We are fortunate in Cleobury to have seven wildlife corridors in and around our town. These ancient natural features provide shelter, security, feeding and breeding grounds for many thousands of animal and plant species as well as enhancing our countryside and urban environment for our enjoyment and pleasure. Without them it would be a barren and sterile environment.

The majority of corridors were formed after the last ice age around the valleys cut by streams, brooks and rivers as they flowed into the River Rea. Over many decades, trees, hedges and scrub have grown and prospered. Some have been planted, but most are natural self sown. We now have matured corridors with their environs which support a sustainable biodiversity. They have survived huge changes of industrial revolution, wars, farming methods and housing developments. We have the chance now at the time of a Neighbourhood Plan to repair, restore and provide new links between them, so we can continue to achieve a sustainable future for this environmentally rich part of South Shropshire.

The seven corridors are all valuably different, with their own character and form. Workhouse wild life corridor starts at Catherton Road, travels through the Skatepark, down to the site of the old Union Workhouse, through the Glen Caravan Park, past Cleanlyseat Farm, then under the road to the river Rea at the bottom of Ron Hill.

School corridor is more urban, starting at the lone oak in Catherton Road, turning left to pass below the school grounds, into Love Lane, Steeple Close, The Hurst, Viol's Walk across Childe Road and into St. Mary's ancient Churchyard.

Pudding Brook (alias Borough and Put In Brook) and its corridor starts at the pond in


Curdale Farm on the Ludlow Rd. It flows as an open brook, or via culverts or back gardens, under the Tenbury Road, through back gardens to the end of Eagle Lane, crosses Eagle Lane, goes under Lion Lane followed by more back gardens to pass under the Old Medical Centre, under Pinkham Lane to Mill Pool and finally into the Rea. Despite travelling as an open brook underground culverts through approximately 60 back gardens the brook supports a healthy clearwater biodiversity along its length. In all respects the Brook and its corridor has the widest biodiversity and the greatest threat from change. It supports many important animal and plant habitats which are in delicate balance.

Tenbury Road/Eagle Lane corridor is short but important as it joins Pudding Brook corridor at the end of Eagle Lane via new housing and possible employment land developments

Hobsons Corridor has developed over centuries from an ancient farm track along the ridge starting at Hobson's Brewery and ending downhill at the end of Lion Lane . It has several fine mature oak trees and many mature trees of other species along its length. Each 200yr. old oak is claimed (Woodland Trust) to be host to over 2000 different species of animals and plants, as well as being valuable as a carbon sink.

Rowley Brook rises west of Curdale Farm and runs in its own valley to the south of the town to cross under the Bayton Road and discharge into the Rea.

The final corridor is the river Rea Wildlife Corridor which flows south down to the Teme at Newnham Bridge. A restored river Rea has huge potential for aquatic biodiversity improvement. We need to look after these corridors with their valuable biodiversity, rich trees and hedges. *Kit Smith*

It was a popular choice when the town's people were asked in the 2018 Big Cleobury Survey to nominate their preferences in a range of extra facilities. Third most popular with 52 percent of the vote was the provision of an area where people could let their dogs run free without any risk inconvenience to other animals or people.

There was space on the open parkland that connects the sports field with Catherton Park and contractors were asked to tender for the job. No names given, just an indication of who was local. Jonathan Guest of Kinlet got the job and earlier this year a stout wire fence was erected around a 20 metre square with a lockable gate to keep dogs firmly in there and under their owners' control.

The official opening was on August 13th, with a range of dogs there to enjoy a run. New resident Peter brought along Tillie, a two year old labrador, Jan Manley had Hero, the family greyhound, Matt Sheehan brought along two whippets and Jill arrived later with two more greyhounds.

We did wonder if such athletic dogs as greyhounds could be properly exercised in such a modest space, but once off the lead they ran happily in big circles, clearly enjoying the place. The Sheehan whippets likewise, while Tillie the labrador ran and jumped, but was overwhelmed when the greyhounds became friendly. Not a single bark - all really friendly.

