#### DOGS WORRYING SHEEP

There have been incidents of dogs worrying sheep recently. In most cases, where the owner is nearby and has proper control, the dog responds and whilst the sheep may be a little worried there is no real danger.

But dogs running loose do offer a threat, even if they are not naturally vicious. One instance like this saw sheep chased by the dogs for some time before they were stopped. The result was lambs stillborn and ewes dying. The loss of sheep like this is a costly business. Do you know where your dog is at all times? Are your fences really secure?

Farmers have approached the Footpath Association looking for help, but that body has firm rules that dogs accompanying walkers must be on the lead at all times. With an estimated 500 dogs in the community there will be occasional problems, but all owners should recognise their responsibility and take proper care. With a little more care, we can live together.



#### MAWLEY HALL ESTATE -INFORMATION

It is clear that much is happening within the Mawley Hall Estate since it changed hands last year. The new owners have committed to a very extensive programme of work to restore both the buildings and landscape – to bring them back to how they would have been many years ago, and to ensure that they are preserved for generations to come.

Although Mawley Hall will once again be a private family home, the Estate's new owners recognise and welcome the fact that the local community is able to share what the Estate has to offer by way of public footpaths and bridleways, all of which are being repaired.

Those who take advantage of the public routes through the Estate will have seen the commencement of a great deal of maintenance work in the woodlands. Many hundreds of new trees have also been planted, which are visible because of the tree guards which are being used to protect them. This new planting is of predominantly native species. Later in the year there will be a large amount of new woodland planting which will replace forestry plantations introduced to the Estate towards the end of the last century. These forestry plantations have proved damaging both to the landscape and to biodiversity.

There has been an increase in site activity connected to various building works. A dedicated works compound has been created just inside the Estate, where plant and materials will be stored, and which will accommodate the temporary site offices whilst the works take place. This activity will increase further as the work progresses, but it is intended that traffic movements will be minimised, and that all storage will be contained wherever possible within the compound itself.

Walkers through the Estate may have spotted diggers at work in the vicinity of Lenches Pond. These are engaged in the re-dredging of the pond, which has silted up to such an extent that it was only about a quarter of its true size. Work has commenced on Mawley Hall itself, and on the Stables. This work is being conducted to the highest conservation standards, an approach which is being applied to other buildings within the Estate. As this work progresses, more information will be available.

Finally, a planning application has been made for the installation of retractable security bollards at the North Drive Entrance to the Estate. These will prevent unauthorised vehicular access to the Estate, especially out-ofhours. Their installation will have no implications for access to public footpaths and bridleways.

#### Mrs Zillah Pain writes:

Re. "Who painted the letter box?" in the March Clarion. In 1985, when the Post Office decided not to use the post box in my wall any more, I bought it off them, for which transaction I have a receipt for £45 and a letter dated 3.2.85. This stated that:

- 1. The box must not be put to any use whatsoever.
- 2. The aperture must be permanently blocked off.
- The box must be so disguised that there is no risk of it being mistaken for a public posting box in use. (I suggest that in the latter case it is repainted in a different colour)
- 4. For security reasons the lock is not allowed to remain on the box.

For various reasons I never got round to doing anything about it, but some time ago Matthew Sheehan, on behalf of the council, approached me about the box and I said they could do whatever they liked about it and I promptly forgot about it! Until recently I found Roger Potter scraping away at the paint. I got in touch with Matthew and showed him the receipt and the letter; he got in touch with the Post Office on behalf of the council. The Post Office gave the council permission to paint the box red and the rest is history.



Way back in December 1991 during one of farming's crisis moments the two local farming brothers Rob and Graham Pain decided they had to think radically about their farming business and its future. At the time they farmed 400 acres producing milk, fat lambs and beef cattle. They were thinking they should increase their cow herd but like many dairy farmers at the time were alarmed by the EU's proposals to regulate milk production, with milk quotas in order to reduce the size of the Milk Lake. Like many businesses they decided to look at diversification and were drawn towards the creation a golf course. Planning permission was sought in January 1992 to build a nine hole course (Deer Park) on Lower House Farm. Rob and Graham are fast and determined learners. They had to be. With interest rates rising to 12% and having to learn new methods and techniques of golf course landscaping, construction \_ grass species, drainage and irrigation with only 24 hours in each day, it was not time for the faint hearted. However, they stuck it out, determined to produce a high quality golf club that was friendly and relaxed with good golf for all.

