can see just how keen the staff are by the car park that's filling up before 8.00 in the morning. Teaching is not a 9.00 to 5.00 job, whatever the students' hours may suggest; the children give their best to teachers who lead and inspire. So, being part of the school community, has Lisa herself learned more? "It's broadened my skills. I am a better communicator and I've become more confident about public speaking. If you'd like to be involved, I'd say 'Do it, it's so very rewarding.""

Darren Reynolds has been head teacher at Lacon Childe for eight years and has overseen the formation of the Shropshire Gateway Education Trust that covers Cleobury, Clee Hill and Stottesdon. Done with the cooperation of school governors: "It's governors who are going to drive a school forward," he explains. "We need community governors, local people with an interest in the community and who want to see it improve."



## Philip Dunne's Letter from Westminster

Following the move to Step 3 of the recovery roadmap last month, we have all been able to enjoy some of the freedoms that mean so much to us all.

The ability once again to hug family and friends, and overnight stays possible across the country, have given the opportunity to reunite with loved ones in a way not possible for months. For those in care homes across South Shropshire, loosening the rules to allow five visitors, instead of just two previously, has meant a great deal.

For many people, the chance to get out and make the most of South Shropshire's great food and drink venues, without the need to run the gauntlet with the Great British weather, has been a great pleasure. Like many others, I took the opportunity to eat out and support a local pub once restrictions changed to allow indoor dining on 17<sup>th</sup> May, and encourage others to support their favourite local pubs and restaurants now we are able. It is especially important to help them bounce back after such a tough year.

In a welcome boost to South Shropshire's vital tourism trade, hostels, hotels, and B&Bs have been able to welcome back guests. Schools can once again organise trips with overnight stays – crucial to support many of the outdoor leisure businesses in South Shropshire, which rely on residential visits.

Later in the month, all being well, we will move to Step 4 – the final marker on the roadmap. I write before full clarity has been issued about what this means in terms of any need for continued distancing or certification, but we do know that the government hopes to be in a position to remove all legal limits on social contact. But this will depend on other factors, like the successful pilots of largescale events with crowds.

The fact that we are able to move encouragingly, and hopefully irreversibly, towards resumption of normal freedoms we enjoyed pre-pandemic is thanks to two factors: the continued respect for the rules by the public, and the remarkable success of the vaccine rollout. The UK has been consistently at the top of world league tables for our vaccine doses administered, helping to keep our population safe. But sadly, risks remain, as we have seen from the advance of new, more contagious or more deadly variants in other parts of the world. So we cannot throw caution to the wind just yet.

We must continue to consider the vulnerability of those we contact, and obviously watch how variants of the virus spread, and maintain social distance when not with friends and family. Remember hands, face, space and fresh air.

As we approach the longest day of the year – the marker for the change to Step 4 – I hope we are able to put this most difficult period behind us, and move towards the return to normal freedoms we all need, and deserve. *Philip Dunne*



Children will have bouncy castles and other attractions, plus the popular tractor trailer ride as a star attraction.



#### CATHERTON COMMON

Good news! I was pleased to find out recently that we have curlews nesting on Catherton Common. Local volunteers and wardens are keeping an eve on the site and it was decided to surround it with an electric fence to protect the young from predators. Predators such as crows and foxes are the main reason the chicks fail to reach adulthood successfully. Given that we know of one nest and that there may be others, along with skylark and other ground nesting birds, can I ask once again that people please keep dogs on a lead until 31st July. Disturbance by dogs is another major reason for curlew to fail to raise their young successfully.

Unfortunately we also had some bad news earlier this year. There were some large fires in February and March with significant areas of the common being burned and the fire brigade having to respond to protect both the common and peoples houses. It is difficult to estimate the damage to our wildlife with uncontrolled, large fires such as this occurring during the dry spell.

Even more worrying is that I have been shown footage from security cameras nearby which appears to show two of the fires being started deliberately. The footage shows a car pulling up very late at night beside the common, someone gets out and passes in front of the headlights. Shortly afterward the car pulls away and an area of flames starts to build up in the area soon becoming a large blaze. Both fires started late at night.