It is estimated that roughly 50 percent of the households in Cleobury have a dog and making such an exercise area available does make sense. As

you would expect of such a facility, there is a bin for any dog waste to be left in.

It's a very new idea and it will be interesting to see how well it is used. Peter and Tillie have been in there every day since it opened; he thinks it's great. The dogs didn't say a word, not one complaint, so we'll put that down as another success for Cleobury.

That lovely idea from Macmillan Cancer Support, the World's Greatest Coffee Morning, will be on Friday the 27th of this month.

AN AMAZING STORY

Lots of people in our community know the story of Samuel Robinson and the near miracle that has seen him grow to be a fine young man. This is his mother Rachel's side of the story and an explanation of the family's latest fund raising drive.

In 2006 we had the lifechanging news that our third child would be born with a serious complex heart disease. For him to have a chance of life, he has had four open heart surgeries and countless other procedures, the first open heart at just three days old. Due to the complex nature of the condition, Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome (or in layman's terms, half a heart) the surgery is only palliative. This condition is very rare and at the time of Samuel's diagnosis, the surgery had only been performed at a handful of centres by specialist cardiologists for 15 years in the UK.

Nothing can fully prepare you for the isolation, fear, uncertainty and anxiety this diagnosis brings. Thankfully I discovered a small charity, who wholly specialises in single ventricle heart conditions.

Little Hearts Matter have been by our side every step of our 'half a heart' journey; from the initial diagnosis at 22 weeks pregnancy, through surgeries, and all aspects of him growing up with the condition. They offer support and advice to anvone affected by single ventricle heart conditions. Being a small charity, they rely heavily on funds raised to continue to develop and support families like ours.

Samuel's eldest sister, Sophia, is away in Africa doing community projects this summer, so his two other sisters, Jemima and Grace have set themselves the challenge of swimming 25 miles to celebrate 25 years of Little Hearts Matter. I do hope you can support them even if in a small way, to show

how wonderful they are doing this for their brother and other families like ours around the UK.

Grateful thanks to Teme Leisure in Ludlow for granting the girls free access to the pool to complete their mission.

CLEOBURY PLAYERS

It is with a considerable amount of regret that I have to announce the demise of our talented drama group, Cleobury Players.

Since it was established by a group of staff at Lacon Childe School in the mid 1970s, the group grew in strength that by the turn of the century it was producing plays of excellent quality and quantity for a town the size of Cleobury. Over the last 40 years we have presented an eclectic selection of dozens of plays ranging from 'Allo, 'Allo to Les Liaisons Dangereuses, all complete with excellent sets constructed by our extremely talented back-stage crew and technicians. All through this period we have looked upon Lacon Childe School as our home (apart from the occasional excursions to other venues in our locality) for both rehearsals and productions. For four decades we have relied on and enjoyed an excellent relationship with seven successive Headteachers, members of staff and caretakers; the latter taking the brunt of our seemingly endless requests for help when our only enemy was the clock, to get a production on the stage. To this end, in addition to paying the usual hire charges, the group has over the years enlarged the lighting capabilities, stage equipment and tracking which amounts to well over £5,000, plus an additional £1,000 for new chairs in the hall, all intended for our mutual benefit.

In addition, many charities were invited to run the obligatory raffle during a production which raised funds for Macmillan Nurses,. Little Hearts Matter, Royal British Legion and many others. Some years ago a for £1,000 cheque was presented to Dr. Taylor for Prostate Cancer.

In November 2014, The C. Players presented R. Sherriff's famous play 'Journey's End' in St. Mary's Church to commemorate the outbreak of the First World War and to remember all the men from the Cleobury area who did not return home after the end of hostilities. We were pleased to welcome 3 young students from Lacon Childe School to take significant parts this moving play; experience that I am sure they will remember for the rest of their lives.

Little did I know that it was to be 'journey's end' in more ways than one. Since then, despite several attempts by our Chair, Annabel Gemmill, to engender support for the continuation of the group has been without success and consequently it has been decided that reluctantly the group should be disbanded. This decision brings to an end a period in our local history where our community was entertained to high standards that, by the end of the century, we had a membership of 30 plus actors offering at least one production a year.