They milked their last cow in December 1992, then opened the nine hole Deer Park course in July 1993 with 202 members, quite a few of whom are still members today. They teamed up with Ray Baldwin, a regional development officer for the England Golf Union. He helped, encouraged them and steered the brothers through the new diversification period. The first nine holes of Deer Park worked well and permission was sought to expand with a further nine hole course, Badger Sett, which brought Cleobury Mortimer Golf Club up to 18 holes by 1995. From cows and milk in 1992 to an 18 hole golf course with club house in 1995, with a rapidly expanding membership, was a huge and remarkable achievement.

With further land swaps, sales and purchases there was just room and funding to build an interesting and exciting final nine hole course. Again, with the guidance of Ray, this proposal eventually got planning permission and despite some really rotten weather, the new nine hole course, Fox's Run, was finished in 1999. Cleobury Golf Club now has the full 27 holes of high quality with a friendly ethos and informality rare in many other golf businesses. This was achieved through hard work and determination to retain their original objectives. The brothers now have a club that is not only good for golf but also for members and for the environment. In building the courses they planted over 24,000 trees, dug eight lakes and big ponds, established woodland and orchards as well as planting wild flower areas.

A recent survey by the Wyre Forest Facilitation Group of butterfly experts showed a good biodiversity and a healthy collection of bio systems of birds, insects and mammals. Recent additions to the club include the lodge development which has strengthened the product especially for visiting golfers and their families. The club house has been enlarged and boasts a good bar and restaurant with social space and the ability to host events centred around raising money for charity. Last year over £60,000 was generated. From relatively simple beginnings in farming Rob and Graham have, through hard work and determination, developed a thriving Golf Club in a new and much used and appreciated environment.





South Shropshire is a great place to retire. But over time this does create challenges, as the proportion of elderly people living here increases. Over 65s now make up 28.6% of our local population, compared to just 18% nationally. Remarkably, this has increased from 20.9% when I was first elected.

The welcome reason for this increase is that we are living longer, healthier lives. The number of people aged 90 or over in South Shropshire has almost doubled since 2005, particularly driven by more men becoming nonagenarians, reflecting healthier lifestyle choices including reduced smoking rates. But clearly as we live longer, we are more likely to need health and social care support.

Challenges around an ageing population are not unique to Shropshire, though are more pronounced in rural areas, given additional pressure around workforce planning and transportation. So a national approach is needed to ensure the most vulnerable receive the support they need in old age.

At the end of March I met the Social Care Minister to discuss the Social Care Green Paper, which will consider a range of options to ensure our social care system meets the needs of our ageing society and is sustainable for the long term.

I emphasised the need to 'rural proof' any policy changes, given the additional cost of providing services in rural areas, particularly pressing for social care providers. For example, in cities carers can move between appointments quickly, whereas in rural areas carers will be available for fewer daily appointments given time needed to travel between them.

It is clear we need to be open to new ideas, and the Minister will invite responses to a consultation on the Green Paper. I shall work with rural groups and other rural MPs to make a powerful case for a more balanced system.

We have already seen some recognition from government of the growing scale of the problem. Councils have been allowed to raise social care precepts to meet local statutory obligations. In the wider system an extra £650 million for social care in 2019-20 was included in last year's Budget: £240 million to help people leave hospital when ready and receive the right care to meet their needs; and £410 million to improve local councils' care offer for older people, those with disabilities, and children.

But funding alone will not solve this significant challenge for any future government. Reform is needed to ensure health and social care services are better joined up, and that social care changes to meet the needs of an increasingly elderly population. Fortunately, technology opens up a world of possibility in delivering improved care at reduced cost.

For example, Shropshire Council is one of the leaders in looking at innovative ways to meet the growing social care challenge. I am pleased it has launched a pilot in Broseley using technology to combat isolation, through schemes than do not replace human interaction but rather facilitate it. This type of innovation in care has led to national award nominations, showing Shropshire at the forefront of best practice.

