They sang through a selection and then the audience got their hands together and asked for more. The CD is available at £10, not a fat price for such quality. PROPOSED CLOSURE OF LOCAL DEPOT

Bridgnorth councillor Julia Buckley writes to tell us that the protest about the local depot closure was very strong, with 2112 signatures in before the deadline. That means Shropshire Council had to hold a full debate on the matter on September 23rd and we hope to get news of that before we go to press on the 24th. Meanwhile, we thought you'd like to know that once again people power counts.

Councillor Buckley is also asking for an environmental assessment of the extra carbon consumption needed to travel twice the distance if the depot is closed and crews drive in from Craven Arms.



The Mens' Shed met face to face for the first time in many months on September 7th. Chairman Pete Blackburn reminded us that the Shed was just four years old and remarked on the growth from concept to the reality of opening this year. The current position is impressive, with insurance arranged for indoor activity only, a Test and Trace diary in place and the storage unit moved to a more convenient place on better standing, thanks to Mawley Town Farm.

Fire safety in the shed is established and approved and the Belfast sink is sitting on a counter made by Pineland at a very special price. Window shutters have been made, painted and installed by Colin Tolley, while table tops made redundant by changes in the layout at the Parish Church have been remade by Mike into worktops - double recycling! We were given a shredder, which Mike sold on and bought wood for the internal work stations with the proceeds. It's an impressive catalogue of effective use of old and new(ish) materials.

Members were notified of the retirement of treasurer Bill Duley, who took over from Keith Martin and continued to raise funds in a thorough and quiet way. Bill will be missed.

We have to establish a hot water supply in the mobile home and attend to various small jobs as we move towards a firm date for our official opening. It's not far away and most of the work still to do is administrative.



GREAT NEWS FOR CLOWS TOP

Nigel Caldicott reports:

For some time the committee at Clows Top Victory Hall have been fundraising to replace the hall roof. Following many fundraising events and unsuccessful grant applications, the Committee are extremely pleased to announce that the National Lottery Community Fund have made a grant of £10,000 to assist with funding the replacement of the roof which is well over 60 years old. This will serve to improve the aesthetics of the Hall whilst making it a drier and cosier venue for the numerous events that take place. Treasurer Chris Gennard said "We are very grateful for this grant which goes a long way towards our goal of making our facilities better and more sustainable. Victory Hall is the only public entertainment venue available to the local community, therefore it is important to make sure it is ready for everyone to use. We still need to find further funding but we are feeling confident that we will be able to commit to the work being done in the very near future."

On 21st August, with the generous support of Bayton Parish Council, the delayed VE/VJ Day Celebrations were held at the Hall and, although the weather was rather damp, there was considerable public support on the day. The Royal British Legion is celebrating its 100th Anniversary this year and the event began with a short Remembrance Service in the Hall conducted by Rev Sallie Butcher with the Far Forest and Rock Legion Branch Standards in attendance. Further music events are being planned for the next few months details of which will be available on the Clows Top Victory Hall Facebook Page.

The committee are also looking forward to welcoming local people to the Family Evenings that are being held on the first and third Fridays of each month between 6.00 and 9.00pm. There will be a range of games and activities for all ages and a licensed bar. Dates for October are Friday 1st and 15th.

THE FOOTPATH ASSOCIATION

In September a dozen people enjoyed a visit to the Wyre Forest with Walking for Health. The morning was rather warm and the forest offered some welcome shade. We finished with refreshments at the café before returning to Cleobury. On 13th October the second Awayday of the year will be to Bewdley. Anyone interested should meet at the Sports Centre Car Park, Love Lane, in time for a 10.00am departure. There will be a gentle stroll along the River Severn with a stop for refreshments in Bewdley. Shared transport is available.

The very popular monthly Parish Walk returned in September after an 18 month Covid break. 16 walkers enjoyed a leisurely walk around the Mawley Estate. A similar walk named Walk 3 The Mawley Hall Tour can be found on the CMFA website. Our October Walk is on Sunday 3rd October at 10am, starting from Cleobury Market Hall.

Last month our work parties replaced a stile with a kissing gate at Barnsland Farm. They also installed a dog gate in the same area. These are popular with dog owners particularly those with larger breeds! The brambles and nettles are still a nuisance along many paths in the area. So don't forget your secateurs when you are out and about. If you see any problems along your route please notify CMFA through our website or Facebook page.