A lot of this success was the result of the enthusiasm of my late wife Mavis whose love of the theatre and her tenacity and capabilities steered the various chair-persons, committee members and others to ever more ambitious productions.

So the above brings to an end 40 plus years of entertaining our community which at times has been hard work for those involved but has always been good fun with plenty of banter and a pint afterwards.

On a personal note I would like to thank everybody who has worked so hard to achieve our objective and also the others who helped the group in so many individual ways.

Last month I met Inspector Nikki Roberts, who leads South Shropshire policing, to discuss steps being taken to prevent and tackle crime in our communities. In light of the Prime Minister's pledge to increase police officer numbers by 20,000, I am determined to see rural areas like Shropshire benefit – and was encouraged to hear that the Chief Constable is allocating an additional 10 substantive police constables to South Shropshire. The result of this increase is effectively a 50% increase in the safer neighbourhood teams in Ludlow and Bridgnorth on each shift - a very welcome increase! This follows a record 56 officers joining West Mercia Police in July alone, as part of recruitment of 115 new officers.

West Mercia Police are also taking encouraging steps to help prevent rural crime, an issue which I know West Mercia's Police and Crime Commissioner John Campion takes seriously. So I was pleased to meet the We Don't Buy Crime officer, who was promoting use of Smart Water to Craven Arms' Mayor and Shropshire Councillor, and encouraging adoption across communities in Shropshire following the lead taken in Cleobury Mortimer where domestic burglary was reduced dramatically.

Smart Water individually marks goods of value with a unique identifier which is invisible to the naked eye, but is revealed under Ultra Violet light, and links the goods marked direct to the household of the owner. Each West Mercia officer carries a UV torch so can look for smart water marked goods whenever suspicious of a theft.

This has proven successful in reducing and disrupting the market for stolen goods,

protecting homes and possessions by making them less attractive to the would-be criminal. So West Mercia are also looking to extend this scheme to cover farms, to combat a recent spike east of the A49 in recent months.

I am sure many will also welcome the additional powers being given to Police under stop and search through a nationwide pilot, with more than 8,000 police officers authorised to use enhanced stop and search powers, as part of Government efforts to crack down on violent crime. While knives are used in fewer serious crimes in West Mercia compared to the national average (4% rather than 6%), and indeed is far below the worst hotspots for knife crime like certain parts of London and Birmingham, this is a welcome step to tackle a growing problem in society, particularly for young people.

The new government has also outlined in its first month plans to review sentencing for the most serious offenders, including not letting prisoners out automatically part-way through a sentence and reviewing how to break the cycle of repeat offending. In light of anticipated increase demand for caseloads, the Justice Secretary has announced a further £85 million for the Crown Prosecution Service to build capacity over the next 2 years, with an extra £2.5 billion investment to create 10,000 extra prison places.

I hope this renewed focus on tackling and preventing crime, both nationally and in south Shropshire, will help make streets safer in communities across the UK.

ST JOHN'S CHURCH, DODDINGTON

"Oooh!" was the reaction of wildflower expert, Rob Rowe, as he walked through the church gate – a sign that he had already seen some interesting plants and expected more. You may have seen the long waving grasses at the front of our churchyard, in preparation for the wildflower identification session with Beautiful Burial Grounds in July.

We started at the bottom of the steps, looking at flowers on either side, many of them good habitat indicators. After the first hour, with 44 species recorded, we moved further into the site. By the end, more than 80 species had been recorded.

The significance of burial grounds is that they have been managed in a similar way to traditional hayfields, farming has changed in the last 100 years, reducing species diversity, so burial grounds are now vital habitats for many species. Recording these is important, and it will inform our future management of the churchyard.

The grass got longer than we intended because we didn't manage a late Spring cut due to bad weather. It has now been scythed by a team from Caring for God's Acre. Next year we

will choose certain areas to manage to encourage wild flowers, but cut other areas more often, particularly those regularly visited to tend graves.