I know innovation through technology is a passion of the Secretary of State for Health & Social Care, so I hope that with his encouragement to embrace new thinking, coupled with local innovation here in Shropshire, we will adapt well to meeting health and social care needs of current and future generations.

#### IN SEARCH OF RARE BIRD SPECIES

The Clarion has carried a range of appeals asking for help in both defending and tracing rare bird species in the area. The curlew is the outstanding variety, but there are many others whose survival bodies like the Clee Hill Community Wildlife Group work to help.

I wanted to follow one of their members and report what the regular check on species and numbers is like. Chris Bargman offered good advice: "Go out with Leo on his April training day - he's very knowledgeable." I had met and talked to Leo at the Clee Hill Group's recent AGM and he was welcoming. At 9.30 on clear but chilly Saturday we met in Cleeton Saint Mary.

Others joined us, volunteers with an interest in watching over and preserving wildlife on Titterstone Clee Hill.

Leo distributed map sheets that regular volunteers use, their chosen local area shown as a two kilometre square with roads and footpaths clearly marked. There were six of us plus Leo, me as an observer, the others there to learn. All of them clearly experienced, properly shod for hillside walking, carrying field glasses and clip boards to hold their maps.

After a briefing from Leo we walked towards Doddington, Leo stopping and explaining how different terrains suited the habits of different birds. We then branched off along a footpath and had covered no more than 200 metres when a curlew flew past, followed by what we presumed was its mate. The two landed in a nearby field, visible through field glasses and blending with the background if vou didn't have that vital tool.

We watched them for some time, feeding quietly as our silence was broken only by soft speaking to prevent disturbance. When they flew off we moved on, stopping to watch other species, including a red kite high up on the hill, circling in what seemed to be a lazy style as it searched for its prey. But that easy and silent way of moving swiftly becomes a stunning swoop if they spot their next meal.

Another curlew flew across the hillside. One of the pair seen earlier or a fresh sighting? Leo cautioned against enthusiasm, knowing that it might be one we'd already seen, or an intruder from a neighbouring area. Both sightings recorded.

The A4 recording sheets on the back of the area maps are a great example of maximum information on minimal space. with abbreviations for all the species you're likely to see and a simple code to explain their actions. There are four periods to be covered, so walking out and spotting is not a demanding job. Volunteers then post them off to Leo for him to collate information and help to build the fund of knowledge.

Walking on Clee Hill is never going to be boring with a job like this. If you would like to join in this work to help protect rare birds, call Chris Bargman on CM 270514 or email <u>chcwg@shropacwgs.org.uk</u>







### May in the Wyre Forest

The first Sunday of the month is International Dawn Chorus Day, often marked by special walks. However, you don't have to join an organised event to hear a free, virtuoso performance somewhere near your home. Setting the alarm in time to be out in the woods ready for a 5.30am sunrise may take grim determination but the reward is memorable. The build-up of birdsong and the effect of the gathering light among the tall trees is uplifting and magical. You can stand still and let yourself be blessed.

The dominant songs will probably be those of Blackbird and Song Thrush. They perch as high as they can to broadcast their melodies: the Blackbird repeating them twice; the Song Thrush rather more varied in its repertoire and repeating each phrase three times. If, like me, you struggle to identify the other songsters, you can listen to recordings on websites such as <u>www.rspb.org.uk</u> to become familiar with them. Or you can just enjoy the occasion and make up your own mind whether you are experiencing a behaviour that is purely functional - an establishment of territory - or an outpouring of joy.

I have only heard Nightingales a few times and sadly never in the Wyre Forest, where they were last noted in the 1940s, but I can reread and enjoy Keats' 'Ode to a Nightingale' to recapture the wonder of the elaborate song or hear three hours of it courtesy of YouTube! The Nightingale favours coppiced woodland and scrub, which used to be common enough in Wyre and other woodlands in the past. The forest also incorporated much more heath in the past and efforts have been made recently to restore and extend this habitat so that many species threatened with local extinction can hold on.