One of my favourite walks in the local area is the Simon Evans Way. A long distance path of about 22 kms tracing a rough figure of eight north of Cleobury Mortimer along the River Rea Valley. It can be either a day's hike for the more energetic or two leisurely circular walks. The route is a moderate hike along field paths with a few stiles, quiet lanes and bridleways which can be muddy after heavy rain. There are some steep sections but many places to stop and admire the lovely views with the Clee Hills in the distance. It was developed by CMFA as a Millennium project to celebrate the life of Simon Evans who was a postman, author and poet in Cleobury Mortimer between the two World Wars. The walk follows the essence of his round rather than the actual route. CMFA produced a booklet with narrative by Bill Duley, maps and lovely illustrations by John Tuck with the route plan research by Dr Mark Baldwin. It gives interesting information about his life, his books and the area of the walk. A walking leaflet was produced when the route was updated. It is easier to use as a walk guide but still contains some details of Simon Evans' life and the history of the area. In 2014 the revised route was included in a series of War Walks. There were plans for a walking festival in 2020 to mark the 20th anniversary but were shelved due to Covid restrictions. October in the Wyre Forest

At the end of this month the world's most affluent nations and largest global businesses meet in Glasgow for COP26 (the 26th Conference of Parties or, in other words, the UN 2021 Climate Change Conference). The parties need to reach some brave and far-reaching decisions to avert the worst effects of climate change.

I'm guessing that I'm not the only one who can experience despair in the face of reports of everworsening environmental damage, extinction threats and freak weather events but at least I have the wildlife of the Wyre Forest on my doorstep to reassure me that things are still fine in our own ancient English woodland.

Or are they? Is the absence of nesting House Martins this year due to their migration from Africa being disrupted by unusually bad weather? Oak trees are dying of diseases not known before; can they recover and still dominate the forest in years to come? Should I be pleased that Gooseberry Sawfly and Raspberry Beetle have failed to attack my fruit crops this year or is this another sign of crashing insect populations? There are a number of other Wyre Forest residents that are causing concern. The number of Cuckoos has been dropping each year, and this year I never heard one calling. The adder population seems to be in decline despite efforts to provide them with ideal habitat. Ash trees aren't a major constituent of the forest but are succumbing to Ash Dieback as it sweeps through the nation.

Rather than dwelling on these examples, which for the most part have causes that are not fully understood, let me tell you about some of the things being done to help the situation. Firstly, we are understanding more about the natural systems that control the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere and beginning to appreciate the role of forests, peat bogs, soils and aquatic habitats in locking up carbon. The patchwork of habitats in the landscape, whether woodland, heathland, wetland or pasture, is precious and needs to be carefully managed. Erosion needs to be repaired, smothering vegetation cut back or grazed, and silted-up ponds restored. The forest needs to be more varied to provide food and shelter for large numbers of species even though new tree diseases are taking their toll, so this winter another 2000 native berry and nut-bearing trees will be planted in the oak woods.

The 'Slow the Flow' project is making good progress with many leaky dams having been constructed locally to reduce the peak flow in the Dowles Brook and River Severn after heavy rain, and landowners are being encouraged to increase woodland cover and create new lakes and ponds. There are no 're-wilding' schemes that I know of locally, but maybe that is the key to it: that we all do our bit to re-wild those little pieces of the world where we have the chance and power to do so. *Linda Iles*

Philip Dunne's Letter from Westminster

Winter, with receding daylight hours, always tends to put more pressure on bandwidth in a family household – whether that's due to online shopping, streaming services for films and TV, or connecting online with family and friends.

Fortunately, the government is determined to get to grips with delivering improved broadband, especially to rural and hard to reach areas, which is set out in the National Infrastructure Strategy.

More than a third of UK premises now have access to gigabit-capable connections, up from 9% in July 2019 (when Boris Johnson became Prime Minister). But here in South Shropshire, a mere 5.5% of us can access such speeds.

While gigabit broadband, with download speeds of up to 1,000Mbps, is not necessarily needed by every household, it does show we have a long way to go to meet the government's target of a minimum of 85% gigabit capable coverage across the UK by 2025, with a rollout of as close to 100% as soon as possible after that.

That is not to say broadband in South Shropshire has not improved. Superfast broadband is now available to 80% of households and businesses here, and the average download speed for the constituency is 38.6mbps. But we lag behind the UK average, thanks to faster commercial rollout and gigabit speeds in urban areas. So we need to see a step change improvement.

The good news is that the government committed to target rural areas for better broadband, when announcing earlier this year that Shropshire and Telford would be within the first phase of the national Gigabit Programme. This is being delivered by BDUK, who are consulting regularly with Connecting Shropshire on what needs to be done to start the roll-out to ensure this upgrade work progresses as quickly as possible.