I have been in contact with the local community police officer and am hoping that we can take some action to investigate these incidents and carry out more regular patrols


## CLOWS TOP VICTORY HALL

### WHAT DOES YOUR GARDEN REALLY SAY ABOUT YOU?

A friend recently gifted me a small plant. This has become an annual thing as one of us finds ourselves drowning in a glut of whatever we're growing. Last year, my excess cucumber plants found a happy new home in her greenhouse, while she repeatedly comes to my rescue when my sweet pea crop fails (for the umpteenth year). This time, though, there was a particularly mischievous glint in her eye.

"It's pampas grass", she said with a smirk. Blimey. My inevitable off-colour joke about us being close friends, just not *that* close, was taken in good humour.

Confused? Well, a quick internet search on pampas grass will explain all. For some inexplicable reason, this statuesque grass has long been associated with an 'alternative lifestyle' that I have neither the energy nor will to get involved in. According to legend, sticking a big clump of pampas grass in the front garden is the equivalent of placing an ad in the local paper (*note - our advertisement rates are very competitive*) or erecting a giant neon sign with an arrow pointing towards your front door saying 'Good Times Guaranteed Inside (please bring a bottle and wipe your feet).'

Of course, this urban myth is complete tosh. If you're the proud owner of pampas grass - indeed, I now count myself as a member of this select group - you'll know that it's a genuinely gorgeous plant. Growing to an impressive size (15 foot is not uncommon), it sways beautifully in the breeze and very easy to look after. It's a whopper.

(On re-reading the above description, it occurs to me that some may view it as a particularly boastful Tinder profile. Mind out of the gutter, please people...)

So, how does a perfectly lovely ornamental grass suddenly become associated

with car keys in a bowl? I don't know, and to be frank, I'm not keen on Googling the subject for fear of freaking my wife out when she sees my browser history. *"Research for the Clarion"* is a strange defence and unlikely to cut it.

This whole episode has, however, prompted me to dig a little deeper into the world of plant symbolism. And, wow, what an eye-opener.

That bunch of yellow carnations you buy at the petrol station on the way to see your mum? Their real meaning is *rejection, disdain and disappointment*. Whoops.

You're on much safer ground with dahlias which represent *elegance and dignity* - the perfect description of a mum. Just be sure not to give *black* dahlias - the message then would be one of *betrayal and dishonesty*, which is notably less upbeat.

Oh, and a variegated tulip means you've got *beautiful eyes*, which is nice if a little random.

And this whole symbolism thing isn't limited to flowers. The coriander sprinkled over your curry? *Lust* (a perfect description of how I feel when faced with a Chicken Madras from one of Cleobury's fine selection of Indian restaurants). The basil on your pasta? *Success*. And so it goes on.

It would seem that every plant has a meaning; we've just lost sight of them over time. Hopefully, one of the slithers of silver lining from the last 12 months is that we've all slowed down a tad. Take time to stop, examine the incredible nature we're blessed with and, maybe, dig a little deeper into its history and symbolism. There's an entire forgotten world out there to explore, a world that's even more exciting than discovering your neighbour has planted pampas grass in their front garden and has just invited you over for a drink...

Early summer has come, as the orbit of the Earth decrees it must, despite a reluctant spring that was cold, too dry (in April) and too wet (in May)! Each day has brought new leaves, blooms, insects and birds to delight us, lifting the heaviness of a winter that was far too long.



The year's first sightings of butterflies bring a special thrill. Across the nation concern for these insects, which have shown a 76% decline (in abundance, occurrence or both) since the 1970s, has prompted many projects to protect or restore their habitats. In the Wyre Forest there has been a huge effort to conserve the Pearl-bordered and Small Pearl-bordered Fritillaries which can be seen bringing a flash of orange to woodland edges and rides from May to mid-August. (Mick Farmer's photo is of the Small PBF but does not show the underside of the hind wing which distinguishes it from its relative.) Both lay eggs on the Common Dog-violet, which is often seen where the sunlight reaches the ground at the edges of rides and in recently thinned or coppiced areas. Surprisingly, Bracken is another essential plant for the two species as long as it is not allowed to dominate the vegetation completely. It provides a sheltered nursery for young violet plants and the dead Bracken provides a warm place for the butterfly caterpillars to bask in cool weather. Thanks to careful cutting of vegetation, cattle grazing and coppicing in the Wyre Forest our local populations of the butterflies have held on. On a national level, although the last three years have generally been good for butterflies, 2020 year saw the third worst year on record for the Small Pearlbordered Fritillary and its ninth consecutive year of below average numbers.