Norman Hickin's 'The Natural History of an English Forest', published in 1971, talks of the Nightjar still being numerous in areas of heath and bracken despite a decline from the earlier years of the century. He describes watching a Nightjar performing aerial acrobatics as it hunted moths at dusk. silhouetted against the sky. The bird's mouth is wide and fringed with bristles to aid it in catching its food and its brown crypticpatterned plumage allows it to avoid detection during the day. I was amazed to hear its loud, 'churring' song (like a clockwork toy winding down) on the RSPB website. Wouldn't it be wonderful to welcome this fascinating former resident back to our forest?

### 'SAVE OUR CURLEWS' NEWS



The Clarion last October carried an article describing the results of a project in 2018 to find Curlew nests on Clee Hill, protect them with electric fences, and radio tagging the chicks to find out where they go and what happens to them. One, probably two, chicks fledged. The project was successful, as we learnt a lot, and we are repeating as much as possible this year.

Farmers with Curlews on their land in previous years have been contacted already, or will be soon. A leaflet, "Curlews need farmers", which describes the project in more detail, is being distributed in the area. Curlews started arriving back during March, and landowners and everyone else are requested to report the locations of any that you see or hear to Chris Bargman on 01299 270514, email <u>chcwg@shropscwgs.org.uk</u> as soon as possible. These reports are very important, as they help us find where the Curlews are breeding. Please don't assume we already know about any you come across.


Members of the Clee Hill Community Wildlife Group have been out looking for them since late March onwards. If you want to help with this, or find out more, it's not too late. Contact Chris (details above) for this too. We've a large area to cover, and all help is welcome. See article on what's involved on page 31.

The Group has been looking for Curlews since 2012, and during that time the population has declined from 13 breeding pairs to only 7 or 8 now. We don't have much longer to save them from local extinction.

A full report of the 2018 nest finding and protection project can be found on the Community Wildlife Group website <u>www.ShropsCWGs.org.uk</u> (Clee Hill section). More information about the *Save our Curlews* campaign can be found on the Shropshire Ornithological Society (SOS) website <u>www.shropshirebirds.com/save-ourcurlews/</u>

The campaign is funded by a joint appeal promoted by Shropshire Wildlife Trust and SOS, and the Clarion made a donation last year. We need to raise several thousands more to complete all the work that we need to do this year. Diamond buses has announced that they will compensate users (as required by the Traffic Commissioners at the last hearing) by giving one week's free travel on the No 3 route only. Although this was judged to be the worst route Diamond operates in Worcestershire, this does nothing for everyone else that has been disadvantaged and as there is a 15 minute service on this route, one missing bus does not involve a very long delay. Nothing is said whether to the as Commissioner has approved this scheme but as it has now been formally announced, I assume he has.

Shropshire Council have announced a consultation on the funding of the passenger transport services they provide. Is this in an attempt to improve them? Er no, just an attempt to save £405,000 next year plus £50,000 on the Shrewsbury Park and Ride service. The consultation document lists all the services thev currently which support and guess number is at the bottom of the list? Yes, the dear old 292. A footnote iustifies this bv pointing out that this service is run by Worcestershire on behalf of Shropshire so may not reflect priorities. In addition it says that as this is the case, it will

not form part of the review. Having said that, Shropshire stump up most of the subsidy on the 292 route and it appears that Worcestershire are looking for even more cash so where will that come from? Replies are needed by 6<sup>th</sup> May so you have time to comment if you wish. Contributions should be sent t o :

The current contract expires at the end of June and will apparently just roll over unless proposals are made to improve the service. There are thoughts that travelling could be simplified by 'Cross а Ticketing' arrangement with Diamond which would enable travellers to buy just one ticket for a through journey say from Worcester to Ludlow but this needs some form of contact to enable it to happen. 





Thorough soaping all over, wash off with buckets of clear water and then he did the wheels separately. The final touch was a chamois leather cleaning off until he stood back again and I was reminded what a smart car I have under the day to day dust and grime.

Anyone who may have thought the Men's Shed was a light hearted time filler for a few men with not enough to do should take notice. At the first Annual General Meeting of the group, the progress made in little more than a year made impressive reading.

