

THE MICHAELMAS CONCERT

What a fine idea this was, Francis Engleheart's according to local sources, designed to remind us of the depth of talent this community is home to. Funds raised went to Cleobury Compassionate Communities and something of the order of 100 tickets were sold. Pete Blackburn hosted the evening with a brief outline of Saint Mary's church's history dating back to pre Norman times and still a place of worship.

Erika Madi Jones opened the evening with work from Wagner's 'Tanhauser" accompanied by Geoff Weaver, her magnificent voice filling the vaults of the church, then falling to a soft near-whisper when still every syllable could be clearly heard. A wonderful blend of vocal quality and clear diction.

Then came a miscellany of poetry and song, from Celia and Ewan Gibb, a much talented pair with Francis Engleheart accompanying before men in the cast helped Hannah Coleman wheel her harp to centre stage and the solo performance of Purcell's 'Ground in F'. It was something of a revelation for many in the audience to hear the harpist not as an accompanist but as the sole performer and the applause reflected the effect on those for whom this was a new experience.

The Ludford Duo, two professional cellists of note, presented Haydn's Duet in D Hob:X.11 to again show an unusual blend of the instruments' versatility when allowed to break away from the orchestra. And to end the first half of the evening, Erika Madi Jones gave voice to works by Leah and Dvorak.

Back on stage briefly Pete Blackburn, clearly a man who knows how to get a message across with no time wasted, asked the audience to hold their applause back until Celia Gibb had reopened the music feast with 'O Quam Mirabilis' and Hannah Coleman had followed with a solo performance of Einaudi's "I Giorni", the two artists occupying opposite ends of the church. Huge applause greeted this novel presentation.

The Gibb family joined with Francis Engleheart as accompanist to Celia singing works by Weill and Gershwin, with Ewan adding readings. The Ludford Duo then offered Aaron Minsky's "Three American Cello Duets" with a gentle touch of western and blues rhythms. A complete break

from what most would expect of cello players, but beautifully done.

Paul Engleheart then read 'The Feast of Michaelmas', a poetic work written for the occasion by David Walford. The editor has a growing fondness for poetry and David Walford's work in particular, but this reading was quite masterly, the best reading of poetic work since drama teacher Arthur Short read Dylan Thomas's "Do not go gentle into that dark night" at my wife's funeral. Superb.

Erika Jones ended the evening with Puccini's "O mio bambino caro" and many people stayed seated, still hearing the echoes of a very special occasion. The audience left on a gentle autumn evening that seemed to continue the feeling of warmth the event generated. This deserves to become a regular feature in the social calendar. *Jim Reynolds*

THE BREAKFAST CLUB

Mycorrhizal Network – the title of October's talk– was perhaps an unfamiliar term for the non-scientists amongst us but Kit Smith, the speaker, soon enlightened us. He explained that there exists below ground, a complex and huge network of tiny fungi threads which far from being harmful to trees and eighty-five per cent of plants, is absolutely crucial for their survival. There is a miraculous, continuous cycle of symbiosis between plant life and fungi without which trees and the majority of plants would not exist. Indeed neither would we!

Little is known about myccorrhizal networks and very few photos of this underground phenomenon exist but fortunately awareness has been aroused and in recent years, research has started to be carried out. To this end, a worldwide consortium of academics has been established – the Society for the Preservation of Underground Networks or SPUN for short– and is conducting on-going research into this little known phenomenon.

New builds, road construction, pollution wash-off from roads are all affecting essential fungi but all is not lost. We can do our bit! Be aware and maybe consider adding a pinch of mycorrhizal fungi 'rootwise' when planting out. And don't try to get rid of any 'fairy ring' on your lawn!



CLEOBURY GARDENERS

"Why Apples are Interesting". This is the title of the presentation by Wade Muggleton, which we hosted on 11 September. It certainly was interesting; also very entertaining and informative. We were given original history; which apples to choose to plant and why; advice on pruning; details of the various classifications, and anecdotes to further explain the derivation of names of apples we know today and how they appeared in today's fruit bowl.

The oldest record of the sweet apple dates from 2300-2400 years ago in China. The seeds (pips) travelled out on the Silk Roads, eventually arriving in Rome and wider Europe and the Mediterrean. However, when these trade routes became irrelevant due to changing boundaries, countries and allegiances, the history of the apple becomes fragmented: the libraries and written histories and breeding records of not only the type of apple produced, but also the development of root stock for grafting; all this wonderful information having been destroyed in wars and civil unrest.