Our Skittles Evening in August was enjoyed by all. On to September, when we have a Jumble Sale at 2.30pm on Saturday the 7th and Celebrate Harvest at 3pm on Sunday the 29th, followed by our Fun Auction of produce and a Bring and Share Tea. Do join us.



CURLEW CONSERVATION

Previous editions of the Clarion described the work of Clee Hill Community Wildlife Group monitoring curlew population, find and nests with support, landowner them from predators, and radio tag the chicks as soon as they hatch. That way we can follow them to see how they move about the landscape to feed, and the threats they face. Last year in Clee Hill, three nests were found and fenced, and while two broods perished, at least one, and probably two, of the chicks from the third brood fledged.

This year, both parts of the project were repeated, with less time spent on nest-finding, protection and monitoring because the SWT/SOS appeal has been less successful. It has been a strange year, as curlews arrived on their breeding grounds and settled down later than usual.

The Community Wildlife Group found seven to eight pairs in the area we have been monitoring since 2012, and another one just to the north. The same as last year, but we have lost five out of 13 pairs (38%) in seven years.

We also added four more squares (16 sq.km.) to the survey area to the north, where curlews are known to breed. The Abdon District Community Wildlife Group, which covers the area to our north, extended southwards, so between us we now cover a much bigger continuous area.

In the Clee Hill area, the project found and fenced four nests. One clutch of four eggs went full term, but didn't hatch, and another clutch was destroyed after sheep with thick coats were released in the field and trampled part of the electric fence down; their coats enabled them to withstand the shock.

Two clutches hatched. Radio tags were fitted to six chicks, and they were all tracked. The first pair, on SWT land at Catherton Common. are presumably the pair that used the fenced area nearby in previous years, as they took the chicks there after hatching. Three of the four chicks were tagged. Two were predated. The third lost its tag, which was found, but it appears this one too was predated.

The second pair (at the same site where definitely one, probably two, young fledged last year) had three eggs that all hatched, and all the chicks were tagged and tracked. All three young were colour-ringed and fledged, an excellent result. These young, and last year's, will help the local population survive longer, while we campaign for landscape-scale changes that enable curlews to breed successfully.

The main aim nest finding this year was to gain more information about how the chicks behave and forage, and the threats they face. We have achieved this on Clee Hill.

Altogether, ten Community Wildlife Groups have been monitoring their local curlew populations. When their results have been analysed, and added to the results of the nest protection and radio-tagging, we will consider how to take the projects forward next year.





A recent discovery of a pack of black and white photos reproduced as postcards by Doctor Mark Baldwin and sold in his renowned book shop, included this surprise. What is now Cinema Court used to be the Three Horse Shoes Cinema.





It's not easy to recognise this humble brick built frontage as the same place that now boasts an impressive entrance into two fine apartments, two storeys high and each with a balcony where the tenants can sit and look down on the world passing by. The editor was lucky enough to be shown around one of these by Bruce Webster, who moved up from the south of the country and sky high rents to live happily in Cleobury Mortimer. A very sensible chap.

Behind this frontage today is a series of apartments, all very attractive and well kept. A far cry from the window factory it was in the 1970s and later Peter Rust's Antique Centre. Those seat prices in today's coinage roughly translate into very few pence: 3p, 6p and 8p.

This picture was reproduced with Dr Baldwin's kind permission and he has agreed to us using his series of cards for more opportunities to take a Look Back. Some fascinating stuff to look forward to, including one ancient view of a local pub.

CATHERTON COMMON UPDATE

The nights are starting to draw in already and autumn approaches, but there is still plenty happening out on the Nature Reserve.

Wet and warm conditions throughout much of the spring and summer have provided excellent conditions for insect breeding. Consequently the common has been alive with hirundines (swallows and house martins) and the similar but unrelated swifts as they feed up ready to head south for the winter. There were plenty to be seen above us the other day when we were out clearing gorse.