From a tentative meeting in October 2017 and an agreement to get on with it, the Shed has become a registered charity, leased land to build the shed on, got planning permission, made a Lottery application and seen the foundations for the shed laid. ### LOCAL HONEY FROM AN EXPERIENCED



David Moule, properly dressed to handle bees, with his hives on the edge of woodlands. "They like the shade in the hot weather," he explained.

David Moule has been involved with bee keeping and the production of honey for more than 40 years. Knows his stuff, this man.

He learned from his dad at first and later worked two spells at a big honey business with 600 hives to watch over. He learned from that experience and his modest collection of 27 hives at present "I did have 37, but the Beast from the East took a lot of them,' he explains.

Cleanliness is very important. "I've seen hives in a really bad state. That's when you can get disease in, and that's a real headache." He watches the hives very carefully in the busy summer months, when the bees move on from feeding on the natural fruits in the hedgerows to rape seed. Keepers know when rape seed is the favoured crop, when they see "Yellowheads".

What's a Yellowhead, David? "When they're gathering in the rape plants their heads are yellow with the pollen."

Watching over his charges means being down with the hives at 4.00 in the morning, checking that all is well and that the bees are calm.

If it's wet and they can't get out and gather pollen, the bees become bored and decide to look for a better lodging. That's when they swarm, which is a natural migration, but rather unpleasant if it's your garden they choose. Does it happen very often? "Me and dad dealt with seven in one day a while back."

He dressed us both in proper keeper's outfit, made in Neath in South Wales and costing £169 each time. Better than being stung...

David and his mum do all the processing, from draining off the honeycomb to filtering through the settling tank before filling one pound (454grammes) jars or neat little Teddy Bear 340gms jars. Well, teddy bears do love honey.

It's a lovely sweet and entirely natural treat - try it on toast. Hmmm. Sales are being handled for David by uncle

### CLEOBURY'S CO-OP STORE

The place opened 18 months ago, in November 2017, a  $\pm$ 1.9 million investment in this community. It has brought a new level of service to the town, with fuel available from 6.00am to 11.00pm and food and other services from 7.00am.

Part of the Shropshire and Wales Co-op group, it employs 32 people at present, 10 of them all properly First Aid trained by the local First Responders group.

The man with responsibility for this very impressive place is 33 year old Elliott Cook, a product of the Coop staff training and way of trading. As a school leaver in Sedgeley, he started out pushing trolleys ten hours a week and has progressed to manage the Cleobury store and serve as deputy to the Area Manager. His own deputy is Iovce Price, who along with several others transferred from the old Harry Tuffins store that took over what used to be West End Garage.

The friendly manner of staff and their ability to take on any job that needs attention is part of the training scheme in the company. New recruits get a two days introductory course at Stourport, then they're out in store with seven qualifying standards to meet before they're fully fledged.

The place carries the wide range you'd expect of a store this size. The best seller is Hobson's beers, with grocery and fuel sales equal second. For me, the range of salads and vegetables appeals, helped by fresh deliveries seven days a week.

The store has made a lot of friends with its support of local events and a week after we talked Elliott and six other locals were due to contest the Gung Ho five kilometre run over inflatables, raising funds for the Homestart charity in Kidderminster.

Looking ahead, does Elliott see changes coming to the store? "I don't think there will be, it's a winning formula," was the reply. And a real asset on our main street. JR

There is another scam message doing the rounds asking people to verify their account details. Its quite plausible and found its way through my spam filter:

#### <u>"TV Licence - Payment error</u>

We noticed that your last payment could not be processed. To prevent your account from being suspended please verify your information details.

### **KESTRELS**

If there is a bird of prey hovering over a field it is almost certainly a kestrel. They are officially the most common British bird of prey but in Cleobury Mortimer they are out hooted and out numbered by owls. We probably have up to two pairs of kestrels nesting on the boundaries of our woods. Two or three new nest boxes are being made in order to encourage the spread of this wonderful bird.