The charity Butterfly Conservation draws attention to the sad fact that what is now seen as a 'good' year for butterflies is still poor compared to records from 40 years or more ago, and that we have forgotten, or never experienced, the abundance of former decades.

There are always opportunities to reverse this trend, which applies to all areas of our wildlife. It was so encouraging to talk recently to a visiting ornithologist who is surveying birds in woodland around Uncllys Farm. Although her work is not yet complete, she has found good numbers of Redstarts, Willow Warblers and Tree Pipits as well as Wrens, Blackcaps and Goldcrests in the sections of forest which have been thinned, fenced and planted with diverse native trees over the last three years. The difference between them and the open woodland is, she says, very noticeable.

That is worth celebrating, and I hope it is a story that will be repeated many times over. Let me know if you want to be part of the good news and help to plant another 2000 little trees next winter! *Linda Iles*

Oxfam: Sadly you are not alone... Following the revelations about Oxfam staff misbehaviour in various areas, the WHO (World Health Organisation) has been fingered for similar abuse. Apparently, women applying for jobs were obliged to sleep with aid agency workers in order to be appointed. Other agencies and the UN were also implicated although the WHO appeared to be the major player. Just for info, the UK contributed £240 million to them last year so clearly money well spent.

At least Kier, famous for failing to fix Shropshire's potholes, are consistent in their approach to contracts. Already, their failure to maintain armed forces accommodation properly has resulted in the condition of squaddies housing being a major cause of resignations from an already overstretched organisation. Having spent many years lying repeatedly to all and sundry including Parliament and despite knowing that the system was faulty, senior Post Office executives fought tooth and nail to prevent justice for their innocent employees. Tactics included spending vast sums on high powered Lawyers, who are themselves being looked at for their behaviour in this case, and submitting increasingly unlikely legal arguments to the the Judiciary who were not impressed. Now, as the Post Office have failed in their efforts to prevent it, many of those penalised have had their convictions quashed. Can we now expect some of those responsible to themselves end up as guests of Her Maj? As most have moved on to other high paid posts and even been awarded honours, what do you think? Me neither, as they have too many powerful friends.





Welcome to June. In the show "Carousel" written by Rogers and Hammerstein, this month is celebrated with the song 'June is Bustin Out All Over'. It seems appropriate for us given that we expect things to start to return to normality from the 21st which is incidentally the longest daylight day in the UK, Summer Solstice day. There will be many who will celebrate this day for many different reasons but sadly there will be many who won't be celebrating as they have fallen victim to one or other of the many different scams that just will not go away. In previous articles, I have outlined several scams and tried to demonstrate ways of ensuring you do not fall victim to them. Regrettably it would appear there is little we can do to avoid being initially targeted by scammers. However, there are ways that you can frustrate scammers who attempt to gain access to your personal data. When a scammer gains sufficient information about you it is possible to 'clone' your ID and use this to buy goods and services or even access your bank accounts to steal your money. Unfortunately, we sometimes make this easy for them as they can access information about you which has been gathered by legitimate companies. How many times have you given your details when ordering goods and services yourself on-line? Frequently you are asked to subscribe or create an account 'to make it easier for future transactions'. Details, such as date and place of birth, mothers' surname, name of first school or favourite pet's name etc etc are recorded by these companies. In many cases this is used to give you "Loyalty bonuses" but the real activity behind this is what is known as DATA MINING. Naturally every legitimate company will assure you that they keep their data very secure and do not pass it on to third parties. In most cases this is true but not always. So many companies are linked to others and you can be sure the data is shared. Take the example of KINGFISHER GROUP. You might not have heard the name but they are an International Home Improvement Company who own B&Q in the UK and Ireland, Screwfix in the UK and three other organisations in France, Spain, Portugal, Romania, Poland, Russia and Turkey. If your data is shared across this group, how do you know it is really secure? There have been some celebrated hacks into big named