This is one of the wider benefits of nature reserves, as they not only provide homes and habitat for resident wildlife, but their natural habitats also provide food for other species that may only use the reserve temporarily. The hirundines can often be seen at the top of slopes or higher in the sky where updrafts bring the insects up to them. On Catherton Common it is often the wet flushes, very rich in flying insects, which attract their attention. Many of these wet areas have been lost in the wider countryside either through drainage or, just as damaging for wildlife, deepening into ponds. Along with them go the insects that many creatures need to survive. However we have some very healthy areas of wet flush across Catherton Common rich in both common and rare insects.

Both swift and pine martin are on the orange list of birds of conservation concern due to falling numbers.





I thought you might like to see my photo of this rather large snake found tangled in netting in a friend's garden recently. I was called for advice and hurried along, hoping or fearing to find an Adder, which I still haven't seen in the Wyre Forest. The yellow collar and sheer size gave it away as a Grass Snake (probably a female), harmless but still formidable, especially when hissing and emitting a powerful stink in its defence. It was estimated at about 3 feet long, so well short of the record 6 feet according to Stefan Buczacki's 'Fauna Britannica'. It was eventually cut free and soon disappeared, unharmed.



The singing of the Robin heralds the start of autumn and the year's harvest has moved on to blackberries and crab apples, damsons and sloes. The beautiful fruits of the Rowan are attracting Blackbirds and Mistle Thrushes and I wonder how much longer supplies will last.

The wild and dog roses in the hedgerows are beginning to show their red hips, reminding those of us of the war-time and post war generations of delicious rose hip syrup being spooned into our young mouths to boost our Vitamin C levels. The hips were gathered throughout the countryside: about 450 tons a year between 1943 and 1945 according to Simon Fletcher in 'A Wyre Forest Diary'. The seeds are the source of the irritating country itching powder popped down other schoolchildren's backs, so they must be removed before boiling the pulp with its own weight in sugar and straining the resulting syrup.

Heather and gorse flowers brighten the woodland edges and heaths and provide plenty of early autumn food for bees and other nectarloving insects. Acorns and beech mast are ripening and the first of the autumn colour is appearing: wild cherry showing red and purple, orange on the deciduous European larch, and yellow on birch and some of the oaks.

It's changeover time, with swallows and martins preparing to leave on their migration flights to Africa. They do this by massing in large groups and juvenile house martins may help their parents to feed the last, late broods of young still in the cup-shaped nests of mud attached under the eaves of houses. Sand martins are brown and white in contrast to the black and white of the house martins and can be seen darting across the river surface in Bewdley. Efforts were made to accommodate them in the quay walls when the flood defences were built and they still breed there. The badgers will be changing over their bedding too, replacing the summer's grass, bracken or straw with a thick layer of fresh material. Even for a badger there must be nothing like a freshly-made bed.


mainly simple floor exercises to build strength in the body.

A new contributor joins the Clarion's rank of talent= Mrs Grumpy

I was interested to read the piece about cats in the last 'Clarion' but I wonder how they have time to sit looking so good as they spend most of their time cutting a swathe through the local bird population. That's when they aren't pooing in neighbours gardens. What a lovely surprise to come out of the house in the morning to the scent of fresh and very smelly cat poo on the flower beds or lawn. They may look cuddly, but as someone said once 'When your dog sits and gazes into your eyes, it's because it loves you. When your cat does the same, It's trying to work out how to kill and eat you'. So cat owners beware. If you awake to find your lovely 'tiddles' or whatever, chewing on your arm, they are not playing.

Talking of dogs and poo, is the world (and Cleobury) being overrun by them? Their numbers seem to be increasing by the minute. And not all their owners seem to be acting responsibly as the industrial quantities of dog poo on our streets demonstrate. The following biological principle may have escaped the attention of some owners but as sure as night follows day, if you put food in one end of a dog, poo will come out of the other. You should not be surprised when this happens (as some folk appear to be) and it is your responsibility to clean it up. This will also happen regardless of whatever fancy name your particular variety of cross breed possesses. Why bother? Just call them all mongrels as we used to.