Apples, whilst they have seeds, do not grow true, having a genetic mix of the host apple and the grafted root stock. There is a whole science attached to mapping the DNA of root stocks to define height of the fully grown tree and type of apple produced, together with matching for suitability to host apple genes. There is existing gene pool identification system which enables growers like Wade to identify particular orchard finds, and this gene pool is further enhanced every time unidentified trees are introduced for investigation. The existence of this increasing fund of knowledge is also filling in some of the missing histories of the spread of the fruit.

Wade had a display of about sixty different apples, and proceeded to entertain us with how some of the apples had gained their names. Did you know that Dr Bramley did not plant the original famous and ancient Bramley Apple Tree; that there was a Granny Smith; that the Lord Lambourn apple and the Duke of Devonshire apple were probably bred by their gardeners, and the Golden Russet is probably a true English cultivar. (There is a Leathercoat Russet, but I personally think all russets are leathercoated!). Linda Ashman

Leon narrates his experiences as he tries to make sense of a complicated world which doesn't seem to hear him. Heart breaking and uplifting, this debut novel by Kit de Waal is based on her knowledge of the system. She serves as a magistrate on adoption panels and was a foster child herself. We liked the connection of gardening helping with life. There was much discussion about current fostering and adoption, how it has changed for the better but probably still needs working on. Various opinions about the ending but a well written, clever book. A good read. Next book is quite a change, 'Brave New World' by Aldous Huxley, written in 1932. We meet on November 20th at the library for our chat.

SIMON EVANS' LIFE AND WORK

On Friday November 10th Dr Mark Baldwin will give an illustrated talk on the life of the man probably Cleobury Mortimer's best known inhabitant. In an eventful life, he was a soldier, postman, author and a broadcaster enthralling audiences with his accounts of life in rural Shropshire in the 1930s. He was advised to move to a rural area where the cleaner air would help his lungs, damaged by gas in the trenches during WW1. The 'Simon Evans Way' is named after him as it is based on the route he followed during his time as a local postman, covering over 20 miles every day in all weathers. Those of you who have recently moved to Cleobury may not be familiar with his story and this is an opportunity to learn more. His lungs eventually failed and he died in hospital in Birmingham in 1940, the day before his 45th birthday, his ashes being scattered on Abdon Burf.

CLEE HILL WILDLIFE GROUP

The Group covers 80 square kilometres, which have been surveyed since 2012. 33 people helped with this year's survey

Curlew results were the most encouraging for some years: 7 – 8 pairs found in the original area, one more than last year. Three nests were found, one a relay by the same pair, but although all three of those nests were predated, a chick fledged from each of two other nests, one on Magpie Hill and one near Coreley. This is great news, the first fledged young for some years!!! A distribution map can be found on our website. For other species, there were two or three pairs of Lapwing: at Hollywaste, the only known

since 2017, and 8-9 pairs of Kestrel: Clee Hill is a county hotspot, and we are supporting a nest box and ringing project. Five nests were found. At least two Cuckoo territories were located, but there must be more, and there were more Barn Owl sightings than for many years. There were probably three pairs, and one nest was found with three fledged young. Two Red Kite nests were also found, in the same places as last year.

If you know of any breeding sites for any of these species, please tell us about them. Don't assume we already know about them. In particular, does anyone know if there were definitely two pairs of Curlew at Hollywaste, and did anyone see any Curlew chicks or fledged young?

In 2024, we need to keep monitoring these species, particularly Curlew and Kestrel, and new helpers are wanted, please.

A full report of the 2023 results will be prepared and distributed early next year to everyone who helped. If you have any information about breeding sites in 2023, want to help or be kept informed about what we are doing, contact Chris Bargman (01299 270514, email: chcwg@shropscwgs.org.uk).

A LOVE STORY. TWO WEDDINGS AND ONE VERY SPECIAL BRIDESMAID!

I met the love of my life Mark 37 years ago. In 1991, we got married in a formal church service in my hometown of Neston. We had two beautiful boys, Joshua and Oliver. Then sadly in 2004, we lost our way and got divorced, but remained great friends and brought our boys up together.