For some users, their experience of broadband at home does not match the speeds they were led to believe they would receive when purchasing their contract. Ofcom recognised this as a problem, and have taken steps to ensure broadband providers advertise realistic speeds. If your service doesn't deliver the speeds you were promised by your provider, get in touch with them. If the problem is on their network and they can't fix it within 30 days, they must let you leave your contract without having to pay an early exit fee. Ofcom's guidance for switching can be found here: <u>https://www.ofcom.org.uk/phonestelecoms-and-internet/advice-for-consumers/ costs-and-billing/switching/switchingbroadband-provider</u>.

I am also aware of some persistent issues of poor mobile signal in South Shropshire, which prove doubly frustrating, given it is now possible to access home broadband via a 4G or 5G hub, if your signal is good enough – potentially eliminating the need for a fibre broadband contract altogether, depending on your usage and speed requirements.

The government has signed a £1bn deal with Mobile Network Operators (MNOs) to deliver a Shared Rural Network – sharing investment costs to increase 4G mobile coverage throughout the UK to 95 per cent by the end of 2025, irrespective of what network provider people use. Operators have already announced the first 333 upgrades and 54 new sites in England – with 8 more masts in South Shropshire from EE. The Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport will shortly be announcing the next stage of the programme.

The pandemic has proved the need for good mobile and broadband coverage, irrespective of whether we live in rural or urban areas. So this investment in South Shropshire's digital infrastructure is extremely welcome. It will transform the ability for many of us to work where we live. I shall continue to press our case for rural roll-out


She'll always be a part of the garden... and our lives.

Call for sites in support of the Cleobury Mortimer Neighbourhood Development Plan

The recent call for sites, in support of the Cleobury Mortimer Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP), concluded at midday on Friday 17th September 2021. The Town Council is pleased to confirm that local landowners have submitted four areas of land for consideration in the next phase of the NDP process. Over the coming weeks, an independent consultant will be reviewing the submissions against the assessment methodology and policies which were published on the Cleobury Mortimer Town Council website as part of the process. The consultant will also visit the sites being offered together with members of the Steering Group to ensure a fair and thorough assessment.


The four sites put forward are shown below.



Land off Lion Lane (0.45 ha)



Land off Tenbury Rd/Larks Rise (5.4 ha)



[* A hectare (ha) is 10,000 sq meters or an area 100m x 100m]

Next steps

The site assessment process will identify the best site(s) to include in the NDP and will be based upon the assessment methodology and policies published as part of the call for sites process. The Steering Group will then submit the recommendation to the Town Council and, if approved, a public consultation will be held and the community will have the opportunity to comment on the NDP. Once the public consultation has been completed, all comments received will be reviewed by the Steering Group and the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) will be updated. The final draft NDP will be submitted to the Town Council for final approval to proceed to the next stage with Shropshire Council.

Why is an NDP needed?

Shropshire Council have identified a need for another 120-130 houses in Cleobury Mortimer over the next 17 years. The Town Council want to ensure that the provision of housing, leisure and employment meets the needs of the community. The site(s) selected will need to accommodate the housing required plus an additional provision for public open space and wildlife improvements. The Town Council will also require 0.5 ha of additional cemetery space but the employment land remains unchanged from the previous NDP and is still planned to be located at New House Farm. If all goes well, development could commence from early 2023 providing sufficient housing and additional jobs in Cleobury Mortimer through to at least 2038.



I was recently asked by a reader about how safe the NEXTDOOR application was? Here is my take on it. I can confirm that NEXTDOOR is a bona-fide app available for both Apple and Android mobile platforms and desktops. It was started in the USA in 2008 to give people the chance to focus in community groups and share any information they wish to. If you Google it, eg." What is Nextdoor, " you will get a lot of info such as the following: "Neighbours around the world turn to Nextdoor daily to receive trusted information, give and get help, get things done, and build real-world connections with those nearby — neighbours, businesses, and public services. We believe connecting with others is a universal human need."

As an Administrator for a local NEXTDOOR group here in Cleobury, I recall being asked if I would invite 100 neighbours to join. I felt our group was effective enough and so declined. The process involved a postal mailshot sent at random to 100 neighbours.

I can confirm that if you receive such a letter, it is not a scam in the current sense of the word and if you click on www.nextdoor.uk , you can read much more about the application. You don't need to reply or be pressured by "a time limited offer". You can sign up anytime you want by going to NEXTDOOR on the web. You are asked for some personal detail, but it is held securely and it's one App I am happy to endorse. *Nigel Reid*





The months seem to fly by with still a lot going on. The drainage at the bottom end of the QEII park is to be completed before winter and we get more rain so we are keeping on top of that with the contractors and there may be some disruptions in that area while they work.

October the bulb planting will be started with ClIr Paul French, so please contact the office or him directly if you would like to help. We have also applied for another Grant from the Police and Crime commissioner to have two speed activated signs at either end of the town, Curdale and before the Fire station, to try and slow the speeding vehicles into Cleobury, while also working with the police.