It is regrettable that there has been an incident of live trapping of kestrels within the town area. A Larsen trap baited with pigeon was found last month by a member of the public. The kestrel was released and the trap may now be collected by the unknown owner by contacting Mercia Police on their 101 number. ### PLASTIC - NOT SO FANTASTIC

Keeping your leftover consumables protected is important in the fight against food waste; cling film has become a popular way to do this. But as we try to reduce our use of plastic, this single use, throwaway product is something to avoid. Cling film is difficult to reuse and can end up in the household rubbish, a potential hazard for wildlife in the environment.

Instead of buying another roll of film, here are some alternatives that could be used. Further details can be found at <u>myzerowaste.com</u>):

1: Reusable plastic box with lid.

2: Dishes or containers covered with a saucer or plate.

3: Lunch boxes with individual compartments.

4: Reusing bags you already have5: Parchment paper made from unbleached paper.

6: Recycled aluminium foil uses a twentieth of the energy normally needed to smelt aluminium from ore.

7: Beeswax wraps; we have our own local producer of these. Lucy Shier regularly sells her Bee Biotic "Bee-Fresh" Beeswax Wraps at the Cleobury Country Market. Lucy is happy to discuss with you the many ways you can use her product, made in Shropshire!

### **IN BUSINESS - Thompson and Parkes**

Because the buildings are set back from the road, you can easily drive past Thompson and Parkes' Oreton branch and not realise how big the place is. But park up and walk into the main showroom and you're in for a big surprise.

The stock is amazing, the rows and rows just go on. Not on a hypermarket scale, but for a rural building supplier this is a very serious operation. And outside there are stacks of timber, wrapped packages of bricks and building blocks, sand and whatever else you want delivered to your garden or building site.



Loose materials come to your site in big bags that leave you in no doubt whose they are. The "Proud to be Local" slogan works well for their business.

A modest storage building, about the size of a large garage, is part of the company's history. That's where the late Ken Morris and his wife Jean started Oreton Building Supplies in 1987; today it's used for storage of materials that need to be kept dry, such as plywood and plasterboard.

The young start-up business in 1987 grew and grew, Ken and Jean setting a standard that really worked well. So well that in 1997 the company bought out Thompson and Parkes in Kidderminster and the two businesses combined under that name in 2006.

Steve Bounds arrived nine years ago to run this Oreton branch, having worked for a branch of a big company in Much Wenlock. So why the move to Oreton? "I wanted to work for a family business," he explains. "Ken Morris was a really good gaffer, a great bloke."

Steve runs a tight ship, the large stock handled by just four busy staff. "We try to stock everything our customers will need," says Steve. Then walks outside to show off the stacks of some of it up to six timber, metres long, bags of aggregates, drainage piping, steel cavity lintels up to 4.8 metres long, roof tiles and Indian sandstone paving. Twenty percent of this business is serving farming.



"Do you stock much timber, Mr Bounds?" Steve took us out into the yard to show just how much.

The neat trading slogan they use is "Proud to be Local" and that reflects in the area they serve, travelling as far as Craven Arms, Ludlow, Bridgnorth, Tenbury Wells, Highley and Far Forest. We can take Cleobury Mortimer for granted as part of that list, they are the obvious source of supply for any builder in or near this town.

So what's their secret, this family business that's survived and grown through good times and bad? "Second to none for integrity, stock availability and price," is Steve's answer. And can they compete with large companies who have big buying power? "We have to be competitive or we wouldn't be here." Good logic.

Thompson and Parkes offer the complete package, whatever you need for anything from a new house build to a new patio. And with the move to a cleaner operation with bagged aggregates, they can serve any customer quicker and just collect the bags when the job's finished. Much less mess left to clear up.

They're open from 7.30 to 4.30 Monday to Friday and 8.00 to 12.00 on Saturday. Deliveries are made on their own wagon, with local lad Marlon Bache at the wheel, who knows the area very well. What they have to offer from the unlikely location in rural Oreton is over half a million pounds worth of building and maintenance materials. All watched over by closed circuit television cameras and an alarm system.

This is another local success story, quietly getting on with business by knowing what their customers want and how to supply it . It's not rocket science making the place work, it's just good old fashioned common sense.