I've now been disabled for four years. I can't walk or talk and Mark is my carer. In February 32yrs on, he proposed to me again and of course I said yes! We agreed we wanted a church wedding, at St John's church in Doddington, to be married by family friend Reverend Kelvin Price. Our Josh would be Mark's Best Man and Ollie would give me away. No invites would be sent out, and no 'after do' for fear of me risking another brain seizure.

We met church warden Celia Gibb and her husband Ewan. They welcomed us into the church with open arms, along with the rest of their lovely regular congregation. Our second banns were read in Cleobury Church. After that, I received messages from friends asking for details of our Wedding Service. I decided I wanted to be surrounded by all my lovely local friends, at our beautiful Church. Without Mark knowing and with lots of help from great friends, we planned my dream wedding that Mark would never forget. It had to be full of love and laughter. I secretly agreed all of my ideas with Celia and our Reverend Kelvin.

On September 28th, 32yrs to the day of our first wedding, my groom Mark turned up at our church, to see lots of cars parked outside, the pathway covered in ribbons and beautiful flowers in the church. He was greeted by my friends serving Bucks Fizz, then saw that the church was buzzing, with a full congregation! Then Pete played my

first chosen song 'You're still the one' by Shania Twain.

Mark turned round to see I was wearing my original wedding dress, tiara and veil. Plus our two strong sons had lifted me out of my wheelchair, to hold me up and they walked me down the aisle. My dream come true!

We undertook our vows, then Kelvin asked our boys for the wedding rings. They didn't have them. The congregation then turned around to see my very special bridesmaid, prancing down the aisle, carrying our rings! Our miniature Shetland pony, Little Miss Daisy! Everyone loved that!

While we went to the altar to sign the register, accompanied by Daisy, everyone joined in singing my favourite song by Neil Diamond – Sweet Caroline. The atmosphere in the church, throughout my dream wedding Service, was beyond my expectations – full of love, fun and laughter. Our church collection raised £145 and my charity Newbridge Cat rescue raised £45.

During most of its history the Wyre Forest was home to a number of large mammals that we don't see around anymore, including the 'Three Bs': bear, boar and beaver. I wouldn't be comfortable sharing the forest with the first two, which had a liking for young lambs and could do humans serious damage as well, but beavers are herbivores, living on water plants, bark and leaves. Although they are well known for their ability to fell small trees and can grow to a metre long from nose to tail and weigh 30kg they have never posed a threat to people. In fact the reverse is true and they were hunted to extinction in Britain 500 years ago, mainly for their fur and a product from their scent



Beavers have extremely strong teeth and I've included a photo of an American beaver skull, cut away to show the extent of the long, curved incisors. These have an iron-rich outer enamel which gives them their orange colour and strength. The trees felled are divided up into smaller branches and carried to build dams, restricting water

flow and creating deep pools. Lodges are made in the dams using mud as well as branches – a safe place for the beavers to live and breed. A side-effect of this behaviour is the beneficial impact on the landscape. An area inhabited by beavers will have watercourses, wet woodland, coppiced trees, glades and dead wood: a varied jigsaw of habitats for a whole range of species struggling to survive in our somewhat sterile countryside.

Small numbers of beavers (and we're talking about the Eurasian Beaver, Castor fiber, here) now live in several locations in Britain: some as a result of carefully monitored reintroductions, some of more mysterious origin. I've visited Knapdale in Mid-Argyll and been amazed at the pencilshaped tree stumps (surely produced by a chain saw?) and the beavers' engineering work. It now seems likely that the Wyre Forest will join that list of release sites next year. An announcement by Forestry England and Natural England said, 'Plans are in place to introduce two adult beavers into a fenced enclosure in Spring 2024. This enclosure will be approximately five hectares in size, and will be located along a tributary close to the Dowles Brook, to the north of the disused railway.'

This development will enrich the largest woodland National Nature Reserve in England (now over 1455 hectares) and have direct benefit for those of us living nearby, as the beavers' activity will slow the flow of water heading into Dowles Brook and the Severn in times of heavy rainfall, reducing the risk of flooding. And all without costing the Environment Agency a penny!

Letter from Westminster – November 2023 Remembrance

November always holds special significance for me, as both a former Defence Minister and now Commissioner for the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, put into sharper focus this year by the continuing war in Ukraine and the conflict between Israel and Hamas.