The problem is not just limited to the streets. A walk down the footpath from the top of Workhouse Bank can be a hazardous route as it seems that some dog owners shove them through the gate and leave them to their own devices. Even the Churchyard is not immune. Not only is this unpleasant but dog poo can also harbour the *Toxocara Canis* worm which can

cause blindness if a toddler comes into contact with it. This happened to a neighbours daughter many years ago and she lost the sight in an eye. She would now be in her forties and and although the dog concerned will be long dead, she will still only have one working eye. Recent surveys on playing fields (why are dogs allowed on playing fields?) have shown that 10-15% of deposits sampled are infected in this way and children up to the age of about seven are the most vulnerable to the infection.

Wandering through a large supermarket the other day, I was amazed by the amount of space taken up by pet food and other animal requirements – virtually a whole aisle. Whatever happened to throwing them a few scraps and an occasional bone? I bet the pet food industry is rubbing its hands with glee at gullible pet owners lashing out on the latest fad. And don't get me started on dogs having their own prams and pushchairs. The latest development seems to be ice cream for dogs. Ye Gods and little fishes – there are an estimated 2.8 million children in the UK living in poverty and we are feeding ice cream to ≥dogs. I despair.

Talking supermarkets, there have been several instances lately where customers of the Cleobury Co-op have purchased items on special offer and found that they have been charged the full price. This seems to have happened because the shelf labels have not been changed promptly when the offers finish. Most of us don't bother to check our till receipts but it might be worth doing this because if the goods are advertised at the lower price, the retailer must charge that amount regardless of what the till receipt might say. I was in there recently and spotted staff changing shelf labels so this may have been sorted now but your







ST MARY'S CHURCH UPDATE

In the July Clarion we announced our project to improve the heating in St Mary's church. Much has happened in the last couple of months, so we should let you know what we've achieved so far and what is still to do.

Firstly, we have received official permission from the Church of England legal department in London to allow the work to go ahead. The church has to approve the work and that there ensure are objections to any work to be carried out: luckily there were none in this case.

With the grant from the Friends of St Mary's, and money already earmarked, we were able to pay the deposit to Grange Heating of Leominster, who are carrying out the work, and this allowed us to agree a timescale for the project. Work will start on September 2nd and is expected to take four weeks, three in the main body of the church and another complete the work in the boiler house. The church will be closed from the afternoon of September 1st; assuming all goes according to plan, services in the church will re-start on Sunday September 29th.

The first stage will be to remove the existing wooden floor, and this will have to be disposed of. We have had expressions of interest in some of the timber: if anyone else is interested please call me on 270601. We'll need to get it moved off site very quickly as storage space in the church during the work will be very limited.

Liz Smith and her committee have been working hard to raise money to complete the work. An appeal letter was delivered to every house in the town, and this has raised over £4000 so far. A cream tea and music recital in church in July raised over £700. Further events are planned for the autumn and are listed below. A further National Lottery grant, made by the Friends of St Mary's on our behalf has achieved another £10,000. Grant applications are also pending for various private trusts. Finally, we've obtained a refund of the VAT on our deposit, which augurs well for doing so for the rest of the cost.



September 2019 Clarion Report

By now you are probably aware that Shropshire Council have outlined a plan sent to us, to hand over funding for the Library to Cleobury tax payers, via the local precept. This is proposed to be phased in over the next 5 years starting December 2019. The full costs of this would start out as £4,800 for 2020/21 rising to £24,000 by 2024/25. This proposal, if accepted, would represent a £21 p.a. increase for an average Band D property, or a 20% increase in local Council tax by 2024/25, needless to say we have asked for firm proposals before it goes out for public consultation so we all have the full facts.

We will keep you up to date of anything else received about this on our Website or Facebook page.

We are also increasingly concerned about the growing inequality between smaller Town Councils precept (£100/Band D) and surrounding parish councils (£30 Band D) whose residents access our services and Shrewsbury (£45 Band D) who have more residents to share the burden and many more services funded by Shropshire Council. The Town council is very focused on value for money and are looking into this with other Town and parish councils.