We are slowly getting potholes and issues sorted with Highways, but encourage you all to still keep reporting on Fix my Street app or directly to Shropshire council. We are also putting together a letter with photos of issues throughout the town of bad markings on the Zebra crossing, dissabled bays etc and highlighting the traffic issues with areas of concern, which will be sent to West Mercia Police and Shropshire council Highways to get a stage 3 audit done because of our concerns before someone gets hurt.

Another item we are looking at with Shropshire council are the things they used to do regularly that rarely gets done now. Cutting back grass and bramble from pavements, sweeping pavements etc. We are looking at taking on some of these duties but only if we have some of our council tax back to do the job. It is an ongoing discussion but we hope that we can work with Shropshire council to address the issues and will keep you updated.

Thoughtless bad parking on pavements and around the town is an issue that causes big problems for those in the community who are having to go on the road to get past. This is being looked at with the police as it targets mothers with prams and small children, mobility scooters and the visually impared, so please think when parking as I usually see empty spaces nearby. Plus we have two free car parks!

We are later than normal this year to get all the Christmas lights checked and ready and we are also looking to enhance what we have with some additions we are looking at. We will be working with St Mary's church for the switch on to make it a pleasant experience for all. If you would like to volunteer to help put them up and take down, then please contact the council office.

Another item we are starting to look at is the Cleobury Festival for June next year and the Royal Jubilee celebrations, so if you would like to help and be a part of it, then please contact the Town council office.

Finally please be kind to each other and help when you can, but most of all stay safe!

Sorry to disappoint you, but I'm not going to talk about those lovely things your mum, grand mum or your wife used to bake. These are far more invasive having a direct impact on you every time you open a browser or look up something on the internet. The main purpose of a cookie is to identify users and possibly prepare customized Web pages or to save site login information for you. When you enter a website using cookies, files are saved on your phone, tablet or computer when you visit a website. Almost every web site you access asks you to accept cookies, and therefore in many cases, stores information about you. On the surface this might not seem such a problem and it's so easy to just click on the 'Accept' button so you can get on with looking at the web pages. It also makes it easier for the owner of the web pages to 'personalise' what you see based on your browsing history with them.

When we were part of the European Union, we were required to accept an edict known as General Data Protection Register (GDPR). This required EVERY organisation that collected personal information (even just a name and phone number) to put specific controls in place to protect that data and ensure it did not fall into the hands of criminals. Every organisation, whether commercial or not, perhaps a Charity, had to appoint a GDPR Officer, who was held to account in the protection of whatever data the organisation collected.

How does this relate to cookies? Many web sites require you to ACCEPT cookies before you can continue browsing, but also give you an option to decline certain types of information that the web site will gather. Typically, when you accept cookies, you are agreeing to information gathering.

There are 4 basic types of cookie & you should be allowed to choose which cookies you're happy for the owner of the website to use. The basic types of COOKIES fall into 4 categories.

1. Cookies that measure website use.

The website uses monitoring software from specialist vendors to measure how you use the website and your web performance experience while visiting so they can improve it based on user needs. The vendors are not allowed to share your data with others. But they collect data on how you got to the site, the pages you visit on their web site and how long you spend on each page and finally, what you click on while you're visiting the site. Other software can store information on how well pages performed on your device (including JavaScript errors).

2. Cookies that help with communications and marketing

These cookies may be set by third party vendors on behalf of the web site owner to measure for example how you view YouTube videos from the web, what products you might have shown interest in or ordered etc. This info is passed back to enable the web owner to target marketing campaigns more effectively.

3. Cookies that remember your settings

These cookies do things like remember your preferences and the choices you make, to personalise your experience of using the site. When you open a web browser on any device you have the option of setting preferences. This cookie remembers those settings and restores them every time you visit the same site.

4. Strictly necessary cookies

These essential cookies do things like remember your progress through a form (for example a licence application). This is probably the most useful one of all but cannot be turned off. It always needs to be on.

So, what do you do next?

When you open a web page for the first time, you are invariably presented with a requirement to ACCEPT or Decline cookies. The ACCEPT button is more prominent and it's easy to just click and move on. But if you don't want to be monitored on everything you do, you can deselect the nonessential cookies. Usually, you may have to click on an 'Options' button and deselect the cookies you don't want, but you must SAVE your selection before continuing. Beware that you may also see a button named 'ACCEPT ALL'. Don't select that, as the web owners are just trying one final time to persuade you to use their cookies. So, once you have made your decision, you should not be asked again next time you visit the same site as your basic preferences have been saved.

Highly reputable web site owners will not knowingly breach GDPR rules or sell on data sent by you. However, no organisation can claim to be so secure that they can't be hacked. Even the best security can be breached by the smartest criminal.