The history of Shropshire is intertwined with the sacrifices made by countless men and women who answered the call of duty during times of conflict. Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday are marked across the county, as indeed across the country, as we come together to honour the fallen and reflect on the enduring importance of remembrance. These are perhaps felt all the more acutely as we see the different way in which war dead are treated in current conflicts.

Shropshire, like most parts of the UK, bears the scars of war. From the towns of Bridgnorth and Ludlow to the villages dotting the countryside, each corner of this county has a story to tell. The names of those who made the ultimate sacrifice are etched in the local war memorials, reminding us that freedom comes at a price.

Interestingly, South Shropshire is home to the only Thankful Village in our county – the village of Harley, just outside Much Wenlock. Thankful Villages are those who lost no men during the First World War, of which there are only thought to be 53 in the entire country. The fact there are so few shows the scale of the human destruction wrought by the First World War.

The impact of the First World War lives on in our national psyche. Our National Service of Remembrance takes place at the Cenotaph, erected as a temporary monument after the end of the War, only to be left in perpetuity due to its resonance with all those who had served and the wider public at the time.

We also have the most visible reminder of the First World War in November - the red poppy adorning lapels and dresses, serving as a vivid reminder of the bloodshed and sacrifice of those who fought for our liberty. In Shropshire we have excellent volunteers who raise money for the Royal British Legion throughout their poppy appeal, and I encourage local residents to support them and wear their poppy with pride.

I try to attend as many local services as I can to mark remembrance, this year attending four across the constituency. While I cannot make them all, it is a welcome sign of our commitment to the memory of the fallen that we still hold so many services and well supported parades in towns and villages across South Shropshire.

As I mentioned in my last Letter from Westminster, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission website (www.cwgc.org) details locations of local grave sites, including names of those commemorated, for those who wish to pay their respects this month. We are always looking for volunteers to help maintain the more isolated graves, and the website gives details of how to volunteer to look after a grave near you, should you wish to get involved.

Farewell to a Friend: The Beauty of a Natural Burial

Despite the billing, this month's offering has absolutely nothing to do with gardening. It does, however, borrow very heavily from Mother Nature.

I make no apologies for this - it's been quite a month...

A couple of weeks ago, I found myself at the funeral of a friend. Beth was one of those people who effortlessly ticked all the boxes of life. She lit up a room, possessed a marvellous Welsh self-deprecating humour, sang from the top of her lungs at the drop of a hat and packed more adventures into her life than people twice her age. She also had an ability to easily drink you under the table, only to emerge bright as a button the next morning - a characteristic that was both impressive and mildly frustrating. Oh, and she brought untold joy to my friend, David, her husband.

Beth was a remarkable woman.

She had a unique relationship with death. She stared down her tenacious and cruel cancer, treating it like it was an annoying neighbour who played loud music at all hours. To her, it was something you had to live with, but she was determined that it wasn't going to dominate her life or the life of her family. This attitude gave her the chance to meticulously plan her own funeral...and what a farewell it turned out to be. Beth's was one of the most remarkable funerals I've ever attended (which is saying something - at my age, I'm starting to amass quite a collection of 'In Memory Of' Orders of Service).

One of the reasons it was so memorable was that it was my first *natural* burial. Beth was laid to rest in a non-religious setting -

a peaceful field that overlooked the stunning Cotswold countryside. Gorgeous and bucolic doesn't do it justice.

The celebrant summed up the whole concept of natural burials perfectly in her introduction - Beth had not only chosen this place because she loved nature but also because it allowed those left behind to remember her in the most natural way possible. Her boys can bring a ball and play in the field, or pack a picnic and make a day of it. The instructions were clear - bring happy memories and create more while you're there.

Wow. Now that's how you celebrate someone's life.

There's a growing trend toward natural burials. There are over 300 of these special and remarkably friendly final resting places across the UK, each offering a more eco-conscious way to bid farewell to our loved ones. Have a Google to find out more - it's definitely worth exploring. I found the stories incredibly moving and uplifting.

Despite the beautiful setting and positivity from everyone attending, Beth's funeral, like all funerals, was tough going. Beth was special, and losing her was just plain unfair. Dragging her away from her devoted husband, beautiful boys, and family was nothing short of cruel. But the setting and celebration of nature, with all its good bits and cruel bits, its beauty and drizzly rain, seemed to be the perfect tribute. It was simple, respectful, and brimming with both laughter and tears.