organisations including banks, where millions of customer records and details have been stolen. Why? Simply so the hackers can sell on the data on the black market. Who are typical buyers of this data? Those very people that attempt to scam you out of your money! There is a post going around Facebook just now illustrating the dangers of some of the 'innocent' games that ask for things like what was your first car, describing your town or city of birth, your first school, favourite pet etc etc. Believe it or not it does not take a genius to start to build up a fairly detailed picture of yourself with this data. With lawful records of Births, Deaths and Marriages being freely available online now, a scammer with the right technology can easily create a believable clone of an individual. While raiding bank and savings accounts is the preferred method of most scammers, using your personal details whether gained through open records or from bought hacked sources, makes it so easy for us to be targeted. So, if you use Online Banking, think about the fact that the banks ask for what, to you, are easily remembered questions to help identify you when logging on. Mothers maiden name, pet's name, date of birth, place of birth etc etc. Does this sound familiar to you? The message is clear, we are in a very connected world now, where your data is constantly being mined and updated. Hackers will always try to break into the most sophisticated of systems and usually succeed. Black market money changes hands very easily and your money can disappear in a flash. What can you do about it? For a start use strong passwords for every online account you access including the social media accounts. Use a different password for every account (easier said than done). Change your passwords regularly. There is plenty of guidance online for this. One company www.proprivacy.com has a lot of good information about keeping you safe online. This is not an endorsement, just one example of genuine companies on the internet that want to help you stay safe.

Andy Perkins's EZ Energy Zone says in its own advert that it's "One of Cleobury's best kept secrets" and that's a very true statement. Tucked away on the Newhouse Farm business park, next door to the Seafood and Freezer Centre, there's no showy bling about their industrial unit. But dig deep and you find one very bright man and a forward looking business with a national reputation among the professionals with whom he deals.

Andy earned his degree at Aston University and after working at Emerson's engineering works for nine years moved on to start his own engineering business. He specialised in heating and ventilation drive and control, and his original thinking soon developed greater efficiency and control. An interest in the growing solar thermal power was a natural move. He could see the potential in the solar panel market and began to concentrate on that area.

"The roof space is the best use, but there's no compulsion to do so," he explains. "The aim is to meet whatever the targets that are specified and do it at lowest lifetime cost." Not as a quick dash-for-thecash job; lowest cost means long term reckoning. "Houses last a long time, so the heating and ventilation system should too," he reasons.

That philosophy carries over into the components used in systems they design and instal "A typical heat pump system costs from £9,000 to £11,000, but if you spend about 10 percent more on the pump, you'll get up to 20 percent more efficiency and better long term reliability too," Andy says. It's just good sense to buy quality and enjoy the benefits that brings.

Something like 25 percent of Andy's time is given to the research and development work that keeps the company ahead of the game. As well as buying in quality components from known sources, they also design better system components and have them manufactured - his background as an engineer helps a lot with that. A good example is the new hot water cylinder. What can you do with a basic component that would make a difference?

"It heats from the top down, not the bottom up," he explains. "It uses about seven percent less electricity and as it takes the hot water out from the top of the cylinder, it takes about 20 minutes from switching on to drawing out hot water." That greater convenience for the customer, whether domestic or commercial, is the result of sitting and thinking. Why ever change such a long established water cylinder design? Because it's better; next question?

EZ serves the whole of the UK, with the greatest concentration around its base here in Cleobury. Andy employs 15 full time fitters, including three apprentices, and they serve an area dictated by a one hour journey time to the job. Good economic thinking in these days of traffic delays. Further away the work is farmed out to proven contractors.

The cost of EZ's current system will pay back the cost of installation in about seven years, and offers lower running costs through that time. There's a lot of new technology coming along that will make operation cheaper still. Like the ability to follow the weather forecast, track the price of electricity and thermal performance of the house to run the heat pump at the lowest cost.

And electricity is safer than a conventional gas or oil heating system: "Heat pumps remove the flammable bits," as Andy puts it.

He is keen on quality all the way. "If you scrimp on installation, it's trouble. With a good system it should cost no more than one pound a day to supply the average new build house. That's heating, lighting and cooking and other day to day use of power. And can the national supply of power cope with demand if it's high? He smiles: We're using 30 percent less than 15 years ago."