The Dog training area has had its official opening and was joined by many dog owners and reported by the Shropshire Star and Clarion.

It is proving very popular and sometimes with queues waiting to use it. It is especially good for those with puppies to train or those with sighthounds who cannot usually let their dogs off the lead. One interesting item to come from a resident that uses it regularly is from Janet Manley, who is a sight hound owner and works hard with her friend Jill to highlight the need for blood donors for dogs, as it is always needed for operations and can save a pet's life. All greyhounds blood is universal, is something we found out, so if you would like to involve your dog in giving blood, please contact the council office and we can pass on your information.

Another good item to report about is the winner of the best dressed window competition, judged by Mrs Bunn, which was won by the Washhouse. As Mrs Bunn was not available for the presentation Mrs Jo Booton, independent living coordinator for Connexus, based at St Marys place presented two cheques for their nominated local Charities of Newbridge cat rescue and Forest dog rescue of £50 each. Worthwhile causes from a worthy winner with a glass trophy to keep.

Please be aware of some unscrupulous people going around knocking on doors and offering to cut back your trees and hedges and then charging a lot of money for doing it.

If you have vulnerable neighbours please make them aware of this and if they do want any work doing or quoted for, they can always call the council office where we can give them details of all the local tradesman.

For those of you that are interested, the next Dementia support group meeting is at 11am 23rd September and will be held at the kings Arms. This will be to see if there is a need for a Cleobury group going forward and what form it should take to meet the needs of People Living with Dementia and their carers. All interested parties are welcome.



IN BUSINESS - Boden and Son Deliveries



Building a business on some old but sound principles - service and reliability. Sean Boden.

Sean Boden started his business in 2013, moving to self employment after years. Why did he do it? "I just got tired of working for other people and I do enjoy the job I do now." He'd worked as a milkman and in a Clee Hill shop, not far from where he and Nesta live now.

You wouldn't believe the hours that milkmen (and women) work, so we'll just give you Sean's own words: "I'm up at 1.20, in the van by 2.00 and finish the round by about 11.00. Six days a week and on Sunday I do the paperwork." If you feel like telling him about the Working Time Directive, don't waste your time - he does this because he wants to.

From his Clee Hill Village base he covers an area stretching from Bewdley in the East to Knowbury in the West, taking in Mamble and Rock along the way. 45 miles a day, 80 miles when he does his Bewdley days; 26,000 miles a year. You need a reliable van for that and when his Peugeot broke a cam belt outside the Medical Centre at 3.00 on a July morning he had to walk up to Mawley Town Farm to borrow a van and get the round done. Mawley Milk is his main business and he does not let a long list of customers down.

He's driving a much newer Peugeot now, courtesy of Harold at Hopton Bank Service Station. "He's brilliant," says Sean. "Told him I needed a van on Monday, had a look at it on Tuesday and drove it away on Wednesday." A 64 plate turbo-diesel at an affordable rental and all he has to find is the insurance cost and fuel.

He started with the Mawley Milk round and has added other services, newspapers the latest one. Nobody would take on the paper round that Simply Fresh were trying to sell for £10,000, which does not sound like a bargain. Sean buys papers from a local distributor and delivers

at the same price that Simply Fresh charged. It's a fast growing part of the business, with about 50 customers signed up in five weeks and enquiries still coming in. He wants to build that business in Cleobury up to the point where he can take on delivery boys and girls. "It would be good for the kids," he reasons. "There's nothing else for them to earn a little money from."

He also delivers Ashley's bread, helping another local trader because Ashley buys all his milk and cream through Sean. Sensible co-operation, two local businesses supporting one another.

He's come a long way in six years, since he started the business with just £20 in the bank and a determination to succeed. He's done that by being helpful and reliable, with respect for his customers: "The customer's the boss," he explains. "They pay my wages."

Future plans? "I'd like to employ someone, So I could have my first holiday in six years." If it gets big enough, would he go for a shop of his own? "No. I like the business as it is." And the many customers of the business seem to like his way of looking after them.