Cheers, Beth - I'll raise a glass (or two) to you. May your memory continue to blossom like the flowers in that peaceful field.

THE FOOTPATH ASSOCIATION

The clocks were set back an hour on Sunday 29th October as British Summer Time came to an end for another year. The shorter days still give many opportunities for a country walk although a good book by the fire is often preferable on rainy days.

Last month the work party replaced a very rickety stile with a kissing gate on a path between Bransley and Dudnill. It is on the CMFA's Walk 19, The Court Circular. More work on this route is planned for next year. Have a look at the before and after photos on the CMFA Facebook page. This is an interesting walk starting in Hopton Wafers. The circular route goes through Earls Ditton, Dudnill, Bransley before returning past Hopton Court. The leaflet narrative points out several places of historical interest along the way.

So far this year we have had an average of 18 people attending the twice monthly Walking for Health walks, which looking back is the same as last year. Where possible we try to pick a route away from the town footpaths.

Pinkham, the stretch of the River Rea from Papermills to Walford Bridge, Workhouse Bank and the Caravan Park are areas that are popular but rather weather dependent. Wednesday November 8th and 22nd are the two dates for this month. We meet at 10.00am outside St Mary's Church and return for delicious refreshments in the Market Hall provided by CoCo.

The Country Walk on October 1st was based on Rea Valley Amble, CMFA walk 18. We did go this way in April but you can never have too much of a good thing! It was warm for the time of year, humid with little wind. The ground was already getting muddy in places but these were mostly avoided with a slight detour round bad patches. Six CMFA members were joined by nine first timers (plus a dog). Some visitors had travelled quite a distance Kidderminster, Bewdley, Highley, Tenbury Wells and Church Stretton. Everyone said how much they had enjoyed the walk, thanked the leader and hopefully will be back.

The full moon on November 27th is the Beaver Moon. There are several theories about the origin of the name. One is that it signals the time when the Native Americans used to set their beaver traps to give them a supply of warm winter fur. Another is that this is when the Beavers are busy preparing for the winter before the rivers freeze.





This has probably resulted in an over estimate of the true number so we shall see if an amended figure appears in due course.

Water companies monitor sewage spills (around 800 per day last year) but refuse to release the figures saying that it might lead to media outlets 'drawing conclusions that the data may or not support'. This sounds like an admission that the data would indeed support the obvious conclusions. They are allowed to release sewage from storm overflows in the case of heavy rain but it would appear that 'dry' spills are occurring even when it isn't raining. Never mind, it hasn't stopped bosses getting bonuses despite failing to meet leakage targets. They are also allowed to increase our bills to cover their costs - £88 million this year in the case of Severn Trent. However, you will be pleased to know that Liv Garfield, the ST Chief Executive, shares our pain about price rises although I suspect she doesn't hurt quite as much as the rest of us given that her salary is nearly £4 million a year (plus bonuses...).

I keep hearing boasts from West Mercia police that they have more officers than ever before. All good stuff but it does beg the question: where are they? Our local policing team should consist of one PC and three PCSO's. At the time of writing, it actually consists of one PCSO... The Sergeant has also moved on so what is going on? Numbers are all very well but what is the life experience of many new recruits? If they are fresh from University, I am worried that they will have fainting fits and need counselling if anyone disagrees with them or is less than polite. After all, you can't just cancel members of the public however much you might want to...





50 YEARS AND STILL NOT SLOW

John Brazier is best known locally as a notable accountant, currently based at what used to be The Three Horseshoes pub at Number 53 in the High Street. The business title there is now Mortimer Childe Accounting, very professional and smart in their presentation, with a friendly staff who make callers feel welcome.

The man behind this operation has what some might consider a dark side, a long term rally driver with a good record in the 50 years he's been competing. Sitting alongside him as they make a less than gentle progress down forest and mountain tracks is son Damian Bird, an experienced navigator with the capacity to read the notes without getting worried about speed. A man who can do a calm job with the car flying over jumps and sliding sideways down tracks has to be rather special.

On November 23rd they'll be leaving Carmarthen with five days of the Roger Albert Clark Rally ahead of them. This UK Historic Rally event commemorates the career of one of Britain's outstanding drivers, who drove a Ford Escort. The cars must be Pre 1986 and have two wheel drive. John and Damian will be in an Escort, very special with its 2.0 litre Cosworth BDA engine and running gear to match. And they've only driven it once before...

The Rally includes 350 miles of timed stages, the longest of them rounding the week off with a 37 mile timed stretch, having visited Welsh forests, Kielder and the Lake District before ending in Carlisle. It's a very serious event, with 180 crews entered, including the best drivers from the UK classic rally scene and several competitors in the current World Championship.

John's competition carer started in 1973 in a Sunbeam Imp Sport that never failed to finish an event. He clearly learned that old competition maxim as a young man: "To finish first, you must first finish." He progressed through a Vauxhall Astra that went well and finished high enough in a series to earn him a drive in the full-blown RAC Rally amongst the professionals. On through a Peugeot 205 to a Subaru Impreza, that he gave me a ride in; my lips are sealed on the matter of how fast the Scoobydoo could accelerate, but I can tell you as a part-time bike journalist who occasionally did

test rides on drag bikes, it was damned quick. His regular competition career reached its peak with a Mitsubishi Evo, a vehicle one local chap bought, enjoyed immensely and sold before temptation managed to cost him his licence.

Does that make John sound like a road hog? He's certainly not and like most drivers with a competition background he's smooth and gentle in his everyday driving. But in 1993 he won his class in the National Championship and at one stage led his class in the RAC Rally when it was a World Championship event. He points out that Damian has a 100 percent finishing record in competition, including the two of them finishing third in class in the Ulster International event. All this with a sense of humour, John suggesting that Damian's record is down to the Iron Bru socks he wears!

The Clarion will have gone to print by the time the rally is over, so we won't be able to tell how the adventure ended until next year. But we hope you'll join their families and friends in wishing them a safe, swift and successful drive.

And if anyone dares to tell you that accountants are always boring, tell them about this 70 year old who celebrated his birthday with an extreme reminder of his old rallying habit. And if that doesn't convince them, we'll ask John if he could give them a demonstration at one of the rally training courses.







It has been a couple of months since the last edition of Beat The Scammers but naturally it was not 2 months off for the scum that prey on the innocent and the vulnerable. So we are back with the same resolve to inform and educate and if at all possible, save someone from the misery of loss.

For a long time, the focus has been on protection of the more mature community that these pages reach out to. But we must not forget the younger members of our society. They are our children, our grandchildren and in many cases our great grandchildren. In youth we all remember how we liked to experiment, try something new and who does not remember thinking that we knew better than our elders.

There are some aspects of life where failure to heed the warnings can have a catastrophic impact on our future, whatever age we are. This is where we turn to youth to help some of us understand the more complex issues of using modern technology.

We learn that over half of all crime committed these days is online fraud which is growing. The fraudsters sit comfortably behind their computer screens, in many cases in different countries or different continents. Law enforcement in other cultures is maybe not as effective as in our country, so the best way to defeat these criminals is to be aware of the techniques, look out for them and not be drawn into devious webs.

There are measures that can and should be taken to stop most fraud although the very most sophisticated of frauds may still be successful. Worcester University has launched a campaign to raise awareness and have called it **3 Steps to Protect.**

It is recognised that many more mature members of the community find some of the technological changes very challenging, but this is where our younger members of the community, our children and grandchildren can play a part in helping protect their grandparents.

There are three easy steps to follow that they can help others to enhance their online security. By online, I don't just mean, those who use smart mobile phones or tablets, even if it just for emails or staying in touch. But even the landline phone which is often a lifeline for elderly people can be a target for scammers.

The simple steps apply to anyone who has more than just a landline phone at home, while even the last step applies to anyone in any situation, no matter how they live their lives.

STRONG PASSWORDS

Use strong passwords for any online access. Perhaps 3 random words with numbers and at least one special character. Try not to use the same password for different things.

2 STEP VERIFICATION (2SV)

There is a process that most major suppliers of online services recommend now. It is called 2 Step Verification. When you sign up for a service the provider will ask for an associated mobile number owned by you and send a text to that number every time you log on. You must respond to that text to verify it is you and not someone impersonating you.

STOP AND THINK

Stop and Think. This is something I have encouraged in the past. Do not be bullied into acting if you are unsure of an unsolicited approach. If possible, ask for the caller's number and say you will call back. If you have a number your Bank or someone has given you, use that to call back on. A genuine person will understand your reluctance until you are sure that the person contacting you is as they say. This applies to even a call to your home landline.


